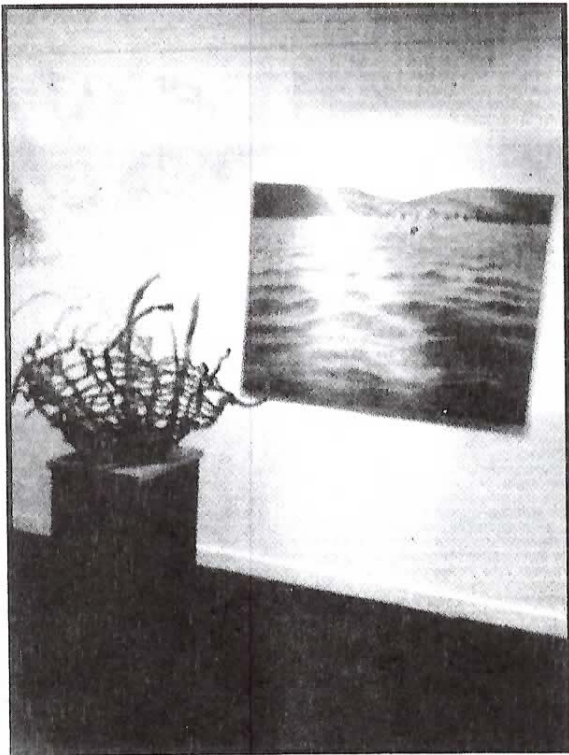

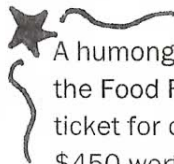

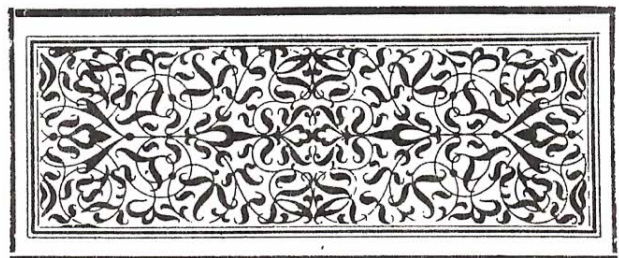

Let's join together and move in the direction of more positive and long-term beneficial alternatives.

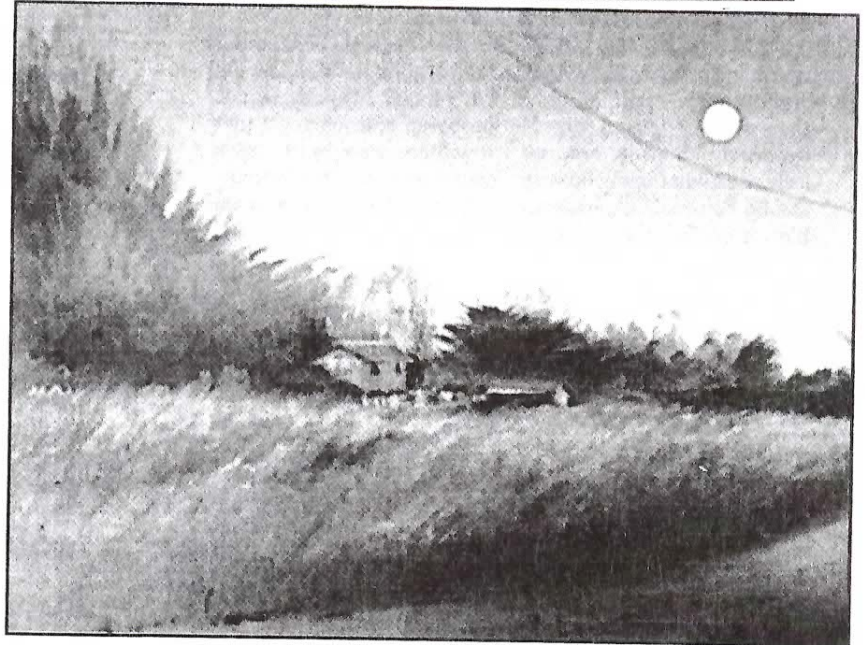
Let's invest our time and money in researching other potential solutions for accomplishing rodent eradications for restoration projects!

Dear West Marin Residents,

It's New Year's Resolution time again! What about that disaster preparedness class you have been meaning to take? A major earthquake can hit anywhere around the infamous Pacific Ring of Fire, the great circle of tectonic activity created by the Pacific plate rubbing against its neighboring plates. And we in West Marin are right on that Ring of Fire!

One of the best things we can do as a community to survive the next earthquake, tsunami, winter storm or wildfire, is to increase the number of us who have learned basic disaster preparedness and response skills. These skills include first aid, triage, communications, team building and search and rescue. Immediately after a disaster it will be impossible for our firefighters, EMT's and other qualified medical people to take care of everyone who needs immediate help. We must be prepared to extend the capacity of our local emergency responders by becoming trained Community Emergency Response Team (CERT) members.

The Fire Departments of West Marin are offering a two-day CERT course on Saturday, January 11th and Saturday, January 18th at the Nicasio Corporation Yard. Many West Marin residents have taken these classes and are already involved in local disaster preparedness. You can join your neighbors and friends to make our communities more self-reliant and able to cope with disasters. There are no pre-qualifications for this training, and you do not have to be in "great shape." In a wide spread emergency there are many ways to contribute your newly learned skills.

For 18 hours and \$45, you can learn how to prepare yourself, your family and your community to respond effectively. CERT class graduates receive a certificate and an Emergency Response daypack. There are scholarships available for those needing financial assistance in order to register.

If He's messiah, knew, no doubt.

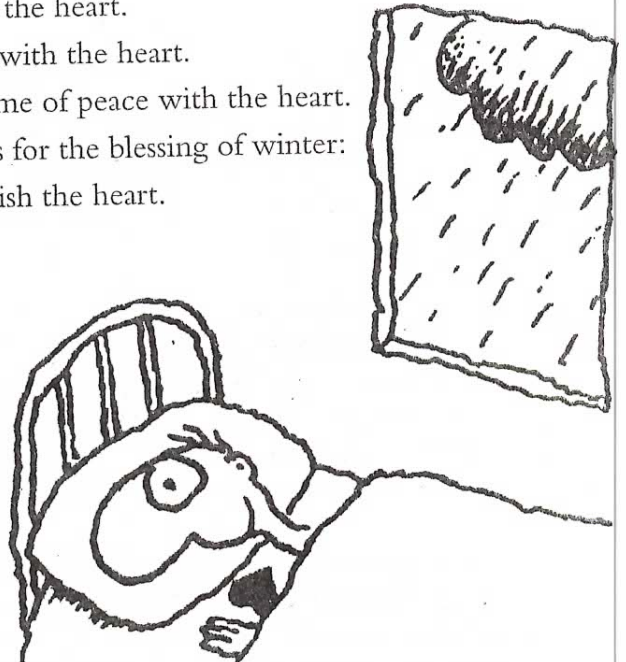
Read later, "Judas only one

Dog regulations: Barking up the wrong beaches?

"If dogs run free, why not me? Across the sands of time..." — Bbb Dylan, 1970

Greetings, Humans: I have been asked to express some thoughts about proposed changes—meaning, more restrictions—to “dog policy” in the Golden Gate National Recreation Area. As you know, in West Marin, that includes Muir Beach. I cannot speak for all my fellow canines, but will try. Yes, I know I might be perceived as having a conflict of interest. But really, who doesn't? We all want to enjoy this beautiful public land, and as far as I can tell, we all do. But my human tells me that of all the controversial topics he might wade in to, this could be the most inflammatory. (Humans: strange.)

A couple years back, when this first became a big catfight (sorry), I instructed my human to download and read the entire 24-page summary of the various options under consideration. Some good people spent a lot of time on this proposal. The full proposal was 2,338 pages, they say—seriously, who would read that? It weighs almost 15 pounds, too much for a proposal, if too little for a dog (sorry, little dogs). The summary itself is not easy reading—even for a human—but we got

through it together.

Many humans seem to have read it too. The G.G.N.R.A. received more than 4,700 comments on the draft. Some politicians have even gotten involved on our behalf, thank you. But dog advocates feel our comments were largely ignored in the new proposal, which would add significant new restrictions. This is like when my human tells me to “sit” and no biscuit materializes. Why bother?

The first overall objective of the whole proposal is to “minimize conflicts related to dog use by providing a variety of safe, high-quality visitor use experiences, including areas where dogs are allowed.” Who could argue with that? It's what we have now, basically. But a bit of perspective is in order. Currently, less than 1 percent of all G.G.N.R.A. space is open for off-leash dogs. It's an “urban recreational area,” technically. Now, I've been romping on the beaches under consideration, namely Muir, Crissy Field, Ocean Beach and Fort Funston in the city, for years now. In all that time, I have never seen any kind of altercation between humans and dogs, or even humans and humans. (There have been a few between dogs, of course—it's our nature—but nothing serious.) I've heard that bad encounters do occur and believe that must be true—like it is true for streets, other parks, ballgames and wherever various species congregate.

The proposed regulations seek to address a few concerns, which I must re-

mark upon:

Environmental impacts: Especially possible harm to birds and plants. Regarding birds, admittedly, it's hard to tell the difference between some of them, but the “sensitive” ones are identified in specific areas we are supposed to stay out of. Likewise for certain plants. Well, again, most dogs can't read the signs, so this is up to their humans (on that note—ever wonder just who those “Seeing Eye Dogs Only” signs are for?). I see humans in those zones sometimes seemingly damaging plants and scaring birds with their behaviors, but that's another issue. I must admit, on behalf of my species, that there is sometimes the chasing of birds. Some of them—okay, gulls and crows, mainly—can encourage it and even deserve it. Regarding the others, humans must do their best to prevent that and most do. My own human, a semi-professional part-time environmentalist, knows about environmental impact reports, supports them (and even used to produce some), and doesn't feel the one prepared in this proposal makes the case for changing current policy.

Poop: Yes, we do. Sorry. Few if any of us canines clean up our own, other than a few reprobates in a most disgusting manner. This issue too is one of human behavior, and again, most folks seem to deal with it appropriately, more all the time. And again, what we see most is human trash left on the beach—including diaper bags, which I find on the beach at Crissy frequently—tempting, but no thanks. So, don't leave our poop in a bag, take it out with you—and please pick those baby bags up too. I'm just sayin'.

Human annoyance: Some people don't like dogs (!?). Some just don't like them in their vicinity while in the G.G.N.R.A. Well, what can one say, other than that over 90 percent of all the land is off-limits to us now, even on a leash? That this is fine, as over 99 percent of people and dogs seem to coexist under current policy with no trouble. There is much—most—G.G.N.R.A. land where humans will see either no dogs or dogs only on leash. I mean, if I can live peaceably in a house full of @#%&*! cats, I think we can all enjoy the beach together. Some humans like to bitch (sorry); some dogs like to bark (again, apologies). But most are more reasonable and well-behaved.

So, to my eyes, ears and nose, all evidence points to the status quo as being the best of the options presented in the original proposal. It's the policy in effect since 1979. I'd perhaps support some reasonable changes—perhaps new restrictions, such as licenses and/or fees for commercial dog walkers, which even the dog walkers' association supports. The G.G.N.R.A. folks also recommend this and such changes have been added to the revised report. The packs don't bother me much, but when a few large gangs convene at once, it can be a bit overwhelming for some of us. Heck, I'm licensed, and we could more strictly enforce the mandatory dog license law in

the G.G.N.R.A. too, with big fines for violators. Likewise for those few irresponsible “unfixed” fellows—and no, I don't say that just because misery loves company.

In the science and practice of ecology, in fact, there is a cardinal rule: Beware the unintended consequences. It is likely that further restrictions could lead to more crowding of canines in other places where complaints and conflicts would be worse than anything we have now. I suppose I could be accused of fearing that more dogs might show up in my favorite little beach burg, where dogs do run free, but already there are far fewer of us than there used to be, so it should be okay. Just tell your humans that there is no parking, to pick up your poop, and that there is no drinking water.

As for Muir Beach, well, the nudies and the clothed humans have mostly gotten along just fine, so long as people behave. Now, I admit I've done a bit of beach humping in my time, but people mostly just laugh, as I have no idea what I'm doing, being fixed and clueless.
