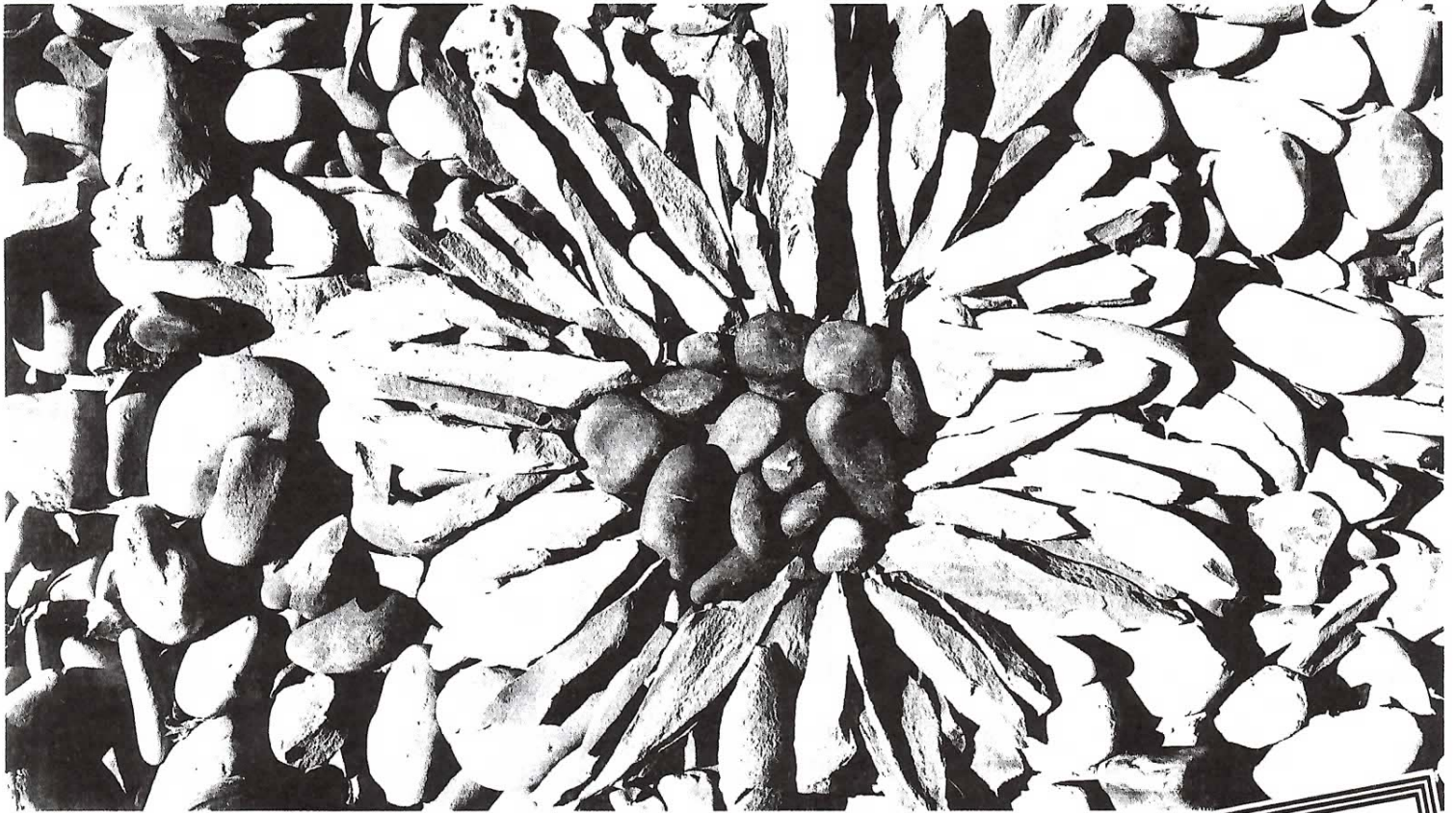

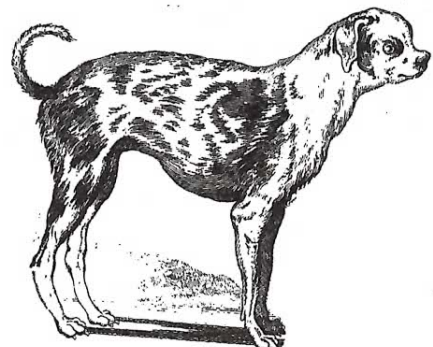

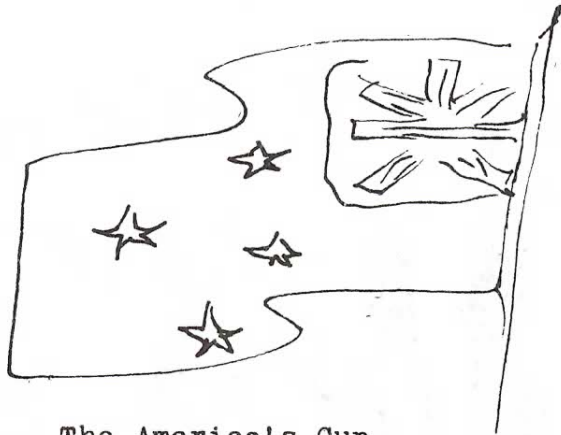

So, that's why this Wednesday I'm on the ferry with Steve, and as the San Francisco waterfront opens before us a fleet of boats comes out to greet us: Yachts and super yachts, and finally the biggest most beautiful yacht of all comes by with the flag of New Zealand flying from her mast... and that's when I think: maybe I've been waiting for this my whole life too and just didn't know it.

Minutes from the August 26, 2013 Bolinas Fire Protection District Board Meeting

Pres. Buchanan called the regular meeting of the Bolinas Fire Protection District to order at 7:30PM. Vice Pres. Smith, Dir. Kimball, Dir. Chiera and Dir. Bass were present. Also present: Chief Brown, Secretary Brown, three Landmark Dividend representatives and two MERA representatives.

MSC, Kimball/Smith (unan) to approve the agenda as it is printed.

**CHIEF'S REPORT**  
**NERA**

Chief Brown reported that she and Dir. Kimball attended a meeting with Dave Jefferies, MERA Project Manager, Alex Anderson, Project Manager Assistant, Maureen Cassingham, MERA Executive Officer, Rich Pearce, MERA Board President, Chief and Asst. Chiefs of Marin County Fire, and the Chiefs from Stinson Beach and Inverness. The main issue addressed at the meeting was the ability of the Volunteer low-band paging system to function with the new and coming next generation MERA system to be deployed in 2018. It was determined that the paging system will be able to be "patched" into the new system similar to how the pagers are "patched" with the current system. Dir. Kimball noted that the pagers are analog and the new system is digital so a "patching" will be required to link the two systems. He noted that the old MERA radios cost \$4,000 each, the new ones will cost \$6,500 each and pagers cost \$400 each. Chief Brown clarified that currently the Department owns 21 radios, one for each seat on all the apparatus and one for each Chief Officer. It would be cost prohibitive to purchase every Volunteer an individual MERA radio therefore making "patching" of the system imperative. It is yet to be determined whether MERA, Marin County Fire, the Volunteer fire agencies or some combination of the above will be responsible for ensuring the system is in place. Other issues addressed during the meeting were coverage concerns, operational costs and the upcoming presentations to be made by all MERA member agencies. Chief Brown stated that she and the Inverness and Stinson Beach fire chiefs are more comfortable with making presentations to their Boards (as will follow in this meeting) as they realize the serious need for the new next generation system.

Dir. Kimball reported that Stinson Beach Fire Chief Kenny Stevens had four points of concern at the meeting: the longevity of the new system, the functionality of the pagers in conjunction with the new system, reception and costs. Dir. Kimball noted that Volunteer fire departments make a very small "sliver of the pie" of the MERA system. Police and Sherriff enforcement traffic constitute the largest portion of the pie with extra special radio

functions that Volunteer fire departments hardly utilize. He noted that the cost of the system should be allocated relative to the use and need of system functions. Presently, the District pays a disproportionate share of the costs as most system functions are not frequently used. Also, the percentage of MERA costs in the District budget is much higher than most of the other twenty five agencies involved. Chief Brown will continue to raise these issues in future MERA meetings. Dir. Kimball remarked that Chief Brown was articulate at the meeting and that all present including MERA officials listen closely to her comments. Dir. Chiera expressed concern about communications during emergency events including floods, earthquakes or wildfires when the MERA system would most likely be flooded and inoperable. Chief Brown answered that there are four layers of multiple communication systems in place including local paging and the Disaster Council radio system. Dir Chiera asked if the Point Reyes National Seashore is part of the MERA system. Chief Brown answered that their system is separate but they do have the capability to communicate within the MERA system.

**Disaster Council**

Chief Brown reported that she and Beth Carusillo are awaiting the arrival of lime green vests that were ordered for Disaster Council Area Coordinators and Neighborhood Liaisons. Orange backpacks with supplies will also be provided for each member. Radio training is planned for the new Coordinators and Liaisons.

**General Operations**

Chief Brown has been working with Kris Backenstose of Maximum ITSM to resolve IT issues at the station. He promptly fixed a broken hard drive needed for audit preparations. He was recommended by Kaaren Gann and currently provides services to Inverness PUD, BCPUD and Commonweal.

**Surfers' Overlook Repair/Terrace Avenue**

Dir. Kimball said that a final report from SAGE regarding their geotechnical investigation completed on April 16<sup>th</sup> and 17<sup>th</sup> was submitted to the "Working Group" consisting of members from the County, BCPUD and BFPD. The report will be on the agenda at the next BCPUD

meeting and then will be submitted to the Fire Board for acceptance.

Meanwhile, Dir. Kimball reported that he and GM Blackman met with Sup. Steve Kinsey and Liza Cross to map out the next steps to be taken toward raising money for the repair. Even though minimal money will be provided by the County, Sup. Steve Kinsey has generously offered in-kind leadership for the campaign. He plans to attend the next Working Group meeting scheduled for the end of September. Pres. Buchanan thanked Dir. Kimball for all of his time and effort spent on the project.

**GENERAL BUSINESS**

**Action Item #1:** Landmark Dividend – Easement purchase proposal. Landmark representatives in attendance. Mike Acker, Zach Melvin, and Tim Brazy, the owner of Landmark Dividend attended the meeting. Chief Brown gave a brief history of the tower easements and related issues in the Bolinas Community. She stated that other companies have previously offered to buy the easements with plans to add additional carriers for increased rental income. Zach clarified that the offer is to buy the revenue stream only with no ability to increase the easement size or add additional carriers. Dir. Kimball suggested that the wording of a legal agreement with the purchase could read, "purchase revenue stream only," and could specify no additional carriers. Dir. Chiera asked for the length of the term of the proposal which is forty years. More advantages of the potential purchase were discussed including acquiring a large sum of money through the sale that could be used to purchase expensive equipment such as new engines that are non-budgeted, cushion the annual budget expenditures, mitigate unforeseen mergers and acquisitions that could cancel the cell tower leases and the associated income. Dir. Kimball remarked that the revenue stream from the cell tower leases make up 15 to 20% of the operating budget and approximately \$85,000 per year which is necessary for operations. Dir. Kimball, Dir Chiera and Pres.

Buchanan all remarked on the principle of a public entity investing the tax revenue in a potentially unstable market. Pres. Buchanan suggested that a public ballot measure would be in order for approval before any sale could occur. He also suggested a legal review of the offer. More discussion ensued including a general reluctance to the sell the asset without public approval, limited use of large proceeds, potential challenges in future budget allocations and the inability to generate income comparable to what is now received annually from the cell tower lease agreements.

At this point in the meeting, the three Landmark representatives left the meeting. Pres. Buchanan thanked them for attending and remarked that their presence was very helpful to better understand their proposal. The Board discussed whether to continue the action item on the next agenda. After more discussion of potential risks, they decided to decline the offer and write a thank you letter to the representatives.

MSC, Chiera/Kimball (unan) to decline the proposal for easement purchase by Landmark Dividend.

**Presentation:** MERA's Next Generation Project Presentation and Study Session Chief Brown began by introducing Dave Jeffries, MERA Special Project Manager and Alex Anderson, MERA Special Project Manager Administrative Assistant. She thanked them for coming and began a twenty minute presentation that updated the Board on the current status and future plans of the Marin Emergency Radio Authority (MERA). The District is one of twenty five agencies that are members of the MERA system. MERA has started the planning process to replace the current Public Safety Communications System with a new system in 2018. The current Motorola radios will become obsolete in the future as parts are increasingly hard to find. Keeping a system up to date and functioning is critical for first responders and for rapid responses during the aftermath of a disaster. Funding for the new system include a possible parcel tax which would be more favorable and less costly to the District than the twenty five agencies paying directly from operating budgets. Vice Pres. Smith asked why the new system is not being funded by the State of California. Dave answered that

that would be too costly and time consuming to replace the system in the near future. Chief Brown thanked the MERA representatives for attending the meeting. They plan to come back to the Board in January of 2014 with an update.

**Action Item #2:** Approve Request from Department of Parks and Recreation to renew Communications Vault Lease for ten years beginning July 1, 2014. The request was exactly the same as the previous request for five years with the same escalation rate of 4%.

MSC, Chiera/Bass (unan) to approve request from Department of Parks and Recreation to renew Communications Vault Lease for ten years beginning July 1, 2014.

**Action Item #3:** Election for LAFCO Alternate Special District Member Pres. Buchanan recommended Jack Baker of North Marin Water District as first choice, Mary Sylla of Ross Valley Sanitary District as second choice and Lew Kious of Almonte Sanitary District as third choice. The Board concurred. MSC, Kimball/Chiera (unan) to vote for Jack Baker, Mary Sylla and Lew Kious for LAFCO Alternate Special District

**Prevention**  
Chief Brown reported that she and Todd Lando have begun working together focusing on ways to reach out and educate the community on various aspects of wild fire prevention and safety. They plan to create a display at the post office with information and graphics similar to the brochure that was sent to all residents in May of this year. They are working on area familiarization and neighborhood meetings.

**Evacuation Planning**  
Chief Brown added that road clearing and improving signage around town and on the large Mesa are preparations necessary for evacuation planning. She and Todd plan to address evacuation planning more directly in the near future.

Chief Brown added that she recently received plans for bathrooms at Mesa Park. She wonders if the new Mesa Park Board is aware of previous agreements regarding possible bathrooms and use of water and the Firehouse sewer lines. Dir. Kimball asked if the BCPUD would be involved in this Mesa Park matter. Chief Brown suggested that the Building and Grounds Committee meet to further discuss the issue.

**Grants** No update.

**Training**  
Chief Brown conducted CPR training for Dr. Bryan Barrantes and staff and for the Bolinas Stinson School staff. Thursday night trainings have been focused on procedures for possible out-of-District responses. Due to fires currently burning in California, resources in Marin County are being utilized. There is a greater possibility for a request for District engines and Volunteers to be requested out of District, especially the Wildland engine.

Planning continues for the Multi Casualty Incident drill. It has tentatively been scheduled for September 28<sup>th</sup>. Chief Brown invited the Board to attend.

MSC, Bass/Smith (unan) to approve the Consent Calendar including the Minutes from the July 22, 2013 regular meeting, the warrant lists from June 19 – Aug 20, 2013, financial reports for May, June and July of 2013 and the account balances.
