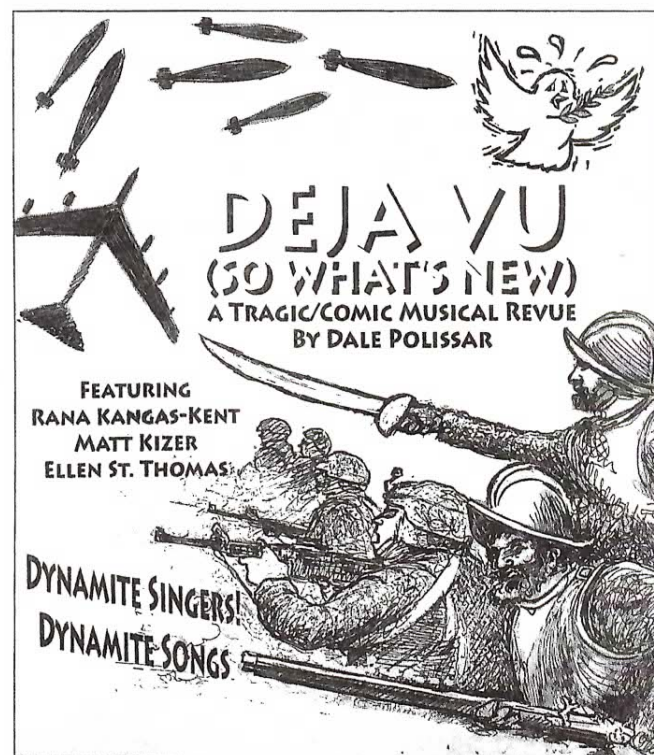

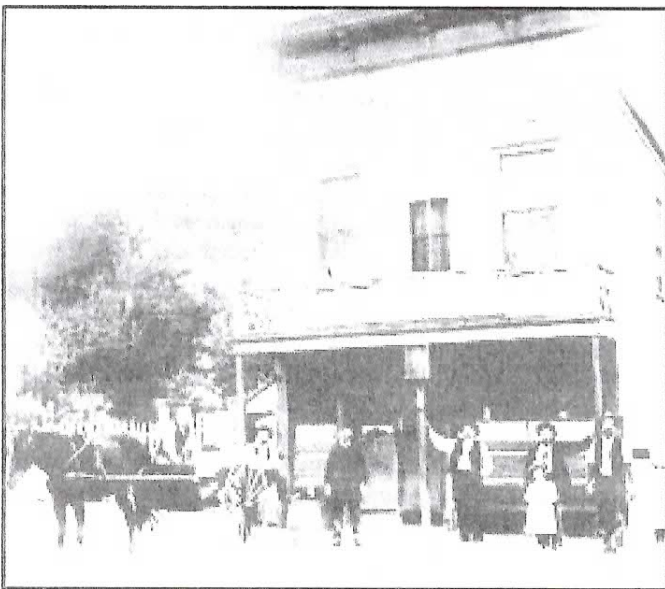

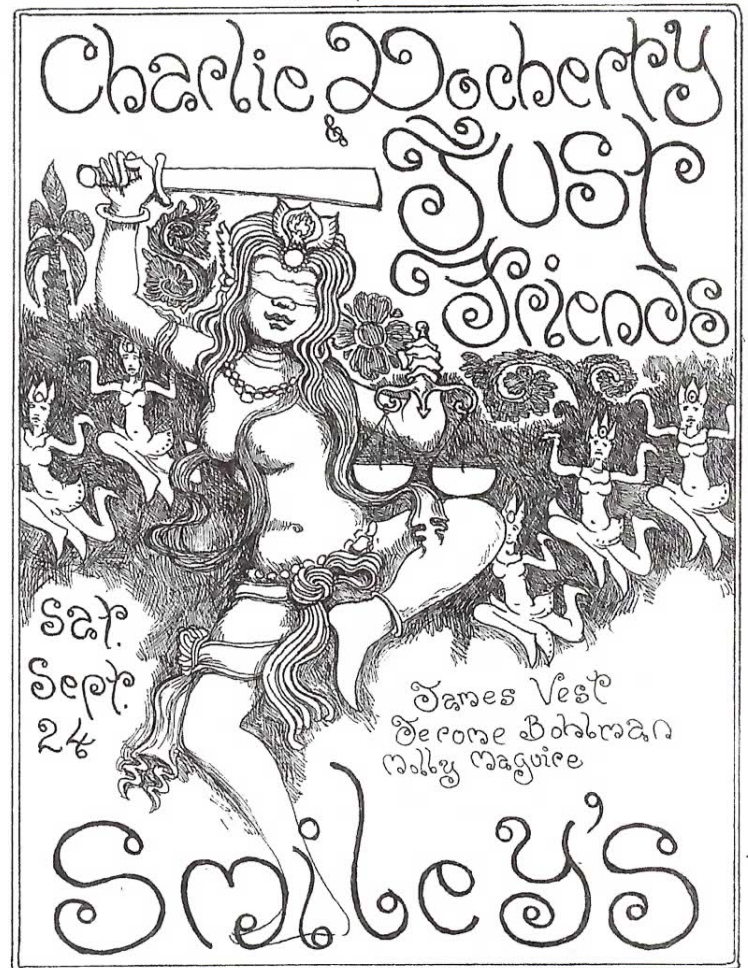

AT&T Celltower Update

Last year, AT&T applied to our Fire District and the County to add a second trio of antennas to their tower behind the firehouse to accommodate a new signal. Community concern about the resulting increase in electromagnetic field (EMF) exposure in public areas around the tower motivated the Fire District, its Board – especially David Kimball, and myself to work hard this year to mitigate the situation, by investigating both the technical context and the legal possibility of modifying AT&T’s 25-year lease with the Fire District which was signed late in the last millennium. There will be a presentation on the results of all this work at the September 26th Fire Board meeting, so please come then to hear more and give your feedback. Meanwhile, here’s a summary of our progress on the technical front.

AT&T’s consultant, EBI, submitted a report this February presenting measured EMF power levels on the ground from all sources around their tower, and calculations of how these levels would change with addition of the new signal. The report was very confusing and essentially not useful to us, and after months of discussions with EBI, we gave up on getting clarity and also concluded that their methodology and predictive computer model were not well suited to our situation anyway. So I redid the calculations and discovered thereby that the new antennas will be much more efficient at beaming power toward the horizon with less spilling onto nearby ground, and also that all of the antennas’ beams can be tilted down toward the ground much less than at present without compromising cellphone reception. AT&T willingly gave me access to their engineers to discuss this. They concurred with my findings and have agreed to move the biggest of their four signals from the old to the new antennas and also to reduce the down-tilts of all six beams substantially. The result will be a 20% reduction in AT&T’s maximum power density anywhere around the tower compared to its present level, and an 80% reduction in power density in the skatepark and playground, even with the fourth signal added.

I am very pleased with this development; but there is still more work to do, because:

- * Wireless technology is growing rapidly, so subsequent requests for additional tower power seem inevitable.
- * We still need to – and will – study the exposure from Verizon’s new antennas just installed on the other tower just behind the Firehouse under their permit approved last year.
- * People’s primary exposure to EMF is more likely to be coming from their own wireless devices, and I am planning a local survey to quantify that situation. Stay tuned.

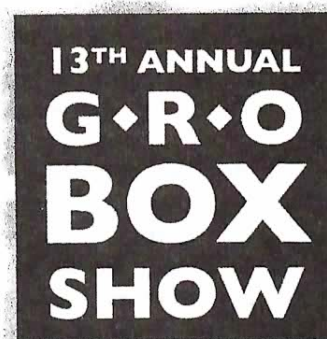

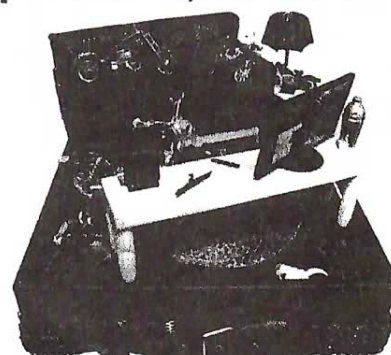

TO ALL DECISION MAKERS OF THE NEW BOLINAS DOWNTOWN PARK

Re: Impact of Your Current Plans and My Request

I live in Bolinas full time; I made my home in this town over 30 years ago and over those years have been deeply involved and have contributed to this community, participated in many activities and, as long term owner of another house I rent, provided long-term, stable housing for our local community members.

Since the beginning I wished to be involved in the design process of the Downtown Park, but was not admitted. I feel now my needs deserve to be heard and taken into account, treated with respect and consideration. Of all the people living on the Little Mesa, me and my house are the most severely impacted by the development, construction and uses of this Park, as my property lays right behind it, across Altura Av. and is looking straight into it.

Your current plans to cut the Eucalyptus trees right out my back door have enormous and far-reaching impacts for me. I ask you to consider the impacts of your current plans, my requests, and make your decisions accordingly.

IMPACTS:

Visual & Sound

The tree barrier provides the only visual and sound protection from the activities of downtown: the street, bar, Community Center and new Park.

Wind

The tree barrier provides much needed protection from intense winds.

My House Design, Character and Value

My house has been designed and built in function of its proximity to these eucalyptuses, with back walls full of windows to allow the majestic presence of the Eucalyptus trees to grace it. Their loss would greatly impact and diminish its character and value.

Microclimatic Changes

The vast foliage absorbs and evaporates big quantities of water, significantly reducing run off; purifies the air and reduces CO2 emissions. Removal or severe cutting of the trees would impact the microclimate of my home.

Undermining Stability of trees on my property

Removal or severe cutting of the trees would reduce the stability of the steep hill and road, and would leave the eucalyptuses on my property standing alone, therefore much more vulnerable to the impact of the winds, undermining their stability.

Economic Losses

All these losses would greatly compromise the experience and desirability of my house; causing significant loss of its market value and making it much harder to sell in an already difficult market.

MY REQUEST

I ask that you do not remove any more of the remaining eucalyptuses and consider pollarding the very tall ones to the necessary minimum--no more than 50% of current height. Any farther reduction of the tree barrier currently standing between my home and downtown would have huge damaging impacts on my life and property.

The impact of the loss of boundary between my home and downtown would be devastating to me, both emotionally and financially, and would cause me to sell my properties and leave this community as soon as possible.

Thank you for your consideration.

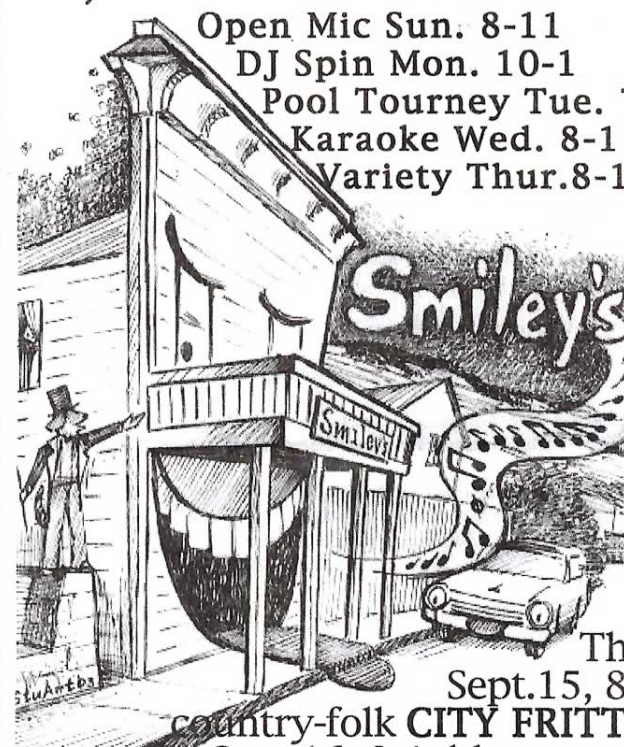

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
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
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
