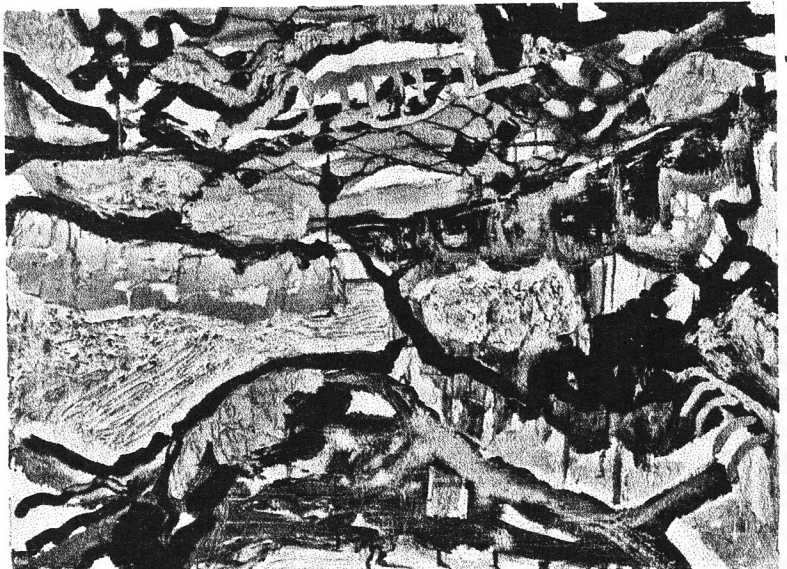

These portraits bridge the divide between the traditional pressed seaweed specimens used by naturalists and scientists and a contemporary art format providing a nexus where art and the natural world converge.

TIM BURNS: LAND OF A THOUSAND BIRDS

Bolinas photographer Tim Burns finds inspiration in the beauty of his ever-changing natural surroundings resulting in a diverse body of work ranging from the pictorial to the abstract. Living perched above Duxbury Reef, with sweeping views of the ocean, Burns is continually drawn to record the magic he witnesses. This exhibition features images of fleeting light through fog and cloud resulting in quiet abstractions of sea, sky and land. While taken with a digital camera, these images are mainly unaltered from their original state.

Most people in Bolinas know Sadja through one of her many interest, as a retired physician and professor, a musician in the group *Midnight on the Water*, a mediator for West Marin, a writer of articles about the latest information on health issues, a stimulating friend and a lifetime activist for women's rights and health. She is also the author of several books. Her new novel *Changing the Rules- A young woman's journey to find her calling* has just been published and will be the focus of conversation on Elia Haworth's radio show *Original Minds*.

Sadja's novel, written mostly in fast moving dialogue, begins in the 1950s. Through her main character Claire, Sadja explores a woman's growing self-awareness, sexuality, the complexity of relationships, abortion, and the slow evolution of our cultural respect for women's self determination.

Like Sadja, Claire summons the strength to succeed in the male-dominated world of medicine and work for women's reproductive rights. Sadja's insightful writing stems from decades of providing education and services for women and families through Planned Parenthood here and abroad. She was also a clinical professor at the University of California Medical School in San Francisco where she taught courses on human sexuality to medical students. Elia Haworth

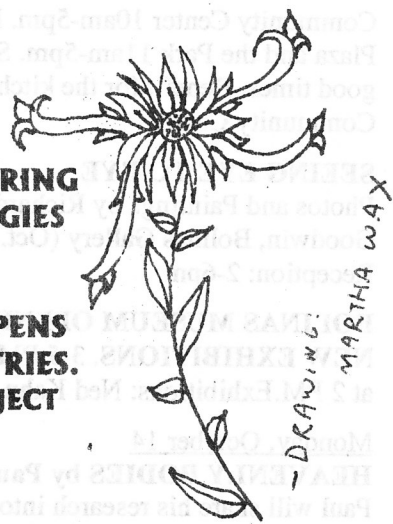

Me and Adam were working at the Peoples Store. We were talking about what it's like to be the oldest child. This is a story about my Mom:

My Mother's Gun by Jessica Ruby Radcliffe

I personally have only shot a gun once, while living in a 1952 Alma travel trailer next to my friend Sally's house out in the country. Jimmy K liked Sally so much, he shot out the street light just for her. She hadn't asked him to do it, but he wanted to please her. The street light ruined the dark of night, stars and moonlight at her beautiful tumbledown cabin. She came home one evening and it was done, and of course we immediately realized his feelings for her must be serious. He hung around her house as much as he could, and one afternoon we had target practice out back, tin cans on the old fence and BLAM! That was fun.

This was different. One morning my mother called to tell me she was working for my ex boyfriend, the dope dealer with a heart of gold. She was a stash house. Someone had tried to break in through her kitchen door. She was scared, and decided she was going to have to buy a gun. Growing up in East Texas during the Depression, her father taught her how to drive and shoot at the age of 13, just like that song- she had to drive the car when he's too drunk to. Mom hadn't actually had anything to do with guns or shooting since then, so she asked me to accompany her to the gun store, for moral support. I felt slightly guilty, being the link between her wanting a gun and my dangerous ex, so even though shopping for a pistol sounded like a horrible way to spend the day together, I agreed to go.

We parked in the hot weedy lot and entered a small cement block building at the back of a strip mall. Glass cases were full of guns and more guns. It was all very foreign and overwhelming to me, but my unshakeable

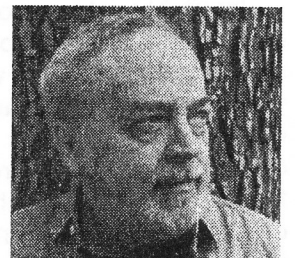

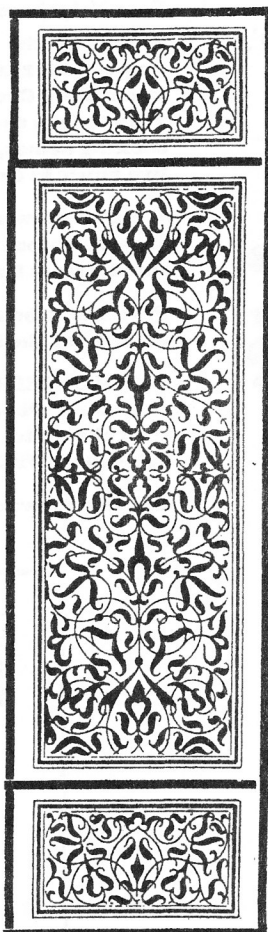

mother knew just what she wanted, and the nice middle aged white gun shop man helped her. They talked about how she should go practice at the shooting range. She paid for her gun and ammo in cash, ill gotten no doubt, and we left. It was easy.

A few days later Mom called to tell me she'd been to the shooting range for target practice and she was still a pretty good shot. She said she'd been able to hit the man shape inside the big bulls eye in some very important places. The next time I went to her house, she had the shot up target from the range taped to her kitchen door window, facing out. Nobody ever bothered her again.

Once she was coming to pick me up at the airport, back when you could still go through security and meet someone at their arrival gate. Mom got there early, wearing her purple overalls and sandals and heavy Mexican gold hoop earrings, carrying a big brown leather purse. In the purse, only three things- keys, gun and a five dollar bill.

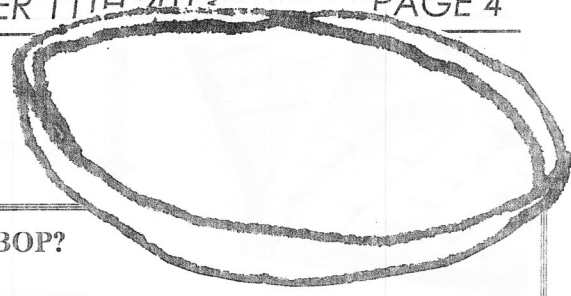

It Takes a Village Treasure Hunt

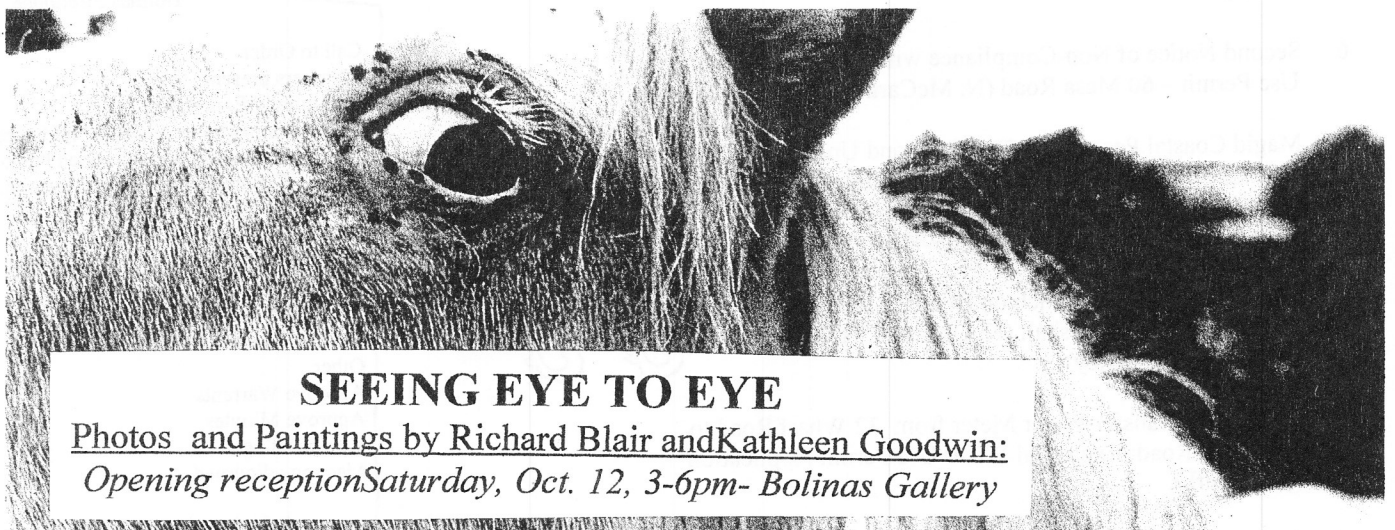
Ever since my daughter was little, I've always had a birthday party for her with about 25 relatives and some kind of a Treasure Hunt. Generally the hunt is based on a Pirate theme around the house, but once with a Hunger Games theme, where the goal was surviving as a team and thriving rather than killing and surviving as an individual. It took them beyond the house to neighboring houses and places, like the cemetery and bus stop.

This year since Heidi was turning 13, I decided to expand the adventure, and send the 9 cousins ages 3 to 17 to town and let them explore by themselves, but in a safe way. The theme I decided was, "It takes a village (to raise a child)." I wanted the kids to go from one end of town to the other and to have meaningful and positive experiences along the way while getting to know some of what and who is here. (I know I missed important places, and I apologize. Maybe I have more to learn myself. Or, maybe I will send them there next year.) I pre-arranged notes and goodies along the way. This is the route they took:

- 1) Uniquities near St. Aidan's: I bought them great old fashioned postcards and left them there with a note. Breeze actually volunteered to open the shop a half hour early to accommodate the kids. And, her boss agreed. (Yay Village!)
- 2) Post Office box (since it was Sunday) for the next note and to see a real Post Office if they have never seen one. (I had left our key at Uniquities for them.)
- 3) Michael's Bookstore. I had them each bring a book to exchange for another. The littlest got Bedtime Stories for Girls and the older ones got Harry Potter, National Geographic, etc.
- 4) The Liquor Store (where my Dad used to take us in the '70's on Sunday mornings to get a newspaper and licorice). No. Not for alcohol! I had bought a bag of licorice which David gave to the kids when they came in.
- 5) The Hardware Store. Karen actually gave them a squirt gun she had used on the 4th of July and some drawing books. I had bought coin purses and bubbles, and clay which she handed to them along with a fresh batch of FREE popcorn each in an individual bag.
- 6) Bobolicious. I had bought gift certificates for two Smoothies (Strawberry and Mango) and had dropped off nine small cups for them to use so they could share. Julie and crew were so welcoming.
- 7) Free Box. They were advised to find some treasure there.
- 8) The People's Store. I bought 9 Bolinas \$3 gold coins (some came from the Bolinas General Store) and put some shiny glass stones I had found in the Free Box in a bag along with the gold coins for them there. Diana advised me to write a note, and she would alert whoever was on shift. They could: a) Spend the coin at the Co-Op, b) Spend it at the General Store, c) Save it, or d) Other. (I tend to entertain myself, too while creating these adventures).
- 9) Next stop, the new park. To use the bathroom. Drink water. And, do the labyrinth. (I assume all of you have done this. If not, you must do it!)
- 10) The altar next to the Store to write a wish. (I regret not remembering till too late to go read all their wishes).
- 11) The Women's Collective. I had bought some cool, colored pencils made of sticks. Tania was not there, but she hung the bag with a note on the door for them.
- 12) Bolinas Museum. To look at the art and to sign the book.
- 13) The Courtyard to sit on the bench and listen to the fountain and watch the birds by Keith's shop. (You all must do this!)
- 14) Buzz' Bolinas Surf Shop. I bought them each a bandana. Buzz clarified that the kids would come in and say, "Heidi's Birthday Treasure Hunt." He didn't want them running around and messing up his store. No worries!
- 15) The final stop was the Wharf. The tired kids then called a mom to come pick them up. (The only tears were when my five year old niece dropped her gold coin through the cracks of the wharf. Every one of the older kids offered her theirs to replace it. Kids are able to give to others when people have given to them.)

Thus ended the "It Takes a Village Treasure Hunt."

Moving awkwardly out of the crowded airplane and into the arrival area with a lot of hand luggage, I looked for her but she wasn't there. A nervous looking young black porter approached and asked if I was Jessica. Yes I was, and, "where's my mom?" It turned out that she couldn't enter the arrivals area with a gun, so she did the logical thing - she offered to tip the porter five dollars to hold it for her while she met me at the gate. He refused and suggested she tip him five dollars to meet me himself.

Visiting my Mom, the gun was always turning up where it was least expected. Sitting on the couch for forty five minutes watching tv... what's this lump under the cushion? Oh, it's the gun. My kids would be hanging out on her high, old fashioned four poster bed on the heavy white bedspread, petting one of several cats, and, what's this under the pillow? Mom, it's the gun!

When my amazing mother died, my mother who loved to sing, who would be forever nine years old and only wanted enough to eat and to have her own pony and for her dad to leave her alone when he was drinking; my mother who was a Grey Panther and a force to be reckoned with; my mother who became a radical socialist and got the wrongfully imprisoned out of jail, who would give you one if she had two... died at 64, in poverty, as idealists often do. She had a heart attack, driving alone in her unheated car on a cold ride to the city at Christmas time. She hung on until Dec 28th. All four of her living children and our partners met at her little house. My sister had our mother's ashes in a small cardboard box from the funeral home.

Mom's friends had given us permission to hold a little ceremony and bury the box anywhere we wanted on their land. We were greeted by two elderly very bohemian ladies who said how much they had loved her. It was January and bitter cold outside but the boys managed to dig a hole under a stand of trees near the road. I sang one of her songs, "Believe Me If All Those Endearing Young Charms", and we buried the box, hugged each other, and drove back to our mother's little rented house which had to be cleared out immediately.

There were tears, and everyone seemed so young and lost, and I am the oldest, and my sister is the most organized, and my brothers were so sad and I remembered them in their high chairs a long time ago, eating peaches from the garden. One brother said, "I don't want this stuff, I want my Mom!", and I told him we couldn't have our Mom but he had to have some stuff and he had to choose it now. The other brother, who'd been searching through her clothes, held up the gun. Our mother's gun. We all told him he couldn't have it and besides we didn't have the papers for it. He took it. He wanted it. He probably got it re registered.
