



Bo: 21st Century Monarch Sanctuary?

We know Bolinas is special - and the 1% fraction of Monarch butterflies that come to the Central Coast know it too! The generation of Monarchs that post-pone becoming sexually active adults, in order to keep their protective fats and migrate to their ancestral overwintering groves, is now gathering in the evergreen trees among us.

Historically they have come to the coast for the relatively mild winters. Here in Bolinas, because of our protective treelined ravines with thick insulating ground covers, they come to cluster together. They seek protection from the cold wind and rain; where there is nearby water and nectar sources, morning or afternoon sun and above all, peace and quiet.

During this year's November counts, citizen scientists with the Xerces Society tragically estimated only 2500 individuals had arrived. Even worse, some Monarchs have had a hard time after their difficult journey through the smoke to get here.

It's with heavy hearts that we must report last week's cold weather and rains, along with a possible predator or local disturbances, emptied one of the groves we are monitoring. Gathering corpses of more than thirty Monarchs for analysis was especially horrible.

 As late as the 1980's they were arriving in numbers in excess of 85,000 individuals. Our current counts reflect that the present population is diminished to a small fraction and that they are struggling.

We are appealing to Bolinas to help our remaining Monarch's survive. Let residents and observers come together to protect and manage the groves! How can we help the butterflies return to Bo for generations to come?

We hope the missing clusters have found refuge elsewhere. We are looking for them and would appreciate any news of their whereabouts.

While witnessing and recording evidence of their precipitous decline, we are also trying to answer a central question: How might we aid the recovery of Monarchs who are overwintering? How can Bolinas sustain the seasonal arrival and presence of this unparalleled wonder of the natural world?

Can Bolinas, with its loving history of planning and organizing on behalf of the natural environment, now rally, and come together to take action on behalf of the butterfly? As Bolinas once chose to become a California Quail Refuge, can we now become a Monarch Sanctuary?

We don't like to end the week's column with foreboding alone, so we invite everyone to look for the Monarchs when the sun is out; sunning and nectaring on flowers. If clusters are discovered please tread lightly, speak softly, take pictures if possible and do alert the Xerces Society - address below.

Their clusters can be quite easily disturbed, but it is such a mysterious and magical treat to look up at a Cypress,

Personal trauma can indeed inspire great artistry, and I've seldom heard and felt this force so strongly as in Anny's intense and moving music. It's also an important story for our time, highlighting the injustices and perils perpetrated upon women in our culture, and offering hope and courage to those struggling for respect and equality. Still, Anny's son Tony from that marriage got up at the end of the performance and spoke of his father and the need for compassion and forgiveness.




