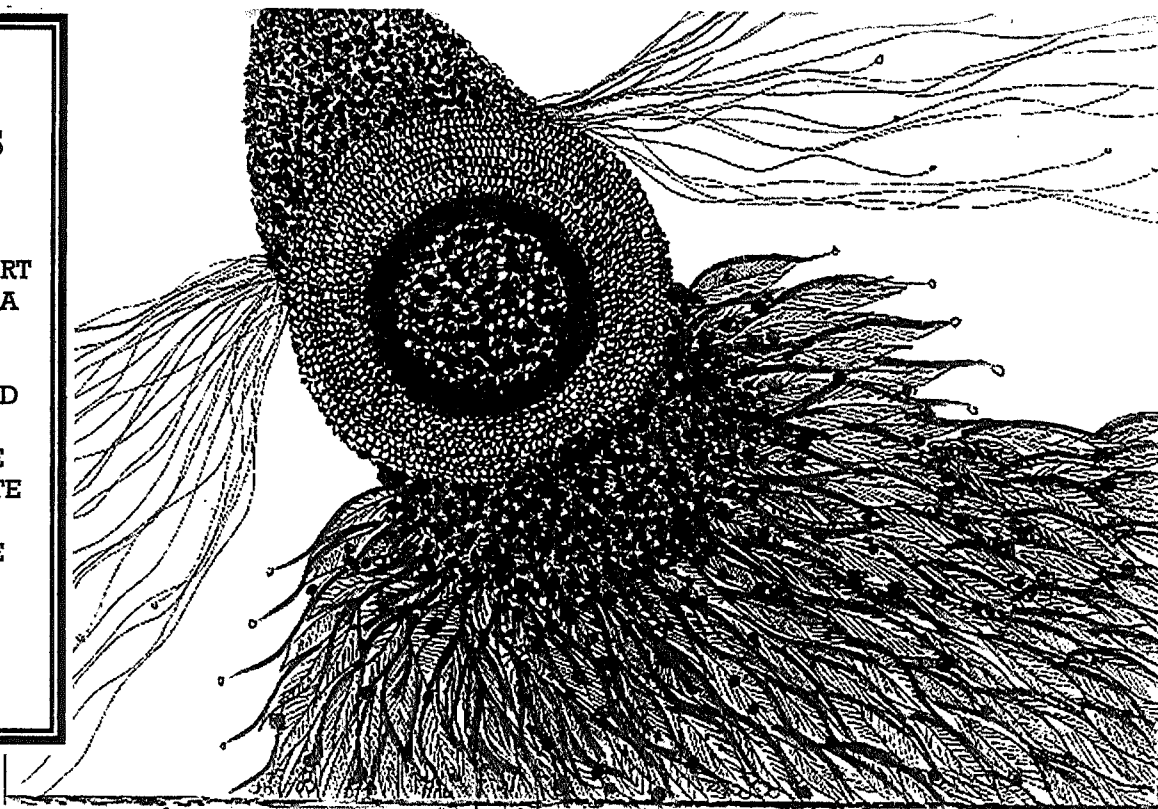

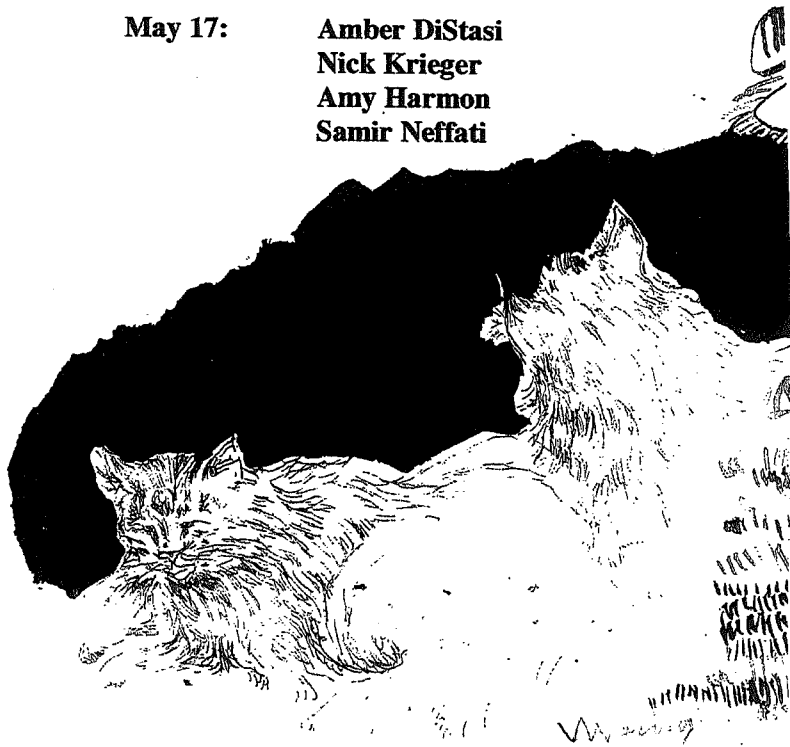

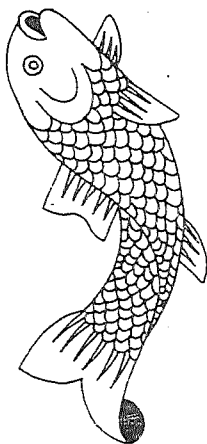

A SERIOUS REMINDER

By now, many of you have heard about the 3 am vegetation fire that broke out north of Poplar Avenue in Jack's Creek. Preliminarily, it is looking like a camp fire was the cause of the almost 3.5 acre fire that sent flames up into the eucalyptus trees and embers falling in the field next to Poplar.

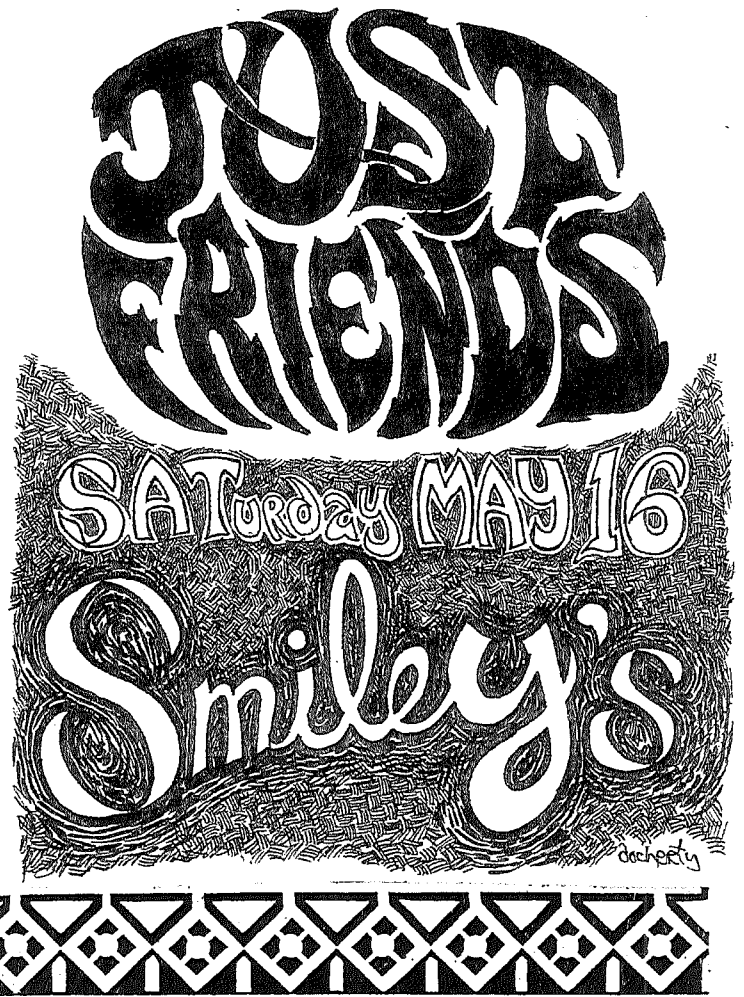
This is a stark reminder of the high fire hazard area we call home. This fire, and the embers it threw off, did not cause a much larger fire because it is only May and our grasses and plants still hold a great deal of moisture. If this same fire had started later in the summer, say October, it would have been drastically different.

Fire would have raced across the grassy field to Poplar, and quite likely beyond, to the many homes that are surrounded by vegetation. When this vegetation dries out, the embers that are thrown from a fire are much more likely to start more fires. The fire would be stopped eventually but not before the loss of homes. Each and every home must have defensible space in order to give it a chance to survive a fire.

If you are a property owner, you may have already received the green Wildfire Hazard Notice from the Marin County Fire Department. Not only is it state law, but it *is critical to the safety of your home as well as the entire town that every property owner complete their Defensible Space Self Inspection.*

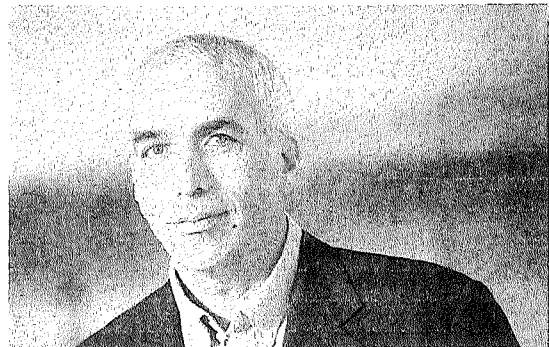

CALMING THE FOUR FEARS DRIVING TOTALITARIAN INOCULATION

Pertussis Panic, Ebola Frenzy and Measles Mania. If your only source of information about vaccines comes from mainstream media parroting medical officials, you've been filled with fears without facts. Four primary fears about vaccine exemptions are driving totalitarian inoculation fever. These can be chipped away using scientific evidence and logic.

Plagues of Eradicated Diseases will Return Unless All Children are Vaccinated

Deaths from infectious diseases were nearly eradicated by improved sanitation, fresher foods, rising incomes and public health measures by the turn of the twentieth century, not by vaccines. Even the Journal of Infection Control acknowledged that "the overall contribution of medical innovations to the health revolution is difficult to validate" in a 2001 paper. Lancet, the British medical journal was more honest in a 1977 paper. "There is no evidence that vaccination played a major role in the decline in incidence and mortality" of infectious diseases.

Fifteen of 19 European Union countries have no mandatory vaccinations, yet they suffer lower rates from those diseases than Americans, with the most mandatory vaccinations of any nation. Yet, our child and adult health statistics rank with the worst of industrialized nations.

Unvaccinated Children Endanger Children with Medical Exemptions

Less than .03% of children are granted medical exemptions from mandatory public school vaccinations. Typically these children's immune systems were so damaged by mandatory doses of oncology poisons that they're granted exemption from toxic vaccines. John Hopkins Hospital guide for Immunocompromised Patients warns them to "avoid crowds if possible", and close contact with anyone who's "recently had a live virus vaccination (chicken pox, measles, rubella, nasal spray influenza, polio or smallpox)". Documented cases of vaccinated people infecting immune compromised children and adults are common, not from unvaccinated.

My Vaccinated Children are Threatened by Exemptors

If vaccines are as effective as claimed, then your children are safe. If you're worried about vaccine failure, then also question vaccine safety because they form an intertwined wall of denial. The Vaccine Injury Compensation Fund was created by Congress to provide immunity to vaccine manufacturers. Their settlements are secret, but over \$3 billion has been paid out in damages since

1987. The few leaked cases show that vaccines were legally proven to have caused autism, severe brain damage, autoimmune diseases and deaths.

Vaccine failure is widely documented, but exaggerated claims of increased risk from exemptors are based on one unvaccinated boy who contracted measles abroad and infected vaccinated children in their doctor's waiting room in 2008.

There's no evidence for the repeated claims that unvaccinated children were driving the 2015 Disney Measles Mania. No Measles Mickey or Minnie has been identified, and the virus strain was from Asia, not the American MMR vaccine strain.

Unvaccinated Children are at Risk From Irrational Parents

Every parent has the right to calculate the relative risk from infectious diseases vs known and unknown dangers of vaccines. The Institute of Medicine confirmed that known and unknown risk factors increase severe injuries or death from vaccines. The known risks aren't routinely screened for before inoculations. There's no research on unknown risks since vaccine providers are immune from damages. Not so the parents of victims.

Zero Americans have died from measles since 2003 according to CDC, while the Vaccine Adverse Events Reporting System listed 108 deaths from the MMR vaccine in that period. The CDC estimated vaccine injuries are ten times higher than doctors report, while the FDA found only one in a hundred were reported.

The few studies comparing vaccinated vs unvaccinated children were done overseas. Vaccinated children were more likely to have autoimmune and neurological disorders, with ten times the rate of tonsillitis in a New Zealand study. Vaccinated German children had 2-10 times higher rates of these chronic diseases than unvaccinated. Children injected with the flu vaccine were six times more likely to become ill with a respiratory illness in a Hong Kong study.

The CDC testified to Congress in 2011 that the U.S. has never done a direct comparison study of vaccinated and unvaccinated children. The Totalitarian Inoculation Bill marching through California's legislature is fueled by fears not facts.
