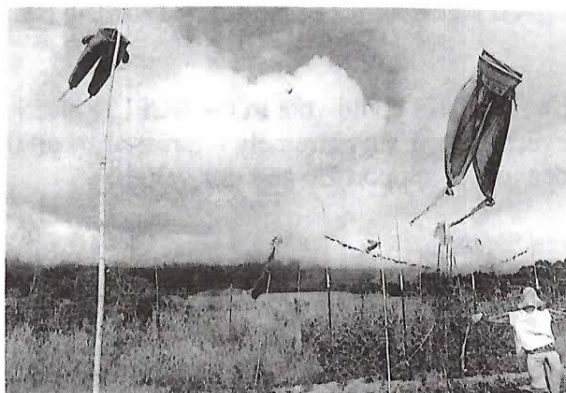

Even though all the candidates for BCPUD Board of Directors claim they support the Water Moratorium and want no changes to Bolinas, do they all really mean it? I'm wondering because I think some of them have previously expressed support for a public swimming pool to be built in Bolinas, and if that were to happen, disastrous changes to Bolinas would most likely follow.

The Water Moratorium would be greatly weakened and possibly even hit with another law suit by the Pacific Legal Foundation, saying that if there's enough water for a swimming pool and showers for all the people using the pool, then there's enough water for the homes they want to build. They would say this shows that the Water Moratorium is really just an anti-development tactic.

And what about the gazillions of people from outside Bolinas who would come to use the pool? We've seen what has happened since the surfers were invited to come here.

It is ultimately the BCPUD Board of Directors who will decide whether to approve or disapprove a public swimming pool in Bolinas, so it's very important for us to know where each candidate stands on this issue, before the election. Each one of them should be asked to state their position and, whoever says they do not support a swimming pool, be held to that position later.

Bolinas entrepreneur Quinn MacDonald

When young Bolinas entrepreneur Quinn MacDonald spotted a need in his community, he decided to fill it - with Legos. With the nearest Lego store miles away, the only alternative was online shopping. And online shopping for Legos just isn't right. The aficionado need to be able to study the box carefully, heft it and shake it to get an idea of value-for-cost. So Quinn rallied his family and with grown up support he was able to contact the company and find out about opening a local store.

Quinn's grandmother is a partner in the eclectic Uniquities treasure shop located on Brighton Avenue beside the 2 Mile Surf Shop. He was able to talk the management into letting him take over a large corner of the store. Then the hard work began. Quinn selected the inventory that he thought would appeal to his peers. He began with his number one favorite, the Star Wars series. His second favorite is the new 'Legends of Chima' series. The Chimas are animal warriors with fantastic vehicles. Hoping to appeal to his female friends, Quinn added some girls' Legos to the inventory. The 'Friends' series features Lego bricks in pink, purple and turquoise colors with female mini-figures embarking on various adventures.

The Lone Ranger and Tonto have come out of retirement, thanks to the July release of the Disney movie starring Johnny Depp as Tonto and Arnie Hammer as the Ranger. It bombed in the movie world despite the \$200 million price tag and Jerry Bruckheimer's producing talent. But it has become the latest hit in the Lego world. You can find several of these cowboy and Native American western sets in Quinn's lineup.

Once his inventory arrived, Quinn proudly plastered the Lego logo on the shop's window. His next marketing strategy includes getting business cards designed and printed for distribution to friends at school. Six-year old Quinn has been playing with Legos for half his life - he knows his stuff and can advise grown ups on appropriate sets for kids of all ages. Quinn hopes his shop will become the go-to place for people needing birthday and holiday gifts.

Bolinas park tax back on ballot: 'We're asking for less than \$1 a week'

Bolinas landowners face a familiar ballot measure next month as they consider a \$49 park tax that lost last November by several votes.

The park proposal is back on the ballot, this time as Measure I, a four-year levy aimed at maintaining Mesa Park, a key community facility sporting a soccer field, baseball diamond, basketball court, skate park and children's area.

A \$45 annual tax to maintain the park at 110 Mesa Road expired last year. It taxed 633 parcels, raising about \$31,000.

The measure needs a two-thirds majority vote to pass. Voters last November narrowly rejected a similar proposal, voting 539 to 275. It won 66.2 percent of the vote but needed 66.6 percent to pass.

"I'm keeping my fingers tightly crossed," said Jane Mickelson, a member of the Mesa Park board that oversees the park operation. "We've been running on fumes since last June."

Revenue is needed to pay the utility bill, pay for a worker, buy fuel for the mower, reseed the fields, service the portable toilet, cover liability insurance and other costs, she noted.

"This aspect of community living is very important, especially for the young people," she said of the park program, noting people from all walks of life and all ages use the fields. "Playing fields really bring people together," she observed.

Mickelson handled the election last year, her first try at "structuring" a ballot campaign, and said it "was very discouraging" to lose by just three or four votes. This time, "I've rallied a whole group of excellent people" to help get the measure over the top, she said.

"If it doesn't pass we won't be able to reseed the fields or mow the fields," she said. "And we'll lose a big recreational opportunity for the children."

"What we're asking for is less than \$1 a week."

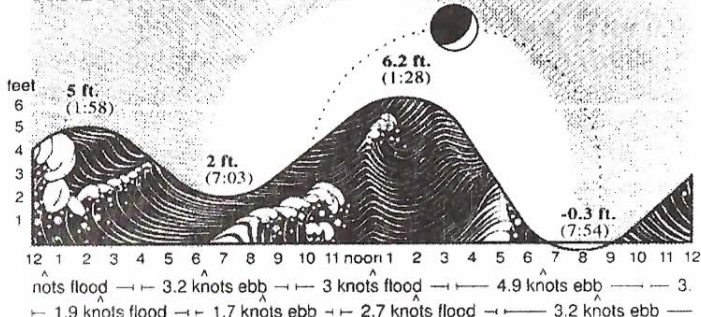

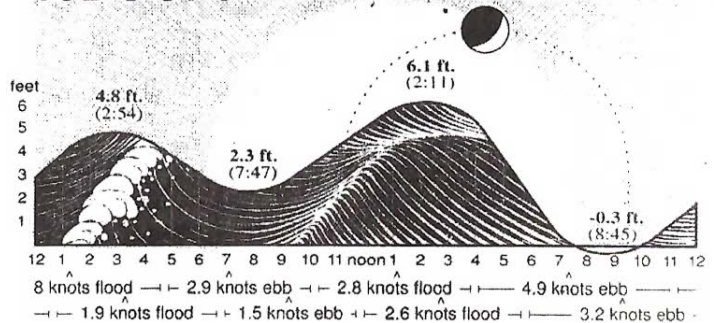

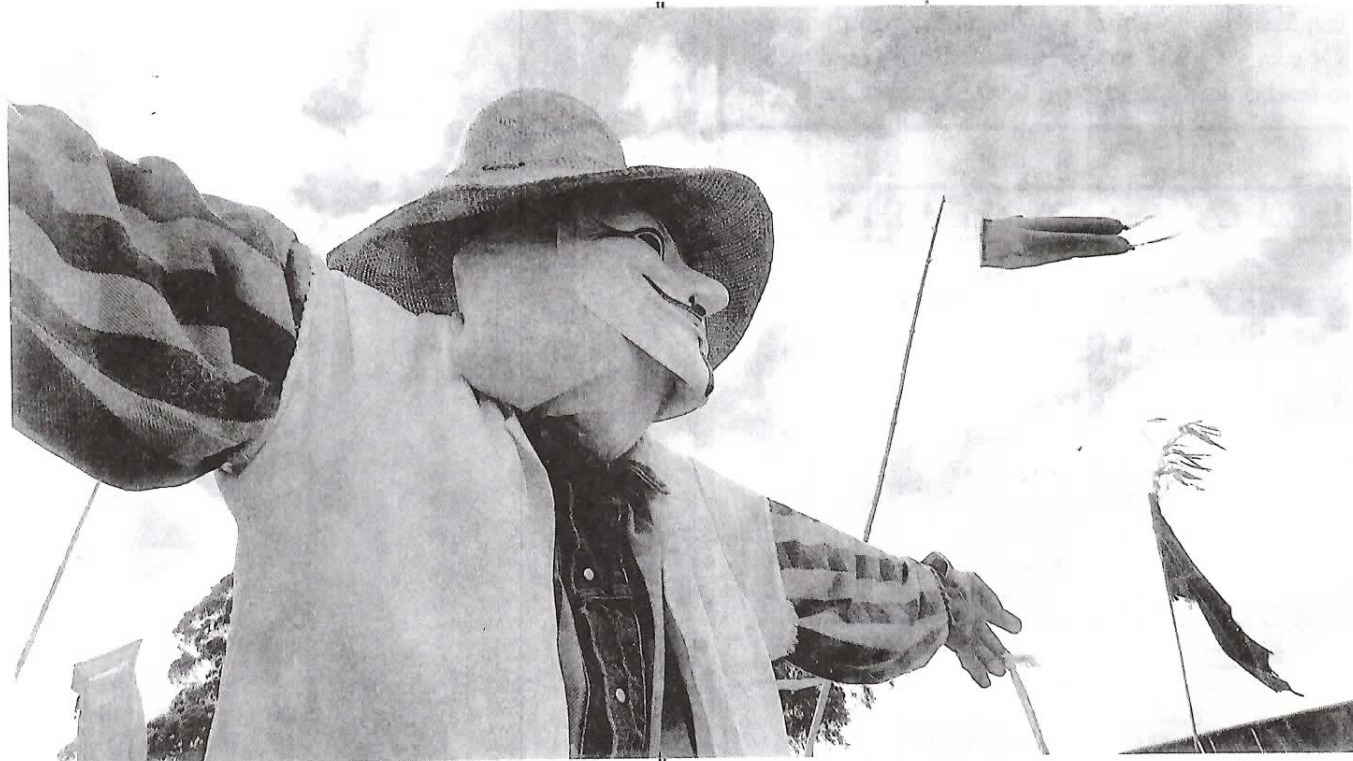
