

Dia de los Muertos

The weather was sunny and warm for Halloween in Bolinas. A very high tide at noon followed by a minus tide at 6pm made a nice clean beach.

Kathleen and I paraded through town in costume. She was a vampire and I was the Ancient Mariner. I was carrying a sign on a tall pole that read: "END IS NEAR!"

Below that was written the date of the Winter Solstice in 2012: "December 21, 2012." which is also the date that marks the end of the Mayan calendar, and the Earth's alignment with Galactic Plane and the dark rift at the center of the Galaxy.

Even though I was carrying a doomsday sign, I was not a convincing doom sayer. I'd reassure folks that there's still "plenty of time" until the End (almost 14 months) then I'd sing, "Enjoy yourself, it's later than you think."

It was glorious at the beach at 4:20. The warm sun swept over the beautiful, empty beach swept by the tide. I had my guitar and Kathleen helped me sing the Happy Halloween song:

Happy, happy, Halloween
happy, happy Halloween
There might not be enough smallpox vaccine!
The Oakland cops are rioting!
So very scary, such a scary scene
so very scary - this Halloween.
Happy, happy Halloween

Too soon it was time to trudge back to town. I had volunteered to sit the Community Center for Halloween from 5 to 8.

There were tables set up in the Community Center, and free popcorn and cookies. I rested my dooms day sign against the wall, and rested my own self, settling into a chair and mindfully munching a bag of popcorn.

There was a lot of action downtown. Cute costumed trick or treaters of all ages passed by and through the Community Center. Tanya Kleider made two delicious lentil soups, one with ham hocks and the other vegetarian with coconut milk. Five bucks bought a nice bowl of soup and a piece of corn bread topped with cheese and green onion.

The next day, Nov. 1, was Dia de los Angelitios, a day of remembrance for all the children and traffic accident victims who died unexpectedly or prematurely. Nov. 2 was Dia de los Muertos, when the rest of the dead are honored. Mirta Guzman usually builds an elaborate altar in the Community Center. But this year she didn't have the time.

I invited Mirta to build a Dia de los Muertos shrine beneath a big skull I had mounted on the fence. She decorated a makeshift altar with *papel picado* and crumpled orange paper that resembled *zempasúchitl*, the Mexican marigolds that are traditionally used for Dia de los Muertos. The skull and marigolds looked great. Placed on the altar were remembrances for Amy, Beha and Carlos.

As I was admiring the altar a Mexican guy began telling me how Dia de los Muertos was celebrated throughout Mexico, Guatemala and Central America.

There was pride in his voice as he told me about his tradition. I realized how important it was to the new immigrants. to honor their heritage. I pictured the melting pot of the United States and thought, "3 days of Halloween. right on!"

Does Daylight Saving Equal Energy Savings?

Daylight saving time finally ends this Sunday at 2 a.m. -- remember to set your clocks back one hour when you go to bed Saturday night -- and for many of us, that's depressing. The day seems to fly by. It's dark before it's time to start thinking about dinner.

But many doctors say the return to standard time -- and the extra hour of sleep you get in the morning -- can be healthy. "Generally, it is always easier to stay up an hour later than to go to sleep an hour earlier, so most people have relatively little problem setting the clocks back in the fall," said Dr. Steven Feinsilver, director of the Center for Sleep Medicine at Mount Sinai School of Medicine in New York, in an email. "This is because our basic circadian rhythm (the 'body clock') actually seems to be programmed for a longer than 24 hour day. It runs a little slow." "The circadian clock does not change to the social change," said chronobiology researcher Till Roenneberg of Ludwig Maximilans University in Munich, Germany. "During the winter, there is a beautiful tracking of dawn in human sleep behavior, which is completely and immediately interrupted when daylight saving time is introduced in March."

Roenneberg, lead researcher for a study of the effects of time shifts, said that humans' biological clocks are stronger than the clocks set by Congress."When you change clocks to daylight saving time, you don't change anything related to sun time," Roenneberg said. "This is one of those human arrogances, that we can do whatever we want as long as we are disciplined. We forget that there is a biological clock that is as old as living organisms, a clock that cannot be fooled. The pure social change of time cannot fool the clock."

Though individuals may see their biological clocks reset, and will get an "extra hour" of sleep or rest over the weekend, researchers say that the stress caused by time changes can be bad for the body. Researchers in Sweden published a report in 2008 in the New England Journal of Medicine reporting that the number of heart attacks jumps during the period immediately following time changes, and that those vulnerable to sleep deprivation should be extra careful.

"More than 1.5 billion men and women are exposed to the transitions involved in daylight saving time: turning clocks forward by an hour in the spring and backward by an hour in the autumn," wrote Imre Janszky and Rickard Ljung, health and welfare researchers in Sweden. "These transitions can disrupt chronobiologic rhythms and influence the duration and quality of sleep, and the effect lasts for several days after the shifts."

Janszky and Ljung said that sleep deprivation can affect the cardiovascular system, leading the vulnerable to have heart problems in the days following Daylight Saving time changes.

The seven-month period of daylight saving time is mandated by governments -- not biological clocks -- which began implementing the time switch during World Wars I and II to save energy and resources for the war effort. From World War II until recently, daylight saving in the U.S. ran from April until mid-October.

But in 2007, Congress adjusted daylight saving time to begin three weeks earlier and end one week later, a move they hoped would help save energy. At the time, they pointed to the fact that longer daylight in the evening hours reduced people's need to turn on lights in their homes at night.

Critics of the policy questioned the government's decision, wondering whether people would simply turn on as many lights in the morning hours instead. In response, the Department of Energy studied the energy savings in 2008. They found that during daylight saving time, U.S. electricity use decreased by 0.5 percent per day, which added up to 1.3 billion kilowatt-hours, enough to power about 122,000 average U.S. homes for a year.

Now, as daylight saving time comes to its November close, energy use will tick up again as the sun sets earlier in the evening. In the early morning hours of Sunday, Nov. 6, the clocks will be set back an hour, from 2 a.m. to 1 a.m. For an individual who goes to bed at 10 p.m. on Saturday night and awakens eight hours later, they will wake up at 5 a.m. on Sunday morning. It will still be dark, of course, but the sun will come earlier than normal. at 6:30 a.m (from Yahoo news)

Humble Kitchen Soup

The cost is \$10 for soup, \$5 for salad for two, and \$5 for scones or bread for two. (Dinner for 2 for \$20).

Stagecoach to Pt. Reyes?

Ironically, the elimination of Route 62 has opened a door to possible solutions. Our ideas have gotten attention from the Marin County Board of Supervisors, some of whom are the directors of Marin Transit. In response to our letters and statements. they are scheduling an additional meeting this month in Bolinas to discuss a creative solution presented to them by members of the community. We are doing the necessary homework to be prepared for success.

After reviewing our solution idea, they have rightly asked:

Who wants this Stagecoach connection?

In the past, Mill Valley has been the common 'go to' town yet the current live-locally, buy locally, green revolution is steering many folks towards Pt. Reyes and Fairfax. The goal is for Bolinas to have regular bus service to Pt. Reyes: seven days per week, all day long. Many of you have more info on the Pt. Reyes community than we do. I have added my research below, now please lend us your insight by adding your answer to the following question, and if you are a Bolinas person, please weigh in additionally on this idea of 7-day service and how you would use it:

Q: Are Point Reyes businesses interested in Bolinas folks?



GENERAL STRIKE: 11/2/11

On Wednesday I headed with Mark & Meg down to Oakland to join thousands of people in a March & General Strike in solidatity with the Occupy Wallstreet movement. Bolinas being a town of pundits, I had heard a lot of differing opinions on this growing, egalitarian movement & was both skeptical & curious to see for myself what was going on down there.

It was a perfectly crisp fall day when I emerged from the BART station & was overwhelmed by the teeming masses in Frank Ogawa (renamed Oscar Grant) Plaza.

Banners reading "The Beginning is Near!", "We are the 99%" & "Death to Capitalism!" hung from streetlights & a huge variety of people packed the Plaza and filled the surrounding streets. I saw public school teachers with pink slips, old folks loosing their pensions, students with overwhelming loan debt, homeless people, families with foreclosed homes, union workers & young anarchists all coming together, carrying colorful signs and chanting slogans.




In front of city hall, hundreds of tents were pitched where the Occupy activists have been living for the past 2 weeks. A full kitchen hummed with activity, providing free food for everyone. Monks were meditating under an oak tree. Angela Davis was inspiring the crowd from a makeshift stage on a flatbed truck. Someone had replanted the planters boxes at city hall with kale & collard greens. Most of the downtown businesses were closed in solidarity and I got an energetic, apocalyptic feeling looking around. More and more people kept arriving from all directions &

At 4pm about 10,000 of us marched down to the Port of Oakland and shut it down. As the sun went down, the main port entrance was blocked, people were dancing on top of idled trucks and waving signs. For a moment, in the place of globalized commerce, a diverse group of many thousands of disenfranchised Americans were standing together, looking to each other, & the future.

there wasn't a single police officer in sight.

We are angry about the wealth disparity in our country and the criminal behavior of the 1% power elite who control the majority of the Earth's resources. However, we are also looking inward to self-sufficiency already practiced here in Bolinas. My favorite sign of the day summed it up:



Pastafarianism

The Flying Spaghetti Monster (FSM) is the deity of the parody religion the Church of the Flying Spaghetti Monster or Pastafarianism. The "Flying Spaghetti Monster" first appeared in a satirical open letter written by Bobby Henderson in 2005, protesting the decision by the Kansas State Board of Education to permit the teaching of intelligent design as an alternative to evolution in public school science classes.


In the letter, Henderson parodied the concept of intelligent design by professing belief in a supernatural creator that closely resembles spaghetti and meatballs. Henderson further called for Flying Spaghetti Monsterism to be allotted equal time in science classrooms alongside intelligent design and evolution.

After Henderson published the letter on his website, it rapidly became an internet phenomenon and a symbol for the case against teaching intelligent design in public schools.

Pastafarian "beliefs" are generally satires of creationism. They are presented both on Henderson's Church of the Flying Spaghetti Monster website, where he is described as "prophet", and in The Gospel of the Flying Spaghetti Monster, written by Henderson and published by Villiard Press in 2006. The central belief is that an invisible and undetectable Flying Spaghetti Monster created the universe.

Pirates are revered as the original Pastafarians (a portmanteau of pasta and Rastafarian), and Henderson asserts that the steady decline in the number of pirates over the years has resulted in global warming. The FSM community currently congregates at Henderson's website to share ideas and crafts devoted to the Flying Spaghetti Monster.

Because of its popularity and exposure, the Flying Spaghetti Monster is often used as a contemporary version of Russell's teapot – an argument that the philosophic burden of proof lies upon those who make unfalsifiable claims, not on those who reject them. While generally praised by the media and endorsed by members of the scientific community, the Flying Spaghetti Monster has received criticism from the intelligent design community. Self-described Pastafarians have engaged in religious disputes, including in Polk County, Florida, where they played a role in dissuading the local school board from adopting new rules on teaching evolution.
