



Ashley Huck and Even Khan ran our bar the whole evening.


Thank you to Melinda Stone and crew for the knot rugs and the fun evenings creating them. I think if there is interest she would like to continue the Wednesday evening creative get together.



Minutes from the January 26, 2015 Bolinas Fire Protection District Board

Pres. Kimball called the regular meeting of the Bolinas Fire Protection District to order at 7:30PM. Vice Pres. Bass, Dir. Chiera, Dir. Gade and Dir. Shaw were present. Also present: Chief Brown, Secretary Brown.

Chief Brown requested to add an "Emergency Action Item" to the agenda regarding the purchase of a new ventilation and heating unit for the

MSC. Bass/Shaw (unan) to approve the amended agenda.

CHIEF'S REPORT

MERA

Chief Brown reported that the regular MERA meeting scheduled for January 28 was cancelled due to a lack of agenda items. The next meeting is scheduled for February 25th. Currently, the Request for Proposals for Consulting Services and System Vendors are still in draft form.

Prevention

46 Wharf Road, Coast Café – Fire and Life Safety

Chief Brown reported that the Café has been inspected several times for fire and life safety issues since a minor fire occurred. Chief Brown expressed concern about the use of a BBQ that is located too close to buildings and is in disrepair. Lately it has been used for warming fires in the mornings. She plans to advise the owner again that the BBQ is not to be used at all and will contact the Fire Marshall if necessary.

Grants No update.

Training

Training for Volunteers began in the first week of January. This year, Chief Brown formed a training group consisting of four members; FF Willie Krakauer, FF George Krakauer, FF Jake Tacherra and Asst. Chief Marcotte. The group will organize six months of trainings at once with a comprehensive plan that includes all aspects of fire and medical training best suited to the District's calls. Trainings will now occur on one Saturday morning every other month in addition to Thursday evenings.

Chief Brown provided a re CERT medical training on the morning of Saturday January 17th for a Muir Beach class. Attendees included members of the Stinson and Muir Beach Disaster Councils.

Volunteers

Chief Brown reported that Capt. Peter Smith is on temporary leave from the department due to a medical issue.

E283 was scheduled for its annual safety inspection the week of January 26th, but the auto shop was too busy to service the engine. Chief Brown will attempt to deliver the engine in the coming weeks.

Disaster Council

Chief Brown reported that she and Beth Carusillo met on January 19th to discuss goals for the Disaster Council in 2015. Disaster agreements with the Bolinas Market, the Bolinas Bay Lumber and the Bolinas People's Store regarding regulating supplies in the case of a disaster was one important goal discussed. Others included issuing radios and training to Neighborhood Liaisons, and planning two drills. Beth and Chief Brown will be meeting with Richard Dillman next week to discuss radios. Dir. Shaw asked how she could be better informed by the Disaster Council. Chief Brown was surprised that she missed the postings in the Hearsay, Post Office and flyers around town as well as a mailing that went to all members of the various teams. She suggested that Dir. Shaw contact her Area Coordinator or Neighborhood Liaison to get involved and informed. Dir. Gade suggested that the Area Coordinators host gatherings in each neighborhood that they are responsible for. Pres. Kimball commented that there are twelve Area Coordinator positions, of which eleven are currently filled in Bolinas. He emphasized that each Coordinator is a volunteer and that the Council operates on a very low budget. He stressed the importance of not overloading their duties and respecting their volunteer time. Vice Pres. Bass remarked that the Get Ready training that she recently attended at the station was very helpful for personal preparedness for potential disasters. Pres. Kimball reiterated that the town's readiness ultimately equals the sum of each individual resident's readiness. Dir. Shaw thanked everyone and will follow up with her Neighborhood Liaison. She also requested information about the Mental Health Team as she is a member.

Building and Grounds

Chief Brown reported that one of the heating and ventilation units located on the mezzanine level has failed. It was discovered when water was found leaking through the laundry room ceiling. Capt Smith began the repair and discovered an area on the unit that had experienced a small fire. Chief Brown called an HVAC technician and requested an inspection The technician found some damage to the unit that caused the primary and secondary heating units to separate which caused fire to re-route out of the side of the unit. The tech stated that he is seeing

this failure in these units more and more. It is due to the unit needing to have additional support to prevent it from sagging. He stated that repairing the unit would cost as much as replacing it. Chief Brown received an estimate of \$6,310 to replace the unit which includes labor and a new thermostat. The other two units in the building were inspected and no damage was found, although Capt. Smith plans to add the additional support to each one in order to avoid a similar failure. Action was taken later in the meeting under General Business.

General Operations/Administration The annual Public Records Request from the Bay Area News Group was received asking the District for compensation information. Sec. Brown will send the Board the report she and Chief Brown prepared and submitted to BANG. Dir. Chiera recently created a Public Records Access Guideline Policy for the District and reviewed the general rules and Fee Schedule for duplication of public records. Any public entity is subject to PRA's and there is a two week limit to requests. Costs to duplicate are \$.25 cents per page and \$1.70 per minute of production time to extract and program data for reports.

Chief Brown reported that she received a call from Grown/Verizon announcing that they planned to install a microwave dish at the station the very next day. She immediately researched all previous communications and discovered that indeed a microwave dish installation was approved by the District in 2012 after a lengthy and public process. She called the County of Marin to check that all of the permitting was in order. Additional EMFs from the dish are negligible at ground level (as presented by Don Smith in 2012), as the dish is designed to communicate directly with another dish using a narrow and focused path-causing very little emissions to reach ground level.

Surfers' Overlook Repair/Terrace Avenue Chief Brown reported the Terrace Avenue Working Group has been renamed the Save Surfer's Overlook Committee. Committee consists of Chief Brown, Asst. Chief Camiccia, Pres. Kimball, (IM Blackman of BCPUD, Ruddy Ferris, Remick Hart, Ken Masterton and other interested residents. GM Blackman is researching the costs of creating a 501c8 for the project in order to receive donations. The Board discussed other options including using another 501c3 entity and paying them a percentage of all donations in exchange for their fiscal sponsorship. Dir. Shaw cautioned against setting up a new and separate 501c3 entity as it is expensive, legally complicated and time consuming. Another community presentation is being planned in the near future to give the community. another chance to overview the situation. Pres. Kimball reiterated that there is no intent for the Fire District to have any fiscal responsibility for the potential repair.



(Crown Castle) Leases with a term of purchase agreement of 30 years and a purchase price of \$1,343,000. Pres. Kimball created a spreadsheet that sums up the rent expected for the next 30 years with the annual 6% increase of interest added. He included the potential costs of replacing engines in 2017 and 2021. When compared with the proposal, the revenue from the leases with interest far surpasses the offered purchase price of the leases. Dir. Gade asked if the outcome would differ if the \$1.3 million received from WCP was invested at market rate. Pres. Kimball informed her that District monies are most appropriately invested in County accounts even though they only receive approximately 1% interest because the District's funds are not large enough to be invested in a more diversified but riskier portfolio.

Chief Brown added that there have been many offers to purchase the leases which the District has turned down. She remembered the District's commitment to the community to limit EMFs as much as possible now and in the future. If the leases were sold, the District would most likely lose control of the number of carriers on each tower, and emissions would most likely increase. She thanked Pres. Kimball for his clear report. MSC, Shaw/Chiera (unan) to reject the WCP, LLC proposal to purchase the Telecommunications Leases as it is not in the best financial interest of the District. Chief Brown will contact WCP,LLC and inform them of the Board's decision.

Action Item #2: Approve purchase of new ventilation and heating unit at the BFPD

Chief Brown reiterated that the action item is time sensitive and therefore considered an emergency item which can be added to the agenda at the meeting without prior announcement. The timely replacement of the failed unit is very important, it is the unit that controls the temperature in the living space of the






