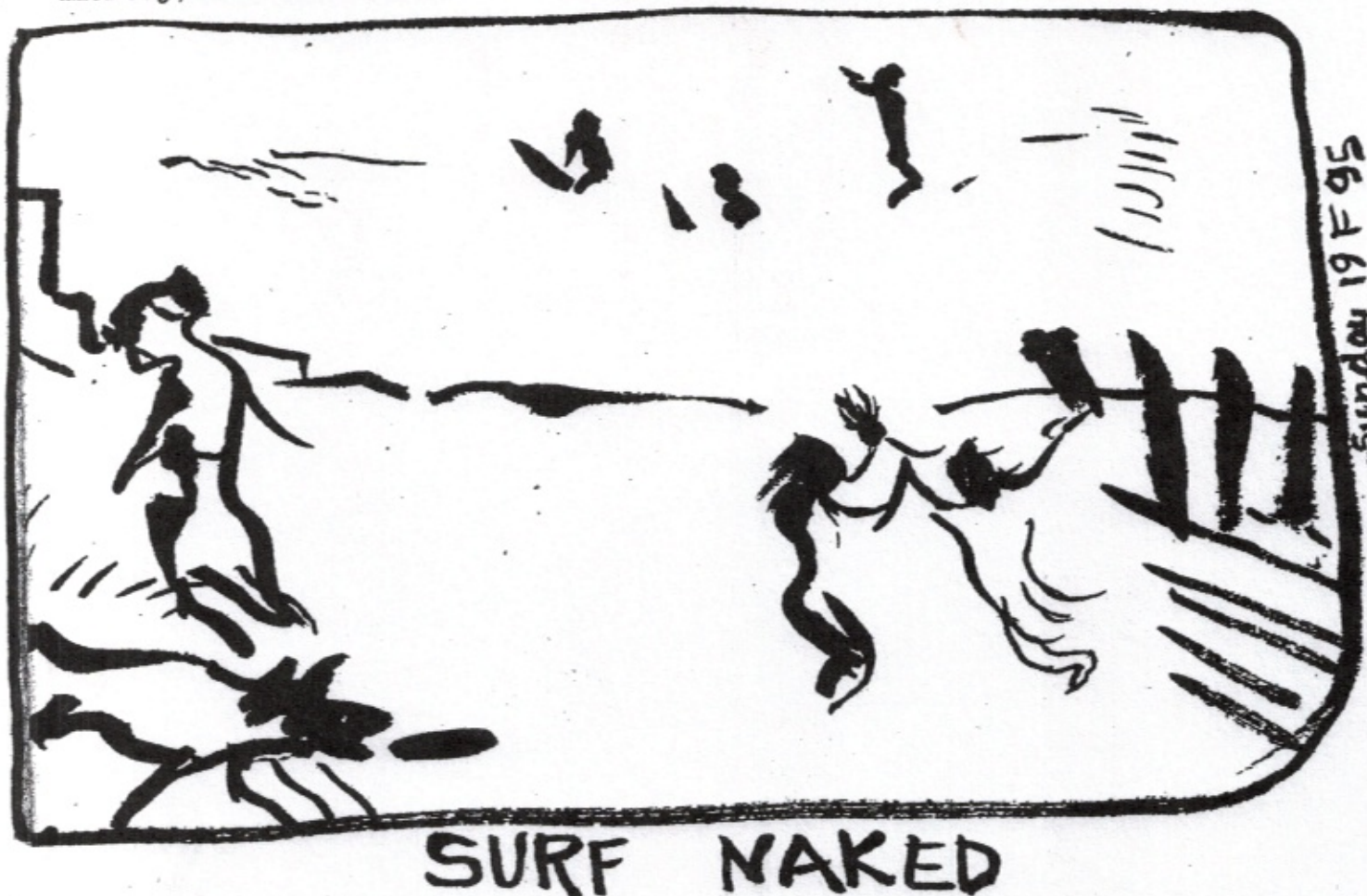

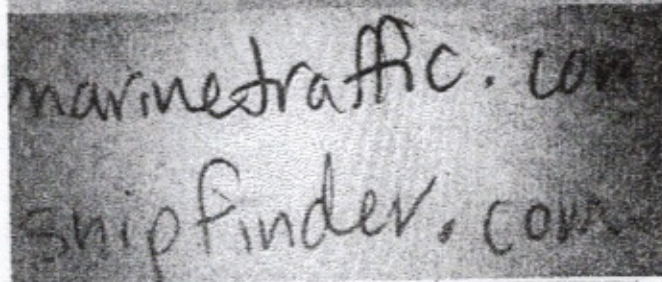

## **Bolinas Marine Lab Coalition Endorses Three Candidates in Marin Community College District Governing Board Member Election**

Marin County, California – October 22, 2018 – The Bolinas Marine Lab Coalition is a group of citizens, scientists, educators, nonprofits and others formed in late 2017 to encourage the College of Marin to place its Bolinas Field Station back in service for hands on science training for its students and continued research with respect to the ecologically important adjacent Bolinas Lagoon and Duxbury Reef areas that has been in process since the College gained ownership of the Field Station in the 1950s. It has been closed since 2005.

The Coalition wholeheartedly endorses **George Rothbart** for Marin Community College District Governing Board Member as he has made restoring the Field Station for programmatic use by teachers and students a centerpiece of his campaign.

The Coalition also endorses incumbents **Wanden Treanor** and **Diana Conti** with the understanding that, although they have been hesitant to take action in the past, they now understand the ability of the College to place the Field Station back in service and have committed to doing so.

## **REASONS TO VOTE 'YES' ON MEASURE X**

**A** walk down Brighton and Park Avenues in Bolinas presents one with bumper to bumper old campers, cargo vans, trailers, storage units and cars that no longer function! Many of the occupants of these vehicles have created campsites for themselves with awnings, lounge chairs, and barbecues.

During the week there is limited parking for visitors and residents; there are no available parking spots at all on weekends when surfers jam their vehicles into every nook and cranny they can find. Many of these surfers spend a night or two or three parked on the street or in front of residents' homes, spreading their equipment and camping gear over garden beds and fences, cooking, and partying.

In keeping with the town's history of public input, the issue of street camping, living in vehicles and long term vehicle storage has been considered over a three year period by a representative subcommittee of BCPUD. The committee recommended in favor of regulation of overnight parking and vehicle storage on the downtown streets as a first step. The result of this is Measure X, which introduces a parking regulation as the only clear way that County planners and legal advisors see as the way to address the problems outlined.

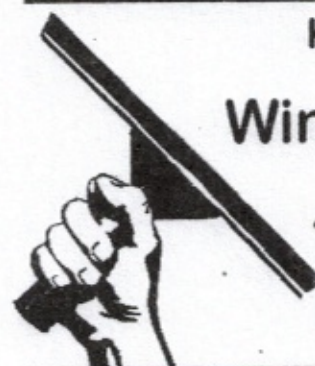
All of us are deeply aware of and sympathetic to people who are homeless. We are willing and able to work with others in Bolinas to find a solution. But we maintain that our unincorporated little village is not equipped to be responsible to accommodate short or long term campers in a sanitary or safe manner in our streets.

The word is out, internet-broadcasted, that anything goes on the streets in Bolinas. If we do not try to regulate this use of our streets now, what is today a definable problem will become overwhelming and intractable. What will our village be like in 5 years? Ten years? Twenty years? Shall our community goodwill be exploited? Shall our village be a public campground or a residential area with a downtown community commons. It's up to us.

For the sake of Bolinas, vote "Yes" on Measure X!

## My Last Post on Measure X

Thanking whomever posted the "NO on "X"-ile" sign – I heard about it but didn't find it – somebody take it for a 'souvenir,' maybe? Check it out, it's clever, it's accurate and I hope you post more, it's only Monday.

The parallels between our nation's current divide and the town's are striking: fear of an onslaught at the border, both the Mexican and the Bolinian... the cry for purging those who 'do not belong'... the general fear that pervades the present and extends to the future, with the blame being laid at the feet of 'others' considered to be beneath our own personal standards... the characterizing of those who live at society's bottom rungs as being dangerous and criminal... You know, as Americans we so proudly and defiantly proclaim it on the Fourth of July, loudly singing: "The land of the free, the home of the brave." We declare, "We are better than the rest of the world because we have freedom and you don't!" "We stand for liberty; for personal rights, for freedom of speech!" "We are the world's greatest Democracy!"

But Democracy with its inherent freedoms is messy because it is, or is supposed to be 'all-inclusive.' "Including All" includes a lot of people and stuff we don't agree with. BCLT UPDATE

The BCLT held its annual Member's Meeting on Saturday, November 3. The following announcements were made:

Thanks to a tremendous amount of work on the part of Steve Matson the BCLT will be submitting plans for Coastal Permits for both 430 Aspen, which is a remodel/renovation/code enforcement compliance case and for the development of a home and second unit at lots on Overlook at the head of Poplar. Plans for both of these projects will be in the office and you are invited to come look at them in the BCLT office behind the gas station office between the hours of 10am-3pm Monday -Thursday.

Thank you Steve!

We couldn't have gotten here without you!

The BCLT is now the proud owner of the 20 acres of the Tacherra Ranch that runs along Mesa Rd. from Mesa Park to the Tacherra's driveway. The land was given to us by a donor who cares about this community and wishes to remain anonymous. We respectfully ask everyone not to ask who the donor is but instead to be grateful and appreciative of their generosity. With the gift of the land is the promise to pay the construction cost of at least 8 units of housing on this land. The BCLT will be responsible for the payment of all pre-development costs through the permitting process. The BCLT has 18 months to complete this permitting, which is a very tight window.

The BCLT had not planned to develop the Tacherra land but have been given this rare and exciting opportunity. We hope to garner the support of the entire community and will seek to be as transparent about our process as we can be and intend also to be as communicative about the process as we can be. You will note in the draft of our strategic plan from last summer that we were only projecting to build the homes on Overlook and our newly acquired lots on Aspen at Alder. This is an adjustment to that plan and will be a huge boon to our entire community. What we know about the project so far: The land is in the Williamson Act and what we can build there is farmworker/ranch-worker housing. These will be rentals and there will be at least 8, hopefully more.

Updates will be posted in the Hearsay, as will invitations to board meetings, and community forums. We welcome your questions at our office, Monday - Thursday 10am-3pm.

**The Benefits of Garlic**

A study from the University of Saskatchewan and UCLA on garlic and heart disease was published in the *Journal of Nutrition* in 2016. It was a review of thousands of studies on animal and humans evaluating garlic's effects and safety. The authors looked at the medical literature on garlic supplements and their effects on high blood pressure, cholesterol, C-reactive protein (an indicator of inflammation) and coronary artery calcium, as well as available data on side effects. Only double blind, randomized, controlled trials were included. In other words, this was a very careful study. What was found was that garlic supplementation reduced blood pressure by 7-16 mm Hg systolic and 5-9 mm diastolic. It reduced total cholesterol by varying amounts: 7.4 to 29.8 mg/dl in various studies. The most consistent benefits were shown in studies that used aged garlic extracts. Although garlic is generally safe, rare adverse reactions were documented. The authors concluded that garlic supplementation has the potential for cardiovascular protection based on risk factor reduction.

The take home message from this, and other studies on garlic, is that it is a powerful vegetable we should include in cooking and also as a supplement if needed. It is a member of the allium family of vegetables including onions, leeks, shallots and chives, all of which are healthy and flavorful. To prepare garlic in your cooking - select a few cloves, peel them and crush or chop them. Let the garlic then rest for at least 10 minutes before cooking, - this triggers an enzyme reaction that boosts the healthy properties of garlic. Cooking the garlic for a shorter time will enhance its effectiveness. You can also add raw garlic to hummus, salads and soups. The most well-known aged garlic extract is Kyolic, but there are several others on the market.

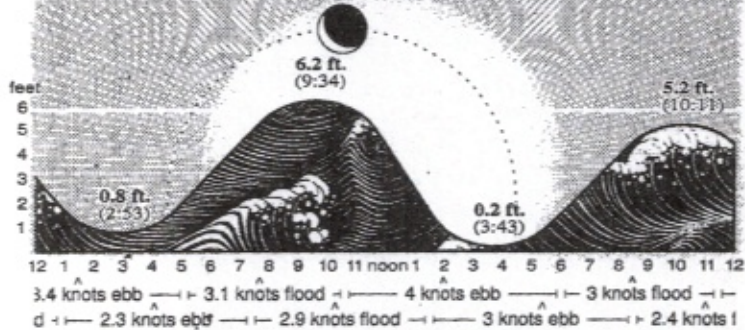




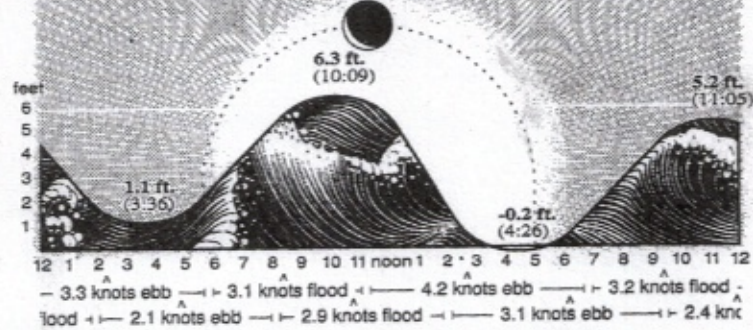
