



KNOW YOUR BO

In 1878, a road was financed between Bolinas and San Rafael. Soon, Bolinas was "deluged with visitors" on the San Rafael & Bolinas Stage Company. In 1884, another road to Bolinas was built, this one started in Fairfax just below Bon Tempe ranch. In 1902, the Mill Valley & Mt. Tamalpais Scenic Railway took one ¾ up the mountain, where passengers transferred to stagecoach for descent to Willow Camp. The plan was to "bring tracks down Steep Ravine onto the beach, thence across the sandspit (Seadrift) to Bolinas, crossing the channel by drawbridge, and up Olema Valley to a junction ... at Tocaloma." The only opposing voice was Frank Waterhouse, who "didn't like the idea of trains upsetting his Bolinas quiet."



What Could Marin Sea Level Rise Mean to You?

The County of Marin's Community Development Agency has formed C-SMART: Collaboration: Sea Level Marin Adaptation Response Team to assess the impacts that sea level rise may bring to people and the natural and built resources of Marin's coastal area. C-SMART also will identify adaptation strategies for consideration into the County's Local Coastal Program updates, as well as other existing planning and policy processes.

The County of Marin is soliciting applications from people in affected communities, including Bolinas, to serve on a Stakeholder Advisory Committee ("SAC"). Applicants must pledge to participate in three in-person meetings (tentatively scheduled for October 2014, February 2015 and November 2015) and provided timely review of draft study products and other communications. Applications are available at the BCPUD office and on the County's website (www.marincounty.org - follow the links to the Community Development Agency's homepage and the Planning for Our Future link).

At its regularly scheduled meeting on July 16, 2014, the BCPUD Board of Directors directed staff to inform the community about this planning effort by the County and to encourage community members who are interested in serving on the SAC to submit a statement of interest to the BCPUD no later than Monday July 28, 2014. Please explain why you wish to serve on the SAC, your qualifications and/or skills that would benefit the SAC, and your personal and/or professional involvement in community and/or environmental activities. The BCPUD Board will review the statements of interest and consider nominating one or more persons from the community to serve on the SAC at a special BCPUD Board meeting to be held on Wednesday, July 30, 2014.





DUXBURY REEF: Low tides, chill swell and warmish weekend weather along with the allure of catching a glimpse of sea urchins, giant anemones, and rainbow colored nudibranchs (the slug of the sea), brought a handful of people to the typically inaccessible tidepools in the outer reaches of Duxbury Reef on Saturday. One creature noticeably absent on the hike, which was hosted by the Point Reyes National Seashore Association Field Institute, were starfish, who have been succumbing rapidly to Sea Star Wasting Disease. "Anecdotal observations on many Point Reyes beaches suggest dramatic declines and even complete disappearance of adult sea stars in some locations," said Point Reyes National Seashore scientist Ben Becker.



BOLINAS-STINSON UNION SCHOOL DISTRICT GOES "LIVE"

WITH COMMUNITY SURVEY

BOLINAS, CA, July 16 —With the exhortation to "Make your voice heard!" the Bolinas—Stinson Union

School District is launching a community survey this week soliciting input from district voters on a range of proposed facility upgrades and improvements on Bolinas and Stinson Beach Campuses. The survey, developed by the Fiscal Oversight & Facilities Planning Advisory Committee (FOFPAC)—an advisory body to the school superintendent and board trustees—is based upon results obtained from a comprehensive BSUSD Staff Survey conducted in May 2014.

Staff Survey results, reported at the June 10th school board meeting, identified a number of areas as "needing improvement" with the top suggestion being replacement of the ageing "Quesada" Building used for P.E. classes, assemblies, ballroom dancing and art shows. Additional areas identified include: technology, additional classroom and appropriate "breakout" space (utilized for small-group learning), inefficient and outdated kitchens on both campuses, larger and safer art shops and special education learning support service areas.

The Staff Survey also identified "non-existent", but relevant, facility areas such as a science lab, gymnasium and performing arts space, and an outdoor classroom.

Given the range of projects identified, BSUSD Board Trustees are now turning to community members for help in charting a future. In order to address facility needs, especially on a larger scale, BSUSD would need to pursue a general obligation bond or tax referendum.

GO bonds, an ad valorem tax on the assessed value of real property, must be approved by 55% of district voters. Proceeds can be used to fund capital construction and improvements under the guidance of a Citizen's Oversight



Committee, which is established to ensure funds are spent only on projects identified in the ballot measure.

Board Trustee and FOFPAC Chair Cyrus Harmon states "Community input is critical to developing a comprehensive and effective facilities planning process. So, please 'make your voice heard' and share your thoughts with us."

The survey is open until July 31_{st}, 2014. Results will be presented at a special meeting of BSUSD Trustees on Tuesday, August 5th at 1 pm in the Bolinas Campus Library. The large, school bus yellow postcards will be mailed to all Bolinas and Stinson Beach box holders this week. The postcards offer a brief introduction to the survey and direct residents to the online survey link.

MESA PARK BOARD MEETING June 16, 2014 7:00 PM Bolinas Firehouse Community Room

Call to Order: 7:08

Board Members present: Charles Whitefield, Jane Mickelson, Patricia Hickey, Dylan Squires Others: Angela Vernon, Christine Cunha, Vic Amoroso

Community Expression: None

Downtown Park: [Jane] There's been a request from community members to install hooks on the doors of the toilet stalls in the park restrooms. [Charles] We can ask Roger to install. Pick them up at the lumber yard. [Jane] The Bolinas Community Center has requested that we include procedures for using the parks on a MP website; or they can include a link on the BCC website. [Patricia] We also need signage with information and contact number. [Christine] My office could take reservations and put them on the calendar. [Charles] The donation for use of the park/parking lot should cover the cost of the person handling the key. Perhaps Suki could handle the Mesa Park and Christine's office could cover the downtown park. [In response to an inquiry to taking the cobblestones.] Cobblestones will be used in future design implementation; not to be sold or donated

Maintenance Report: [Angela] Clearing the hillside cost more than anticipated. We pulled the thistles rather than cutting them. Found a lot of little oaks. [Charles] It looks wonderful. Thank you. [Angela] We need a sign to keep people off the hill. It's dangerous in places and they can destroy the plantings. I had Oscar hammer in most of the old rebar that was part of a wooden retaining wall. They were very dangerous. I would like to have the edge of the road painted red. People park at the end of the driveway so I can't get in. [Dylan] That's a fire access. We should ask the fire dept. to paint it. [Angela] The dog water dish quit. Eddie came and fixed it last week. A power washer is needed. [Charles] We have one, and you can ask Suki to get it from the storage shed. [Angela] I've had a request from the clinic. They want to plant something on the outside of the fence along west end of the soccer field, a potate vine. [Charles] Yes, but they must know that we're going to be doing construction of the soccer field. [Angela] We need to post the ordinances. [Jane] I can provide the text, having posted it in the Hearsay and at the Post Office. Charles can have it laminated and installed. [Angela] The water tank emptied when I turned it on to water the lawn for the big party. When it closed off, the toilets went down. We had to turn it over to the BPUD water. We still don't know if we'll have enough water to make it through the summer. The tank is filling up very slowly. [Charles] Roger needs to tell the installers to fix it. He's still responsible for the park structures. [Patricia] The bathrooms should not have been changed over to the tank at all. [Angela] There's a system to prevent the tank water from getting into the BPUD water, and where they disconnected a section is now leaking. The leak is from the tank water, not the BPUD water. [Charles] If you can't contact Roger when something like this comes up, call me. [Christine] Arn locks the toilets if there's any trouble. [Angela] Someone on the board should be shown how the irrigation system works. Roger will be off the project within the year.

Irrigation Report: Bryan not present. [Vic] I spoke with Jennifer. She's going ahead to put the project out to bid, but it will be minus the drawings for the sprinkler systems to include in the bid. [Patricia] Isn't part of this finding someone who knows how to put in the irrigation system and would design it? [Vic] It's my understanding that the design has to be included in the bid proposal. [Patricia] Perhaps Ed Pohlman can inform us about this. I'll call Bryan and Ed.

Election up-date: Action Item: Pass Resolution No. Twelve, Resolution of the Governing body of Mesa Park (Firehouse Community Park Agency) District. Proposing an election be held in its jurisdiction on November 4, 2014; requesting the Board of Supervisors to consolidate with any other election conducted on said date, and requesting election services by the County Registrar of Voters. 3 seats on the Mesa Park Board are up for election. [Patricia moves, Jane 2nd] 4 Ayes. Patricia will not be running for office.


She has accepted a job in Ukiah and is moving in July. She is resigning. [Christine] It would be good to find someone who has worked on the downtown park. [Dylan] I'd like to offer to be the point person on the board for the downtown park.

Treasurer's Report: Dylan: transferred some money into DT park for final stages of the project. Measure A has about \$2200 left. I'm completing the forms for the second payment. Matt Lewis has finished the bleachers and has submitted his invoice. Liability will be paid by splitting between the two parks, \$1009 per park. County council fee came out of the DT park account, to approve the ordinances.

Other: Return to idea of having preschool here: [Charles] I think we would confront the same issues about permitting as the school. We told them we would entertain the idea if they would supply all the data. We have not heard back yet about that. There are concerns about the parking lot usage, also access that would have to go between the skate park and the basketball court. If we agreed, the structure couldn't remain there permanently. They need to find out if it's feasible before we can decide. Jennie Pfeiffer has requested a meeting between the school board and the MP board concerning future plans for the school & gymnasium. [Patricia] I am going to try to come to the July meeting, but that will be my last meeting.






What I Learned at Bug Camp


Most of my book learning about insects has come from children's nature guides—a good starting place for a novice. The more I glean from casual study, the odder it seems that entomology has not claimed a place in school alongside reading, writing, and arithmetic. Insects scoot and soar through the background of every human drama-and more often than most people realize, they take center stage. Humans wouldn't last long without insects. They provide us with products like honey and silk. More essentially, they pollinate plants, disperse seeds, aerate soil, scavenge wastes, and control pests, making themselves ecologically and agriculturally indispensable.

Yet insects can also, of course, be monstrously destructive. Every known plant on Earth serves as lunch for at least one kind of insect. In some agricultural areas, insects regularly devour three-fourths of the crops. Furthermore, by biting and stinging, spreading disease, and destroying homes and possessions, these small creatures inflict large-scale misery.

And they are ubiquitous. Insects inhabit every peak and pocket of the earth's surface, from icy poles to deserts, snowfields to steaming volcanoes. They fly high above the Himalayas and dwell deep in caves. An average-sized back yard may host more than a thousand kinds of insects, each one exploiting a slightly different niche in that small world.

Insects also display remarkable power for their size. Some beetles can lift the proportional equivalent of a sixty-ton object. A grasshopper can leap the length of an insect-scale football field. A flea can spring to a height comparable to that of a thirty-story building. And in terms of technological prowess, insects are the rocket scientists of the nonhuman world. They devised a method of jet propulsion long before we had the wheel. They also invented air conditioning, antifreeze, papermaking, gardening, chemical warfare, celestial navigation, the social division of labor, bait-and-switch advertising, and communication through dance. Who wouldn't want to study these animals?


