

JAZZ JAM AT SMILEY'S TONIGHT

Michael Pinkham and Piro Patton host their second monthly JAZZ JAM tonight at Smiley's, starting time 9 p.m.

This is a welcome addition to Smiley's already rich musical menu. Last months debut JAZZ JAM brought amazingly high-quality an variety of players: Alethea's son, a fine drummer, showed up Miles, with some members of his band, including a vibraphone player who brought down the house--great to see these young men so versed jazz standards. Justin sat in with excellent guitar, I played a couple tunes; there was an outstanding harp (harmonica) player; and I hear that after I left Rick Gordon sang, primo scat singer.

I remember some of the old time Bolinas jams as a spaghetti of five or six egos blowing at once in five or six different keys. (And when I tried to get people to play in the same key, I was mocked as an impossibly rigid square.)

By contrast, the way Michael organized the last jam insured a good experience: A core group playing the first set established a high professional tone--Pinkham on drums, Piro on Bass, and Taylor Cutcomb on piano--and then Michael invited in other players one at a time.

It was a great night.



MESA PARK MEETING MONDAY, January 12, 2012 AT THE FIREHOUSE @ 7pm

Board members present: Patricia Hickey, Charles Whitefield, Geoff Geupel

Others: Suki Ferrari, Roger Peacock, Vic Amoroso, Christine Cunha, Jennie Pfeiffer, Bob Cart, and Dirk McCall

Call to Order: 7:10 pm

COMMUNITY EXPRESSION:

[Bob Cart] Expressed concern that the Pool Committee was intending to site the proposed pool where the existing softball field is located behind the Skate Park. [Charles & Geoff] assured Bob and Dirk that no such decision had been made, and that the Pool Committee is in the early stages of a feasibility assessment. No siting considerations are being made at this time. And further, that if and when we get to that stage, such decisions will be open to public comment in full consideration of the importance of the second ball field. Charles expressed hope that there will be enough softball players in the future to justify maintaining it.

[Bob Cart] also mentioned that it would be very useful to have some sort of website for the Mesa Park facilities as well as for the softball league. He has volunteered to help develop a simple website, but would like someone else to maintain it. [Dirk] expressed his belief that a website for the league could be an important fund raising tool. [Patricia] expressed that having a website for the Mesa Park would be an excellent idea, but we don't have employees to help maintain a website. We will continue to discuss the issue as it is an important one.

[Dirk McCall] asked the board to consider allowing sponsorship signage along the playfield for the little league. The club is in need of funding for improving and maintaining the fields. Last year 15 kids were playing in the minors and now a second team is being organized. Dirk has organized a booster club to raise funds for improving the fields. Last year it cost \$1,500 just for soil, and there were still drainage issues on the field. He needs money to pay for additional soil. [Geoff] asked about costs to get the field in shape.

[Dirk] anticipates around \$5,000 to get the field in good shape. It costs \$1,800 a transfer load for soil and he needs about 4 or 5 this year, and less for each year thereafter. West Marin Little League will give some funds for soil and other improvements. Dirk is district president for softball league (girls). It isn't specifically little league field. Little league gives about \$1,000 a year. [Charles]: When I first became a board member I was in charge of getting funding for the field. I hired locals and volunteers for \$1,500 a year to get the field in shape. Fees from little league were used for both fields. [Patricia] asked Dirk to prepare an operational plan and budget for the ball fields. She and Suki will be working on the Mesa Park 2012 budget, and it would be very helpful if Dirk would help with this.

[Dirk] He understands that the community has been opposed to permanent sponsorship signage on the playfields in the past. He suggested that signs from sponsors could come down after each game. He would also be asking for donations.

[Jenny] Back in the 1990s, the community was opposed to signage. Jenny expressed her view that the signs detract from the beauty of the location even during the game. An alternative is to ask sponsors to pay not to have signage. This worked in the past.

The Board asked Dirk to submit a formal proposal for game day signage, including dimensions, location, and number.

the park is more complete, we can do fundraising for some of the bells and whistle. Rodger mentioned the stonemasons would like to hold a workshop at the site. They will ask for approval in the future.

[Patricia] asked Rodger to work with her on developing an operational plan and maintenance budget for the Downtown Park.

[Charles] would like the design committee to meet and discuss the front rock garden and rock boulders prior to work being done. There are liability and aesthetic concerns involved.

MAINTENANCE REPORT:

[Suki] reassured Dirk that she will meet with him and make sure that the MP is providing full maintenance support of the ball fields. There have been some issues regarding movement of tools and equipment (shovels etc.) while the pump house was being used as a snack shack. We need rules and regs for the pump house now that we will be using it as a pump house.

[Charles] suggests Suki prepare an inventory of tools. Some were lost during the summer. We need to repair locks and develop protocols for access.

[Suki] There is the ongoing issue of dog waste in the park, particularly in the children's play area. Suki will post something in the Hearsay News. The board gave Suki permission to purchase a dog waste bag dispenser.

POOL DEVELOPMENT-status: No status report this month.

IRRIGATION PROJECT-status: A special meeting was scheduled for Monday, January 16th to discuss the project due to Bryan's absence.

[Charles] The county will hydroseed, but we don't have water to irrigate. We are looking at buying 1,500 gallons from BPUD to fill our tanks. We have also looked into renting an agricultural sprinkler system (Rainbird), but none are available. We could put in temporary PVC up the hill from our well. Charles thinks he could bring up water for \$1,500.

[Vic] would like MP to bring the water up to the infiltration gallery to make sure the pipes work. He believes BPUD will require us to use a meter before we fill the tanks in order to track water use in case there is an undetected leak in the pipes DOWNTOWN PARK-status:

[Rodger Peacock] The bathrooms are in. The BPUD has been really helpful. They have been great inspecting sewer lines* and now upgrading the water meter. Billy, in particular, has been very helpful. The sidewalk is being replaced and sidewalk remediation is being done to satisfy Public Works. Tree work on hillside is now complete. [Charles] I am surprised. There are 10 to 15 trees just cut in half with 40ft sticking up. [Rodger] We are trying to keep trees alive until new trees are established. They will bush out. The neighbors wanted them at that height.

[Rodger] The bottom of hillside has been seeded and covered with jute blanket. We have proceeded as far as we can this season. Charles asked about the scotch broom. Rodger*says it is basically dead.

Rough grading is complete. Stonework layout is currently going on. Some of the boulders and stone have been kindly donated by a local sponsor.



Update: Verizon Microwave Antenna Application

Verizon has submitted an application to install a microwave antenna at the Bolinas firehouse property. The fire District is currently researching the predicted level of Radio Frequency (RF) emissions from the proposed microwave antenna, as well as those from the cell phone antennas on the District's property, operated by both Verizon and AT&T. Also, the District is seeking an approach to have an on-going procedure that monitors the level of RF emissions produced by all antennas installed on the property. Once information about these items is sufficient for the board to act, then Verizon's request will be placed on a regular Bolinas Fire Protection District public board meeting agenda. Stephen Parker is an artist Jungian psychologist, who's been living in the interior of Alaska for almost forty years. This installation, framed in copper, is a story in images and words about a journey of healing after a severe heart attack. The story begins with Chiron, the mythical centaur who had a permanent wound in his knee; chronic illness can feel like a similar, neverending wound. The forty images and narrative convey a surprising story of alchemical transformation. Dreams, stones, pelicans, and eggs were all participants in this journey. In this long process of dealing with mortality, Steve has constructed an underground stone cave, a labyrinth, and a stone retreat space in the birch forest where he lives. A book on his experience, Heart Attack and Soul in the Labyrinth of Healing, was published in January 2011. Robert Bosnak, author of Tracks in the Wilderness of Dieams, writes about this book

When the heart stops a world comes to an end. The work of Steve Parker shows us that there is life after the end, after the heart has been attacked by death, and survived. In his remarkable reports and stunning paintings, we are moved to witness the transition from his life before to his life after as it forges its way to renewal.

A reception for the artist will be held in the gallery immediately following the New School event with Stephen Parker and Michael Lerner – *Jung, Art and Healing*.



Hey! We won - sort of - with more to come!



Channel Five at demonstration after CPUC decision

You may recently have received a certified letter from PG&E and a robo call telling you that you now have the option until May 1 to choose to keep your analog meter or have a 'smart' meter installed. Happy day! Except for the ridiculous fee of \$75 up front with \$10 extra monthly (to discourage opt outs) and a few other potential pitfalls to watch out for.

We aren't finished with this yet. There is a Phase Two in the CPUC's opt out legal proceeding and EON is a legal party in the negotiations.

Our movement is still fighting against this fee extortion but we must first fight against it in the court of the very entity that mandated the 'smart' meters in the first place and then charged the fee, the California Public Utility Commission, CPUC.

There are legal challenges coming from our movement both in the CPUC court and later in the state and federal courts. We are absolutely opposed to forcing people to pay to NOT to have something on their homes that they didn't ask for and that may harm them in many ways and that emits what the International Agency on Cancer Research (IARC) classified as a class 2B carcinogen.

We're also determined to get community-wide opt outs, since if neighbors have the RF pulsing meters, it still can effect you.

But in the meantime, here are some things to consider about the current opt out plan:

If you have a smart meter and want it changed back to analog, you can have that done now or later. The number to call to have the smart meter replaced by PG&E is 866-743-0263.

If you want to keep your analog, you do not need to do anything before May 1. If you have a smart meter, you might want to consider having it changed to an analog. Many people with smart meters are experiencing (1) higher utility bills, (2) health problems and (3) interference with or damage to electrical devices in their homes. Paying \$75 + \$10/month to have the smart meter removed may be worth it for some people just to avoid the higher bills.

Then there are the RF radiation pulses. PG&E has admitted in legal filings with the CPUC that each smart meter pulses RF radiation between 10,000 and 190,000 times per day—quite a different account of the radiation than PG&E had previously been reporting in the media.

The County Health Department of Santa Cruz finally did a report on smart meter health issues, and they concluded that the RF radiation from smart meters poses a significant risk to human health, and that government regulatory bodies should exercise much more caution in such a wide-spread roll-out. The American Academy of Environmental Medicine recently wrote a letter to the CPUC stating that the smart meter program should be halted. http://eon3emfblog.net/?p=4399 for both reports and more info.

Some in the movement say to delay until May with your decision, to avoid paying the fee until the last minute. Others claim that a vice President of PG&E promised in a personal conversation that they won't charge until May anyway. You'll have to decide when you take action. Just don't forget to do it if you decide to wait, since after May 1, they will assume you want a 'smart' meter if you don't tell them otherwise.

If you still have your analog meter, be sure that PG&E doesn't change it to a 'new' analog meter. Some meters have been replaced with a quasi-'smart' meter that still emits dangerous RF. Be sure to continue to guard your meter and insist on being there when any PG&E employee is dealing with your meter. Don't let them bully you into accepting a replacement analog meter. Let us know if they do.

If you have a 'smart' meter already and want to get rid of it asap, which is a good idea so you won't be injured, overcharged or surveilled, you can write "paid under protest" on your check. Avoid signing anything that may limit your right to sue later if we bring a class action lawsuit, which many want to do.

All fees paid for opting out (of something we never opted into in the first place) should be marked "paid under protest" on your check to enable further legal action if necessary.

PG&E claims that the charges cover meter readers that won't be needed by those with 'smart' meters. But we're already paying for meter readers in our bills.

Plus we're paying for the \$2.2 Billion 'smart' meters - about \$300 per customer...

So, someone opting out is paying multiple times, for a 'smart' meter they don't want and won't get, plus twice for meter readers. There are no refunds for the increased rates for unused 'smart' meters.
