Community Expression:

1. Mark Butler: proposed play area for the kids in DT Park. Presented overview, funding ideas, community involvement benefits to Downtown Park, Concerns. There was a sign-up sheet at the last community meeting with 10 people who signed up to help work on the project. Those involved include Chrysanthe Gussie, Kirsten Walker, Roger Peacock, and Mark Butler.
Concerns: We would have to change the irrigation in the area, more maintenance would be needed.
Vic: There used to be a play structure in the plaza next to the free box. Could that be an area that could be considered?

Downtown Park:

1. Trash cans for the front of the park. Uline? Mark will talk to Brian Lee to see if we can get matching cans.
2. Irrigation system. The large line irrigation box was filled with dirt and plastic. Need to talk to Alethea about the original plans of the irrigation system so we can find boxes and the main water line is.
3. The redwood tree is dying, someone approached Zoe and mentioned clearing the grass around the roots. Ray Moritz
4. Need to clean out the enclosed area by the tanks. There is a lot of junk that needs to be moved in order to look at the tanks.

Mesa Park:

1. Well/pump used for irrigation is non-operational. Pump failed. Mark had a plumber look at it. Norcal came out and said it is not the silt that is clogging the pump, but plastic from the impeller in the pump. Concern is that the pump draws more water than the well can produce. Could be caused by drought. Norcal is testing to see if we need a smaller pump.
Resource recovery has called to say that there is no water. The line is shaking and vibrating. Gary from Norcal is scheduled to come out and look tomorrow 10/11/15. Pump itself is what might be broken.
2. We need to switch our toilets back on to BPUD water so they are operational.
3. Woodchips for the playground Transfer trailer loads is what we need. Call shamrock. 4-6yards Victoria will meet with Charles to measure and order.
4. Bathroom graffiti, Chas will look at this. There is something that is carved into the door.
5. Mice in the pump house. Chas already cleaned this up.
6. Grey car with windows down has been sitting

GREAT NEWS!

The BCLT is trying to acquire a new property!

It is not only stunningly beautiful, it one of the oldest properties in Bolinas and it consists of three full houses. The owner has been generous enough to work with us and has given us until February to get the finances in order. The plan will be to offer the units for sale through a shared co-operative structure. This will mean three new homes for families!

The units will not be strictly affordable but their resale value will be restricted and they will be well below current market value. The aim is to provide housing for our middle-income families, people such as school-teachers, health practitioners, and utility workers.

The details have not been worked out completely as it doesn't make sense to spend a lot on lawyer fees before we have secured the property. In the meantime, we need to raise \$500,000 by the end of February.

We will be putting out more information as we have it. If you want to make a contribution to the project, all donations are completely tax deductible.

KNOW YOUR BO

For many native peoples, contact with Europeans was the beginning of the end. For more than 1,700 years the native people here were the Coastal Miwok. Their Chief Marin (about 1781-1839) is who our county is named after. Their villages and camps spanned across present-day Bodega Bay, Tomales, Petaluma, San Rafael Nicasio, Olema, Sausalito and Angel Island. A village called "Bauli-n" was located near what is now the town of Bolinas.

In 1579, Sir Francis Drake made his first contact with the Coastal Miwok. His chaplain wrote: "I found the Indians very humorous, with courteous manner, mimicking my prayers with chuckles." But there were major differences in how subsequent Europeans treated them. A letter from a Russian colonel to the lieutenant he sent out to trade with the Miwok stated: "Strictly forbid and punish the slightest rudeness toward the local inhabitants by your men. Seek to win their friendship and love in every way, by various favorable enticements stemming from the courtesy and love of mankind. Strictly forbid anyone to accept the smallest trifle as a gift, not even a morsel of food, but pay for everything with whatever seems appreciable to them." When the Spanish needed labor, they enslaved the Miwok and changed their nutrition to a western diet, thereby weakening their immune systems and making them vulnerable to diseases which killed many of them. The Americans opened boarding schools and brought children from the villages with the intent of taking the "native" out of the Native American.

In 1958, nearly 400 years after Sir Francis Drake's first encounter, the Coastal Miwok were stripped of their federal recognition as a tribe. In 2000, the census listed their total population at 167 people. Later that year, President Clinton signed legislation restoring federal recognition to the Federated Indians of Graton Rancheria (a federation of Coast Miwok and Southern Pomo of Sebastopol). In 2004, the Tribe formed a language group dedicated to learning the Coast Miwok language and publishing a dictionary based in large part on the recordings of Sarah Smith-Ballard (b. 1881, d. 1978), one of the last fluent Coast Miwok speakers. In 2013, the Tribe opened the Graton Resort & Casino, which according to its website: "is able to provide programs and services to Tribal Citizens to realize their dreams of self-sufficiency."

BCLT Annual Membership Meeting

Present: Board Members: Karen Dibblee, Lisa Townsend, Fran McDormand, Jeff Manson, Alethea Patten, Howard Dillon, Steve Matson, Meg Simonds, Patty Bradford, Clare Rojas. BCLT staff members: Newly hired by BCLT Board - Executive Director - Arianne Dar, Project Manager - Evie Wilhelm, Gas Station Manager - Albie Foreman, and Bookkeeper - Patrice Daley

Meeting led by newly selected BCLT Board President, Meg Simonds.

1. Welcome by Board President Meg Simonds.
2. Board Retreat - Report back with explanation of new structure. Qualifications to serve as a BCLT board member were presented. The formation of the new Board Committees was presented and discussed by ED Arianne Dar and Pres. Meg Simonds. They are:

Executive Committee:

President: Meg Simonds, Steve Matson, Karen Dibblee, Logan Goodman, Howard Dillon

Working Board Committees: *Finance/Fundraising, Design/Facility Oversight and Communications.*

3. **Report from committees:** A report was given by a Board representative from each of the committees:

Hiring Committee: Discussed the interviewing and hiring of new ED Arianne Darr who resigns as President to become Executive Director.

Finance Committee: Discussed a brief review of income and expenses of the BCLT for the fiscal year of 2015 prepared by Bookkeeper Patrice Daley. Handouts of the financials were available to review.

Communications: Plans for updating the web site were discussed and the annual ASK letter has been sent out.

Design Committee: The completion of the new patio attached to the Bakery was discussed.

4. **Membership reinvigoration** - The ED and the President stressed that we are a membership driven organization. We welcome new membership and input. People were invited to join or rejoin at \$5.00 per year. We plan to have 4 Board meetings per year, with committees meeting more frequently as needed. Meetings are open to the membership and general public. Members may also participate on committees. Dates and times of meetings will be posted on the BCLT website and other social media platforms.

5. **Formation of "Advisory" committee** to assist the Board: The BCLT is inviting any members of the community who feel they might have special skills, i.e. in fundraising, law, or real estate for example, to become members of this special advisory committee.

6. **Election of new Board Trustees** by the membership. All of the newly applying Board members were introduced and gave a short speech stating their reasons for wishing to serve on the BCLT Board and support affordable homes in our community. The membership also asked that each of the currently serving Board members to introduce themselves and also discuss why they wanted to serve on the BCLT. After casting ballots with the assistance of Evie Wilhelm, all new and those with terms up for re-election were unanimously elected.

7. **The new Executive Committee** was discussed and selected. Members are Meg Simonds, Karen Dibblee, Howard Dillon, Logan Goodman, and Steve Matson.

8. **Quarterly meeting schedule** dates to be decided and posted in BCLT website, the Hearsay and other social media platforms.

9. Looking Ahead:

We have been focusing on the feasibility of 2nd units for affordable homes. We are working with the county and Don Smith to allow functioning septic systems to support 2nd units. We are also working to secure property and projects despite huge costs and bureaucratic obstacles.

A Homeowners Rental Rehab Loan Workshop is being planned for early 2017. This will be presented in collaboration with CLAM in PRS, the Marin Housing Authority and Lilypad Homes a Marin County contractor. This is to encourage and help facilitate the rehabilitation of possible second units for long term rentals in West Marin.

12 Q and A:

Q - *What fundraising have we done recently?*

A- The Halloween party benefit, the annual "ASK" letter. We historically fundraise when we have a project to complete although we plan to begin an extensive fundraising drive in 2017.

Q - *Have we asked for a lower price when purchasing gas for the station since we are a non profit and would that give the supplier a tax break?*

A - So far that has not been possible although we have investigated the possibility.

Q - Have we considered the possibility of a charging station for electric cars?

A - Because of parking restrictions, we do not have a space for this.

Q - Have we been in touch with the other affordable housing non profits in West Marin?

A-Yes we are in touch with CLAM in PRS and the Marin Housing Authority. And our board members have also attended affordable housing workshops.

Q - How can we keep rentals under local influence? What are our thoughts on AirBnB? How can we involve visitors, possible using our web site as a community portal for controlling rentals so the local community would benefit?

A - Discussed. The BCLT (along with CLAM and other Marin County land trusts) has signed a letter of support for the county's investigation of and possible enforcement of a 1980's Bed and Breakfast regulation that could help regulate the Airbnb short term rentals.

Q - Could we use the Next Door website to post our quarterly meetings?

A - Yes. We are also working on the BCLT website and hope to add Instagram and other social media platforms for distribution of information.

Q - What projects can you "divulge" that you're working on?

A - 1. A donated property but county says it has a wetland ditch on it. We're working on this. 2. The difficulty of finding public funding for smaller projects. 3. The possibility of a house currently in receivership. 4. The possibility of purchasing a property to serve middle income residents.

Q - Has the BCLT considered offering legacy land leases to people and have a workshop towards this goal?

A-We are considering a workshop similar to the one sponsored by The West Marin Fund on legacy giving which was excellent, led by Kim Klein at the Dance Palace in PRS with 85 people attending.

Public Pre-school Program for 4-Year Olds

The Bolinas-Stinson Union School District is now registering students for a new public preschool program for 4- year olds that is scheduled to open in August of 2017.

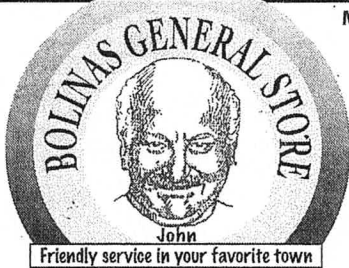
