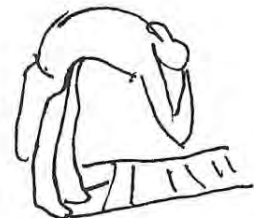

Minutes from the April 28, 2014 Bolinas Fire Protection District Board Meeting

Pres. Buchanan called the regular meeting of the Bolinas Fire Protection District to order at 7:30PM. Dir. Chiera, Dir. Bass and Dir. Kimball were present. Vice Pres. Smith was absent. Also present: Chief Brown and Secretary Brown.

MSC, Chiera/Bass (unan with one absence) to approve the agenda.

CHIEF'S REPORT

MERA

Agenda Item 4a and b to be addressed later in meeting under General Business.

Prevention

Evacuation Planning

Chief Brown met with Sgt. Hernandez regarding the evacuation planning for Bolinas. He confirmed that evacuation is a law enforcement (LE) task. LE agencies have mutual aid agreements with surrounding jurisdictions similar to the fire service agencies. In the event that residents would need to be evacuated, LE would immediately start multiple agencies to the area. BFPD may start evacuations depending on the situation, but LE would take over as soon as it was feasible. The specifics of a situation would determine whether residents would be instructed to evacuate on foot or by vehicle. The situation will also dictate where residents are requested to go. If residents are instructed to leave Bolinas, a shelter could be activated in Stinson Beach or Pt. Reyes Station. Sgt. Hernandez suggested having copies of maps of Bolinas available for agencies responding to the area. Chief Brown will prepare them. He also recommended ID cards for Board members and volunteer firefighters in the event the incident requires LE to set up a closed perimeter. Those with an ID card will be allowed to get through the perimeter to respond to the fire house. She will research how to acquire ID cards. Chief Brown hopes to attend a North Bay Incident Management meeting to observe discussion and table top drills which address some of these issues. These meetings are attended by LE, EMS and Fire personnel.

Dir. Kimball thanked Chief Brown for taking action on evacuation planning.

Grants

Todd Lando attended a mandatory workshop hosted by the California Fire Safe Council on April 9th regarding grant monies awarded to the district. He plans to call Chief Brown for a phone meeting to discuss receiving and expending the monies.

Training

Firefighters Willie Krakauer and Cole Rippe have been conducting trainings on Thursday evenings. Topics covered have been rope rescue, water suppression systems and water rescue. Chief Brown commended their excellent service to the Department.

Chief Brown provided a public CPR class on April 21st. Only two people attended, which is better than none.

Disaster Council

Chief Brown reported that area meetings have been held for Areas 1, 5 and 12. Despite their best efforts to advertise and alert residents to the meetings, attendance has been minimal. Beth and Chief Brown will continue to hold meetings and encourage participants. Chief Brown and Beth met with Red Cross representatives on Friday March 28th to discuss disaster supplies for the town. They also discussed supply needs in the event of water outages and shelter needs for both residents and non-residents. Some very good information was obtained in the meeting. Thanks to the very generous donations made by Susie Tompkins Buell, the Disaster Council plans on making several purchases to be better prepared for these types of events. Chief Brown reminded everyone that the Bolinas reCERT class is scheduled for Saturday May 3rd from 0900 to 1630. The morning session will cover Disaster First Aid and the afternoon will be Search and Rescue. Lunch will be provided. Asst. Chief Marcotte will be conducting the afternoon portion. There are ten confirmed attendees so far. There will be backpacks containing various supplies provided to all participants. Chief Brown was very thankful to Susie

Buell who donated yet another \$2,000 from the rental of her Peace Barn to the Disaster Council.

Surfers' Overlook Repair/Terrace Avenue
Dir. Kimball reported that he, along with Chief Brown and GM Blackman of the BCPUD will meet with Sup. Steve Kinsey, Liza Cross, Earnest Klock, Bob Beaumont and Larry Kennings on May 31st to discuss the next steps to be taken regarding funding for the Surfers' Overlook repair. Dir. Kimball reported that Sup. Steve Kinsey has one more year left as the chair of the Coastal Commission. He may be reappointed. Dir. Kimball mentioned that there are regulations regarding construction below the mean high tide line as mentioned by Maria Brown, executive Director of the Gulf of the Farallones Marine Sanctuary. Its exact location is hard to determine. Chief Brown thanked Dir. Kimball for the report.

GENERAL BUSINESS

Presentation: Proposed funding mechanism for the second generation Marin Emergency Radio Authority public safety communications system presented by MERA Project Manager David Jeffries. Dave Jeffries presented the current issues that are now effecting emergency radio communications throughout the County of Marin. He began by defining MERA (Marin Emergency Radio Authority) as a collection of public agencies (25) formed in 1998 to plan, implement and manage a countywide public safety and emergency radio system for the use of all the agencies for both day-to-day needs and after major emergency or natural disasters. MERA is the link between the 911 public safety dispatch centers and the public safety units in the field that respond to emergencies.

The current radio system was designed to accommodate 1,580 mobile and portable radios with expansion capacity to 2,500 radios. Today, it serves 2,897 radios which is significantly more than it was designed to serve. The actual radios are soon to become outdated and unsupported by Motorola who manufactured them. He described the Next Generation system that addresses these problems mentioned above and improves emergency communications overall in the County. The new system will have greater coverage and capacity with additional tower sites, provide new radios and updated technology to first responders, improve response times and will comply with new communication regulations. He then outlined the proposed County wide parcel tax as a funding mechanism for the second generation system. The parcel tax, if passed with a two-thirds vote on the November ballot, would cost \$29 per single family.

Chief Brown asked if the new system will have greater capacity in addition to greater coverage as the BFPD gets

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"bumped off" the current system when there is high traffic. Dave answered that the two new towers planned for western and southern Marin will increase the capacity of the system.

Dave went on to overview the Operating and Maintenance budget for the new system that is projected to have a 7.4% annual increase of costs. Dir. Kimball asked if the 7.4% annual increase includes Service Upgrade Agreement (SUA) costs. Dave answered that the annual increase does not include the SUA costs. Dir. Kimball asked that these costs be included in the future for a more accurate and honest presentation.

Chief Brown asked if the parcel tax costs per family will diminish if grants are received to fund the project. Dave answered that that answer has yet to be determined.

Dir. Kimball expressed his support of the new system and the parcel tax as the BFPD needs to stay current with new technology being used in the rest of the County. He pointed out that the current radios will soon be obsolete and that the new "open architecture" and Internet based technology will be cheaper in the long run.

Dir. Chiera asked if there is opposition to the new system from any agencies at this point. Dave answered that there is no sizable opposition, but there is concern from several agencies about adequate coverage.

Pres. Buchanan asked if the implementation of the four new proposed towers will be difficult. Dave answered that the new towers will only make the new system more functional and can be installed while the new system is up and running.

Chief Brown asked what the contingency rate is for the overall budget. Dave answered that it is budgeted at 15%. Dir. Kimball remarked that 25% would be more realistic.

Pres. Buchanan thanked both Dave Jeffries and his assistant Alex Anderson for their presentation.

It was noted by the Board that this funding mechanism of a County wide parcel tax for the updated system was far more financially feasible than passing the cost on to each individual jurisdiction.

Action Item 1: Adopt Resolution #170-2014: A Resolution of the Board of Directors of the Bolinas Fire Protection District Supporting and Endorsing the Levy of Parcel Tax to Finance a New Countywide Public Safety Communications System
MSC, Kimball/Chiera (unan with one absence) to adopt Resolution #170-2014. The Board noted that the Action Item endorses putting the tax measure on the November ballot only.

CONSENT CALENDAR

MSC, Kimball/Bass (unan with one absence) to approve the Consent Calendar including the Minutes from the March 24, 2014 regular meeting, the warrant lists from March 19 – April 22, 2014, and the financial reports for March 2014 including account balances.

PUBLIC EXPRESSION

None.

COMMITTEE REPORTS

Dir. Kimball reported that the Finance Committee met on April 15th including Bookkeeper Kaaren Gann, Lisa Doran of Doran & Associates, Dir. Bass, Dir. Chiera and Sec. Brown. Financial budget reports were discussed and how to best show both operating and capital expenditures within the reports. Lisa Doran suggested including three additional reports in the Board packets for the monthly meetings. The three additional reports include a balance sheet, a cash flow report and a profit and loss statement in an excel format. Dir. Kimball requested that the original financial budget report be continued and included in the packets also. He asked Sec. Brown to align the old financial budget report with the new reports. He also reported a new goal set at the meeting to approve the budget for a new fiscal year before the fiscal year begins on June 30th.

He then thanked Dir. Bass and Dir. Chiera for attending the meeting.

Dir. Chiera remarked that basing District finances on an accrual basis makes the best sense and that he is pleased with the direction the Finance Committee is taking by making the finances more transparent to the community via more accurate financial reporting. He added that a public agency should be as transparent as possible with its financial reporting. Chief Brown reported that the preliminary draft budget is almost complete. She would like to meet with the Finance Committee to review it and then meet with the Personnel Committee.

BOARD MEMBER REPORT

Pres. Buchanan announced that his term on the Board will be ending in November and that he will not be running again for re-election. He encouraged Vice Pres. Smith to stay on the Board as his term is also over as of November. The rest of the Board members present encouraged him to reconsider his decision and stated that he will be missed greatly.

GOOD OF THE ORDER

Dir. Kimball commended Chief Brown for her excellent work at managing the District Volunteers, the finances and all aspects of inter-department relations. He thanked her profusely for her job well done.

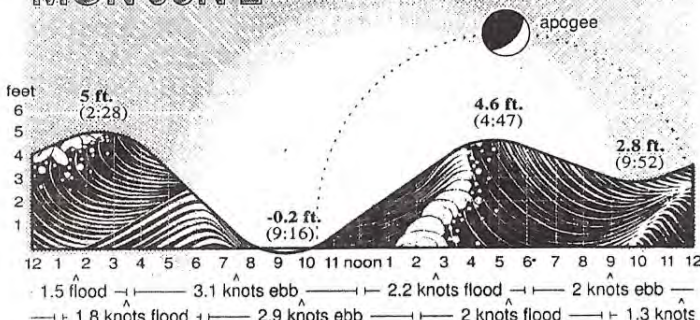

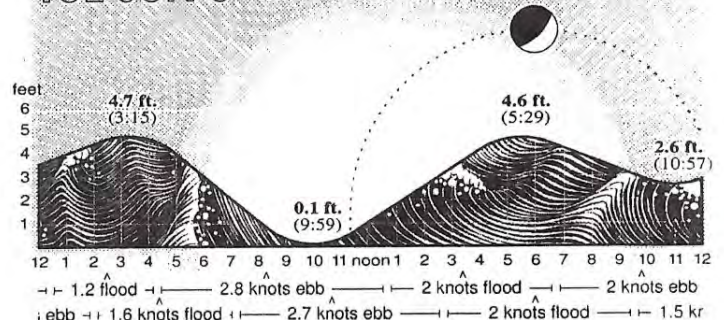
