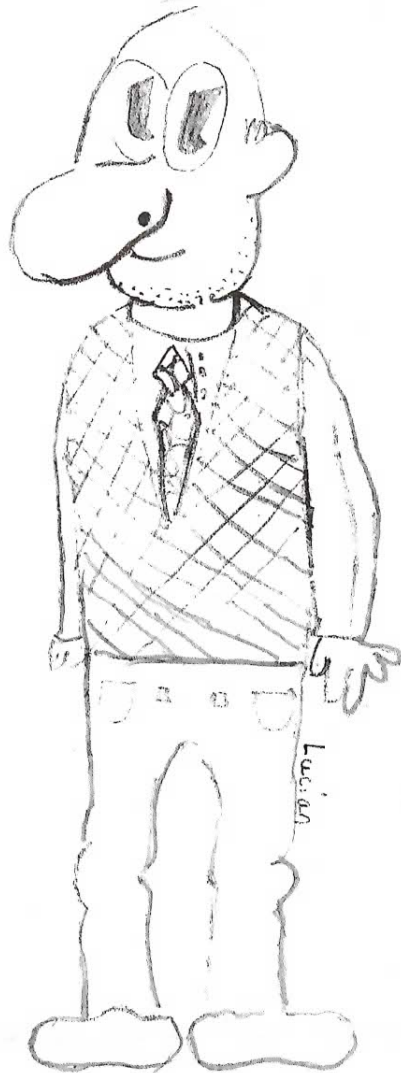

UPDATE FROM THE BCPUD ON RAINFALL AND THE STATUS OF OUR WATER SUPPLY

As we all enjoy the fabulous February weather, many in our community undoubtedly are wondering: How is our water supply? Are we going to face mandatory rationing again this year? What if it doesn't rain this Spring? Here is what we can tell you as of late February 2012:

Our water supply is in relatively good shape, thanks to healthy rainfall last year that continued well into late Spring. The Arroyo Hondo creek (our primary water source) continues to flow well and both of our emergency reservoirs are completely full. Thus, we are in much better shape than we were in 2009 when we were facing a dry winter after a very light year of rainfall the previous year. In February 2009 when we imposed mandatory rationing, the creek flows were poor, one of our reservoirs was completely empty, and the other was seriously depleted. Thankfully, the rains came that Spring and we were able to lift the mandatory rationing.

Another reason why our water supply is in relatively good shape is because of YOU, our community members. The overall water consumption in our district since we imposed mandatory rationing in 2009 has dropped by more than 20% due to the conservation habits all of you have demonstrated. Many people tell us that they purchased new water-efficient appliances, replaced leaky toilets, and altered their landscape watering practices when the rationing was imposed and all of your efforts have made a huge difference. THANK-YOU!!!

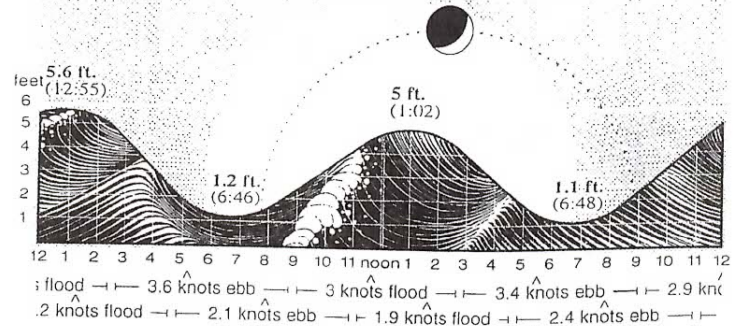
At this point in time, we do not believe it will be necessary to impose mandatory rationing this year. As noted above, our water supply is in relatively good shape. However, we urge you all to continue your wonderful conservation efforts to help ensure that we continue to manage our water supply responsibly.

Finally, if it does not rain this Spring, we will be heading into the next rainy season (which begins unofficially on Halloween night as that always seems to be the first rain of the season in Bolinas) in challenging circumstances as we very likely will have drawn down our reservoirs considerably over the summer. As always, we will communicate with the community as much as we can and continue to keep you updated.

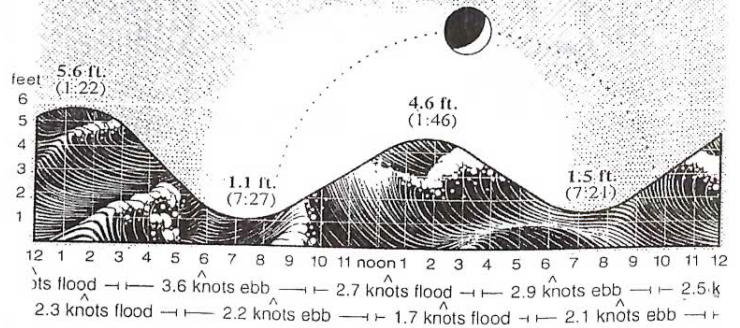

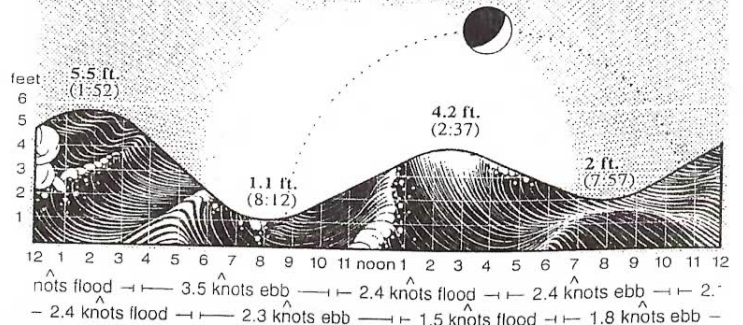

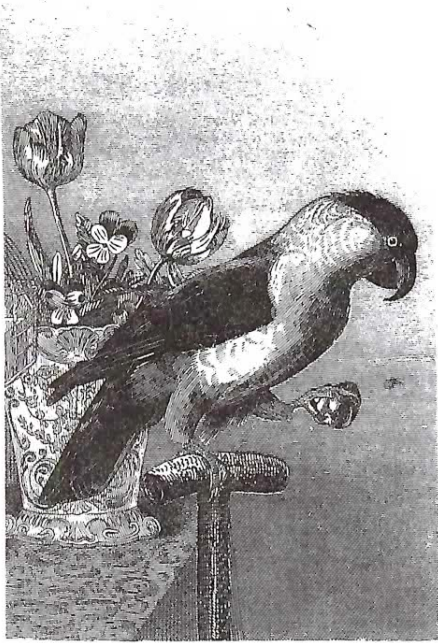

BLACKER THE BLACK-CAPPED LORY

We're sad to report that Blacker, the beautiful Black Capped Lory who delighted hundreds of visitors at Bolinas Bay Hardware, died in her sleep today. Blacker was a wonderful creature and beloved by friends from all over the world.

Blacker's doctor, a bird specialist, pronounced "him" a "her" several months ago but also gave her new owners the news that she was an elderly bird, probably 20 plus years of age.

Since the lifespan of her species is typically 15 years, Blacker led a long and very happy life, chirping her amazing repertoire of truck-backing-up beeps, cell-phone rings, and whistles. She loved her special Lory food, her many friends, and chomping on fresh fruit, which was fed to her by hand on a daily basis.

She enjoyed strutting around her cage, and it often seemed as though she was dancing for joy. Her amazing tongue resembled a brush and she liked poking it out as far as she could, perhaps sizing up the mettle of her visitors.

Blacker's species originates in New Zealand, although we do not know for certain how she came to Bolinas. She had magnificent markings, with bright red coloring her throat, cheeks and the feathers which surrounded her wings, which were metallic green with black tips. The nape of her neck and breast were purplish blue and the only time she showed her wild side, a.k.a., her yellow feathers, was when she flapped her wings while bathing.

Rest in Peace, Friend Blacker. Fly high with your bird friends to the clouds above. You will be missed

Not a fun experience, I can tell you). After the first round of bee stings and crying children, one of them having to go to the emergency room, the parents decided to high-tail it out of there. We ended up at a friend's desert home in the very interesting community of 29 Palms. I'm an eco-terrorist! pt.2

Motor vehicle drivers are unlikely to be blackbaggged and shipped off to Guantanamo, even though our toxic and hazardous vehicles have done far more damage than al-Quaida. There's widespread acceptance of even the most terrorizing drivers. Killer drivers are coddled, while vehicle makers are not held accountable for the damages their products cause. Trucks and buses are still toxic waste distributors, decades after exhaust emissions from cars were legislatively reduced by 99%.

The interior of a motor vehicle is almost as polluted as the roadside. Rates of heart attacks, strokes, dementia, asthma, and autism correlate with exposure to "free"way fumes. Vehicle noise raises blood pressure and sleep disturbance rates.

Carcinogens and lung irritants in school buses equal those in a home with a stove burning wood. Even tightly sealed homes near highways and/or wood burning stoves let in 70% of the most deadly, fine particles.

No Burn Days didn't stop epidemics of semis with double trailers "fixing" Highway One along the Bolinas lagoon and "repairing" Terrace Avenue.

It's illegal for tobacco smokers to puff near a window, while truck drivers can idle beside a playground. No ban on heavily smoking "garbage" and delivery trucks, chain saws, chippers, motorevcles, generators and barbecues, either.

Their manufacturers oppose "job killing" regulations limiting their exhaust killing people.

Rocket wood stoves that burn with minimal smoke, while heating spaces more effectively are available, and diesel and small engines that burn less fuel with cleaner exhaust can be built. Citizens haven't demanded that these sources of pollution, noise and injurious products pay for their damages, so there's no incentive for manufactures to reduce externalized costs. Their lobbying keeps things that way.

We're selective about our "public safety" priorities.

We have a "transportation" system that heavily subsidizes motor vehicles, pauperizes alternative transport, and grants motorists exclusive right to interstate highways, the Royal Roads.

We're comforted by the noise of engines and feel better, alone in a womb with a view. It's a hazardous luxury we've seized from human history, available during a short window of geologic history. Or until we're gouged to death by oil companies.

Gas prices are like the weather, everyone loves to talk about it, but few do anything to change it. Driving at posted speed limits uses 20% less fuel than the habits of most drivers. That's more than filling the tires and tuning the engine combined. It also saves on maintenance.

Since gas prices are allegedly based on supply and demand, if everyone drove like little old ladies, (not from Pasadena), fuel prices would decrease by that much. PACE (Positively Affecting Consumer Expense) Cars driving the speed limit act as a cost saving strategy for everyone.

PACE cars calm traffic, even though some drivers don't find it particularly calming. They could be happily saving cash, reducing risk, practicing patience, breathing and scenery awareness. Unsafe passing and risky choices of some drivers behind PACE cars can't realistically be blamed on law abiding vehicles, although blaming others for their explosive anger is probably a pattern.

This cost saving fundamental is not widely taught, which is why they call economics the dismal science. Training the masses to suck the myriad teats of Big Oil. Drivers complain about burning cash, while leading with their lead foot. Even lemmings slow down when they near the cliff.

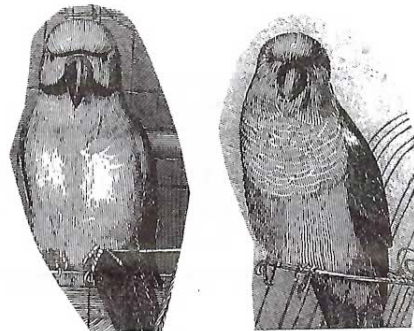
Green Chili Dipping Sauce

This is a sour, sweet, tangy dipping sauce for spring rolls, sushi, samosas, etc. It tastes a lot like the green dipping sauce you get with appetizers at Avatar's in Sausalito. It is especially great with seafood. The sauce can be kept in the refrigerator for 3 to 4 months. Stir before using.

- 1/2 bunch fresh coriander (also called cilantro)
3 - 4 jalapeno or serrano chili peppers, stems removed
1/4 cup chopped garlic
1/4 cup sugar
1 1/2 teaspoons salt
1 cup white vinegar

Blend until all ingredients are completely liquefied. Makes about 2 cups.






