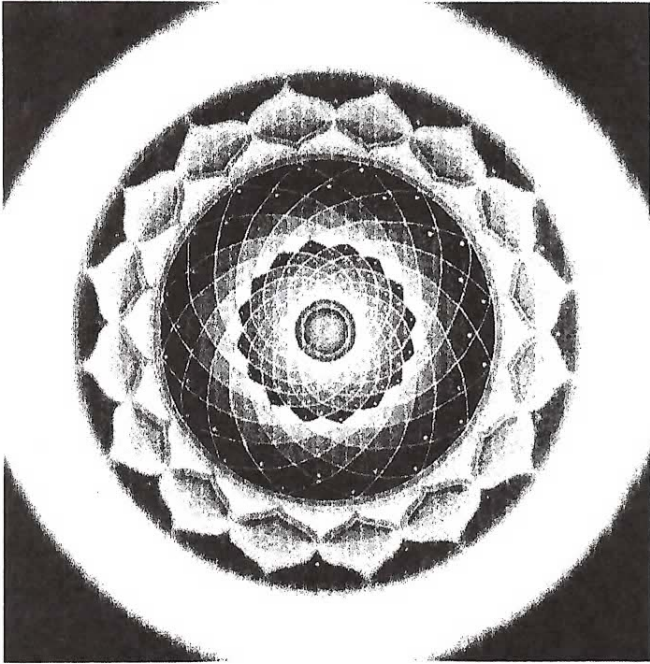

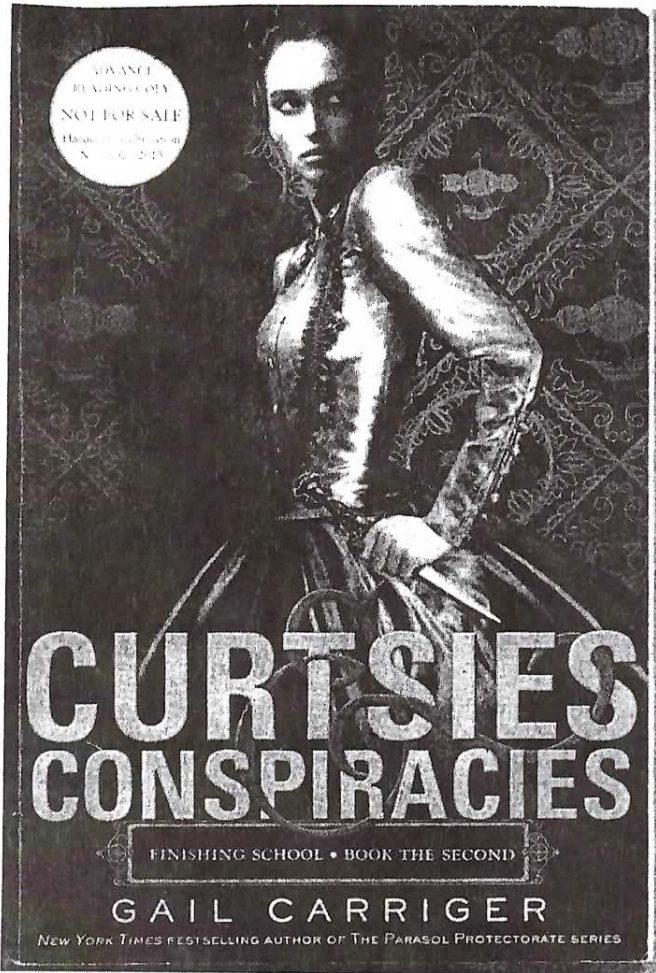

Many thanks to all the candidates who stood for election this year. It speaks well for our future that we had a full slate of interested, intelligent and skilled people who loved our town enough to run for office.

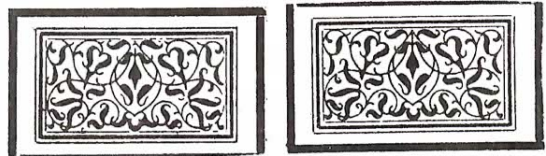
Thank you to all the BPUD staff members who took time from their already-full work schedule to discuss things (no doubt repeatedly) with those of us who were running for the Board.

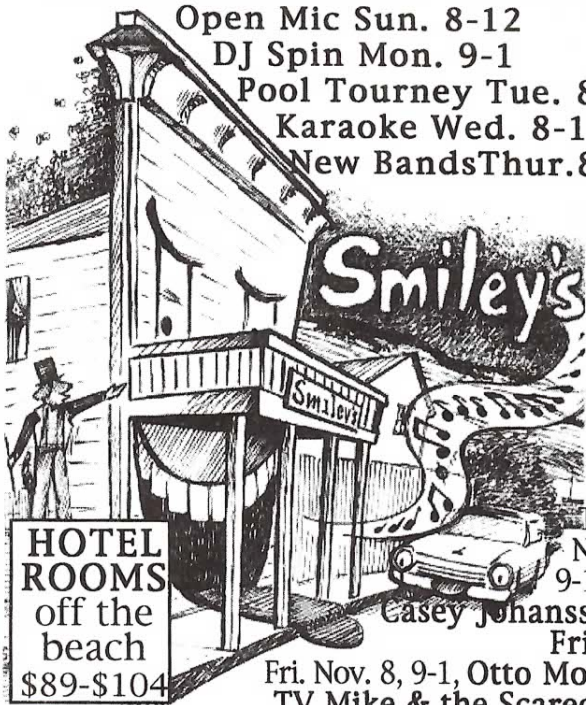

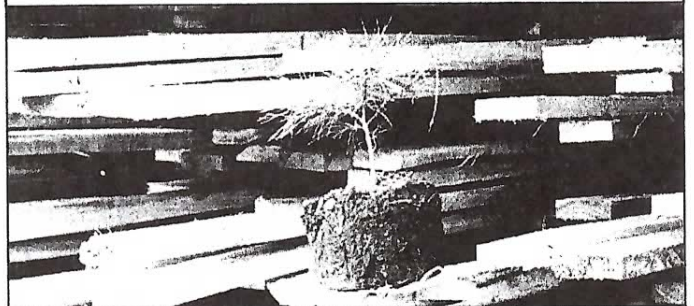

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

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Minutes from the September 23, 2013
Bolin Fire Protection District Board
Meeting

Pres. Buchanan called the regular meeting of the Bolinas Fire Protection District to order at 7:30PM. Vice Pres. Smith, Dir. Kimball, Dir. Chiera and Dir. Bass were present. Also present: Chief Brown, Secretary Brown.

MSC, Bass/Smith (unan) to approve the agenda.

CHIEF'S REPORT

NERA

No update.

Prevention

Chief Brown reported that she and Todd Lando met with a group of residents from the Yucca neighborhood on the evening of September 18th. Topics of discussion included the Fire Departments concern with overgrown vegetation along the areas only access and egress. The residents raised concerns about the danger of illegal fires on Agate Beach. Residents at the meeting plan to talk with additional neighbors in the area regarding more defensible space and continuing to work with the Fire Department to improve their fire safety. Chief Brown will make inquiries regarding extra patrol by law enforcement for the illegal fires.

Chief Brown expressed concern regarding multiple fire and life safety issues noted at this property.

Grants

Todd Lando has applied for a \$10,000 grant from the California Fire Safe Council. If received, the grant would be matched in-kind. Plans for the money include another prevention mailer to the community and several "Chipper Days" in Bolinas which would encourage residents to dispose of excess vegetation in their neighborhoods.

Training

Chief Brown conducted CPR training for the National Park Service volunteers in Bear Valley.

A Multi Casualty Incident training has been confirmed for October 20th at Audubon Canyon. The training will include Bolinas, Stinson Beach and Marin County Fire Departments. The focus will be on triage and transport of 15 – 20 patient volunteers. The MCI trailer housed at the Bolinas Fire Dept will be utilized during the drill. The trailer holds enough supplies for 25 patients as well as overhead supplies to run a large incident. Chief Brown invited the Board to observe the training.

Disaster Council

Chief Brown reported that she and Beth Carusillo prepared a display for the Post Office which should be installed later this week. It will consist of a map of Bolinas indicating the thirteen Disaster Council Areas, general Disaster Council and Disaster Council Coordinator information. A "We Need You!" message will be included.

Building and Grounds

Dir. Chiera reported that he met with Dir. Bass and Chief Brown to discuss the plans submitted by Mesa Park to install bathrooms which would connect to the existing sewer line utilized by the Fire District and the Coastal Health Alliance. An agreement between the three entities to share the sewer line has been in place since 2008 when all three participated in the expense of its installation. At that time, Mesa Park was not in the position to install the bathrooms due to water needs. Today, the water for the Mesa Park bathrooms and irrigation will come from a well located on BCPUD property by Resource Recovery and not from the Fire District water meter. The primary concern expressed by the Fire District with Mesa Park hooking up to the sewer line is the expense associated with use. There are annual maintenance expenses as well as the pumps themselves being expensive and relatively sensitive. They can not process any foreign materials. Dir. Chiera continued with the history of the pumps which were out of service at one point, due to garbage being flushed at the Clinic. They have corrected their disposal practices, paid for the repair and are now monitoring their use closely. He stated that an agreement with Mesa Park is in order for a grinder and catchment system to be installed that would pre-treat solids in the line before potentially clogging the pump. He also suggested that a financial agreement be reached for a maintenance fund to be established by Mesa Park similar to the one in place between the Fire District and the Coastal Health Alliance. He, along with Chief Brown and Dir. Bass, plan to attend the next Mesa Park Board meeting on October 14th to meet the Board and further discuss the issue.

Pres. Buchanan commented that there is a multi-use line on the Little Mesa which is working well, so such an agreement can be reached.

Chief Brown reiterated the cost of a broken pump can be as much as \$10,000. Any debris that needs to be removed cannot be put back in the sewer ponds, so it would need to be trucked out of town at an additional expense. She stated the need for additional monitoring of the system with the addition of the bathrooms because of their potential to be open in an uncontrolled environment. Misuse could prove problematic. A permit from the County is required for the installation of the bathrooms. Chief Brown was informed that construction of the bathrooms needs to begin by next spring according to the stipulations of a grant that has been received for the project. Chief Brown also plans to meet with B&W Plumbers to discuss all options. Dir. Chiera and Chief Brown said that after the next Mesa Park meeting, they will report back for further discussion.

General Operations

Chief Brown reported that PetroTech conducted the annual testing on the Above-Ground fuel tank on September 18th. They also made a few minor corrections to the tank that the Bay Area Air Quality Management District required. BAAQMD is also requiring the tank be repainted with paint that costs \$150 per gallon. The work is to be scheduled.

Chief Brown attended the Chief's meeting and the West Marin Disaster Council meeting on September 19th. The Disaster Council is working to hire a new Coordinator to replace Libby Coleman and installing communications equipment purchased with grant monies. Interspiro conducted the required annual testing of all Self Controlled Breathing Apparatus. All equipment is in good working condition. Chief Brown thanked Capt. Wall for his hard work done to prepare for the testing. Stinson Beach Fire Department generously allowed us to use their air compressor trailer for the testing. Using their compressor proved to be much faster than using Bolinas's Cascade System which was used in the past.

Chief Brown reported that she has been on light duty since injuring her finger on September 4th. She expects to remain with this status for another two to three weeks. She thanked Firefighters Tacherra, Rippe and Asst. Chief Marcotte for helping with coverage of U219. Chief Brown thanked Bookkeeper Kaaren Gaan and Sec. Brown for preparation for the annual audit which is scheduled for tomorrow Sept. 24th.

Chief Brown reviewed the signers of the Bank of America checking account which include herself and all five Board members. Everyone's signatures are now on file with the Bank of America branch located in Mill Valley.

Surfers' Overlook Repair/Terrace Avenue
Dir. Kimball said that GM Blackman of BCPUD contacted Drew Kennedy of SAGE about a budget for the next steps to be taken for acquiring a coastal permit. Most of the funding will have to be raised by the community including the cost of a project manager that Dir. Kimball recommends to coordinate with the County and manage raising funds. Plans include expanding the Working Group to local residents, Sup. Steve Kinsey and possibly Bob Beaumont as a citizen member as he is retiring from his County position shortly.

Chief Brown concluded her report with announcing that Capt. Wall will be changing his health insurance status by signing up for Kaiser Coverage. The cost to the District will remain about the same.

Pres. Buchanan asked about the status of evacuation planning. Chief Brown answered that her first priority is road clearing which has begun at congested areas of the Mesa.

Pres. Buchanan remarked that the number of Fire Calls & Emergencies has declined since the previous month.

GENERAL BUSINESS

None.

CONSENT CALENDAR

MSC, Bass/Smith (unan) to approve the Consent Calendar including the Minutes from the August 26, 2013 regular meeting, the warrant lists from Aug 21 – September 17, 2013, financial reports for August 2013 and the account balances. Dir. Kimball inquired about the lower income in the Budget v. Actual report. Sec. Brown answered that an expected grant and some rental income has not been received yet. He also reminded the Board that the last Solar Rebate check is expected in December 2013. He recommended revisiting the solar reserve fund to review Solar bond financing.

GOOD OF THE ORDER

Dir. Bass commended Sec. Brown for well written minutes from the August Board meeting. Sec. Brown thanked her. Pres. Buchanan appreciated Capt. Wall's efforts for the prep work completed before the SCBA testing.

ADJOURNMENT

MSC, Kimball/Smith (unan) to adjourn the meeting at 8:30 PM.

WILD CARE

I feel very troubled by the Farallones Eradication Plan as put forward by Fish and Wildlife for managing the mouse problem there.

1. Why are the only choices for dealing with the rodent problem two extremes? Two of the choices are plans for aerial dropping using deadly poisons—rodenticides—that are highly toxic to the environment and the one other choice of doing nothing.

Why isn't *managing* the mice being considered as one of the choices?

The proposed plans are dropping 2,904 lbs of rodenticides on the island during the rainy season. Some of this poison will also be washed into the ocean to be consumed by the food chain. We're part of that chain.

2. What about the "Marine Protected Area" with a declining fish population? What about a productive marine food web? Each time a rodenticide drop is made the poison will be again available for the various hungry creatures of all kinds to feed upon and die. Fish will be poisoned as well as the birds that feed upon them like cormorants that also nest there.

It is mentioned in the EIR that, no problem, "most fish species near the Farallones are either predatory or planktivores that are unlikely to come into contact with or consume pellets."

Won't the dissolving pellets washed off the island by the rains also be floating among the plankton that is eaten by the planktivores and will not the predators eat the fish that have been poisoned?!

I'm told by a Wildlife Refuge Specialist that the toxic chemicals in the dissolving pellets drop to the ocean floor. This is where the bottom creatures dwell like halibut and crabs. We eat these creatures!

It doesn't take a rocket scientist or studies to see that one thing leads to another in the natural world.

The ocean is a moving thing won't the fish and crabs that are poisoned wash up on our coastline and be eaten by crows, gulls, ravens and others? Our Bolinas shoreline is only about 16 miles from the islands.

The EIR says "the scale of impact would be a few individuals." Really?

According to Wildcare, brodifacoum has been documented to persist inside animal tissue for as long as 300 days. After the initial drop and then again on the second application the seasonal rains would wash the poison into the water.

3. According to the EIR, "the significance determination for marine fish is insignificant." According to Wikipedia, the rodenticide brodifacoum-25 conservation they are proposing is "lethal to fish."

Are these extremely harsh measures appropriate for an island that is so close to a populated area where there is a fishing industry? I am concerned about the impact on the environment that's us.

Wildcare's position is that more research into non-toxic alternatives needs to be done to determine a safe way to rid the islands of invasive mice. I say yes to that.

We are an innovative race. If we are clever enough to invent the computer surely we could find a way to deal with rodents that doesn't involve polluting our environment with deadly poisons.

Why not earth and water friendly choices for the Farallones?
