Set in 19th Century Dublin, Glenn Close leads the cast in the title role. Disguising herself as a male butler at a prestigious hotel for Mrs Baker, she becomes close with the young and beautiful Helen Dawes (Mia Wasikowska of Alice in Wonderland) Ms Close also co wrote the screenplay and starred in the 1982 live theater version. Clearly this is a story close to her heart. The film received mixed reviews, however the performances by both her and by Janet McTeer as Hubert Page were highly praised. 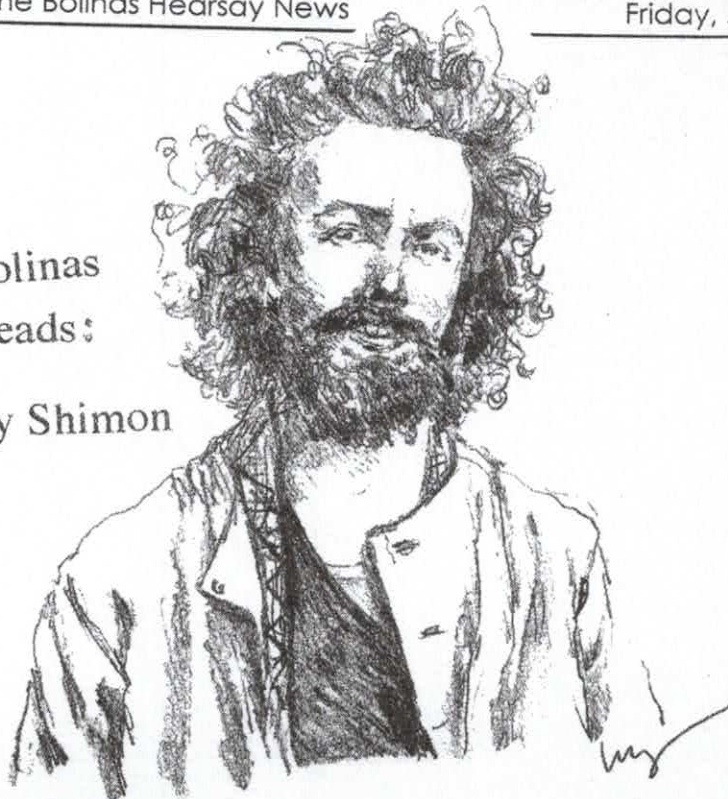

Perry Shimon



*The fleeting choruses of Perry Shimon are often found in West Marin playing with light, sound, satellites, sadness, rare earths, bare chested Georgian men sitting around the table singing folk songs and short artist bios. We can connect @perryshimon on instagram to share thoughts on books and other things*

**What are you reading now? Do you read one book at a time or several?**

Usually several or I'll pick through a stack pertaining to a subject of interest. Currently I'm reading a catalogue from a museum show that opened this year at the ICA in Boston called Art in age of the Internet. This is one of the first major shows in the states about the way institutional Art has responded to the advent of the internet. It's a helpful consolidation of key thinkers and artists at this nexus. It brings to mind Hito Steyerl, who's Duty Free Art: Art in the Age of Planetary Civil War also came out this year and I would recommend highly to anyone even moderately concerned with Art and the internet. I'm also reading Arts for Living on a Damaged Planet, which is a multi authored collection that came out of a conference in 2014 at UC Santa Cruz and looks at our advancing understanding of microbial ecologies, how they relate to our understanding of self and the roles Art can play in addressing the manifold crises of the Anthropocene. There are some wonderful contributors like Donna Haraway, who's recent Staying with the Trouble: Making Kin in the Chthulucene and Anna Tsings The Mushroom at the End of the World: On the Possibility of Life in Capitalist Ruins are two useful and beautiful meditations on this subject.

**What's in your stack of books?**

I'm interested in the work of postcolonial Martinique poet philosopher Edouard Glissant, who's writing is being amplified by an interesting constituency in the art world including Hans Ulrich Obrist - who's writing on art and curating is also interesting and comes along often. Glissant offers concepts like Mondialite - a kind of global dialogue to counteract the homogenizing force of globalization and the right to opacity which feels salient in this moment of the nearly complete colonization of digital life and it's doctrines of transparency. German philosopher Byung-Chul Han takes up this theme in his popular and widely translated philosophical essays The Transparency Society and The Burnout Society, useful tools for thinking if you don't mind the omniscient, western centric,

### What About the Employee Apartment at the Stinson School Site?

I read with interest in Wednesday's Hearsay News the open letter from the Bolinas-Stinson School District Employee Housing Committee, and it reminded me that in 1982, when I was a school bus driver and John Brickner was Superintendent/Principal of the Bolinas-Stinson School District at a whopping salary of \$35,000. per year (which included supervision of design and construction of two complete and entirely new schools on the two separate campuses), that the Stinson School site was designed with an awareness of the need for onsite security and affordable employee housing, and included a lovely efficiency apartment, paid for with school bond money, which for several years was home to a school employee who was also a live-in caretaker. I have been told by former School Board Members that for a long time now, no one has lived in the efficiency apartment on site, and that it is currently being used for storage.

I hope that in addition to finding creative solutions for inexpensive local housing for the underpaid school staff, as a first step the Employee Housing Committee might consider the liberation of this lovely if lonely apartment for the original use it was intended ... cheap staff housing. I believe it could be immediately cleaned out and refurbished, without the expenditure of massive additional funds.

mansplain-y great german philosopher tone. Fortunately they're concise. While in the realm of mansplaining, few do it more broadly and more entertainingly than Tim Morton, who's averaging at least a book a year with a formidable range of academic and radical publishers and showing up often in the forwards and bibliographies of Art related publications. His *Ecological Thought* is a foundational work, which introduces the concept of Hyperobjects- a significant contribution expanded to book length that describes anything massively distributed in space and time relative to human scale and subsequent works which have been refining and remixing his core concepts. Last years *Humankind* is on my shelf and *Being Ecological* came out this year. I'm interested in the work of Keller Easterling who I've been devouring in many media forms. Her *Extrastatecraft: The Power of Infrastructure Space* (Verso 2014) is a recommended read to better understand and discuss the deregulated special economic zones which have become a powerful tool in Neoliberal Expansion, their normalization and the implications. Mckenzie Wark compiled a collection of contemporary thinkers called *General Intellects* that I would recommend as entree to a number of relevant and emerging discourses. And because this is Marin County, I recommend Etel Adnan, who writes beautifully about here. I enjoyed her recent *Night*.

**Are you a browser in the library or do you know in advance what you are looking for? Do you browse the library catalog or pick specific books? If so, how do you find out about them?**

I browse, talk, visit, research and listen to the algorithms. I'm of the mind our branch has the most wonderful librarians and foot-for-foot the most interesting holdings in the system. That said, about half the titles I'm looking for are not in the system and the one's I do find are usually in Link Plus, an affiliate lending program. This highlights a need for public institutions to collect more esoteric holdings. Specialized art libraries like the Brand in Los Angeles is a good model. Libraries like the Graphic Arts Institute of Oaxaca, started by Francisco Toledo, is another inspiring model.

The Library is so much more than a collection of books. In this common space, with it's ecologies and promises, are the seeds to a better way of living together. I go to big cities several times a year, usually New York and LA and visit my favorite book stores. McNally Jackson and Printed Matter in New York and Skylight and Artbook at Hauser and Wirth in LA are some favorites as well as the book sections of contemporary art spaces. I like Alley Cat in San Francisco in the one part of the mission that doesn't totally bum me out and the new owners of Point Reyes Books have been bringing in interesting titles.

**What is the most interesting thing you have learned from a book recently?**

That they can extend way beyond their bookness, relate in both digital and physical space in manifold ways. They can act as a unifying force in gathering people and catalyze multimedia explorations. I read most books in a kind of dialectic with an internet browser. I can see and hear the author/s speak and link to referenced titles and related works.

**Do you have a favorite genre? Any genres that you never read?**

I like work that isn't easily shelved in a preexisting category. I enjoyed Mirtha Dermisache's recent collection of asemic writing (link: selected writing of Mirtha Dermisache). I tend towards lyrical essays for their tone and openness, Maggie Nelson (link: *Bluets*) and Mary Ruefle (link: *Madness, Rack and Honey*) come to mind. I know fiction is having a tough time and I don't mean to pile on, but it does take a lot to get me interested. I like Ben Learner and also his criticism and poetry. I picked up Arundhati Roy's new book while listening to her read at the Brooklyn Library last month. I admire her activism. I'm increasingly drawn towards collections with many authors around subjects of interest. Ellen Mara De Wachter recently did a series of interviews with artist collectives that I appreciated (link *Co:Art artists on creative collaboration*). There are certainly publishers I pay attention to, Sternberg Press, Verso, Zone.

**What was your reading experience as a child? A favorite book?**

I read Bill Watterson and Gary Larson a lot - Calvin and Hobbes and *The Far Side*. Anything funny, with words and concepts that expanded my understanding of things.

**Were there any books that made a strong impression on your work?**

David Shields *Reality Hunger* did a good job of framing the cultural moment / postmodern crisis.

**Is there a famous author that you ever wanted to meet?**

James Baldwin, Anne Carson, Laozi, Plato, Pasolini, Sei Shonagon, Marx, Cage, Deleuze and Guattari... to name a few that come to mind...

**What's the last book that you recommended to a friend?**

*Carceral Capitalism*, Jackie Wang. An urgent read on our expanding carceral condition and how radicalized it is. And *Mali Twist*, the catalogue for a recent show on the Malian photographer Malik Sidibe. The pictures are wonderful and there are some nice essays including one by Manthia Diawara who's work intrigues me.

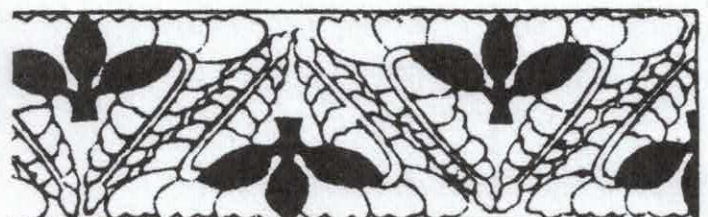
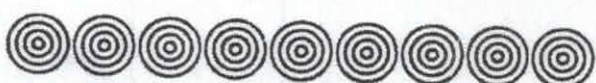
**What kind of characters draw you in as a reader?**

Critical, unsure, self-aware with a compulsion towards beauty and sharing.

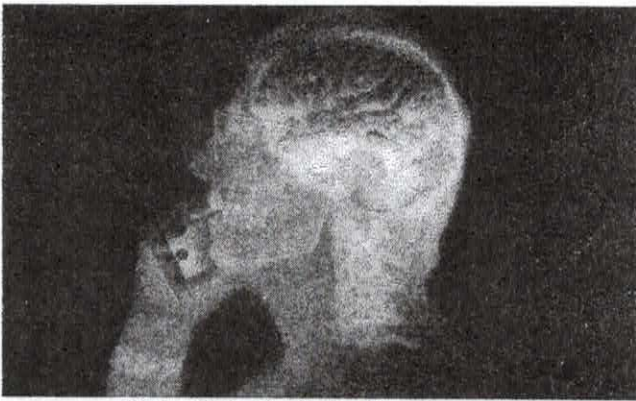
**When and where do you like to read? Describe your ideal reading experience.**

## War gaming the science on cell phones and health risks: A conversation with journalist Mark Dowie

*We've been documenting the development of wireless microwave devices and the independent science on its effects for the past 20 years. So we were delighted by a recent confluence of events: the release of the National Toxicology Program peer-reviewed study and the publication of an article in The Nation, "How Big Wireless Convinced Us Our Cell Phones Are Safe," focused on how industry war-gamed the science. Soon after, a major study was released in Italy that replicated the results of the National Toxicology Project study. Both found that the same rare cancers appeared in animal subjects exposed to both high and low levels of radio frequency electromagnetic radiation. We couldn't resist interviewing Inverness resident Mark Dowie about all of it. Mark is a celebrated investigative reporter and historian, the author of many books, the winner of at least 19 journalism awards, a former publisher and editor of Mother Jones Magazine and the co-author with Mark Hertsgaard of the recent Nation article. Here is our conversation.*

**Jim:** How did you decide to write this story?

**Mark:** [Mark] Hertsgaard, who's the investigative editor of The Nation, asked me to do a big story on cell phones. I looked at the literature and found that cell phones have been beaten to death. It's a shop-worn story, impossible to advance.

So I said, "I think the story is how industry has been war gaming science" — 'war gaming' is their term, not mine — and gave him the history going back to military research that was done on microwaves during the Cold War, then up to the present, and how so much of it has been suppressed, classified, hidden and distorted by wireless defenders who tore pages from the playbooks of the tobacco and fossil fuel industries, then used the same P.R. firms, the same law firms. All to do the same thing: manufacture doubt about the harmfulness of this technology. Hertsgaard said, "Okay. Let's go with that."

**Jim:** Did you find anything surprising that you didn't expect?

**Mark:** Of course. Whenever you do a story like this, you're bound to discover amazing things that were never exposed before, meet amazing people. But what really stood out to me was the lack of imagination in this industry. They literally did exactly what cigarette manufacturers did for 50 years, even hired the same people who had tried to make tobacco look safe, tried to make P.C.B.s look safe, tried to make all sorts of horrible things look safe. The very same people who had failed to make tobacco look safe were hired to make wireless look safe.

That's surprising to me. Get some imagination, guys. When people do that, I'm tempted to quote Sun Tzu from "The Art of War." There's only one sentence you need to remember from that book: "Don't ever do the same thing the same way twice and you'll win the war."

Anybody who's written intelligently about conflict repeats that adage—do things a little bit differently every time and you'll win. It's about the art of surprise. How can you surprise anyone when you go back to the same lawyers and flacks, who will just pull up same tired tactics?

**Mary Beth:** Folks in West Marin have been hyperaware of these issues since the growth of cell towers starting in the late 1990s. What should our area be aware of, in terms of the evidence and the science that you've uncovered?

**Mark:** I think we should feel blessed to live where we live. I don't know whether you've ever done any of those searches, which you can do just with antennasearch.com. I did this once in downtown San Francisco, and found the location was being zapped by seven big towers. What have we got here? One up on Mount Vision with a very weak signal. That's AT&T's. Then we have Verizon over on Mount Barnaby. That's pretty much it, where I am in Inverness. You?

**Mary Beth:** We have two towers at the Bolinas fire station, but we have 27 antennas scattered within four miles of our zip code.

**Mark:** Well, Bo is being zapped. You're a laboratory.

**Mary Beth:** Did you look carefully at the results of the recent National Toxicology Program study?

**Mark:** Yes, I did. In fact, it was peer reviewed and announced while we were doing the story. It was a clear sign that telling and revealing science was beginning to pile up against the wireless industry.

**Mary Beth:** By that you mean?

**Mark:** Evidence. Evidence is accumulating. Five years from now, I might very well be sitting right here telling you, "Yes, non-ionizing radiation is a carcinogen." But right now, I think that the most compelling fact is that a long-term heavy dose of pulsed non-ionizing radiation can break DNA strands, which is a precursor of cancer. And look, DNA is everywhere. It's not just in humans. It's in every living thing. Radiation is affecting the grass on your lawn. It's affecting the bees, birds and trees.

Maybe this year, but certainly next year, the World Health Organization and its International Agency for Research on Cancer are going to reconsider their classification of cell phone radiation. They recently increased its classification from a 3 ("not classifiable") to 2B—"possibly carcinogenic." There are scientists at WHO who want to push it immediately to 2A—"a probable carcinogen."

**Jim:** What about this onslaught that's being conducted by the industry to foist 5G on cities and rural areas?

**Mary Beth:** Do you think that we'll have to worry out here in West Marin about 5G, the soon-to-be-rolled-out fifth generation of wireless technology?

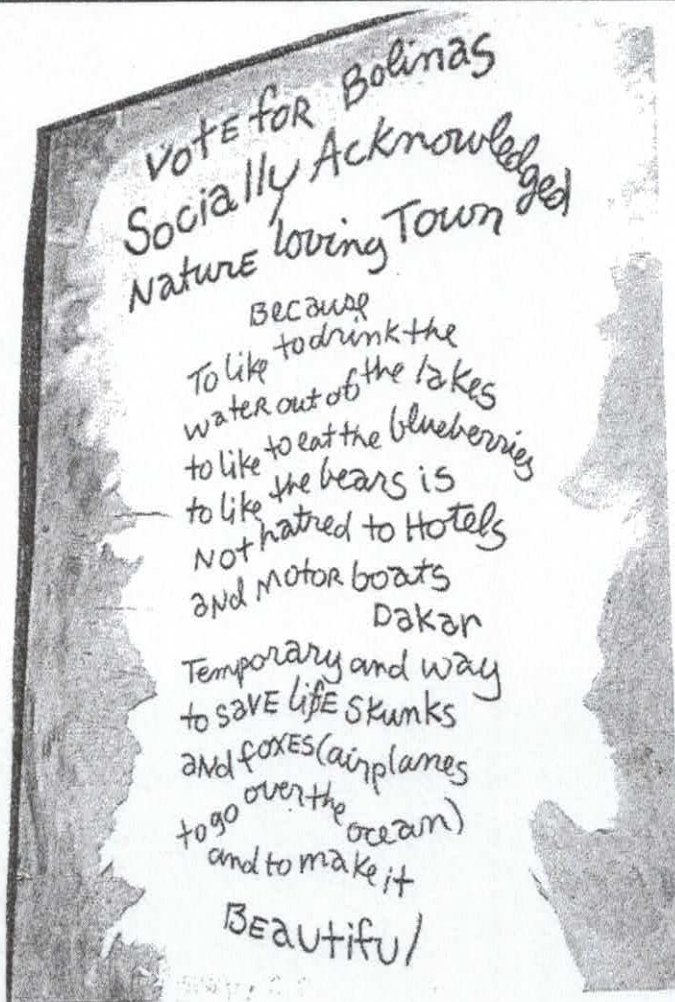

**2018 ELECTION NEWS! DEADLINES FOR CANDIDACY AND FOR BALLOT MEASURES! PLEASE READ!**

The terms of three (3) BCPUD Directors expire this year. If you would like to run for one of these seats in the November 6, 2018 election, you must declare your candidacy during the filing period, which opens **July 16, 2018** and closes **August 10, 2018**. The appropriate forms are available from the Registrar of Voters office at the Civic Center (Room 121) and must be filed there. If any of the three BCPUD Directors whose terms are expiring at the end of November decide that they do not want to run for another 4-year term, the filing period for **non-incumbents only** will be extended be several days (the specific date is not yet available).

The last day to submit measures for placement on the November ballot is **August 10, 2018**; the last day to withdraw a measure from the ballot is **August 15, 2018**. The last day to submit ballot arguments is **August 20, 2018** and the last day to submit rebuttal arguments is **August 27, 2018**. In each case, the pertinent documents must be received by the County's Election Office by **4:30 p.m.** on the deadline date.

**BOLINAS MUSEUM: MORE COURTYARD VANDALISM**

Bolinas Museum's courtyard is private property that we maintain to share with the community and visitors. In addition to the site of free museum concerts and events like the upcoming Free Family Fun day this Saturday, it is an oasis where children play and brings joy to people of all ages who bask in the sun and enjoy sound of birds and the bubbling fountain.

But now, once again, we are forced to lock our gates after business hours because of the mindless selfishness of a few. Too often we have find the courtyard filled with trash, beer bottles, and even vomit from overnight partying by people who care little for the community. Keith Hansen's gallery faces the courtyard where he maintains the fountain and attracts the birds that delight us all. Usually the first to arrive, out of the generosity of his heart, Keith cleans up the damage and mess, but it's not fair to him.

The incidents have become so common that we began to once again lock the courtyard gates. The evening of the 4<sup>th</sup> of July, someone kicked in the gate across from Smiley's, and parts of the picket fence at the main entrance, which the museum will now have to pay to repair.\*

Off of the top of my head, I can think of 6 pregnant women and I bet there's more. So, let's throw them a community baby shower!

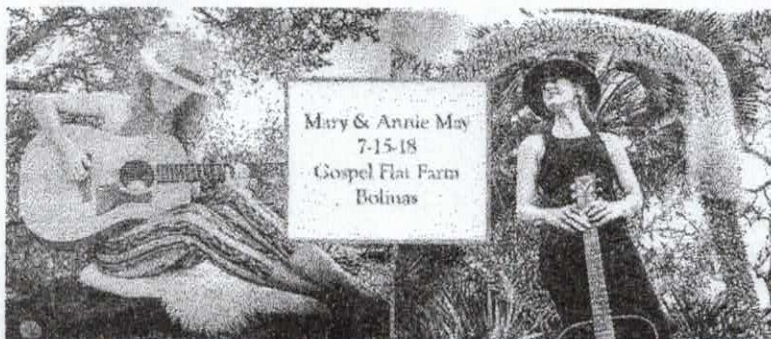
