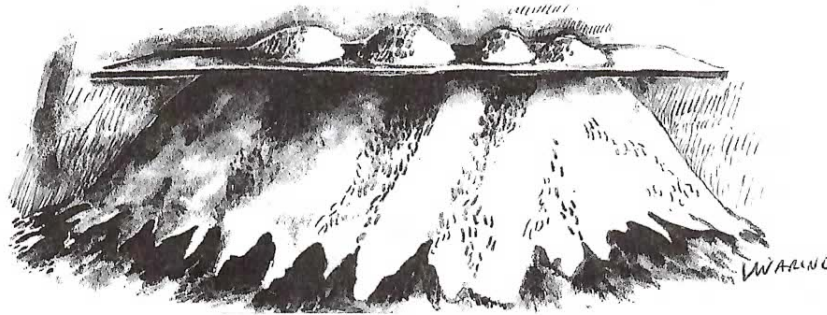

Daniel Abdal Hayy Moore is a great poet and the father of my friend Salihah Kirby who is an accomplished artist in her own right. His first book of poems, Dawn Visions, was published by City Lights Books in 1964. He later went on to found the Floating Lotus Magic Opera Company in Berkeley, California in the late 60s which I imagine some of you remember or were even perhaps involved with.

Daniel lived here in Bolinas back in 1962/63 at the Kent Estate. 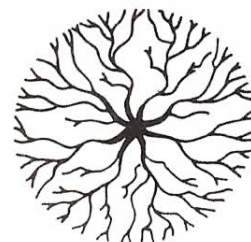
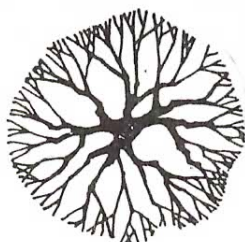
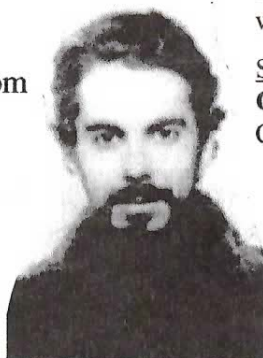

Xavier Nuez: Alley's and Ruin

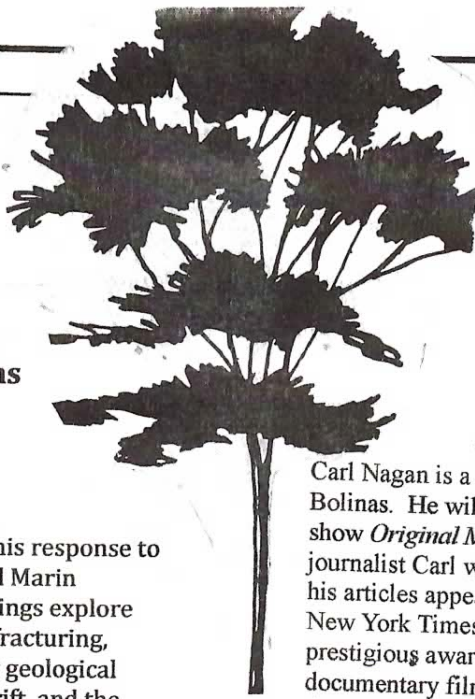

Johanna Baruch: Exploring the Cosmos

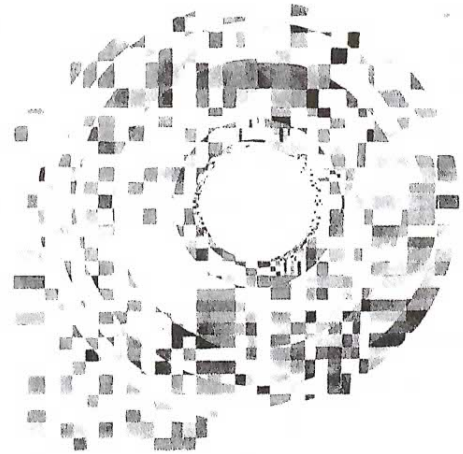

She wailed and wheezed like a pickup truck!"

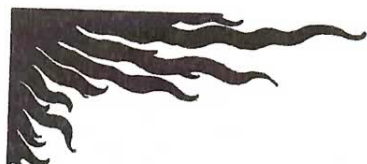

Minutes from the January 23, 2012
Bolinas Fire Protection District Board
Meeting

Pres. Buchanan called the regular meeting of the Bolinas Fire Protection District to order at 7:30PM. Vice Pres. Kilkenny, Dir. Kimball and Dir. Smith were present. Dir. O'Donnell was absent. Also present: Chief Brown, Secretary Brown, Mary Beth Brangan, Jim Heddle and Don Smith.

MSC, Kimball/Smith (unan) to approve the agenda.

Action Item #1: Elect new Board Officers: President and Vice President
Action Item #2: Form new Board Committees: Finance and Budget, Personnel, Building and Grounds

MSC, Kimball/Kilkenny (unan) to continue Board Officers and Board Committees in current positions and configurations with no new election or reformation necessary.

Vice President Shannon Kilkenny
Finance and Budget: Dir. Kimball, Dir. Smith
Personnel: Pres. Buchanan, Vice Pres. Kilkenny
Building and Grounds: Dir. O'Donnell

CHIEF'S REPORT
Mera

Prevention
Chief Brown reported that the repair at the top of Terrace Ave. is complete. She said that a ribbon cutting ceremony is scheduled for Friday the 27th with Sup. Steve Kinsey, Liza Crosse, Bob Beaumont, Earnest Klock and other representatives from the County of Marin. The Board discussed moving the ceremony to the next Friday on February 3rd in order to give more notice to the community to attend. Chief Brown agreed to contact Liza Crosse to reschedule the event.

Training
Asst. Chief Steve Marcotte has been instructing the EMT recertification classe being held at the station on Tuesday nights and on Saturday January 14th. Chief Brown commended him for his exemplary teaching. Volunteers will be attending two more EMT Saturday classes including two skills tests in February hosted by the Stinson Beach Fire Department.
EMTs are now required by the Department of Justice to get a "Live Scan" fingerprinting which serves as a background check.

Volunteers
BFD/BCPUD Shared Personnel Update: The reciprocal training issue is yet to be resolved.

Apparatus
The Ford pickup truck to replace U231 has been ordered and will be delivered in early March. Chief Brown will bring a recommendation to the next Board meeting for a minimum bid to be used to sell existing U231.

Building and Grounds
Chief Brown reported that deep cleaning and interior painting is in order to maintain the fire station building. She plans to get quotes from local businesses for cleaning services and painting/minor repairs. The firehouse and clinic are also

experiencing difficulties with the digital thermostats. She will inquire about a quote for installing a simpler model.

General Operations/Administration
The Bay Area News Group requested fourteen categories of employee payroll information from the District. Chief Brown has had to request Jennifer Vuillermet of County Counsel to review the information to make sure the District is compliant. Chief Brown also received a Civil Grand Jury survey regarding District finances that is due in the first week of February.

Maintenance Agreement – CHA
Chief Brown and Dir. Kimball reviewed and updated the agreement which addresses communal property issues including the solar panels, upkeep and use of community areas and finances. Chief Brown will meet with Nancy Dombrowski of CHA to review the draft which will then be presented to both Boards for approval.

Chief Brown reviewed the "extinguished fire call" listed in Fire Calls and Emergencies. She described that a fire ignited in a wood shed next to a hot tub. The wooden deck and windy conditions contributed to the fire.

GENERAL BUSINESS
Action Item #3: Approve renewal of annual Underwriting contract with KWMR
MSC, Kimball/Kilkenny (unan) to approve renewal of annual Underwriting contract with KWMR for an annual fee of \$610.

Discussion: Emergency only access and egress alternatives to closure of Terrace Avenue and Overlook Road.
Dir. Kimball suggested that Pres. Buchanan write a letter on behalf of the Board thanking Sup. Steve Kinsey, Bob Beaumont of DPW, Earnest Klock, Chief Engineer and others at the County to acknowledge the repair of Terrace Avenue.
Dir. Kimball suggested that the letter acknowledge and appreciate the County funds allocated for the repair, the huge undertaking and scope of the project, and the value to the community of the repair that creates two vital access and egress routes to and from the Mesa. Pres.

Buchanan accepted the request to write the letter to be read aloud at the ribbon-cutting ceremony.

Discussion: Verizon request to add microwave dish to existing Crown Castle tower located on Fire District property. Don Smith reported that the 2011 Site Safe Report is inaccurate as the antennae data used to calculate EMFs was inaccurate. Don said that he has been working with an engineer at Site Safe and plans to correct the data so that Site Safe could possibly prepare an accurate report.
Dir. Kimball requested that a determination be made of what equipment is located on the tower and what exactly is being transmitted. Don is focusing on what the total emissions are at the station including those from the AT&T tower, the Verizon antennas on the Crown Castle tower, the National Park Service and all other fire station communications. He would like to determine exposure to any persons on the second floor of the fire station as emissions may be greater on that level.
Pres. Buchanan thanked Don Smith for his excellent and diligent work.
Dir. Kimball and Jennifer Vuillermet of County Counsel have reviewed the contract between Crown Castle, the tower owner, and Verizon, the tenant. The contract includes a six month written notice tenant termination clause but no landlord-termination clause. The structural integrity of the tower with weight of additional antennas in high wind conditions is also in question. The discussion and findings to be continued at the next Board meeting.

MSC, Kilkenny/Smith (unan) to approve the Consent Calendar including the Minutes from the December 19, 2011 regular meeting, the warrant lists from December 13 – January 16, 2011, and the financial reports for November 2011 including the account balances.

Chief Brown reported that a third party had requested access to the data base collected by the Disaster Council. The Board discussed the use of information collected for non-related purposes either political or non-political. The Board concurred that an action item be put on the next Board meeting agenda to determine that all data collected by the Disaster Council is officially confidential and off limits to any other organization or individual.

Secretary Brown will e-mail the Inverness Fire Employment Handbook to the Personnel Committee members to be used as a template.

Bolinas: I keep that little trunk of a short life-span I spent there (about a year in 1962-3) in my memory bio-map of where I've lived, but only visited last year in May for the first time since. Among the vanguard 60s UC Berkeley dropouts after two years in the English Department (I had a vision of professorial colleagues walking down the hallways with knives in their backs from their competition) and taking a cue from a professor who suggested, after loving a Walden paper I had written but who informed me he would have to teach me how to write a "formal essay," and "did I really want to?" and "why not just go and write poetry if that's what you want to do," I went off to Mexico and continued writing poems for a book I called "Dawn Visions." Submitting it to a UC competition for manuscripts in progress before quitting, I was awarded a thousand dollars that, actually, in those days, lasted me nearly a full year at the Kent Estate at the turn of the road to the beach.

I recall, perhaps sketchily now, a giant, mournful cypress tree, beloved of the Greeks, facing the lagoon in front of the perfect little tutor's cottage I'd rented (the Kents only came out on occasional weekends) in which egrets roosted by night and night herons by day. In my head I can still hear the night herons' cries as they sailed out at dusk over the lagoon and the battering of arriving egret wings simultaneously, establishing their roosting order before settling down for the night. Inside the cottage was an assemblage of huge and heavy teak Victorian furniture, a humongous bedstead, a side table with thick gray marble top, and assorted chairs and tables all assembled within its small, four walls. I felt a bit like Alice when she grew too big for her house. Raccoons also would chase me from the tiny kitchen in back, having come in through the cat door.

The main building with its grand, maybe early 1920s front porch, remained silent and unoccupied except for a few noisy weekend cocktail parties provided by Mr. Kent, I think a Senator then, and the times Mrs. Kent, a lovely woman in a wide brimmed Kathryn Hepburn white hat, would venture out to work in her luxuriously blooming garden.

But for the most part I was left alone to walk the beach and write, and I loved it. I had a female tabby cat with whom I communed, and read new poems to

her purrs of approval (perhaps none too critical). We would take long walks along the lagoon and she'd stay with me the whole time, often going ahead and jumping out from behind a tree. We might spend all afternoon meandering, especially when San Francisco friends began popping in unannounced for a long weekend visit, to the point I'd get a little paranoid and stay away with her all day. One epiphanic moment was when I reached a point in the trail one dusk and large dazzling white owl suddenly landed in a clearing in the trees ahead and turned to look right at me, eye to eye.

To stretch my prize money I washed windows in the Grocery Store, all those rectangular panes, and later scraped cat crud off the floors of a couple who had a house at the edge of town overlooking the water and a household of about forty cats. Some were crippled, some dazed, some mating, some yowling, and everywhere I walked there was cat activity out the sides of my vision. But the job soon grew irksome, my money soon ran out, a girlfriend moved in, and to cure any paranoia about guests, we moved to San Francisco to join them. I had a completed manuscript of Dawn Visions by then, written mostly in Mexico and Bolinas, and in 1964 Lawrence Ferlinghetti published it with my illustrations in an edition that I was later told served as a kind of trip manual for LSD journeys. A cathartic tumble of visions, it did have its ecstatic moments...

Now, nearly half a century later (!), after creating and directing the Floating Lotus Magic Opera Company in the late 60s in Berkeley, in a kind of prodigal return, having become a Muslim Sufi in the tariqa of Shaykh Muhammed bin al-Habib of Meknes, Morocco, visiting Mecca and Medina for Hajj and Umra, living in Nigeria, traveling throughout North Africa, now residing in Philadelphia, with thirty-books of poetry in my Ecstatic Exchange Series, I'm giving a reading at the Point Reyes Dance Palace, on

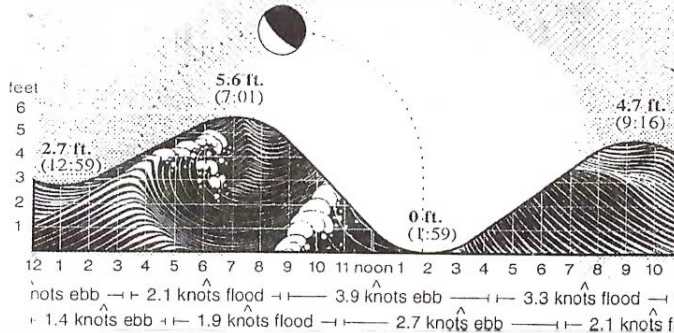
