Childhood Vaccinations are a Matter of Safety for One and for All

I think it is irresponsible of the Hearsay to publish vaccine claptrap filled with partial and distorted facts. People who are looking for excuses to believe this nonsense will continue to put their children and the public at large at risk. It is appalling that we need to have the measles vaccine discussion at this point in medical history.

Measles is one of the most contagious of human diseases. You can contract the illness after breathing the same air as an infected individual - even two hours after the fact!! It is socially irresponsible not to have your child vaccinated.

The risk of serious side effect from measles vaccine is estimated to be about one in one million...safer than riding in a car with the parent who refuses to protect their child and the public at large. Are their some occasional allergic reactions like for all medicines? Rarely, but none are serious or long lasting. There are no excuses for avoiding the proven safe and effective childhood vaccines in use today. Furthermore, any politician who supports anti-vaccine options is not fit for public office.

All of the peer reviewed scientific evidence to date fully supports childhood vaccine safety. There is no valid scientific evidence to the contrary- none whatsoever. Thousands and thousands of children have been studied with and without autism, for example, and using standard epidemiological methods there is no link between vaccination and autism spectrum disorder. The so-called scientist who claimed there was a link turned out to be a fraud. His paper has been retracted. In the face of all the scientific evidence that is supported again and again by independent researchers, there is no acceptable rationale for anyone who wants to believe that vaccines are not what they have been shown to be - safe and effective.

With respect to the Big Pharma conspiracy theories, the CDC and not vaccine makers are the ones rightfully pushing childhood vaccines. The vaccines work very well and have very low rates of adverse outcomes. These vaccines are generic (off patent) and there is little profit incentive for Big Pharma to stay in that business. Furthermore regardless of how much net profit the vaccine companies make, the value to society of vaccines far, far exceeds the price tag. We would be paying incalculable amounts to treat annual epidemics of diseases now largely under control because of vaccines.

I reached out to a person with whom I have had difficulties in the past, and that attempt came back and hit me in the face like a cream pie. My kindness might have seemed too aggressive, maybe too much, even for the year of the ram.

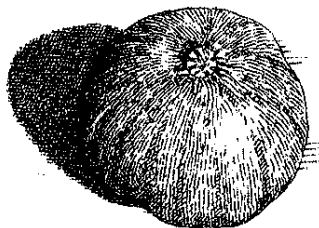
Monday last week was a Bolinas-Stinson School Board of Trustees strategic planning working retreat at the Firehouse meeting room. We started with some work on Board Protocols – how we work together as a Board – and went from some rules, to MANY rules, (including no interrupting, no snorting, eye-rolling, etc, etc.) back to the idea that less is more and best to keep it simple, so now it's: be present and on time; be concise; be respectful. Fits in well with my resolutions of increased kindness and lowered expectations.

We moved on to a look at our District vision and mission statements, and a check-in to see if our current practices reflect our values and priorities

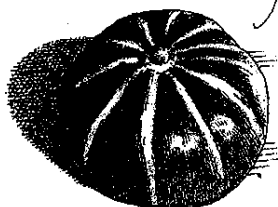
with a report from Tam High as to how our students do there in math, compared with other feeder schools entering the Tam High District. Our small graduating classes were reduced to percentages for comparison. I think this gives false information because a graduating class of 10, which we have had, means one student is 10% of the class, and can make a difference in calculations. If two or three students go into private schools, their scores do not show up on the percentages. Also, it has not been a priority of ours to make sure every graduate has algebra and geometry so it is an unfair comparison with middle schools that include those courses. We can do that if we wish and that should be a discussion for our strategic planning. Frankly, I think it's Tam High's responsibility to teach the math they want the students to learn. It is our responsibility to give our students the tools they need for creative thinking so they can learn whatever they need to know to move on in the world. We do that well at our school and those are standards we will not be lowering. This discussion will continue at tomorrow night's monthly School Board meeting at Bolinas campus library. You are welcome to weigh in. jp

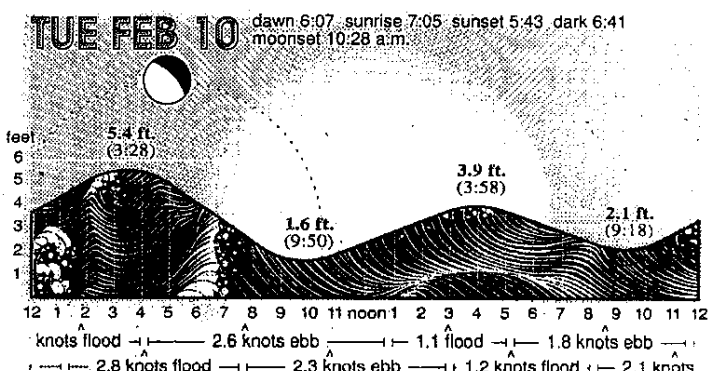
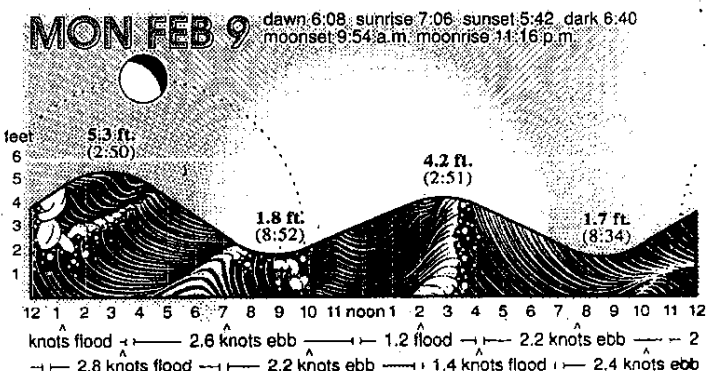
