Talking to Your Children About Sex

Last week I wrote a column about Nurx, an app or website that helps women order birth control or 'morning after' pills by mail. Women can order these drugs by using the app, answering a series of health questions, providing basic demographic information, and having their information reviewed by a physician. They then choose their pills of choice, either birth control (pills or a vaginal ring) or emergency contraception (Plan B or Ella) after unprotected sex. The doctor reviews their information, writes a prescription and the drug is delivered to the patient's home or local pharmacy. The service is available to women over the age of 12.

Young girls can use the app without parental knowledge, in situations when they feel they cannot talk with their parents about sex, either because of strict religious views or strong parental discomfort with the subject. Here are some books that could help parents and children talk about sexual feelings and actions. These books are recommended by *The School Library Journal*, a national monthly magazine with articles and reviews for school librarians, and public librarians who work with young people. The books include *Sex is a Funny Word*, which is filled with cartoons and is for younger kids, and *Doing it Right: Making Smart, Safe and Satisfying Choices About Sex*, which is for high school girls and boys. These books, and others on the recommended list, reassure readers that developmental differences are quite normal. They account for differences in gender,

family makeup, and sexuality. Often the best way to a difficult topic is through fiction, and this is certainly the case with teen romance and sex. The School Library Journal suggests:

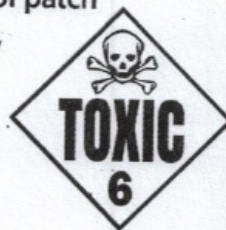

Draft plan issued for responses to lagoon flooding

Work is continuing to move forward on a restoration plan for the north end of Bolinas Lagoon, one of the world's most biologically diverse bodies of water, home to rare, threatened and endangered animal and plant species.

The work has an element for humans in cars, too: alleviating chronic flooding of county and state roads in the area that will only get worse with anticipated sea level rise.

Dubbed the "North End Wetland Enhancement and Sea Level Rise Adaptation Project," work has gone into its formulation for two decades, with more formal plans starting in 2014.

Now a draft conceptual design report has been issued, detailing specific project goals and alternatives in area known as the "Bolinas Wye." The report will be reviewed by the county Board of Supervisors in December or January.

The Marin County Open Space District, the Point Reyes National Seashore, the Golden Gate National Recreation Area and the Greater Sanallones National Marine Sanctuary are working on the issue, along with residents of Bolinas and Stinson Beach.

"It's about climate resiliency," said Veronica Pearson, Bolinas Lagoon restoration manager for county parks. "We are looking at elevating roads to take them out of inundation area and to make room for streams to be restored on their natural alluvial fan and their flood plain, while improving the wetlands and the habitat connectivity between the lower marsh and the uplands to allow wetlands to migrate during sea level rise."

The project also aims to improve the function of Lewis and Wilkins creeks.

"It's an important sea level rise project," said Marin Supervisor Dennis Rodoni, who represents the area, noting a crossover road to Bolinas would be removed under the plan. "That would allow Bolinas Lagoon to move and expand."

Home to 23 rare, threatened and endangered animal and plant species and 50,000 migratory birds that come though every year, the lagoon was officially design-

nated a Wetlands of International Importance under the 1971 Ramsar Convention — an international treaty of more than 100 nations — in 1998. It is the only wetlands in the western United States to receive the designation and one of only 17 in the United States.

The lagoon also provides varied habitat for a unique community of plants and animals. Small fish, which serve commercial fishing industries, thrive in the lagoon. Nearby, thousands of shore and water birds, including brown pelicans and endangered snowy plovers, forage mud for worms and clams.

Larger predatory animals such as osprey, owls, falcons and foxes hunt day and night during high and low tides. Only 3 to 4 inches deep in many places, the lagoon's flat, almost lunar landscape is marked by dried-out tree trunks, scrub brush and muddy loam.

"The Bolinas Lagoon is a special place — an iconic centerpiece to Marin's coastal landscape and home to countless birds, seals and other wildlife," said Max Korten, director of Marin County Parks. "The vision for this project has been developed through cutting-edge science paired with community engagement with the goal of ensuring that this wetland of international importance is able to continue to thrive and be resilient in a changing climate."

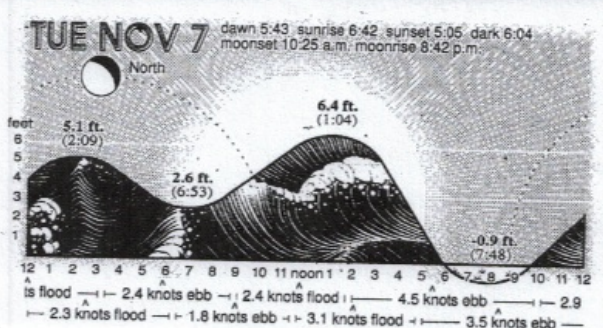
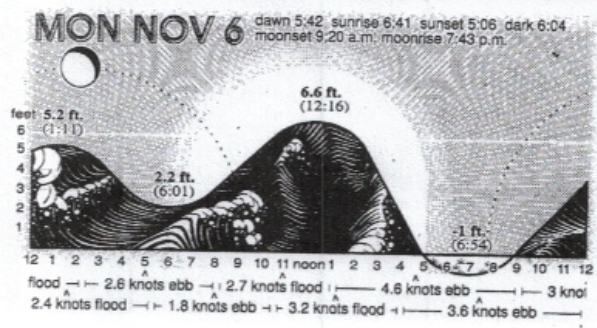
