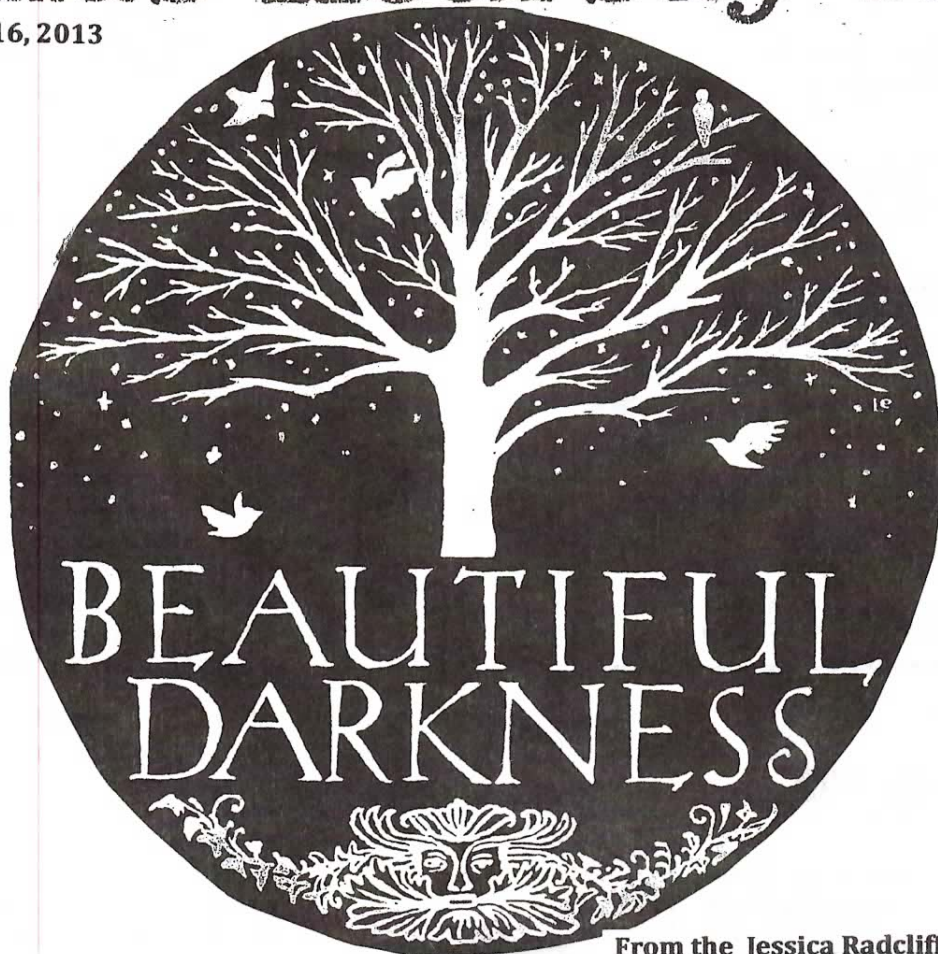

Go to Health: Oregano

Oregano is an important culinary and medicinal herb that has been used in medicine and cooking for thousands of years. It belongs to the mint family. Its name comes from the Greek words *oros* (mountain) and *ganos* (joy)!

In folk medicine, oregano is used to treat respiratory problems, gastrointestinal (GI) disorders, menstrual cramps, and urinary tract disorders. It is also applied topically – as oregano oil - to help treat a number of skin conditions, such as acne, dandruff, skin infections and athlete's foot. (Full disclosure – I use it on my sore fungal toes, and it's helping.)

Oregano contains a fair amount of vitamin K - an important vitamin which promotes bone growth, the maintenance of bone density, and the production of blood clotting proteins. Although dried basil, thyme and oregano contain high levels of vitamin K, a teaspoon of these herbs in their fresh form contain only a small amount and can be used by people taking Coumadin. Check with your doctor on this.

Oregano, allspice and garlic essential oils (EOs) can be effective, natural barriers against *E. coli*, *Salmonella* and *Listeria*, according to a study in the *Journal of Food Science*, published by

the Institute of Food Technologists. The study from government researchers revealed that oregano oil was found to be the most effective antimicrobial used in cooking, followed by allspice and garlic. While this information can make you happy to include these herbs in your dishes, you should never forget the important rules about food safety to prevent bacterial contamination.

Researchers at Long Island University (LIU) have found that an ingredient of oregano could potentially be used to treat prostate cancer. Dr. Supriya Bavadekar, PhD, RPh, Assistant Professor of Pharmacology at LIU is currently testing carvacrol, a constituent of oregano, on prostate cancer cells. The results of her study demonstrate that the compound induces apoptosis in these cells. Apoptosis, is programmed cell death, or simply "cell suicide." Dr. Bavadekar and her group are presently trying to determine the signaling pathways that the compound employs to bring about cancer cell suicide. "We know that oregano possesses anti-bacterial as well as anti-inflammatory properties, but its effects on cancer cells really elevate the spice to the level of a super-spice like turmeric," said Dr. Bavadekar. Though the study is at its preliminary stage, she believes that the initial data indicates a huge potential in terms of carvacrol's use as an anti-cancer agent. "A significant advantage is that oregano is commonly used in food and has a 'Generally Recognized As Safe' status in the US. We expect this to translate into a decreased risk of severe toxic effects. Some researchers have previously shown that eating pizza may cut down cancer risk. This effect has been mostly attributed to lycopene, a substance found in tomato sauce, but we now feel that even the oregano seasoning may play a role," stated Dr. Bavadekar. "If the study continues to yield positive results, this super-spice may represent a very promising therapy for patients with prostate cancer."

Oregano grows very well in Bolinas gardens. Mine survived the recent frost and seems to be growing well all year long. You can put it in salads, soups and stir fries, as well as pasta sauces and pizza.

Dear Hearsay News -

I would like to respond to Richard Charter's opinion article "Close to Home: Farallon Islands ecosystem at risk" published in the December 8th issue of the Press Democrat.

I am a wildlife researcher who spent parts of 24 years as a biologist on the Farallon Islands, including over 20 fall seasons (September-to-December) when the invasive house mouse population there explodes and crashes each year. I am strongly in favor of U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service (USFWS) attempts to remove mice from the Farallones. I am generally against the use chemical agents in the environment, but the long-term benefits to the Farallon ecosystem of a successful mouse eradication so vastly outweigh the costs of a single aerial spraying of Brodifacoum, that it is greatly worth an attempt.

Use of a chemical in the environment is an easy subject to get the public worked up about, here in northern California. In this case, Richard Charter and others have done an admirable job of recruiting opinion against an eradication attempt from a lot of people who have never been to the Farallones, have not read the USFWS's exhaustive draft environmental impact statement (DEIS) on the project, and are forming an opinion without full consideration of the scientific facts or long-term trade-offs of an eradication attempt. It is easy under such circumstances to have the public believe false and distorted scientific information, as seems to be occurring with the review process of this project.

I encourage those forming an opinion on this project to review the DEIS, titled "South Farallon Islands Invasive House Mouse Eradication Project," a 700+ page document in which the USFWS provides great detail on history and methodology of rodent eradication from islands, and considers all alternatives for controlling or removing mice. In this and other respected scientific materials on the project you will learn that:

- In fall the mouse population on the Farallones reaches unprecedented and plague-like densities for a mammal, of over 490 mice per acre and some 60-100,000 mice overall, after which the population crashes brutally to a population probably numbering less than 100 in spring. Populations with this sort of extreme and unbalanced cycling cannot be eradicated or controlled at low levels through trapping or other means, as has often been proposed by those against the use of rodenticides.
- The mouse crash results in armageddon-like suffering for 10's of 1000's of mice each year, including hypothermia following winter rains and widespread cannibalism. Those against animal suffering should be for eradication to end this devastating and gruesome, annual destruction of life.
- Migrating burrowing owls will not remain on the island to eat storm-petrels once the mice are removed. Storm-petrels are not found on the Farallones in November to February, there is nothing else, besides mice, for arriving migrant owls to eat during this period, and they will continue migrating as do thousands of other migratory birds that reach the Farallones each fall. Currently, most owls that are coaxed to winter on the Farallones die anyway in spring, as even the presence of storm-petrels, in the absence of mice, is not enough to sustain them for spring migration. Thus, both owls and storm-petrels die unnecessarily every year due to the mice.
- Brodifacoum is not a "supertoxic poison" but an anti-coagulant that is used by the medical industry in humans to thin blood ("Coamadin"). Its active ingredient is warfarin, widely available and used in the U.S. and other countries for pest control. Those against its use should concentrate on these industries, or on widespread use of pesticides and herbicides at farms and on lawns, rather than a much lower impact, one-time application of Brodifacoum on the Farallones.
- In the wild, mice that ingest Brodifacoum usually die within 4-5 days. Persistence rates of Brodifacoum in the soil is up to 5 to 15 weeks, depending on rainfall amounts. In the marine environment Brodifacoum dissolves within 2-3 hours and, at the very low quantities expected to reach the Farallon marine environment, will be undetectable in the ocean within a day if not a few hours. The above documented values have been widely misquoted or misrepresented by those commenting against mouse eradication on the Farallones.
- Brodifacoum has been used to successfully eradicate rodents from over 50 other islands, instantly restoring the natural ecosystem balance on these islands permanently into the future. The alternative less-toxic anti-coagulant Diphacinone has never been used to successfully eradicate house mice from islands.
- Highly controlled application of thoroughly researched rodenticide quantities by highly skilled professionals, along with extensive mitigation actions, will greatly limit toxin ingestion by non-target

Regarding David Ainley's comments about the Farallone Eradication Project proposed by Fish and Wildlife

Yes, my response to this proposed project is "heartfelt" and more. *I am strongly motivated to protect our environment from being polluted by deadly poisons.* There ARE other choices.

David refers to my view as being "uninformed". Well, I guess that all depends on who you believe. Some of my sources are Wildcare, Maggie Sergio, formerly with Wildcare, an award-winning environmentalist, Richard Charter, Gulf of the Farallones National Marine Sanctuary Advisory Council, etc.

Richard Charter has circulated a petition supporting the "no action" alternative that has been signed by Sierra Club/National, The Ocean Foundation, Ocean Conservation Research, Hands Across the Sand, Calif. Coastal Protection Network, Reef Relief Founders, Friends of the Esteros, Friends of the Sea Otter, Colorado Ocean Coalition.

"While the underlying theoretical intent of this proposed project may be well-intended, the potential for the proposed aerial broadcast by helicopter of one of today's most powerful and controversial broad-ecosystem poisons poses an unacceptable threat to non-target avian, terrestrial and marine species".

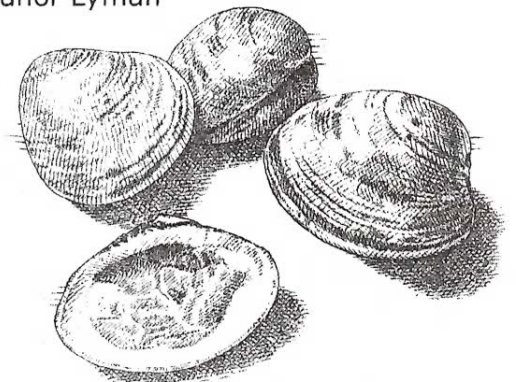
He states regarding the DEIS for the Eradication Project: "Our detailed comments herein reflect the many inadequacies of the NEPA document, the flawed logic behind the project..."

animals including gulls and owls, the latter to be trapped and removed before application. The broadcast would take place in November or December, during and after the mouse population crash, and when less than 1% of the breeding seabirds (including gulls) are typically present on the islands.

Thus, the relatively minor and short-term costs of an eradication attempt are vastly outweighed by the long-term benefits to the Farallon ecosystem of successful removal of the unnatural and wildly unbalanced, non-native mouse population. I urge those interested or concerned about this issue to become informed of the scientific facts and to carefully consider the big picture before commenting against the project.
