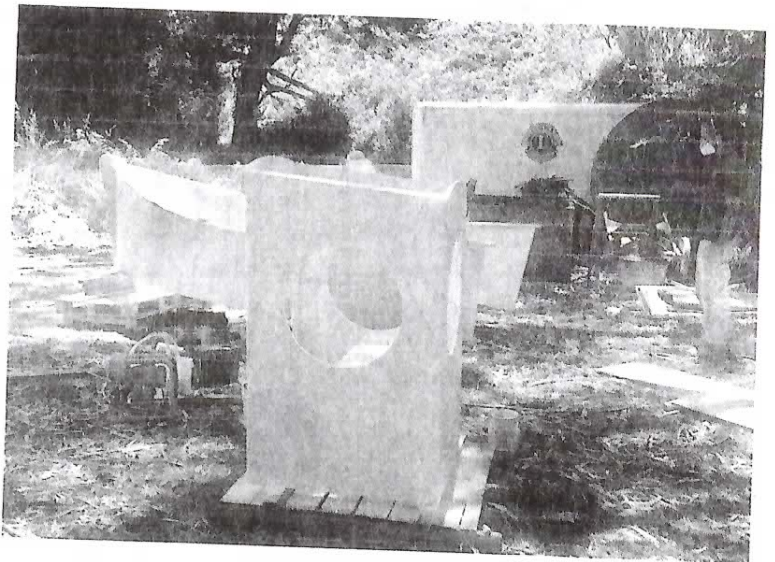
Report from the Peoples Store,

UPDATED ELECTION NEWS!

**DEADLINES FOR CANDIDACY AND FOR
BALLOT MEASURES! PLEASE READ!**

The terms of 3 BCPUD Directors expire this year.** If you would like to run for one of these seats in the November 5, 2013 election, you must declare your candidacy during the filing period, which opens **July 15, 2013** and closes **August 9, 2013 at 5:00 p.m.** The appropriate forms are available from the Registrar of Voters office at the Civic Center (Room 121) and must be filed there. If any of the 3 BCPUD Directors whose terms are expiring at the end of November decide that they do not want to run for another 4-year term, the filing period for **non-incumbents only** will be extended through **August 14, 2013.**

**** UPDATE ON BCPUD INCUMBENT DIRECTORS:** one of the three incumbent BCPUD Directors whose terms expire this year has publicly declared his intention to run for reelection and two of the three incumbent BCPUD Directors whose terms expire this year have publicly declared their intentions *not* to run for reelection.

The last day to submit measures for placement on the November ballot is **August 9, 2013**; the last day to withdraw a measure from the ballot is **August 14, 2013.** The last day to submit ballot arguments is **August 19, 2013** and the last day to submit rebuttal arguments is **August 26, 2013.** In each case, the pertinent documents regarding measures on the ballot must be received by the County's Election Office by **4:30 p.m.** on the deadline date.

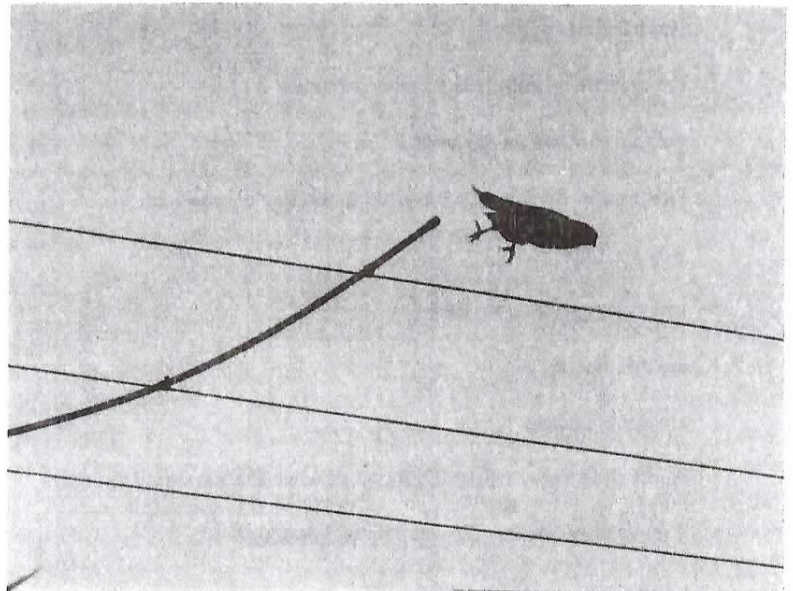

always moving

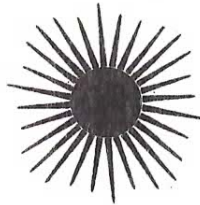
always breathing

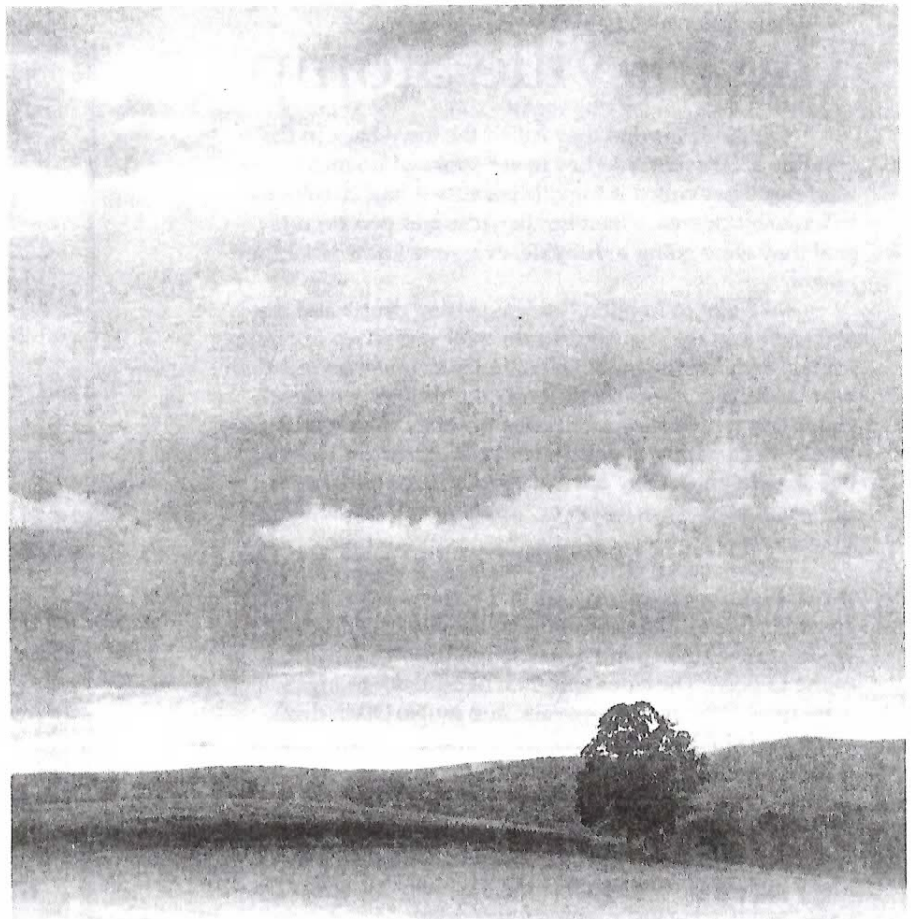

Lagoon Restoration: As I mentioned last issue the restoration of Kent Island is in full swing and is being organized by Marin County Parks & Recreation. There are two rangers on hand who bring a nice lunch and Parks & Rec. caps & t-shirts as souvenirs. They also show what plants are targeted for removal and what are to remain. Future workdays will be the 1st Friday and the 3rd Saturday of each month, beginning at 10 AM. A little Bolinas community interaction is nice, but so far I have only met volunteers from over the hill. It is now time for Bolinas to "to put up or shut up" about Lagoon restoration. If you can not make it on one of the organized days there plenty of week day opportunities to lend a hand. This time of year is critical to remove certain invasive's because they are blooming and sending out virulent seeds. Sea rocket is easy to identify and easier to pull. What is hard but gratifying physical work is pulling up ice plant. Each organized work day there is an introduction to the tasks, tools are supplied, snacks and a fine lunch served at noon, the work day concludes at 2 PM. It is a terrific way to take in the entire sweep of Lagoon and surrounding hills.

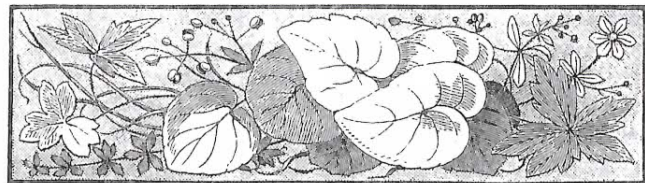
A pump which draws salt water from the Lagoon's main channel and sends the salt water down a series of 2 ½ inch pipes to a high pressure fire hose which then effectively drenches any targeted plant matter which is not salt tolerant. The island plays such a critical role in the dynamics of the lagoon. Located just inside the Seadrift spit off the main channel it directs tides as they ebb & flow! This alters the way sediment is transported or in most cases deposited at the margins of the island. The first thing that struck me is how incredibly lush and well vegetated that it was, but with all the wrong plant species. The grove of trees seen from Wharf Rd. is much larger and denser than it appears. None of these trees is over 50 years old. By removing ice-plant, European beach grass and others which anchor the island, it is our hope that future high tides will top over and start a large natural excavation project. Below the mat is densely compacted fine grain sediment that forms the crown of the island. In years past King Tides or seasonal high tides would top over the island and keep invading plants in check. I was astounded at how much plastic and driftwood debris was littering the island. For now we have to limit our activities to certain areas so we do not impact nesting Egrets and Herons whom Audobon Canyon is closely monitoring. As trees have matured the grove has provided a relatively safe nesting place.

Marine Debris: The last outing to South Beach near the Point Reyes lighthouse again delivered up no interesting marine debris. I know one day soon we will strike it rich as large quantities are being reported off the Oregon and California coast. Our search is continuing with new funding from NOAA to support tracking of Tsunami marine debris as it approaches our coast. While now we are finding large amounts of kelp it is interesting that much of the large debris seen in the Winter months has now disappeared.

Duxbury Reef: The month of May has seen many daylight low tides. Coupled with children getting restless with the thought of summer vacation has brought unprecedented visitation to the reef. On May 14 & 15 I witnessed +/-250 people on this sensitive tidal environment. I saw several school buses from Sierra Nevada Communities with kids on multi-day field trips. Trampling is always a problem on a reef and the special habitat is exposed only for short periods. Flora & Fauna have been secure in the over nite hours of high tides but when exposed to daylight and hundreds of scampering kids these creatures get shell shocked with no place to hide from groping hands. I have learned a great deal about these special creatures and I want children to be able to learn about and appreciate them. To witness so many people on the reef hurts my sensibilities and concern for all things

natural. The permitting system in place by the Marin County Parks is not fulfilling the need to protect the reef. Groups larger than 20 people require a permit but few realize this and large groups show up simultaneously with an excited notion of a tide-pooling experience. Unfortunately, what I recently witnessed was more like a mosh-pit. I am trying to work with County Parks, the California Academy of Science, the Marine Sanctuary and Environmental Action Committee of West Marin to bring about more protection and oversight. It seems that this time of year in particular, a ranger should be present at low tides, instructing and informing people of the permit process.

The Jugville Stomp

Jugville is what they called the town back in the 50's (the 1850's that is.) They never spoke of Bolinas or Las Baulines. They called it Jugville because it had 20 saloons in a two block area. When lumberjacks and prospectors said they were going to Jugville, everyone knew what they meant.

"Goin' to Jugville." meant getting drunk and the favored beverage was hard apple cider served up in ceramic jugs, each holding about a quart. Cider was stronger than beer, and a lot gentler on the body than rotgut whiskey. Cider was the ideal social drink. One of its chief merits was that it was a happy drunk that led to boastful and boisterous shenanigans. Only once in a while did a fight break out amongst cider drinkers or "appleheads" as they called themselves.

The coastal schooners that ferried redwood lumber to San Francisco returned with full ballasts of hard cider in 70 gallon barrels. The barrels were usually rolled from the wharf up the street and right through the swinging doors of the saloons. The cider was then decanted into jugs which were used to pour the applejack into mugs. Often drinkers would sip directly from the jug, and then blow across the jug's mouth to make a musical note, the scale of which depended upon how much cider had been drunk.

Other drinkers would join in and soon an impromptu "jug band" would be huffing and puffing away. Many jug songs were written, most of them quite bawdy. Other songs were just excuses for dancing.

The cider drinkers usually danced by themselves, each one hopping up and down, or performing some repetitive gesture that was their own unique brand of self expression. As the jugband hooted away, everyone in the saloon would be stomping, twitching, flapping, sneezing or doing the "Merry Whirlwind," in time to the music.. One popular number was the "Jugville Stomp," which went:

*Do the Jugville Stomp
whomp, whomp
Do the Jugville Stomp
whomp, whomp*

Everyone would stomp their foot in time to the "Whomp, whomp." The song's repeated refrain was interspersed with rhymesters riffing on current events and punsters punning. Other appleheads would do the "ladybug," laying on their backs on the dance floor and wiggling their arms and legs vociferously.

For a while a tame black bear hung out downtown. The bear would beg for cider, and then stand up and dance to the jugband music..

But times change and after the Civil War ended, a wave of anti-alcoholism swept the country. By 1868 the newly formed Temperance League had taken over the town. Even Captain Issac Morgan, the proprietor of the Schooner Saloon, joined the Loyal Order of Rehabites

The prohibitionists closed down most of the saloons in Jugville, and they ordained that the town was never again to be called "Jugville." All references were struck from historic deeds and documents.

The party was over anyway. All the good lumber had been stripped and shipped. Most of the lumberjack crews had moved north. The Jugville era came to a close and Bolinas entered a new era of respectability.
