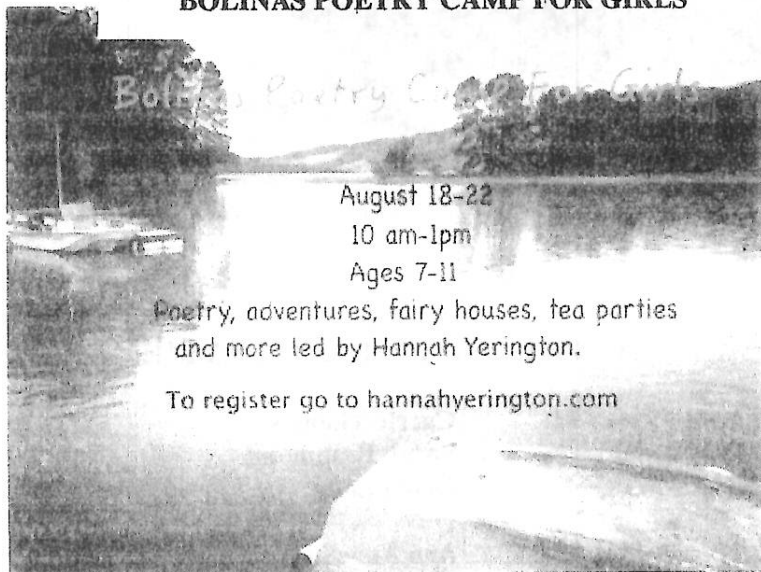

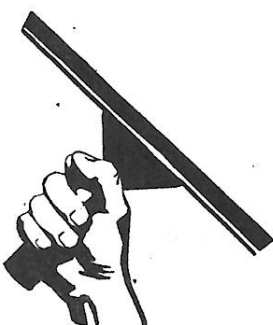

The other night, Giants' usually sure-handed first baseman
Brandon Belt dropped a soft toss from the pitcher when it
hit him in a bad place, his glove. In a post-game interview,
he said he "lost the ball in the light." I was disappointed no
one at that time or that I later heard evoked the memory of
Billy Loes, who famously joked he "lost a ground ball in the
sun." One of my favorites, I wrote a poem about it:

Just Me and Billy Loes

The Village Elliott: 5/15

Brandon Belt, who "lost toss in lights," knows,
Gold-glove types can drop "ball in glove" throws,

High flies when high skies spun,

But, lose ground ball in Sun?

Just me in Waikiki, Billy Loes.

Billy Loes, Brooklyn Bums northpaw wit,

Known for "Southpaw-like" quotable bit;

Asked why Game Six Yanks won,

Joked, "Lost it in the sun,

I boot ground ball, Vic Raschi legs hit."

Once played game at sunrise, Waikiki,

First hit to me bounced high, I couldn't see,

Just saw tropical sun

breaching sea's horizon;

Blinded, ball-bloodied nose awoke me.

Saw shocked faces through my bloodied nose,
Silence screamed, "Haole Boy sure does blows",

But once wiped blood away,

Cried out, "Ready; let's play"

Locals cheered, "Haole like Billy Loes!"

Nearly forty years ago, when in my mid-twenties. I moved
to Honolulu, for not quite two years. My passion was
playing softball. Whenever I could, I played, and among my
friends, earned somewhat of a reputation. Though one
roommate didn't play, his fellow cabbies, mostly locals did.
When he told them about me, they invited me to join their
weekly Early Sunday After-Shift Game, Sunday, 8 AM in
Waikiki.

I usually worked late Saturday and couldn't make it. One
day I did. Just before sunrise, one of the first to arrive, I
introduced myself. Just light enough to take grounders, I
went out to short. Lost in reverie at the beautiful view
overlooking the beach and across the channel to Molokai, I
turned my head when the hitter called, "Grounder coming."
Simultaneously, the blazing sun rose from the sea,
temporarily blinding me as the high, lazy two bouncer
smashed into my nose.

As my bloodied nose gushed, my glasses went flying one
way, the ball another. I heard the others groan and mumble
nervously. I reckoned they must be wondering if this haole
boy was half the ballplayer my roomie represented. Then
the hitter yelled, "You OK, Brah?"

"Yeah, but I feel like Billy Loes." I gurgled as I picked up
my glasses and wiped away glops of blood with my long
sleeves. "Usually I'm asleep now, but that woke me up.
Okay, I'm ready now; hit me another."

"You OK, Brah!" the hitter yelled back. When the others
cheered, I knew I was fully accepted. By game's end, they
told me their workmate didn't exaggerate, I was OK. And
though they probably had no idea who it was I said I felt
like, by games end they were calling me "Billy Loes."

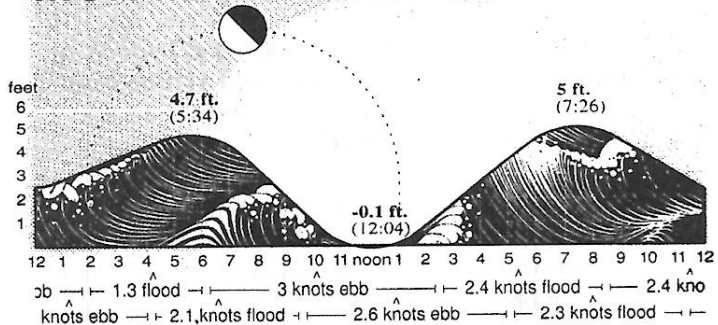

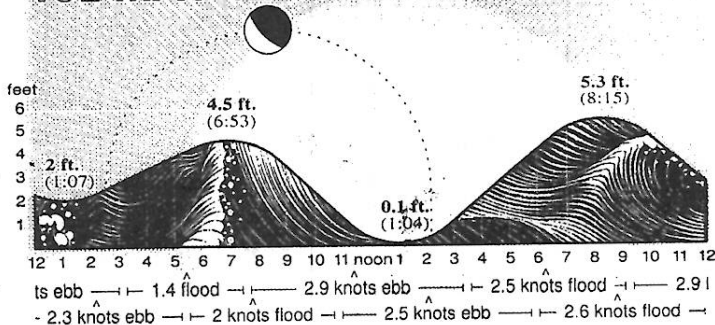
