



The Cal Fire Fuel Load Reduction Project Completed

This past Saturday in Bolinas was perfect sunny fall day. It started with working in my garden and getting a bit ahead of winter by reconnecting the rain barrels. By late morning I was ready to walk down the path to the knoll to see the results of the BCPUD fuel load reduction project, supported by a \$150,000 grant from Cal Fire.

The project included the use of goats, sheep, alpacas and a watchdog llama to clear the understory. I saw them in action one day. I talked for a while with the shepherd, who told me that Sofia, a stately llama and head of the motley crew, would eventually come over to check me out. Every herd member was doing his and her part, taking down thin branches to munch leaves where the ground debris had already been dispatched. I walked down what was now a clear path to Resource Recovery along the portable fence set up around the project area. Amazing what a group of herbivorous animals let loose in a shrubby and debris-covered steep canyon can do to change the landscape.


As predicted, Sofia walked along the fence with me as I left the site. She came very close to the fence and I went forward to meet her. Blow in her face, Stan the shepherd told me. That's what the herd owners told him to do if they, Ilama and shepherd, were to get along.



So I did. I blew a soft but steady stream of air in her face. Sofia stood her ground, cocked her head for a moment and then turned to go back to her job.

I walked the area when the goats were gone and the California Conservation Corps had started their work. I went

again yesterday to see the final result. What thrilled me was seeing the coffeberry growing next to one of the stakes the Land Stewardship Committee put in during one of our Sunday broom pulls to alert project folks not to eat, trample or cut the emergent native shrubs.



The project owes its success to the careful planning and oversight by the BCPUD

staff, Jennifer Blackman, Billy Pierce, Stew Oakander, Andrew Spalding, Seth Kline and Belle Wood. Anita Tyrell-Brown worked with the BCPUD from the beginning of project planning. The project had support from Resource Recovery's Mike Aitken, Joe Bracco and Oscar Salazar. The goats-plus herd is owned by Ray Allen, but it was Stan who watched over them during their stay. Then came the Conservation Corps North Bay supervisors and staff under Terri Thomas, Director of Natural Resources, to start the tree work. Small World Tree Company, Natalie Carey, James Cairnes and crew, working with Chuck and Reed Oakander of the Pacific Slope Tree Company, finished the tree removal. Local folks and external partners did wonderful work to reduce the fire load from the BCPUD land, making the community less vulnerable and incidentally opening up the land for native plants to

Are Sugar-Free Chemicals Affecting Your Gut?

According to a new paper by researchers at Ben-Gurion University in Israel and Nanyang Technological University in Singapore, FDA-approved artificial sweeteners and sport supplements were found to be toxic to digestive gut microbes. The study looked at the relative toxicity of six artificial sweeteners (aspartame, sucralose, saccharine, neotame, advantame, and acesulfame potassium-k) and 10 sport supplements containing these artificial sweeteners. The bacteria found in the digestive system became toxic when exposed to concentrations of only one mg./ml. of the artificial sweeteners. The researchers

modified bioluminescent E. coli bacteria, which luminesce when they detect toxicants and act as a sensing model representative of the complex microbial system,. They stated: "This is further evidence that consumption of artificial sweeteners adversely affects gut microbial activity which can cause a wide range of health issues."

Artificial sweeteners are used in countless food products and soft drinks with reduced sugar content. Many people consume this added ingredient without their knowledge. Moreover, artificial sweeteners have been identified as emerging environmental pollutants, and can be found in drinking and surface water, and groundwater aquifers. According to the researchers - "The results of this study might help in understanding the relative toxicity of artificial sweeteners and the potential of negative effects on the gut microbial community as well as the environment. Furthermore, the tested bioluminescent bacterial panel can potentially be used for detecting artificial sweeteners in the environment."

Diet Coke, Diet Pepsi, Sprite Zero and other sports drinks contain aspartame and acesulfame potassium as artificial sweeteners, along with other ingredients for flavoring. Splenda is sucralose.

As you are aware, your gut microbes play a large role in your digestive health, your weight and the strength of your immune system. They thrive on a diet with lots of fiber from vegetables and fruits. This recent study, published in the journal *Molecules*, can be toxic to these important bacteria.

What are your alternatives for a thirst-quenching drink that will not harm your gut and allow you to avoid sugar? Slice an organic orange, other fruit or cucumber into a glass bottle of water and sip from it during the day. Add mint and other herbs. Drink plain coffee and a variety of teas, Sweeten with small amounts of stevia (this plant derived sweetener may not be safe for the kidneys with excessive use, but is considered safe as ordinarily used.) Yacon syrup, derived from a plant grown in the Andes, is another recently popular sweetener. It has not been extensively studied, but should probably be used sparingly. The syrup can cause abdominal pains, nausea, bloating and diarrhea when taken in doses greater than two teaspoons a day. You can retrain your taste buds to prefer

## **School Board Election:**

In the "who, what, when, where, why, and how" of things, starting with the WHO, I'm Jennie Pfeiffer, and I'm in my third term as a Bolinas-Stinson School trustee. I am steeped in education, having taught every level of learners from preschool to University courses, and adult classes. With a k-12 teaching credential, Master's degree in Education, and also a Master of Fine Arts degree, the goal was to return to school every decade. After 3 decades, I discovered that the best education comes from listening to students, which I continue to enjoy doing.

I moved to Bolinas from Florida in 1980 with my two children who enrolled in Pine Gulch, the alternative multi-grade k-8 program that was available at that time. We all enjoyed the openness of the school and the major involvement of parents and community members who started the Pine Gulch program, as well as the award winning visual arts shops, still part of our excellent school curriculum. There were close to 250 students in the District then and I worked for a time teaching in Pine Gulch, moving from there into the wood shop, where I taught for 18 years. I "graduated" at the same time that my grandson did, in 2005, but I discovered after my retirement that I missed the students and staff, so I ran for School Board the next year. Continuing on the Board since that time, I'm happy be here to see my granddaughter graduate from our new pre-k for 4 year olds this year. That program is blossoming in a beautiful way after many years of discussion and planning.

The WHAT is about my hopes for another term on this outstanding Board of Trustees, working to continue to move forward, with 5 particular goals in mind that include:

 maintaining and continuing to upgrade the beautiful campus we have, where every child can feel safe both physically and emotionally;

 supporting our committed, hard-working staff by continuing to offer generous benefits, including stipends for continued coursework for professional development and advanced degrees;

 continuing a commitment to experiential learning for our students, with out-of-classroom activities and field trips, and science in the out-of-doors in our gardenclassroom program;

4.following through with, and hopefully expanding, our trial program that opens music and art shops to home school families, perhaps working toward becoming a home school hub with more inclusivity and flexible scheduling, maybe looking at ways to offer an alternative, independent study program that might also incorporate our District high school students, should that be something families desire;

5.examining the greater world concerns that affect our families and students. In this area there are 3 large ones on my mind:

1)The "Me too" era we have entered, demanding we move forward with attention to social/emotional concerns, including a constant re-evaluation of our policy on student comportment. We must listen to our students to find out what their needs are so they can feel safe and find their strong voices to speak up for themselves.

2) Global warming and sea level rise -- with both of our campuses on Bolinas Lagoon, we need to look at future possibilities for higher elevation of school facilities, perhaps combining this future planning with the present all too real crisis of affordable housing. 3) In this time of financial inequities, when home prices and rents have become out of reach for so many, I hope we can work together to find creative ways to help our staff be able to stay in the towns where they are employed. I would like to continue the work of our Staff Housing Committee to find solutions such as on-site residence construction, or maybe leasing properties for employees, or perhaps helping with purchases. The greater vision I have is for our District to work with other local organizations toward a multi agency project, (i.e. Land Trust/Mesa Park/school), to provide a gym, pool, and housing for our families. If we are going to be considering a District bond measure in the future, that's a component I would support because all the community organizations in small towns seek funding from the same people. Best to get together on a joint project that works for all in our two communities.

WHEN, would mean starting now, with November elections; WHERE is here in our West Marin Communities of Bolinas and Stinson Beach; and the WHY is because it's my belief that the reason for existence is to help in all ways possible to move the species forward, and I feel educating our children is the best way I can help do this.

Finally, the HOW is by attending meetings for crosspollinating & exchanging ideas with other organizations and community members, particularly listening to parents, students, staff, and constituents to promote open communication. Being open to more ideas gives more options, and the more options, the better the choices

In my time here in Bolinas I have served on the Bolinas Community Utility District Board, the Bolinas Land Trust Board, the Community Center Board, and I continue to work with Resource Recovery and the Bolinas Hearsay News. All these organizations do important work and provide resources for continuing communication and sharing ideas. Education is a collaborative undertaking: students & families with teachers and staff, and the communities.

We have close to a \$4.4million budget. We need all the stakeholders to participate in looking at the best use of funds to educate our children for lifelong learning.

I am ever thankful for this school that has served so many for so long and well, helping launch my children, my grandchildren, the many learners of our District, and has given me so many opportunities to engage in meaningful work.

I hope to be able to give back by offering my services for another term on this Board.




