Marin Agricultural Land Trust Protects Paradise Valley Ranch in Bolinas

Family-owned ranch supports pioneering organic farm and endangered fish habitat; Owners donate half the value of conservation easement

Pt. Reyes Station, Calif. – Marin Agricultural Land Trust announced today the protection of Paradise Valley Ranch in Bolinas, placing one of California’s oldest certified organic farms under permanent protection from subdivision and development. The protection of this 239-acre ranch ensures a more secure future for Bolinas’s organic farming community, the endangered fish and wildlife that call this place home, and the Martinelli family, which has owned the ranch since the 1940s.

Seeded in the fertile soil of Paradise Valley Ranch in 1983 by organic farming pioneer Warren Weber, today Fresh Run Farm is operated by third-generation owner Peter Martinelli. Fresh Run Farm grows more than 40 varieties of organic produce for some of the Bay Area’s most acclaimed restaurants, including Quince and Chez Panisse. Another family member, Susan Martinelli, grows organic fruit and makes jams and preserves, which she sells under the Creekside Gardens label in local markets.

The farm is irrigated with water drawn from Pine Gulch Creek, which flows year-round through Paradise Valley Ranch on its way to Bolinas Lagoon. This stream is one of the few in Marin that still support coho salmon and steelhead trout. The Martinellis and the operators of two neighboring organic farms are collaborating with the Marin Resource Conservation District, the National Park Service and other agencies to engineer a water storage project that will allow enough water for fish and vegetables alike.

“It is a pleasure to work with farmers like Peter who are genuinely connected to agriculture and the protection of natural resources,” said Nancy Scolari, Executive Director of the Marin Resource Conservation District. “The Martinelli family and MALT played critical roles in finalizing the Pine Gulch Creek Watershed Enhancement Project by providing the necessary easement to ensure the development of the project and, ultimately, the protection of endangered coho salmon in Pine Gulch Creek.”

The water storage project is just one way in which the Martinelli family cares for the long-term health of their land. More than half of the property remains as pristine riparian and woodland habitats, supporting a remarkable diversity of rare and native plants and animals, like the northern spotted owl and the California red-legged frog.

Bolinas’s organic farmers and delicate habitats are under threat. Fields and forests around the town are being converted to residential estates. Just an hour north of San Francisco, property values in Bolinas are sky high, and each year pressure mounts to sell land to developers. Peter’s grandfather purchased seven parcels here in the 1940s. Today, only two remain in the family’s hands.

To ensure that Paradise Valley Ranch will never be developed, Peter and his family approached MALT in 2010 about selling an agricultural conservation easement on his family’s land. MALT members and Bolinas residents donated over \$1 million to help their neighbors stay on their farm. The California Wildlife Conservation Board (WCB) pitched in with a \$1.5 million grant, the first grant from WCB in support of a MALT easement. The Martinellis are so committed to preserving this land’s agricultural and ecological values that they donated more than half of the cost of the easement to MALT.

“Paradise Valley Ranch has some of Marin’s best soil and an amazing array of biodiversity,” said Peter Martinelli. “For years I have dreamed of preserving the property. Now that this dream has come true, my family and I would like to thank the private donors, the California Wildlife Conservation Board, and MALT staff who joined us in a four-year effort to permanently protect the property. In donating half of the easement value to MALT, we hereby dedicate our contribution in the name of our grandparents, the Honorable Jordan L. Martinelli and Genevieve C. Martinelli.”

“The Wildlife Conservation Board was proud to assist MALT in the acquisition of the Paradise Valley Ranch easement and happy to play a part in protecting a working landscape that integrates environmental stewardship practices beneficial to the wildlife, landowners and the local community,” said WCB Executive Director John Donnelly.

“Paradise Valley Ranch highlights how agriculture and nature can co-exist in harmony,” said MALT Executive Director Jamison Watts. “We couldn’t be more pleased to work with WCB, the Bolinas community and MALT members to help the Martinelli family realize the dream of protecting this special place forever.”

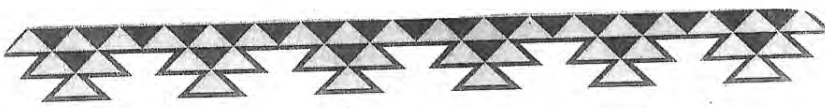

THE LAST OCEAN



Ecologist **David Ainley** will present and discuss a special screening of his documentary *The Last Ocean*. The Ross Sea, Antarctica is the most pristine stretch of ocean on Earth, a vast, frozen landscape teeming with whales, seals and penguins carving out a place on the very edge of existence. For more than 30 years Ainley has traveled there to study this unique ecosystem, but international fishing fleets recently found their way to the Ross Sea, targeting Antarctic Toothfish (marketed as Chilean Sea Bass) and threatening the delicate balance of nature. This beautifully filmed documentary follows the race to protect the Ross Sea from our insatiable appetite for fish. Camera/Director: **Peter Young**. (New Zealand 2012) 88 min. plus discussion.

Presenter and film subject Dr. David Ainley has made 30 trips to Antarctica and the Southern Ocean. He is involved in research on penguin demography, and for the past 10 years has been engaged in trying to protect the Ross Sea from industrial fishing (lastocean.org). He's written four books and several publications about the ecology of marine top predators: seabirds, mammals and sharks.

This presentation is part of Science on Screen, a series pairing film screenings with lively scientific discussions. The series is made possible by a grant from the Coolidge Corner Theatre and the Alfred P. Sloan Foundation.

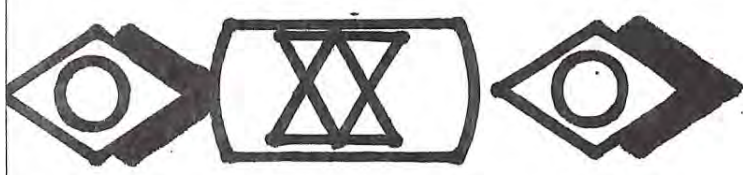

Pres. Buchanan called the regular meeting of the Bolinas Fire Protection District to order at 7:30PM. Vice Pres. Smith, Dir. Bass and Dir. Kimball were present. Dir. Chiera was absent. Also present: Chief Brown and Secretary Brown.

CHIEF'S REPORT

NERA
Chief Brown reported that The Marin for 911-YES on Measure A campaign continues to work on getting the vote out and fundraising. The West Marin Fire Chiefs are currently drafting a letter to the editor for local papers regarding the need for Measure A. The Measure needs a 2/3 vote to pass. They have raised \$60,000 of their \$120,000 campaign goal.

Training
Due to the recent information regarding the Ebola outbreak, recent training with the Volunteers has focused on proper procedures for responding to calls for a sick person and the use of proper Personal Protective Equipment. The District continues to monitor information coming from the Marin County Public Health Officer and Medical Director, and the Center for Disease Control. Asst. Chief Marcotte is researching the latest equipment recommended for use. Chief Brown explained that teams of three are necessary to get in and out of suits in order to prevent contamination. Structure training is next in the training curriculum.

Volunteers
Zach Miller has been accepted by the Volunteer Association as a new Volunteer. The annual raffle fundraiser commenced last week. The annual Health and Fire Safety Day occurred on October 26th. The day started slowly but picked up speed with lots of fire engine rides, address signs made, fires extinguished and various hot dogs sold. All proceeds from the BBQ are donated to the Alisa Ann Rauch Burn Foundation. Chief Brown thanked everyone who volunteered their time for the event.

Apparatus

Disaster Council
An Emergency Operations Center Familiarization class was held at the station on October 8th. Fire department personnel, Disaster Council members and the general public were invited for dinner and training for the EOC. The class was intended to allow people to become more familiar with the operations of the EOC, ideally making it easier to fill needed positions in the EOC during an actual event. Twenty seven people attended and seven of them expressed interest in advanced EOC training. Asst. Chief Marcotte did an excellent job preparing and presenting the material. The training was provided in preparation for the larger scale Disaster Council Drill which was held on October 18th. An earthquake was simulated at 1000. Participants were instructed to "Duck, Cover and Hold On" and then proceed with their assigned tasks. Area Coordinators and Neighborhood Liaisons went out into their neighborhoods and reported their findings to the fire department. Simultaneously, four preselected people, including Dir. Bass and Dir. Kimball, responded to the fire department to deploy the EOC. They did an excellent job and had the center set up in less than half an hour. The drill was followed by lunch and a debriefing. It was a valuable drill resulting in many lessons learned that will be incorporated into disaster planning. Chief Brown was very grateful to all who participated, but especially to Asst. Chief Steve Marcotte and Ian Johnson for their long hours spent in preparation for the event. Ian and Steve's experience and knowledge were highly valuable. Dir. Kimball commended Chief Brown for her excellent leadership during the event. He said that her ability to coordinate and facilitate the many different facets of the event was impressive. Pres. Buchanan stated that he also was impressed with Chief Brown's performance.

Chief Brown met with the school staff on October 16th to review their disaster plan. There are several more trainings scheduled for groups including the Medical Team and the Search and Rescue Team. There will also be a drill just for the staff in the near future.

A Get Ready class is scheduled for the evening of October 29th at the station. The two hour class is intended to instruct individuals on personal preparedness. Dir. Bass announced that she and her husband plan to attend.

Building and Grounds

General Operations/Administration
The Board of Supervisors appointed Judith Shaw to the vacant Board of Directors seat for the fire district. Chief Brown thanked both Don Russo and Judith Shaw for being willing to serve on the Board. The new Board will be seated at the November meeting.

Chief Brown attended a C-SMART meeting on October 15th in Pt. Reyes. The meeting was requested by the County of Marin to receive input from jurisdictions regarding assets that could be affected by rising sea levels. Jack Siedman of BCPUD also attended the meeting. This meeting was a first in a series of meetings planned over the course of several years. There is no immediate threat from sea level rise. It has been measured that over the past 100 years, the level has risen eight inches. More flooding from tidal action and storms are expected over the next fifty years. Chief Brown and Pres. Siedman identified the residents and businesses in the downtown area as well as the school and the single road/bridge that serves the town as potentially vulnerable areas to flooding.

Chief Brown announced that the audited draft financials were received from Doran & Associates last week. She will forward them to Bookkeeper Kaaren Gann and then on to the Finance Committee for

lists from September 17 – October 21, 2014. Sec. Brown explained that there were no financial reports due to not yet receiving the September financials from the County of Marin. Dir. Kimball asked if the amount of money in the Vehicle Replacement fund was final or if any withdraws were expected. Sec. Brown replied that the amount was final.
