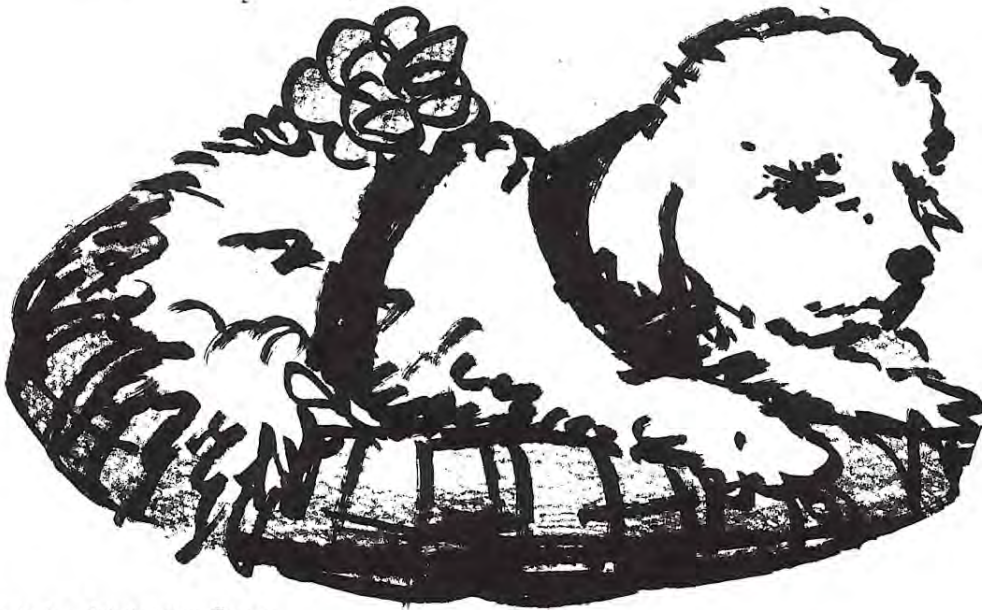

Forests Forever?

Forests play an important role in the carbon cycle of the planet, taking carbon dioxide from the air and putting it into their wood, roots and the soil beneath them. According to the New York Times, 12/23/14, humans (that's us) have cut down, burned or damaged three-quarters of the world's forests, which has accounted for much of the excess carbon that is warming the earth. Scientists concluded years ago that deforestation must be stopped, to limit climate change and preserve biological diversity. According to Nigel Sizer, director of forest programs at the World Resources Institute, "Every time I hear about a government program that is going to spend billions of dollars on some carbon capture and storage program, I just laugh and think, what is wrong with a tree?" Richard Houghton, acting president of the Woods Hole Research Center, has argued for turning some 1.2 billion acres of marginally productive agricultural lands into forests. This could be possible, researchers say, if farming in poor countries could become more efficient. Dr. Houghton believes that his target of regrowth and protection of existing forests could slow the rapid growth of carbon dioxide, or possibly halt it. This, he believes, would give the world a few decades for an orderly transition away from fossil fuels

Environmental organizations, such as Greenpeace, and mounting worldwide pressure, have helped corporate and governmental leaders in countries with tropical forests to begin to slow the cutting. Forest regrowth is also in the works. Costa Rica is considered a forest success. Although much of the country's old growth forest had been cut down, new policies encouraged regrowth to cover more than half the country. However, there is a threat to reforestation - a boom in pineapple farming that gives landowners an incentive to cut down recovering forest plots. The pineapples will mainly be exported as a cash crop.

The Amazon, spreading across nine countries of South America, is the world's biggest tropical forest. Brazil has cut down millions of acres of the Amazon for timber, cattle ranching and soybean farming. The soybeans were mainly used to produce meat for Western fast food companies. After

Greenpeace invaded McDonald restaurants and put up poster of Ronald McDonald with a chain saw, McDonald and other companies pressured their suppliers to stop buying products linked to deforestation. Pressure from the Brazilian government and large business groups has resulted in a sharp drop of deforestation, by 83% over the past decade. The Brazilian Ministry of Agriculture focused on helping farmers raise yields without needing additional land. The carbon dioxide kept out of the air by Brazil's actions far exceeded anything done in the world to slow global warming, according to the New York Times article.

Indonesia is the new test case for environmental groups; deforestation is rampant there - to clear land for the production of palm oil from a type of palm tree. Palm oil is used in many processed foods - ice cream, candies, baked goods and even lipstick. Since the (partial) demise of hydrogenated oils - so called trans fats - palm oil has been used as a replacement. Despite its high levels of beta carotene, it is not a health food, as it is a saturated fat that can raise levels of cholesterol. Deforestation of Indonesian forests to produce palm oil has resulted in serious environmental damage and has put the Sumatran orangutan on the critically endangered list. Indonesia is working on better forest regulation. This has caused palm oil producers to move to Africa.

Here is action plan for us, the lowly enlightened eaters. Do not buy animal food if the animals have been fattened with soybeans - the beans have probably come from Brazil (and sprayed with Roundup since they are GMO). Soybeans from the US, unless they are organic, are also sprayed with Roundup, which has endangered the Monarch butterfly by killing milkweed. 2,4-D is also being used on US soybean crops. Do not buy pineapples from Costa Rica - support their ecotourism instead. Read labels very carefully on all manufactured foods, and don't buy anything containing palm oil. Support family planning in any way you can. Plant a tree. Your actions count - every day! Happy New Year. Feliz y Prospero Año Nuevo. And - as Jenny would say- 'Press On Regardless'.

What a great year 2014 has been. Due to the continued dedication and hard work of a committed staff, board of directors, fantastic volunteers and the generosity of the surrounding community we were able to finalize the first phase of the kitchen remodel, obtain a new stage apron, install picture molding in the hall, continue to improve the sound and lighting systems, replace the hot water heater for the restrooms, and an assortment of other building improvement projects.

The BCC continues to facilitate daily village & beach cleanup, maintain the public restrooms and offer many classes and events as well as a variety of locally based human services, including, but not limited to: the weekly food exchange through West Marin Food Bank, hosting a monthly 'No place like home' free brunch, community nights and producing free holiday meals. The BCC is a designated Disaster Council shelter site and also works as a fiscal sponsor for a dozen local programs such as Stinson-Bolinas Youth Group, The Stinson- Bolinas Summer Camp and Food for Families.

Our goal is to provide diverse, inclusive programming while continuing to respond to the changing needs of our village population. We strive to improve the quality of life in Bolinas.

A good portion of our funding comes from donations such as yours and in this season of giving the BCC is asking you to make an extra contribution to help us get closer to our goals.

We are reaching out to you for assistance on our current projects and needs:

- Replacement of chairs in the hall, we have matching funds of \$1,500 (\$2,816)
- Prepping and painting the inside of hall, foyer and bathrooms. (\$5,000)

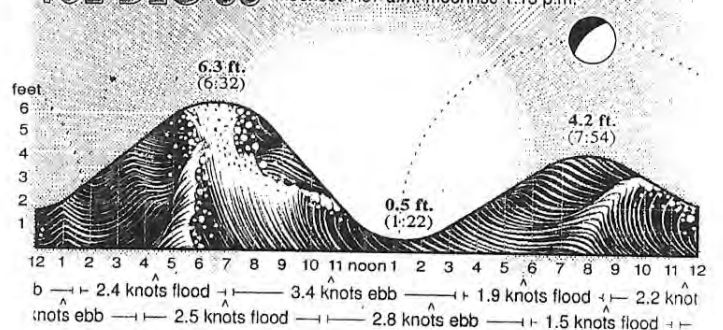
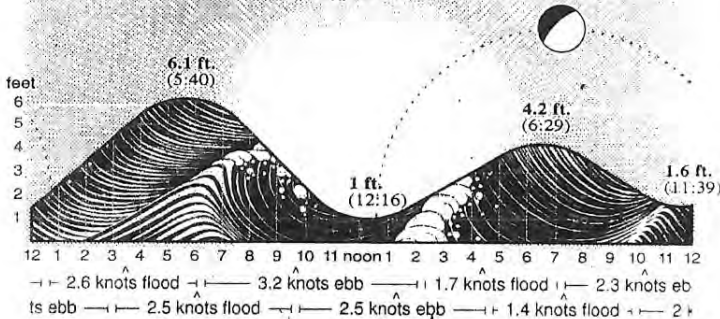

Serita Lewis, a 36-year-old Bolinas native who has written and been written up in these pages, is undergoing treatments for heart conditions that began appearing in the last year for which she has now undergone three surgeries. She is unable to work (she's a dispatcher with the Fairfax Police Department), and she has little family to support her. We wrote about Serita in late 2012, when she was hard at work getting a charitable project called Food for Families off the ground; that effort brings Bolinas residents together weekly to cook for others at the Coast Café and now serves 40 families. We also remember a heartfelt reflection, published in the Light, in which she thanked the folks who helped her in the first year of Food for Families. She spoke of losing both of her parents and more recently, her husband through a divorce, of returning to Bolinas from New York City and of the inspiration that led her to start cooking for friends. She concluded: "And I found something that I didn't even know I was looking for, a place to belong, in a community of people that feel wonderfully, perfectly, divinely like family." Serita was recently diagnosed with ventricular tachycardia, or the rapid beating of the heart, and says she must undergo surgery for a failing valve; she has also suffered a collapsed lung. Michael Guilkey

Michael Guilkey, 65, of Stinson Beach and Bolinas, passed away on Nov. 15 from complications due to a heart attack and a life of Type 1 diabetes.

He was born on Sept. 16, 1949 to two World War II veterans and, at the age of 7, was diagnosed with child-onset diabetes. Nonetheless, Michael knew how to experience the joys of life, especially rock 'n roll, which erupted in San Francisco during his coming of age.

Michael attended San Francisco State during the time of the counterculture revolutionary movements and stayed on campus for eight years as a dorm manager, receiving much of his education outside of the classroom.

In the 1970's, Michael worked as a collaborator with Charles Reich, the author of "The Greening of America," on Charles' memoir, "The Sorcerer of Bolinas Reef." With Michael, Charles wrote, "I saw equality, trust, respect could be taken out of the realm of abstract ideals and made part of the daily, ordinary exchange with another person."

In the late 1970's, Michael began a career as a landscape gardener and met Carol Naber, who became his lover, wife, and life partner. In 1988, they gave birth to a baby boy, Lucas, the love of their lives.

Michael became the well-loved master gardener of the Chevalier Gardens in Stinson Beach from 1990 until 2012, where he lived with his family and worked with his hands in the earth, creating beauty for others to enjoy.

He will always be remembered as a garden-lover, Giants fanatic, Bob Dylan devotee, and a patient, humble, kind, and loving spirit.

He is survived by his wife, Carol, and son, Lucas; sister, Judy, and brother, Paul; many nieces and nephews, and a community of family and friends who loved him.

A memorial service and celebration of his life will be held at the Stinson Beach Community Center on Saturday, Jan. 3, 2015 at 2 p.m. It is open to the public.
