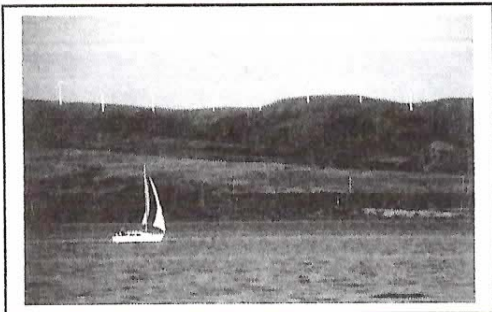

10 Story Industrial-Scale Wind Turbines on the Ridges East of Highway One?

Here's an updated announcement of the film **WINDFALL** this Friday night, January 20, 2012 at the Dance Palace in Point Reyes, 6:30 pm (doors open at 6 pm.)

The film showing is sponsored by EAC, Environmental Action Committee and West Marin/Sonoma Coastal Advocates.

Delicious soup and other refreshments provided. No charge!

Disclaimer: We have not been able to preview the film because of the distributor's rules, but this is **NOT** the same film that was shown in Fairfax a few months ago (which we also hadn't previewed.) This film, Windfall, has won an award from the NYC documentary festival.

Precedent-Setting Decision in the Making We need to know as much as possible about this issue since very soon the Marin Planning Commission will decide on a policy for WECS - Wind Energy Conversion Systems (i.e. wind turbines) - in West Marin's coastal zone. How large can WECS be and where they can be in the coastal zone is what's being discussed.

Speakers include:

- *Amy Trainer, Executive Director of EAC,
- *Frank Egger, former Fairfax mayor and the first Prop 20 California Coastal Commissioner appointed in 1972 who represented Marin for 9 years
- *Beverly Childs McIntosh, retired public agency environmental planner and member of West Marin/Sonoma Coastal Advocates

WECS range from 40 ft., 100 ft. (ten stories) to 400 ft (40 stories) and higher! **The Coastal Commission is watching what happens here closely and intends to use the policy determined here in Marin for the rest of coastal California**, according to Ruby Pap, North Central Coast District Supervisor for the Coastal Commission.

What are the pros and cons? What are the issues? Why would anyone object to wind power? Isn't it green and desperately needed? But why are some people who live near WECS getting sick and abandoning their homes? Why is there a gag clause in the contracts? Is the reason related to electro-magnetic pollution?

Do we need to use WECS to combat climate change? Are people who bring up concerns skills for

the nuclear and fossil fuel industries? Are there any other human and environmentally friendly local power generation potentials? Do we need to take the lessor of the evils in electricity generation?

Are we approaching renewable energy from the same consciousness as produced the fossil fuel problems in the first place?

Some of these questions are explored in an **award winning film** to be shown Friday night. **WINDFALL**, by Laura Israel looks at both sides of wind energy development when the residents of a rural upstate New York town consider going green.

Speakers will give a Local Coastal Program Update and discuss Marin County's proposed plan to allow 100-foot, ten story tall industrial wind turbines east of Highway One in the Coastal Zone.

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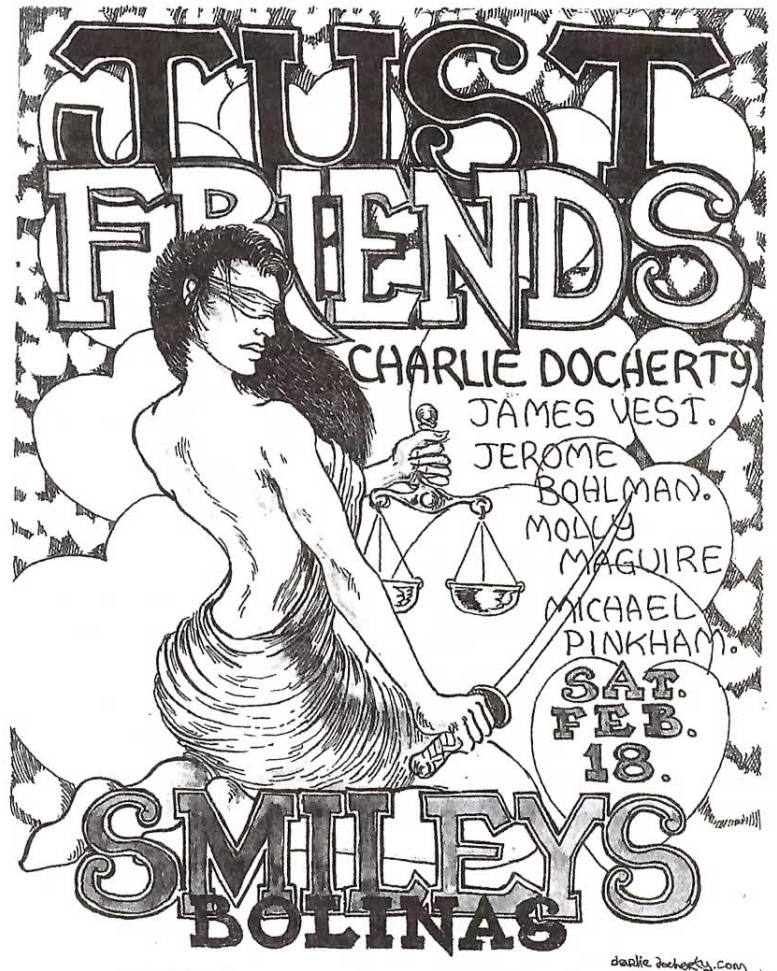

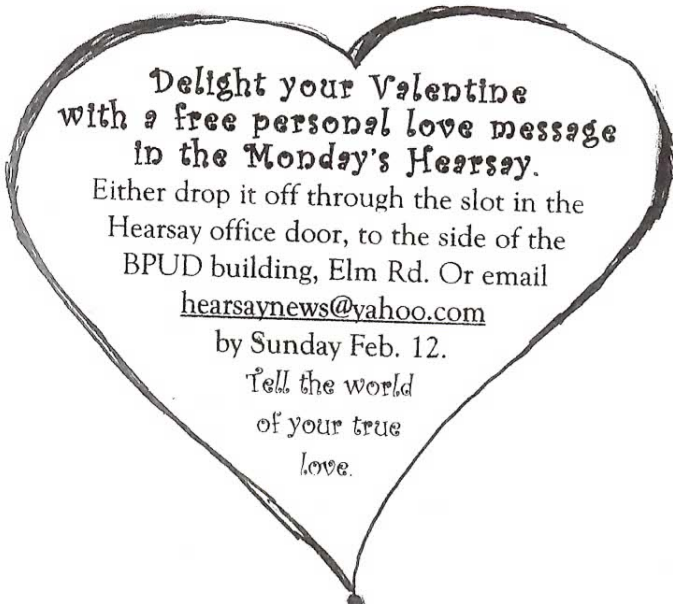

"Yeah, I'm an eco-terrorist!"

A local driver boasted when asked to turn off his loud truck engine. It was parked in the middle of Brighton Avenue, while he was over yakking with his surf buddies in their SUV. Having seen how aggressively this guy drives, I agreed. You'd grow hoarse arguing with every idiot.

Maniacal drivers are why I don't bicycle any more. Instead, as One More Car, I drive even slower when they're tailgating me to prevent being rear ended when braking suddenly. Plus, it really pisses them off. Doing my part as a PACE car (Passive Agressive Combatting Entitlement) to calm traffic, if not drivers.

Aggressive, impaired and distracted drivers have killed magnitudes more Americans than official Terrorists. Even when these drivers kill they are lightly punished, compared to murderers using other methods. The major cause of traffic deaths now are aggressive, speeding drivers, after drunk drivers were whittled down through increased enforcement and fines.

Society still considers speeding acceptable. Traffic Safety engineers don't call them accidents anymore, because most collisions are predictable due to routine driving habits. I drive posted speed limits, even slower when conditions warrant. Like when some impatient driver is flashing their highbeams. I let speeders pass at paved turnouts, unless they honk. Teaching patience one jerk at a time, just selfless that way.

All motor vehicle drivers qualify as eco-terrorists, although even the most terrifying drivers don't rate indefinite detention. We are dependent on vehicles that are inherently toxic and hazardous. Petroleum byproducts are poisonous at every level in the food chain. Diesel trucks and buses are mobile toxic waste distributors. The interior of a motor vehicle is as polluted as the roadside. Noxious machine fluids leak into soil and creeks. Even motor vehicles' final shredding spews carcinogens into nearby soil, groundwater and waterways.

Higher speeds multiply tire and brake erosion and the distance contaminated road dust is spread. The noise of engines, tires and wind resistance grow louder with velocity. Add obesity and social isolation to crashes and pollution to tally the major medical costs from motor vehicle traffic.

For all that, it's a fast womb with a view. How can we ever give this up? Especially when the alternatives are so bleak. We like to think of ourselves as fiercely independent in west Marin. The truth is we're utterly dependent on the roads we take for granted and share with a society of other users. Closures, even temporary, threaten economic viability. Fuel price spikes crumble the fragile balance dependent on most workers driving in while residents drive out to work and shop.

The aggressive habits of some drivers who regularly use these roads is fiercely anti-social to other road users, if not terrorism by definition.

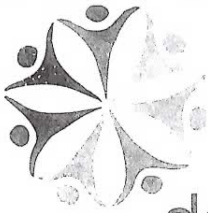
The most careless drivers on west Marin roads tend to be locals, construction truckers and surfers. They routinely speed, tailgate, cross double yellow lines in blind curves, and drive in oncoming lanes when turning left to avoid slowing down.

They don't consider these behaviors dangerous, even though their habits are constant threats to other motorists, cyclists, pedestrians and animals sharing these roads. Others are frequently endangered by these drivers, sometimes injured. yet they consider those who drive the speed limit the problem for slowing them down. We live in an incredibly scenic area, yet the only view they focus on is asphalt or the bumper of the slowpoke in their way.
