Dear Community:

This is to inform those of you who were present at the quarterly meeting of the BCLT on March 5th about the status of the Lauff Ranch Road project. The hope of this project was to provide an opportunity for families and that do not qualify for federally funded housing to be able to purchase homes and remain long-term Bolinas residents.

Unfortunately, due to the federal funds we have invested in our existing properties, we are not eligible for the loans that would have made the project possible. The BCLT has decided to table this project to focus our efforts towards other opportunities.

The Lauff Ranch Road property consists of three single family dwellings and was slated to be deed restricted-middle income workforce housing, owned by residents through a co-op structure. The potential still remains for this to happen. Should anyone like more information on the details of this project or have any suggestions for funding please call or visit.




About the show:

About a year ago I came across a book by Eliot Porter — the American Photographer renowned for spearheading the use of color in - and further defining the genre of - Nature Photography. The cover was torn, and the book itself was completely faded, water damaged. But I saw organic forms, something photographic. Before I identified the photographer, I thought that it was a contemporary Artists' Book. I assumed the artist would be a process-based, camera-less photographer (such are the times). So it was interesting to find that it was, indeed, Eliot Porter — who is often labeled as a relic of some bygone, conservative bro-culture. I was struck: the distinction between the intentional, process-based work today, and this haphazard Eliot Porter remix, was slight. As is so often the case, it simply came down to context. I began to wonder: what would Nature Photography look like today?

As a genre, since Porter's heyday, Nature Photography has largely been relegated to the pages of National Geographic — oversaturated images of flowers, macaws, tossed amidst landscape, portraits, and stories of exotic worlds. This so-called "Nature Porn" is problematic. It is not just the objectification (as is often the case with depicted cultures), but the presentation of a faux objective methodology. Anyone who has spent time in Nature - especially when alone - knows that these depictions are Disneyland. The experience of Nature is personal, vital. It can be beautiful, but also intense, terrifying. So why has its representation been reduced to this cartoon? And why is this ritual copied by millions of people with digital cameras and a copy of photoshop?

I guess it's no accident that as Rupert Murdoch took over National Geographic so many photographic artists left their cameras behind. Despite the dominant culture, though, I still wonder what an authentic Nature Photography looks like. I believe the individual, subjective experience of Nature matters — so I wonder what a subjective voice looks like, particularly one amplified through a camera. I wonder what our experience of Nature means, now, amidst Climate Fallout and the potential collapse of capitalism, and I wonder why its depiction is drowned out in noise. For all of this, I am left wondering — what we are looking for?

The photographers in this show address this question. In their myriad ways, they are pushing forward - and against, at times - prevailing strategies within the arts — of process, and materials-based abstraction. In some cases, they are pushing against themselves, questioning how their work functions across several strategies. They are not just photographing Nature, but asking us to think about the way we look - why - and how photographs function.



To be clear, the goal of this show is not to answer any questions, nor to return to a bygone era where we all took cameras out to explore some fictional, virgin wilderness. But it is to assert that authorship still matters, that an individual's authentic experience of Nature still matters, that a particular gaze into the enormity of existence - the wilderness itself, of our own time, of our own experience - that this still matters. Amidst fascism, and a society defined by extreme inequality, this is only more true — "in wildness is the preservation of the world," said Thoreau, at the beginning of the last Gilded Age. In our time this remains: the authentic experience of Nature is a political act, the authentic voice is personal and collective preservation.


