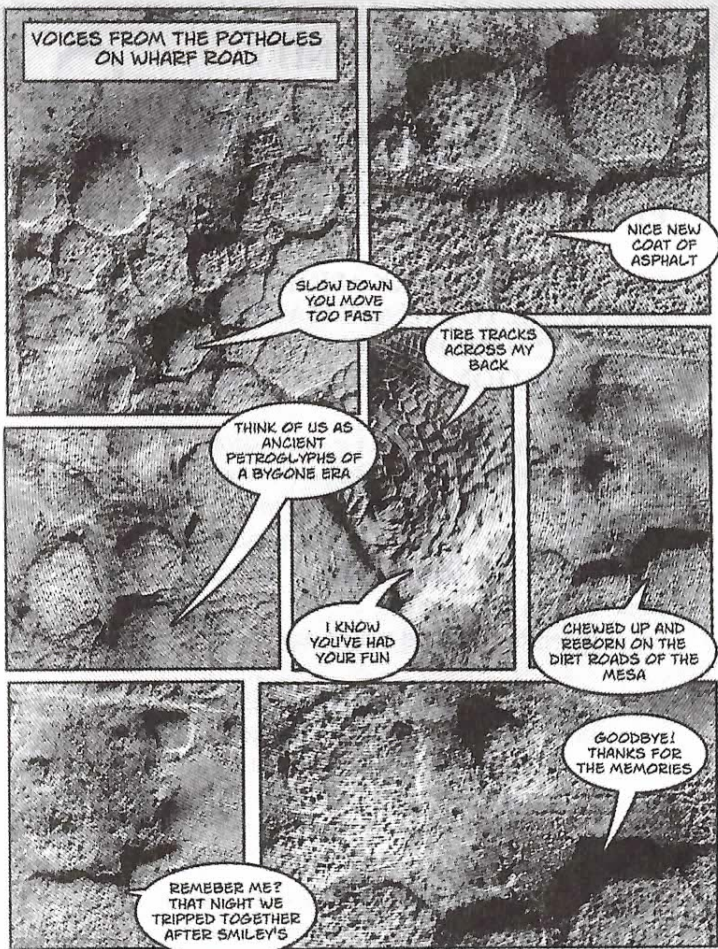

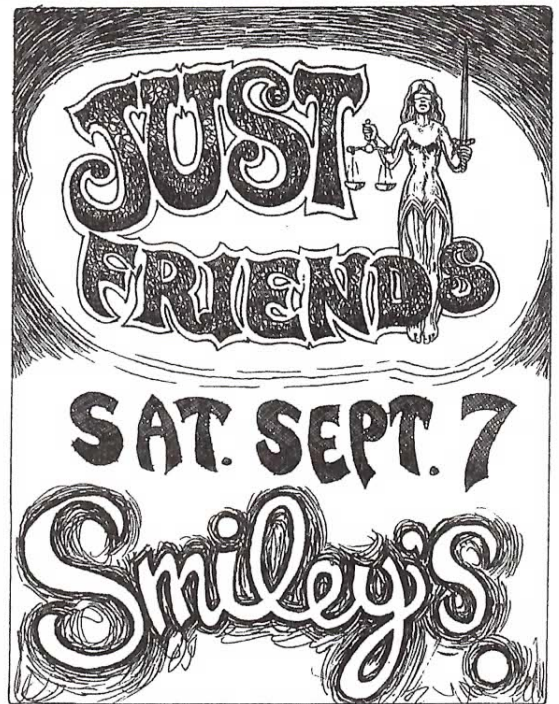

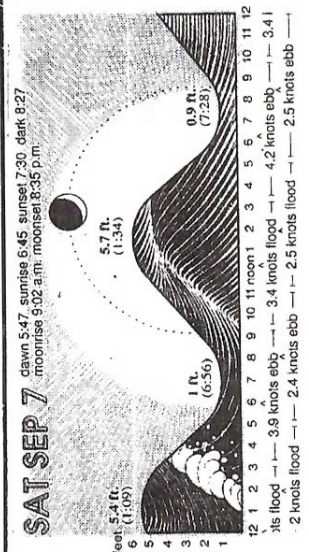

Minutes from the July 22, 2013 Bolinas
Fire Protection District Board Meeting

Pres. Buchanan called the regular meeting of the Bolinas Fire Protection District to order at 7:30PM. Vice Pres. Smith, Dir. Kimball, Dir. Chiera and Dir. Bass were present. Also present: Chief Brown and Secretary Brown.

MSC, Chiera/Smith (unan) to approve the agenda.

CHIEF'S REPORT

NERA

Chief Brown reported that Tiburon Fire Chief Pearce, President of the MERA Board, requested comments and concerns from fire departments regarding the MERA Next Generation system. A response is yet to be received. She was contacted by Alex Anderson, a contractor hired by MERA, regarding a presentation to governing Boards regarding the Next Generation System. A presentation will most likely be made at the next August Board meeting.

Prevention

Chief Brown reported that she has been making twenty five minute fire safety presentations to groups of Bolinas-Stinson Summer campers before exploration of engines in the Engine Bay. Some have retained a remarkable amount of information from presentations from past years.

Chief Brown discussed the upcoming process for adopting the 2013 California Fire Code. She is researching the process for adopting the Wildland Urban Interface codes as well. WUI codes address removing flammable vegetation from around a structure and constructing buildings with fire resistant materials.

Training

Asst. Chief Marcotte and Chief Brown are preparing a large scale Multi Casualty Incident training. He hopes to involve twenty "patients" and multiple agencies including Stinson Beach Fire, National Park Service, and Marin County Fire. Audubon will be used as a venue for the

drill. The training will focus on the triage, treatment and transport of multiple patients.

Asst. Chief Marcotte provided a CPR class for the National Park Service Fire Crew. Chief Brown taught CPR to Bolinas-Stinson Summer camp Counselors.

Disaster Council

Chief Brown reported that she and Beth Carusillo continue to encourage Area Coordinators to identify Neighborhood Liaisons for each area of Bolinas. They have identified new Area Coordinators to fill in gaps in the downtown area and at Gospel Flats. New bright orange backpacks and other equipment have been ordered for the Area Coordinators. Beth has taken over the monthly radio tests and continues to do a great job. The Disaster Council recently received a \$2,000 donation from the rental of the Buell's Peace Barn. The Buell's previously allocated the donation to the Bolinas Firehouse/Clinic project. Chief Brown

greatly appreciates their continued generosity.

Building and Grounds

Paving, painting and sealing the parking lot shared by the Clinic and Fire station was discussed.

General Operations

Chief Brown announced that preparation for the annual audit has begun. The audit field work with Jane Totten is scheduled for September 24th.

Surfers' Overlook Repair/Terrace Avenue

Dir. Kimball said that a final report from SAGE regarding their geotechnical investigation completed on April 16th and 17th will be submitted shortly to the "Working Group" consisting of members from the County, BCPUD and BFPD. The next steps regarding permitting from the Coastal Commission and funding will be discussed at the next Working Group meeting.

Meanwhile, Dir. Kimball reported that he, Asst. Fire Chief Ralph Camiccia and Don Smith of the BCPUD met with residents near Surfers Overlook. The next steps including funding and permitting for the repair were discussed. There was a consensus to work with the County. Pres. Buchanan asked about spearheading a capital campaign to raise the five million dollars needed for the repair. Dir. Kimball answered that the serious feasibility of a repair needs to be more thoroughly evaluated by the Coastal Commission before any capital campaign is started. Pres. Buchanan thanked Dir. Kimball for all of his time and effort spent on the project.

Chief Brown remarked that June was a busy month with lots of fire calls, sometimes three times per night.

GENERAL BUSINESS

Action Item #1: Approve Final Budget for FY13/14

Dir. Chiera asked why the income is anticipated to increase by \$2,000. Chief Brown answered that rental income is

expected to increase as outlined in each cell tower lease. She went on to review changes in the budget including an addition of \$10,000 for Prevention Services, a 3% Cost of Living raise for each employee and the annual increase of CalPERS and health insurance expenses. Dir. Kimball remarked that he was pleased with the increased annual contribution to the Vehicle Replacement Fund which will be almost double than what was expected. Chief Brown noted that the engine scheduled for replacement is E265, a Type 3 engine, in the next two years.

MSC, Kimball/Chiera (unan) to approve the Final Budget for FY13/14.

Action Item #2: Approve Request from Department of Parks and Recreation to renew Communications Vault Lease for five years beginning July 1, 2014
Chief Brown recommended the approval of the lease. The lease was initiated in 1990 for a small antenna that communicates with the Farallones Islands and is used minimally. The lease renewal is every five years and includes a 4% annual rent increase.

MSC, Kimball/Smith (unan) to approve request from Department of Parks and Recreation to renew Communications Vault Lease for five years beginning July 1, 2014.

CONSENT CALENDAR

MSC, Bass/Chiera (unan) to approve the Consent Calendar including the Minutes from the June 24, 2013 regular meeting and the account balances. (The financial reports for May and June 2013 were not yet received from the County of Marin.) Sec. Brown will include the warrant lists and financial reports through July 31 at the August Board meeting.

PUBLIC EXPRESSION

None.

COMMITTEE REPORTS

None.

BOARD MEMBER REPORT

None.

PERSONNEL MATTERS

Dir. Chiera asked if a Personnel Handbook has been completed. Chief Brown answered that it is not yet complete. Dir. Chiera offered to work on it as he has experience to offer with such projects.

Dir. Kimball at this point in the meeting added a side note that the Fire Department should continue to play a prominent role in the Surfer's Overlook repair project as it addresses important access and egress issues for the entire Mesa area. He also noted that the bulk of the geologic study completed by SAGE has an eternal shelf life and would significantly increase the response time for a rapid repair if needed. He is committed to the project as it ultimately would result in maintaining an additional emergency route to and from the Mesa area.

ANNOUNCEMENT

None.

GOOD OF THE ORDER

Chief Brown commended the Volunteers for jobs well done on July 4th. There were

six calls total with four deputies on duty during the evening hours. It was a relatively quiet and orderly holiday this year.

Pres. Buchanan gave "kudos" to Capt. Smith for driving the engine through the parade.

Chief Brown was concerned about children darting in front of the engine during the parade to catch candy being thrown off of the top of the engine. She will have a firefighter walking next to the engine starting next year. Pres. Buchanan suggested throwing the candy off the back of the engine to avoid danger which the Chief thought was an excellent idea.

ADJOURNMENT

MSC, Smith/Bass (unan) to adjourn the meeting at 8:20 PM.

2. *What is your most pessimistic vision of the future?*

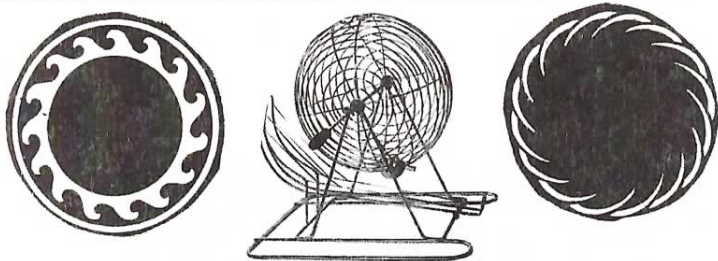
Not being able to feel self empowered and make informed choices. The point of no return.

Bolinas-Stinson Union School District: A New Look for the Front Yard

District residents passing the school office building on the Bolinas campus may have noticed a rather dramatic change; there is very little of the original vegetation left. After years of struggling with gophers, moles, diseased plants and the ever-problematic issue of watering, we have decided that it is time to re-landscape the entrance to our school. While the beloved "Granny Bourne Garden" (especially the roses) is largely gone, it will be replaced with a newly designed native plant garden that is representative of our local flora. Installation of the new garden will include participation from our students, staff, parents and community members. In addition to making the entrance to the school more attractive, this project will provide us with a new teaching tool and a model for our school and community. The District has saved some of the old rose bushes and other plants that have graced the garden for the past years. It is our hope to finish this project before the rains begin in late fall and early winter.

2. *What is your most pessimistic vision of the future?*

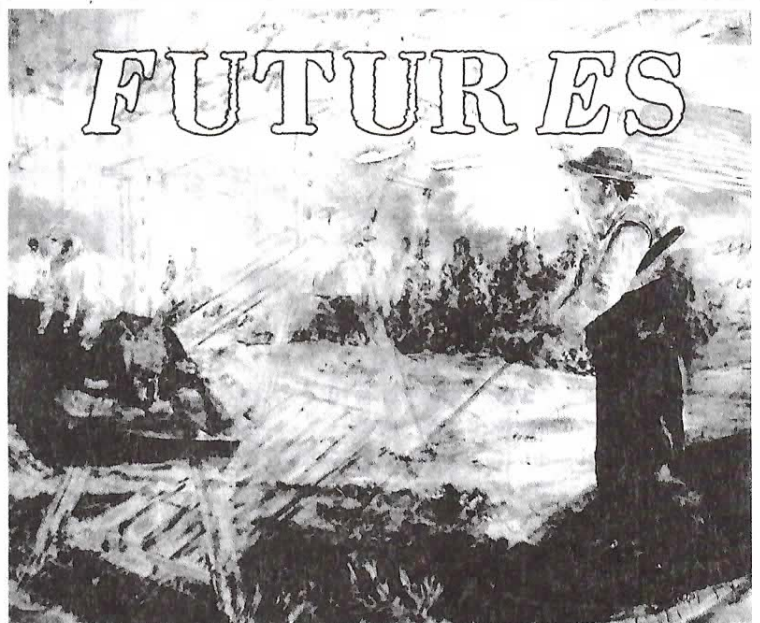
