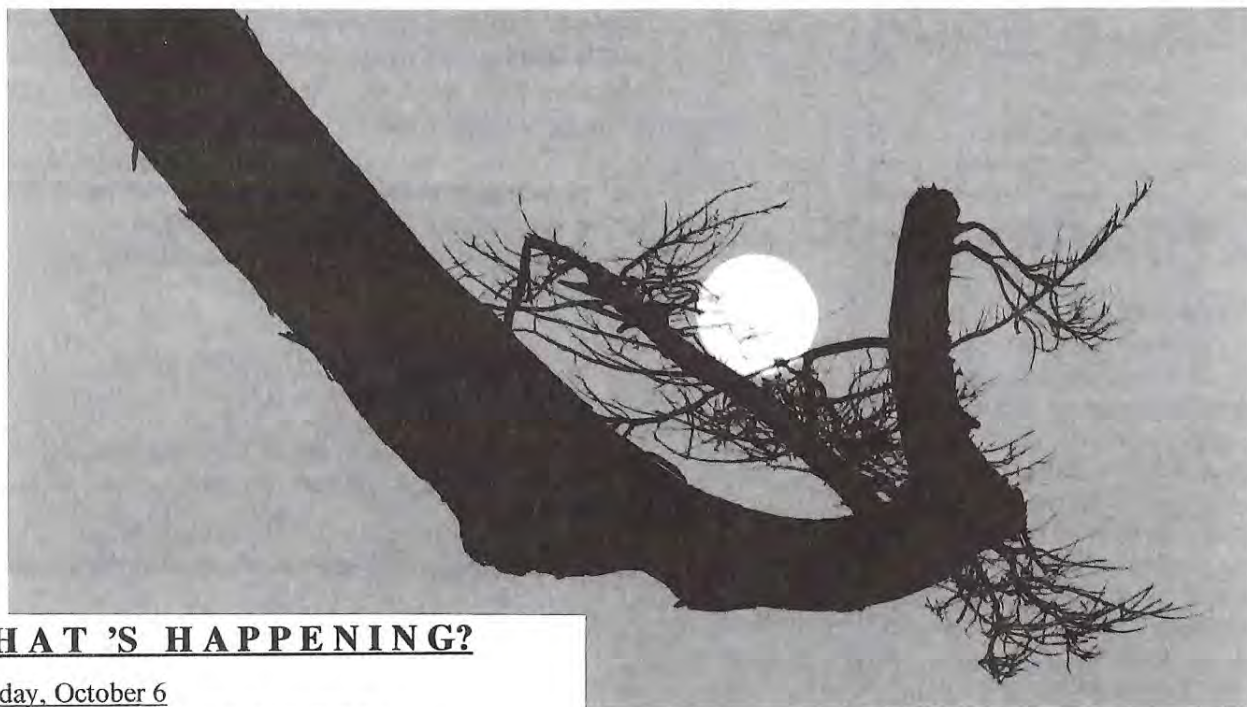

It was a chance for a visit with Karen, who missed Saturday's opening party, but will be back for the closing. I recommend everyone take some weekend time in this month to check out this exhibit of earth, sky, water, spirit. Congratulations to the two of these artists.

The group of people interested in forming a coalition to keep Star Route Farms locally owned is expanding. If you would like to be part of this exciting project, let me know – 868-0144, or stop by Uniquities Friday from noon to 5:00 and talk with me for an update.

Ned and I got some waltzing in at Smiley's (got two reports it sold, then one conflicting report) Friday night with This Old Earthquake, always a fun night at the bar with them.

Saturday's Solar City free consultation on leasing solar installations, led to a commitment on our part to go solar, with a lease, option to buy in 5 years. It was an offer we have been looking for - nothing upfront, monthly payments less than our present electric bill, and an opportunity to do our part for opting out of fossil fuels. Solar City is the Elon Musk company that formulated the lease model that uses the grid to store unused power, and then gives it back to you when you need it. Musk is very keen on making innovation accessible to the other 99%. He is the Tesla designer/developer, who is working to take that expensive prototype and make it affordable by streamlining production. This grid plug-in approach to solar, does not allow power when the grid goes down, but makes it affordable to use our local solar installers to add a cheaper, smaller back up system for emergencies. Working cooperatively is a good thing.

Minutes from the August 25, 2014 Bolinas Fire Protection District Board Meeting

Pres. Buchanan called the regular meeting of the Bolinas Fire Protection District to order at 7:30PM. Vice Pres. Smith, Dir. Chiera, Dir. Bass and Dir. Kimball were present. Also present: Chief Brown, Secretary Brown.

MSC, Chiera/Smith (unan) to approve the agenda.

CHIEF'S REPORT

NERA
Chief Brown attended a special meeting of the MERA Governing Board on August 13th. The Board took action on an Amended and Restated MOU between the County of Marin and MERA. The amendment was made to clarify that the special parcel tax revenues will be used solely for the purpose of funding the Next Generation System as provided by the Tax Ordinance. Action was taken to define qualifications for Low-Income Senior Exemptions which follow current guidelines used by library districts. An Ad Hoc Committee, which Chief Brown will serve on, was formed to define the proposed duties, terms, membership, qualifications and application process for the Citizens Oversight Committee. Pres. Buchanan asked if anyone independent of agencies involved will serve on the Committee. Chief Brown answered that all members of the COC will be independent of MERA member agencies. Chief Brown also stated that a group called Friends of MERA has been formed. They will be fundraising and getting information out regarding Measure A. Everyone involved in Friends of MERA, if they are associated with a MERA member agency, is doing so during their own time and not during work hours.

Grants
Chief Brown and Todd Lando have been working on the Bolinas Wildfire Hazard brochure which has been mailed to all property owners and residents. Feedback on the brochure has been very positive. Chief Brown thanked Dir. Bass for allowing pictures of her home to be used in the brochure. She also thanked Dir. Bass for her time spent editing the document. Pres. Buchanan suggested mailing the next brochure without an envelope. Chief Brown said that there has been a significant increase of inspection requests and clearing done on private property as a result of the recent communications regarding wildland fires and fire prevention.

Apparatus
U219 received its annual safety inspection. Several issues need to be addressed including an exhaust repair, replacement of fuel and water pumps, front brake repairs and manifold repairs. A total cost of \$2,600 is expected.

Disaster Council
Chief Brown attended the Marin County Tsunami Annexation meeting held on July 30th. Marin County OES updated the annex and requested all jurisdictions to review the draft. The meeting was called to discuss and edit the draft. BFPD's role during a Tsunami event is as follows:

- Fire Dept**
*Serve as Incident Commander in Unified Command
*Serve as Branch Directors
*Move resources out of the Tsunami Inundation Hazard Area until the All Clear
*Provide rescue emergency medical treatment and transport
*Request fire and medical mutual aid as required
*Identify and assist individuals and organizations that may require evacuation assistance
*Consider activation of Disaster Councils and Community Emergency Response Teams

- Emergency Response Teams (Including the West Marin Disaster Council)**
*Assist in evacuations and road closures as appropriate
*Participate in the Joint Information System (JIS), Joint Information Center (JIC)

Marin County is preparing to re-launch the Get Ready Marin program. Get Ready emphasizes how to prepare yourself and your home for a disaster, including specific instructions on storing water and food. Residents can take the 2 hour class online or attend a class at the fire station (booklets, signs and banners will be arriving for the class). The District will advertise the program beginning in October.

Marin County CERT is currently updating their curriculum. Chief Brown was asked to review and recommend changes for the Disaster First Aid section. She completed the work and is expecting to receive updated material before the next class tentatively scheduled for January. The West Marin Disaster Council quarterly meeting was held on August 14th. Discussion continued regarding communications, training opportunities and organization of areas. Elia Haworth is the newest Area Coordinator covering the downtown businesses. Chief Brown and Beth met with her on August 19th to finalize paperwork that Elia will hand out to every downtown business. The Fire Department is asking each business to install a Knox Box and to supply a simple sketch of their building footprint and after hours contact information. The Knox Box is a secure method for providing the fire department access to their building in the event of an emergency. Once all the contact information is received, Chief Brown, Beth and Elia plan to visit each business and/or hold several meetings encouraging disaster planning and preparedness. Vice Pres. Smith and Dir. Chiera suggested that the money donated by the Buell's Peace Barn to the Disaster Council be used to buy the Knox Boxes. Chief Brown plans to discuss the idea with Elia.

Chief Brown reported that after the earthquake happened the previous night at 3:20AM, she responded to the station to ensure operations were unaffected. She was contacted by Woodacre for a status check, checked generator power, ensured engine bay doors were operational, and

activated the Disaster Council radio system. She reported that the experience was a helpful drill for post-earthquake procedures and she plans to update procedures for 219 and the Duty Officer's. The Board discussed a new computer application that gives a 10 second warning of earthquakes.

Dir. Kimball commended Chief Brown for her recent email to Disaster Council Area Coordinators regarding the earthquake. He said she demonstrates good management and leadership skills and thanked her for her service.

General Operations/Administration
Sec. Brown and Bookkeeper Gann have been preparing for the audit which is scheduled for September 16th. Chief Brown thanked Kaaren and Molly and commended Kaaren Gann for all her expertise she brings to the audit preparation.

Chief Brown reported that over a month ago, the station pressure washer was found missing from the engine bay. After lots of searching and email communication, it is still reported missing. Chief Brown has asked everyone to keep the engine bay doors shut and to keep an eye on the front of the building.

Surfers' Overlook Repair/Terrace Avenue
Chief Brown reported that Roger Kovach, a resident near Surfers' Overlook, has generously set up a website with information on the potential project. After some discussion, Chief Brown, Dir. Kimball and GM Blackman will ask Roger to edit the site until a clearer direction of the project is identified through public meetings. GM Blackman wrote an excellent synopsis in the most recent edition of the BCPUD Pipeline that describes the project and the need for local financing. Chief Brown stressed that in order for the project to move ahead, a public/private partnership with the community must be formed. The Terrace Ave. Working Group, specifically Dir. Kimball and GM Blackman, have spent a great deal of time building the foundation for the project, but now the financing must be secured before proceeding any further.

Personnel
Brian Peterson has been hired to fill the Friday, Saturday and Sunday portion of the seasonal firefighter position. Brian has been a reserve firefighter with the Corte Madera FD for five years. He brings great experience and is a valuable addition to the BFPD ranks. FF Jake Tacherra is filling the Tuesday and Wednesday portion of the position and continues to do a great job. Chief Brown reported that Angie Calpestri let her know that she will be unable to fill the District Secretary position after all. Sec. Brown committed to filling the position until January of 2015 if not longer.

GENERAL BUSINESS
Action Item #1: Review draft Public Records Access Guidelines. Dir. Chiera presented the draft Public Records Access Guidelines of which he had spent many hours researching. The Board discussed the wording in several areas of the document and discussed how much to charge for duplications. Dir. Chiera clarified that it is the law to charge for the direct cost of duplication only, not for research time in response to requests. Chief Brown offered to consult with GM Blackman about their policy regarding PRA guidelines and charges for duplication. Different prices were discussed for different amounts of pages copied. No action was taken. Dir. Chiera agreed to research charges further and

incorporate all edits into the document. The item was tabled until the next September Board meeting. The Board thanked Dir. Chiera for his time and effort spent on creating the document.

Discussion: Bolinas Fire Protection District Board Seat Openings
 Chief Brown announced that the period for candidates to file for the Board Seat election has passed. Syd Bass and Anna Gade have filed. There still remains one Board seat open. The Board of Supervisors must now appoint a person to fill the seat. Don Russo, a retired San Francisco firefighter and Judith Shaw have expressed interest in the position. Both persons must fill out an application but only one will be appointed by the Board of Supervisors.

CONSENT CALENDAR

Chief Brown stated that the new budget for FY14/15 has not yet been entered into QuickBooks. The financial reports for July therefore were incomplete. Dir. Kimball inquired about unspent monies from the last fiscal year as to whether they would be deposited into the Vehicle Replacement Fund. Chief Brown answered that she is expecting to transfer approximately \$90,000 to the fund. However, she stated that if the MERA financing Bond does not pass for the new communication system, then eventually monies from the Vehicle Replacement Fund will have to be accessed to pay for the new system.

MSC, Bass/Chiera (unan) to approve the Consent Calendar including the Minutes from the July 28, 2014 regular meeting and the warrant lists from July 22 – August 19, 2014, the financial reports from June 2014 and July 2014 including account balances.

PUBLIC EXPRESSION

None.

COMMITTEE REPORTS

Chief Brown reported that the Coastal Commission has approved a repair of the seawall on Wharf Road across from the College of Marin building. The project goes to the Board of Supervisors next for approval. The repair is estimated at \$600,000 and is expected to begin in late September. It would involve repairing 126 feet of the seawall in front of the College of Marin dock up to Dr. Brian Barrientos's dental office.

GOOD OF THE ORDER

Dir. Chiera reiterated what Dir. Kimball conveyed earlier in the meeting about appreciating Chief Brown for her leadership and capabilities demonstrated after the recent earthquake. The Board also appreciated Sec. Brown's flexibility regarding continuing on as Dist. Secretary.

ADJOURNMENT

MSC, Smith/Chiera (unan) to adjourn the meeting at 9:05 PM.

Vehicle habitation ban suspended as county reviews Ninth Circuit ruling

Sheriff's deputies have stopped enforcing a county ordinance that criminalized living in one's car, following the repeal of a similar ordinance by the Ninth Circuit Court of Appeals in June.

While Marin's county counsel reviews the ruling and the statute's language to consider possible revisions, a traveler whose head is drooping after a late night on the highway or a homeless person with no place else to go should technically be free to

take refuge by cranking off their headlights and reclining the front seat.

The ordinance wasn't enforced very often anyway, said Deputy Rich Johnson, a 30-year veteran of the force. "We get a few calls, not too many. Generally, we knock on the door and talk to them, tell them that there's an ordinance and that there's a campsite over here or a campground over there," Mr. Johnson said. "I don't remember myself writing a citation. Most

people say, 'I didn't know there was a campground,' or 'I can't afford it.' I'll usually just say, 'So you know, here's not a good spot.'"

Marin's ordinance states, "No person shall use, occupy or permit the use or occupancy of any bus, camper, car, housecar, trailer, or trailer coach for human habitation on any street, park, parkway, beach or other public or private property except in areas zoned or designed for such purposes." The law contains some exceptions for law enforcement purposes, disaster relief or in a private campground or mobile park, and habitation up to four hours is allowed. But violators could be found guilty of a misdemeanor and be subject to up to a \$500 fine and a 60 days in county jail.

The Ninth Circuit ruling struck down a Los Angeles ordinance that prohibited using a car as living quarters and overturned a district court's 2011 ruling. The three-judge panel unanimously concurred that the ordinance was unconstitutionally vague, unintelligible to the point that people of average intelligence wouldn't know if they had broken a law. The opinion quoted from a 1970 Supreme Court opinion that overturned vagrancy laws, which formerly justified arrest for "wandering or strolling around from place to place without any lawful purpose or object," "night-walking," "prowling by auto" or "generally opprobrious character."

Because the illegal use of a vehicle is ill-defined, "plaintiffs are left guessing as to what behavior would subject them to citation and arrest by an officer," wrote Judge Harry Pregerson, appointed to the bench by Jimmy Carter. "Is it illegal to keep a sleeping bag? Canned food? Books? What about speaking on a cell phone? Or staying in the car to get out of the rain? These are all actions plaintiffs were taking when arrested for violation of the ordinance, all of which are otherwise perfectly legal."

He concluded: "For many homeless persons, their automobile may be their last major possession—the means by which they can look for work and seek social services. The City of Los Angeles has many options at its disposal to alleviate the plight and suffering of its homeless citizens. Selectively preventing the homeless and the poor from using their

vehicles for activities many other citizens also conduct in their cars should not be one of those options."

The ruling did not guarantee a right to sleep overnight in a car, since other laws like parking restrictions or disorderly-conduct statutes still apply, but it did signal that those offenses could not be prosecuted under the umbrella of vehicle habitation. Like Marin County, Los Angeles is in the process of redrafting its ordinance.

During a single night, on Jan. 24, 2013, Marin's Health and Human Services and other volunteers fanned out across the county for a point-in-time survey and identified 37 homeless individuals living in a car, van or other vehicle out of 924 homeless found. Those recent numbers fell from the nadir of the recession in 2011, when 60 out of 1,220 total lived in their vehicles.

Most of the calls deputies receive about vehicle inhabitants in West Marin happen when a mobile home is parked on a side street in Point Reyes Station or in a turnout in the San Geronimo Valley, Mr. Johnson said. When deputies arrive, most of the drivers move on. There's rarely a trace by morning.

"Bolinas is kind of different," he added. There, many vehicle inhabitants are local residents, not just people passing through. And some can be more of a nuisance, like a call that came in on Aug. 31 about a man who returned to his second home to find a mobile home parked in his driveway and hooked up to his electricity.

In response to concerns from residents, a committee in 2006 recommended deputies should enforce vehicle habitation laws throughout the year, particularly for campers on Wharf Road and Brighton Avenue, and a few signs went up: "No camping or overnight parking," one sign in front of College of Marin's laboratory reads.

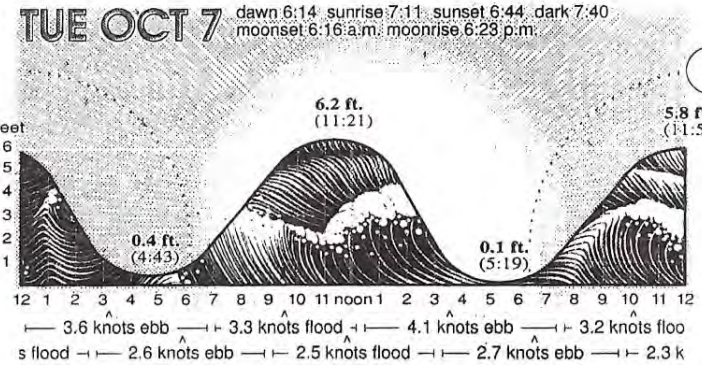
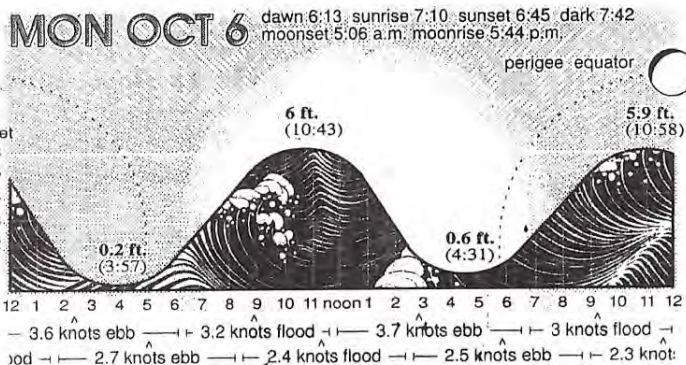
Although Marin's deputies aren't writing tickets in the meantime, they're still approaching some vehicle inhabitants. On Monday night a woman in Stinson Beach sat in her car for six hours, repeatedly entering and exiting. She said she was visiting friends but couldn't remember their names when asked. Deputies asked her to move along, and she did.

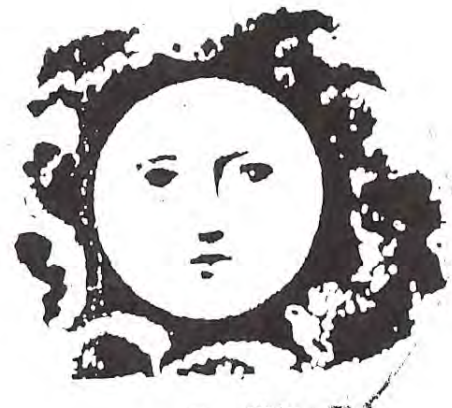

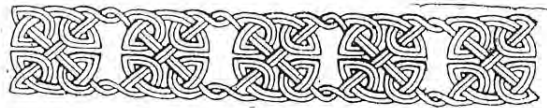
