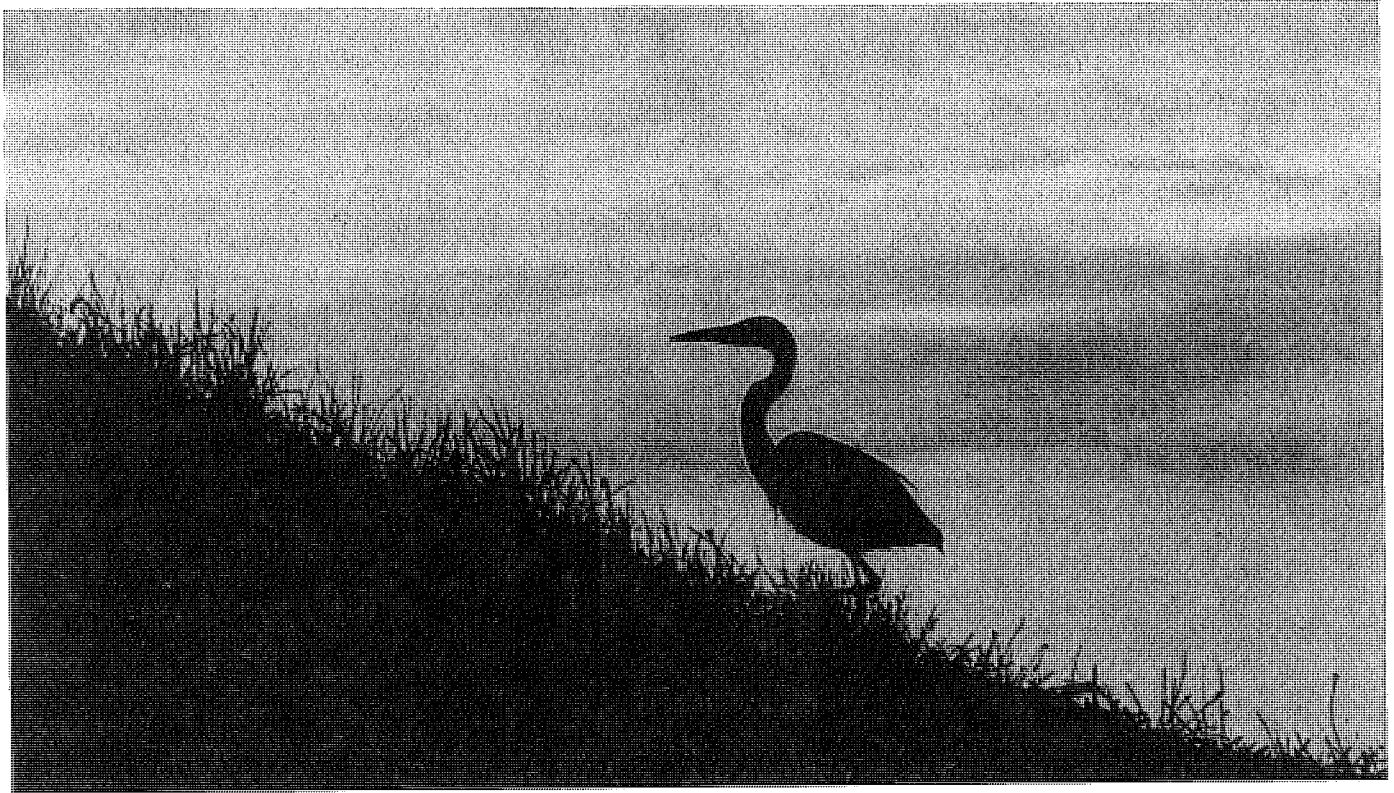

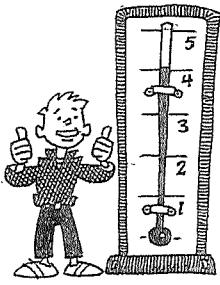

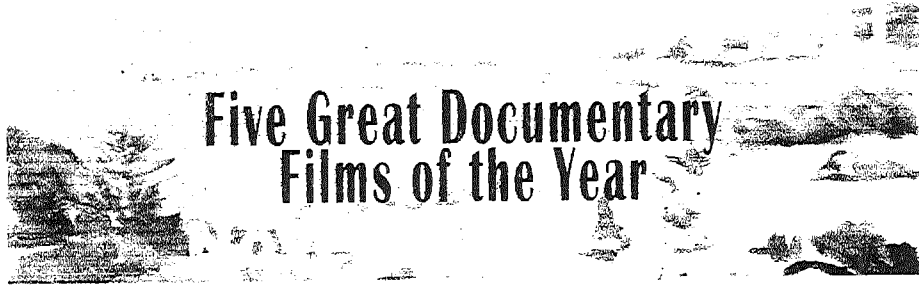

WHAT HAPPENED

MONDAY MORNING WEEK IN REVIEW
10//14 WRAP AND RECAP from Jennie Pfeiffer

On this morning's walk, it was refreshing to hear the cars splash through puddles (small though they might be) and realize how few and far between those splashes have been. So nice to have rain!

It's also so nice to have some new babies in the neighborhood. Cindra Joy has another grand baby, Penny Jane Pruitt, born Thursday to Justine and ISun Pruitt. Congratulations to that family and to Brian and Christine Lee with new baby Flora Victoria, entering her third week of life. No matter how grim the World news events get, it's hard to be pessimistic around babies. They are such a sign of hope for the future.

Candidate's night was Tuesday, with four contestants - Christine Cunha, Nate Siedman, Steve Marcotte, and me, Jennie Pfeiffer - running for three seats. There were 25-30 people in attendance, asking good questions, receiving good answers, everyone offering sensible opinions, and Michael Rafferty (thank you Michael) serving as moderator and time keeper, an all around good evening. It had been suggested to me that I use the Ronald Reagan accepted rules for political debate, which it seems have now become standard practice. Reagan would prepare 12 answers and then whatever the question, he would use one of his three answers. I wasn't sure I could remember 12 answers, so I prepared three. My three answers were pretty much, the students, the students, the students, with a variety of ways of getting there. I did have an extra answer, in case I forgot one of the first three, and that was regarding the General Obligation Bond that is measure B (for Bond) on November's upcoming election ballot. There was concern expressed as to the amount, \$9 million is a lot of money, and as to the sketchiness of the proposed use of the money. Some may remember a very specific proposal that came to the Board two years ago and was voted down. This time around, the thinking is that it's good to secure the money while it's affordable, and then draw against this bond money as the priorities are assessed, addressed, budgeted and voted on by the Board. It is my understanding that this money is not unlike a line of credit, in that pay back starts only after a specific amount is drawn as needed, for an approved budgeted item, such as ADA compliance or seismic retrofit, or property purchase for a future site for school expansion or relocation should sea level rise cause the Lagoon sites to become problematical.

The rest of the week was an avalanche of events coming too fast to grasp, as amazing as they all were. I loved hearing Sadjia talk at Commonweal Wednesday about her life and her book, CHANGING THE RULES; and later that night at Wednesday's BCPUD meeting Eleanor Lyman alerted us as to changes in the Plant Pest Management spray plan, which she is researching mightily (thank you Eleanor); Liz Grace's beautifully moving movies about Lily at 10, 20, 30, and 50, Friday night at the Community Center (50 years! How can that

I was on my way to Bo, to pick up the salmon for our dinner party that Saturday night. It's a short season in the Gulf of Farallones, July 16th until they leave in early October and even then it's hit or miss on a given night whether the crews catch any, so on Friday I'd put my name on the list. I'd called Diane at Bolinas Market and was excited when she gave me the good news: Jeremy and his crew had had a good night and she'd have it ready by 2. By this point in the summer Diane and I had our little ritual down: over the phone or at her counter, an order for salmon followed by a quick review of the factors impacting that particular night's odds for success, like we knew...

I was thinking about the party when I left for Bo from our place at Stinson Beach and the 5 mile drive around the magnificent Bolinas Lagoon, an amazing showcase of nature and one of my life pleasures. The harbor seals were in their usual places, sleeping on the mudbanks, digesting morning meals before heading out with the rising tide for dinner, seabirds everywhere and none so fine as the pelicans, egrets and herons.

Almost at the turn for Bo, and I did a double-take. There was a deer swimming across the lagoon! I stopped the car and saw I wasn't the first to spot it; someone coming from the opposite direction had also seen it and stopped. I quickly crossed the street and seeing how far he had to go, said: "No way he makes it". Then there were 6 or 7 cars stopped, sensing something special. A man adjusted his binoculars and pronounced: "That's a 4 point buck". It looked like he had such a long way to go, and since we were both headed for Bolinas I thought, hopefully, maybe I can greet him on the other shore and hopped back in my car.

There's no way to get to the water's edge, so I strained to see him across the marsh from the road. I was feeling a connection, and pulling for this guy! Another driver stopped, also following the buck from the other side of the lagoon, saying: "I've lived here 30 years and never seen anything like this". After a while I made out his head, still swimming, then more of his body as he started to rise up, pulling himself from the mud that was releasing so grudgingly. His front legs worked their way to firm ground, gaining him the leverage to finally manage the back legs free, before he was on marsh grass and running toward the glen, safety and his family. What a display of courage, strength and determination. It's not enough to say he had earned our deep admiration. It was an heroic moment, a life or death struggle, played out, alone, with life going on all around, mostly indifferent.

At the Bolinas Market, Diane offered me the salmon. I said: "I have to tell you what just happened". Her partner, Pete, in the butcher shop had his own story: "They don't all make it. They can get stuck and drown. A couple of years ago a few of us were down on the pier and saw a deer stuck in the mud. A coyote started to circle and was snapping at him. The deer was fending him off with his antlers best he could. As we were watching in morbid fascination the coyote let out a howl. We figured that was him calling the pack down for the kill. So did the buck, and he pulled himself free."

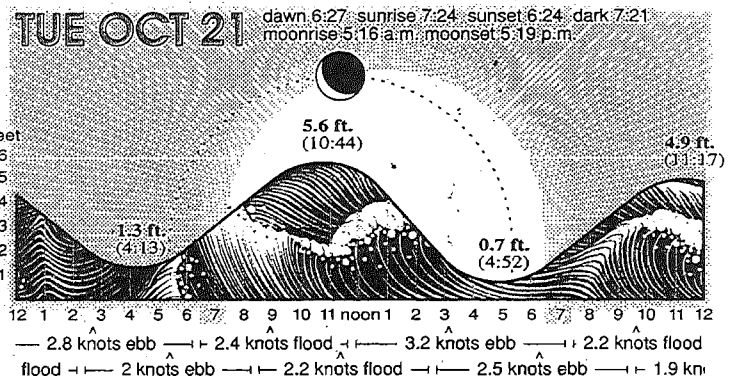
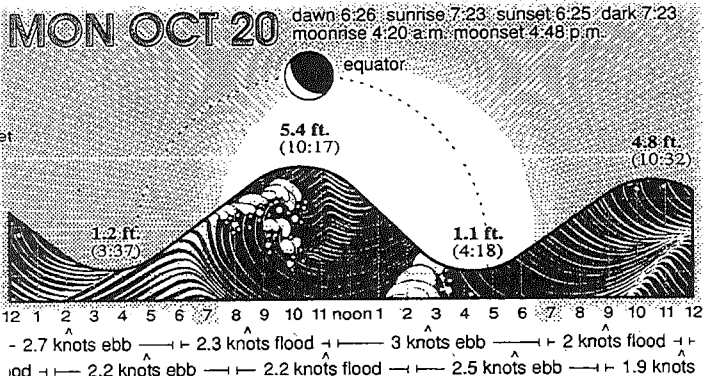
A week later at 3 a.m., our friend Marc walked out of his Bolinas home overlooking the Pacific and the house the Jefferson Airplane used to live in, headed for the Burning Man Festival outside LA. When he reached the Lagoon, four raccoons were going in crazy circles beside the road--oblivious to him; a few minutes later two foxes in the road doing their own weird dance; then, standing in front of the Stinson Beach Fire Station was a buck in the middle of the road, transfixed, staring at Marc and not moving. "You've got to be kidding me, is this what goes on in the middle of the night?" he was contemplating, when his partner called to make sure Marc hadn't been injured by the earthquake.

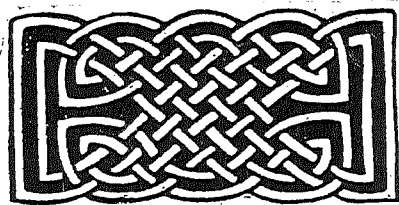

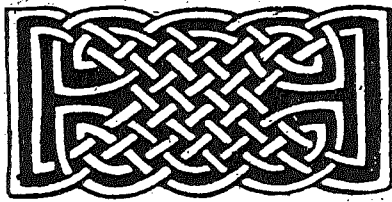
