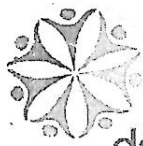

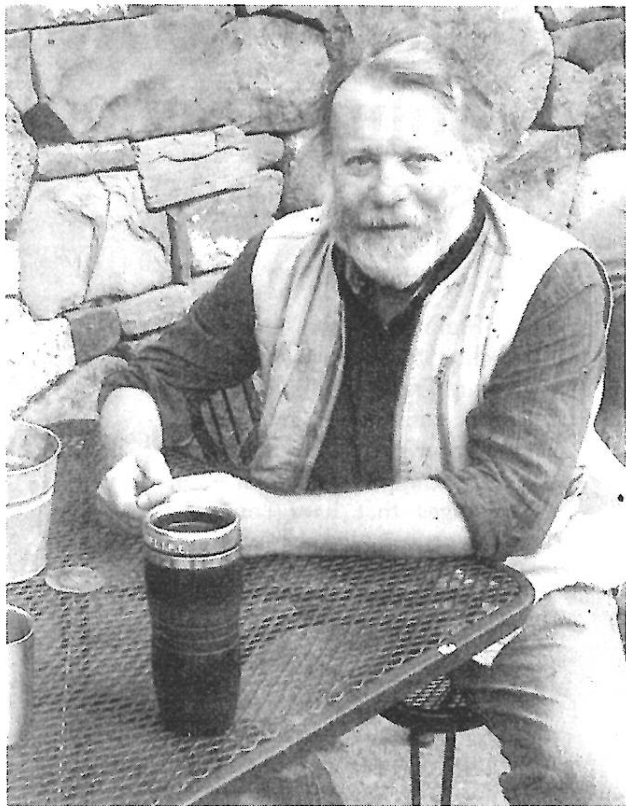

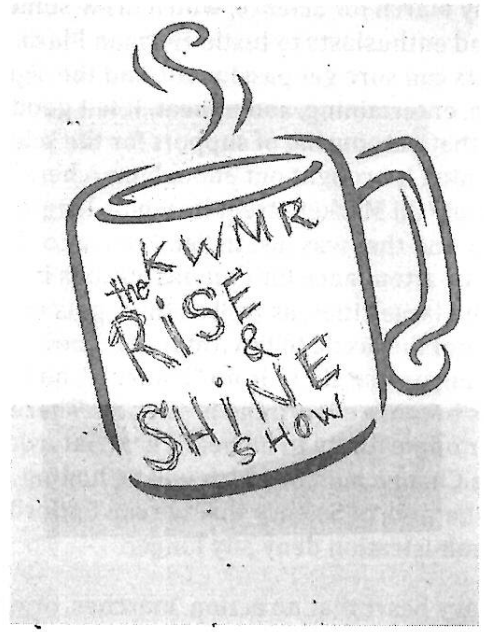

Week in Review Recap from Jennie Pfeiffer

This is a difficult column for me today. It seems every time I start to recapture my sense of humor a bit, I hear about another appalling policy from the Whitehouse, or there is another sad loss of a much loved community member.

The Donald's outrageous anti-environment, anti human rights edicts are rough, but stress and rage can spur one to action, such as participating in the Saturday March for Science, which drew some 50 thousand enthusiasts to Justin Herman Plaza. Those scientists can sure get passionate, and the signs were creative, entertaining, and upbeat. It felt good to be part of that outpouring of support for the scientific community. It brought out enough marchers to completely fill Market Street its whole length and breadth, and that was just in San Francisco. There was equal attendance for demonstrations in D.C, New York, and large cities, as well as tiny spots on the earth from the arctic to the Antarctic. They were all reminding us that there is no "Planet B", and Science matters because everything is science. There will be another opportunity to be heard next Saturday at a Climate Change march, which will be honing in on a particular area of Science that we can't afford to have this administration deny any longer.

The heavy heart that no action, marches, or rallies can uplift, is caused by the sadness of losing a friend. I was so sorry to get the news of the death of Doug Gallagher: a farmer, musician, parent, family man, and deeply caring person. I offer condolences to his family, extended family, and fast friends. It is so difficult to say good-bye to yet another of our eclectic community members. I'm so glad to have known him.

But as life continues, no matter what the setbacks, other news of the week included Tuesday night's School board meeting. There was a large, respectful parent turnout and we were once again reminded that our school is a community school and is a three legged stool: one leg is parents/families/community; one is staff & administration; and one is the school Board of Trustees. It takes all three of those legs to support our children and uphold the academic expertise that will help our students succeed in the acquisition of knowledge in their ongoing scientific exploration of the greater world. There will be more discussions regarding class configurations and locations as we remember it's all about the children and includes kindness and social/emotional development as well as academics.

Middle school films had their second year of presentations and if you missed it, you can see them on the internet at: worldstoryexchange.org. Check them out. Our students are brilliant!

Track and field day was Friday and was another successful day of students stretching their limits. I love that school event.

Also this week was a Community support night for our Spanish-speaking community members. Food, was excellent (thank you to June and Alex Kleider for supplying the food and to Carmen and the excellent volunteers for preparation) and the music was lively and uplifting. It was a very moving night and I hope there will be more as we continue to take care of each other. JP

Parents concerned over Bolinas School class combos

Bolinas-Stinson Union School District is reconfiguring grade combinations and considering moving younger grades to the Bolinas campus next year—changes that have some parents troubled about the potential impacts.

Two specific issues sparked much of the conversation at Tuesday night's board meeting: combining third and fourth grades and moving first and second graders from the Stinson campus—which will house the district-run preschool for the first time this fall—to the Bolinas campus, which has typically housed third through eighth graders.

The discussion also sparked questions among board members about which decisions lie in the domain of staff and which are matters of governance on which the board should weigh in. It's a particularly pertinent question since the small size of the district—about 84 kids this year—means the administration will probably evaluate class configuration every year, according to district superintendent John Carroll.

District teachers have met repeatedly about which grades to combine for the coming school year, Mr. Carroll said, a process that considered the number of students in each grade as well as student dynamics.

Staff started out with seven scenarios, but ultimately settled on an option that has kindergartners—which, with 12 projected students, will be one of the biggest grades next year—in one class. First and second, third and fourth, fifth and sixth and seventh and eighth grades would be combined. That's a change from this year, which combined kindergarten and first, fourth and fifth, and sixth through eighth, but had second and third graders in individual classes.

Mr. Carroll considers the configurations a staff decision and not a matter of board governance. "It seems very reasonable to me," he said of the staff's decision, which he said was determined to be "the most workable approach."

Joanne Kyger, a poet associated with the San Francisco Renaissance, died in March. "Take a Deep Breath" exhibits some of the vital influences on her poetry, including Buddhism and a passionate engagement with nature. Mindfulness is a central theme of her work. The 13th century Japanese poet and monk Dogen serves as a spiritual guide here. His reminder opens Kyger's attention to extraordinary details from her garden: "temporal poppies," "small gold narcissus" and "tiny plum leaves." It seems as if the organic shape of the poem, as well as the image of those plum leaves swaying in the wind, embody Kyger's mindful practice.

Take a Deep Breath

Can't seem to get the fire
started this morning need to add dreams
so flames rise quick as thoughts
and drift out

into the overcast sky
Mind here and now
is Buddha says Dogen

Appearing in front of the bright and temporal poppies
about to open against the perfume
of a small gold narcissus

Just searching for information from the air
waves a gentle moment from tiny plum leaves
the day with barely an adieu

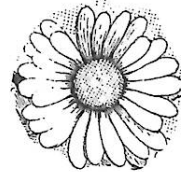
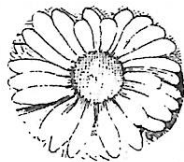
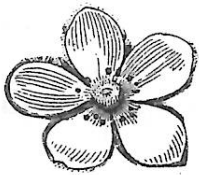

For many years, the Litanía Major of the Catholic church for St. Mark's Day at Rome followed the earlier festival. Its purpose, like the Robigalia, was to gain the blessing of heaven for the growing crops. In traditional English lore, this is Cuckoo Day. The cuckoo, "St. Mark's gowk," heralds the arrival of migratory birds from the south, indicating the return of summer.
