

I live on Overlook and thus will be affected by all three developments that have been proposed by BCLT. I acknowledge that there is a need for affordable *rental* housing in Bolinas, however building multi-unit developments *for sale* is not going to solve the problem, for obvious reasons. BCLT stated at their last community meeting that two of these three projects would be offered as "equity ownership," in other words, they would not be available as rental housing.

I am also concerned about the cumulative impact of these projects on the neighborhood in terms of water use and septic load, not to mention traffic, parking and noise. I note that the BCPUE Agenda for 1/16/19 Board of Directors meeting includes no less than *four* items which are "Second Notice of Non-Compliance with Expanded Water Use Permit." BCLT has applied for and been granted Expanded Water Use Permits. Is this the beginning of a trend? Get your Expanded Use Permit and then just violate it? Certainly, there is no way that a housing development with 3-4 bedrooms as proposed, for example, on the 430 Aspen Project, will get by on the Expanded Use allotment of 225 gallons per day. Even calculating very conservatively that there would be 6 people living on the property, that is 37.5 gallons per person per day. This is 25% of the stated average water use for Bolinas residents of 150 gallons per person per day.

When neighbors asked BCLT about the proposed developments under consideration, the Executive Director stated that her organization was not soliciting community input on proposed projects and that "the neighbors have no say." Repeated efforts to obtain information about developments that are certain to impact the neighborhood were ignored. BCLT never explained why all three separate proposed developments are contained within an area that represents only 6% of the gridded Mesa. Both BCPUD and BCLT need to provide answers. An environmental impact report and consideration of the issues of density, water use, watershed, wildlife and traffic should be the firs order of the day before proceeding any further. So far, BCPUD has been going along with BCLT's ill-conceived schemes to become the biggest landlord cum developer of the town of Bolinas. As a long-term resident of Bolinas, I want assurances that our way of life will not be deleteriously impacted, all for supposed good of the community.


Does anyone remember the plan to use or create second units as affordable housing? Why has this plan been abandoned in favor of grandiose schemes to develop? It's time to think about the unintended consequences that usually accompany such decisions.

The County has already determined that there are multiple problems with BCLT's applications and have deemed them incomplete. However, BCPUD should be concerned about the broader issue of the future of Bolinas and how much more development, in the form of Expanded Water Use Permits, our water supply can sustain. Moreover, how many Expanded Water Use Permits will it take to set a precedent for allowing rampant development by for-profit developers in our town? BCPUD needs to take a stand and protect the values of the community as set forth in the community plan, not the aspirations of wannabe developers.

She and Michael Rafferty have shared the same house on the Big Mesa for the last 33 years, and most of the time, they feel that they are living happily ever after.

What are you reading now?

I want to start with a Public Service Announcement for the Bolinas Library Book Club, which meets the first Thursday of every month at 7:00 P.M. in the Library. Great venue, lovely people, lively discussions. The selection for February is *The Sympathizer* by Viet Thanh Nguyen. It's set mainly in the '70s in the U.S., the era at the end of the Vietnam War. The protagonist is a refugee from South Viet Nam, but he's really a spy for North Viet Nam....

I usually read several books at once, skipping back and forth. For example, I am currently reading and rereading everything Barbara Kingsolver has written. Also, I just finished My Ex Life by Stephen McCauley. It was so light and sweet and delightfully frothy I ordered all his books from the library. And I read a fair number of non-fiction, political, social, cultural, historical, and self-help. I am now reading James Clapper's Facts and Fears. A recent Terry Gross interview introduced me to a delightful biologist named Rob Dunn and his book Never Home Alone, about all the microbes in our bodies and in our homes, which sounds creepy, but is actually reassuring – so I now have his three previous books from the Library.


Do you like to read paper or ebooks?

Almost exclusively paper. I love the feel of holding a book and physically turning pages, especially old books. I even like the smell.

How about audio books?

They are wonderful, and I need to remind myself to get them as an alternative to watching cable news. I'm in a Shakespeare group right now, and I like to read the plays, while hearing them read by voice actors.

Are you a browser in the Library, or do you know in advance what you're looking for?



I do most of my browsing online; I'm a big fan of the Library's website. When I'm in the Library to pick up my load of reserved books, I will glance over the "Lucky Day" "one week selection." I often find there something I was already planning to read: so lucky me, no #85 on the reserv list. I also look at new fiction and nonfiction on the back wall.

OK. Do you have a favorite genre?

If I had to pick a favorite, it would have to be literary fiction but I also like a lot of nonfiction, historical, social/cultural & political.

Any genres that you never read?

I don't much care for Fantasy or Magical Realism. Don't ask me why.

Do you prefer a book that makes you laugh or cry? Laughing and crying are both great, but I try to avoid graphic depictions of violence and abuse, because these images can get seared into my brain and are just about impossible to expunge.

Or one that teaches you something?

If I can't learn something from every book I pick up, there's something wrong with me.

Were there any books that made a big impression on you in your life?

Since I'm the child of a preacher and an English teacher, The Bible and Shakespeare were woven through my youth, as a part of my cultural heritage, and I now feel fortunate for that. So many literary references are enriched by this background.





The surf shacks are painted on recycled windows with windowframes intact. The driftwood construction of each surf shack is fancifully and minimally rendered. Most of the painting is done on the back of the glass. The palette of colors is muted and harmonious. Each painted surf shack has an colorful outside and a subdued interior. The effect is one of invitation into sanctuary.

At the opening of his show at the Farmstand, Jeff commented on the surf shack effect outside of the gallery's walls:

"Go to the beach. Stack up some sticks. Hang out inside."

Is there an especially famous author that you wanted to meet?

Carol: I'd love to have lunch with David Sedaris and his sisters and Hugh at their North Carolina beach shack. And it would be fun to browse Ann Patchett's bookstore in Nashville with her, then go out for barb-que. And it would be wonderful to go on tour with Mark Twain, not to mention tea and scones with Jane Austin. I would insist on having an appropriate wardrobe for each venue.

What's the last great book you've read and recommended to a friend?

I just re-read Barbara Kingsolver's Flight Behavior. It's about Monarch butterflies and their fictional appearance in an Appalachian community, and the locals' varied response to this miracle. I learned a lot about butterflies and how they are being affected by 'climate change. It mirrors our own concerns about Bolinas Monarchs. Plus, it's a wonderful family drama.

Is there a book you've always meant to read, but still haven't?

I have this huge Russian fiction gap that you could drive a truck through. I've always planned on taking a few years sometime and reading all those guys. Tolstoy, Dostoyevsky, Gogol, etcetera. I could always ban cable news and use my time for more enriching pursuits.

Any highly rated books that you thought were overrated?

I'm easily pleased. And I'm swayed by others' opinions, so if everybody says it was great, I will tend to agree.

What books do you return to? Are there any books you reread?

Twain, Dickens, Alcott and Austin are like comfort food.

Do you have a collection of books at home? If so, where do you keep them, and do you reread?

If I'm in love with an author, such as Richard Powers or Marilynne Robinson, I need to have them close at home. Otherwise, not so much, because it would be easy to become a hoarder. Also, there wouldn't be room for my collections of shoes, or dog collars, or Rafferty art work. If I want to reread I can almost always find it at the Library. If I have had to buy a book for any reason, I either pass it on to a friend, or donate it to that sweet little bookstore downtown next to the post office. (Another public service announcement: that's the place to go browsing!)

What kind of characters draw you in?

Formerly, I would have said, "People like me." But one thing I like about book clubs is that I have been forced to read about unfamiliar times, people, places, and things. And by virtue of that, I have learned a lot of history and culture, which otherwise I might have avoided.

When and where do you read?

Anywhere and everywhere? I love to read in front of a fire with music in the background and my dogs sleeping around me. I love to read on my front porch, which I adore, or in my yard on a balmy day, and in bed at night before I go to sleep.


Why read?

WESTERN MONARCH ACTION PLAN -NOW IS THE TIME!

It was wonderful meeting many of you in the courtyard at the Bolinas Museum opening on January 12th. Thank you for stopping by our monarch table, sharing your deep and special connections to monarch butterflies and expressing your interest in learning more and helping.

Last Thursday the Xerces Society announced an Action Plan to help the MONARCH POPULATION CRISIS along with this year's count results. Available at: savewesternmonarchs.org

The key points are summarized here below. Please share this widely! We hope to share more with you soon. With Love, Mia, Barbara, Aurora et al...

THE XERCES SOCIETY MONARCH BUTTERFLY ACTION PLAN highlights 5 ways to help save Western Monarchs:

1. Protect and manage California's overwintering sites:

We need to create and implement overwintering site management plans at as many overwintering sites as possible that have hosted significant numbers of monarchs in recent years.

2. Restore breeding and migratory habitat in California

Plant flowers which are attractive to monarchs and other butterflies. Ideally, native species which are adapted for climate change and which benefit other insects as well. On the coast no milkweeds please! Inland native milkweeds are wonderfull!

Fall & winter blooming species are very valuable for overwintering monarchs to nectar on.

3. Protect monarchs and their habitat from pesticides We need to halt all cosmetic use of pesticides and work to reduce herbicide and insecticide use in and around overwintering sites and in key breeding regions. https://xerces.org/pesticides/

4. Protect, manage, and restore summer breeding and fall migration monarch habitat outside California

Conduct management activities such as mowing, burning, and grazing in monarch breeding and migratory habitat outside of the period when monarchs are present.






Answer key research questions about how to best aid western monarch recovery

We need research at overwintering sites and suspected early spring breeding sites to understand when monarchs are leaving the overwintering sites, their health and mating status, and milkweed phenology in nearby areas. The effectiveness of western monarch conservation efforts depends upon how many people get involved, and how rapidly we mobilize. Email your work to monarchs@xerces.org
