



- (3) Sunday's final Irish music session at the Sleeping Lady Café in Fairfax—at least thirty players. After six years of jigs and reels they're going out of business.



A newly formed book club is meeting at the library once a month. All are welcome to come. The selection for this month, meeting on June 7th, is "A Tale for the Time Being" by Ruth Oseki. There are some copies available at the library desk for anyone interested. The following review is from the publisher.

""A time being is someone who lives in time, and that means you, and me, and every one of us who is, or was, or ever will be." In Tokvo, sixteen-year-old Nao has decided there's only one escape from her aching loneliness and her classmates' bullving. But before she ends it all, Nao first plans to document the life of her great grandmother, a Buddhist nun who's lived more than a century. A diary is Nao's only solace--and will touch lives in ways she can scarcely imagine.

Across the Pacific, we meet Ruth, a novelist living on a remote island who discovers a collection of artifacts washed ashore in a Hello Kitty lunchbox--possibly debris from the devastating 2011 tsunami. As the mystery of its contents unfolds, Ruth is pulled into the past, into Nao's drama and her unknown fate, and forward into her own future.

Referring to rodenticide -free Bolinas, I, most respectfully, strongly disagree!

There are many species of rats; I am not referring to roof rats that live in the roofs of cities.

Here in Bolinas I am referring to the rats that live in holes and tunnels underground! They live also in the fields on empty lots. There they eat the eggs that quail lay and they kill and eat the baby quail as soon as they are born. I have seen a mother quail crossing my land, followed by several golf ball sized baby quail with the proud little feather waving over their heads. The next day she returned minus the little ones. On that bit of land there was no rat poison so the quail had no protection from hungry rats.

However, if you give those same rats a strong rat poison they immediately go deep into their holes and tunnels underground where they die. Their fleas find no blood sustenance and die,

We never see the young rats until they are mature enough to make their own holes and tunnels But you can be sure that there are many many little rats

Have you ever seen the balls on a rat? I can tell you they are huge and free swinging. Noprostate cancer for them...And you know what they like to be doing all the time!

In the more than thirty years I have lived here, just once in broad daylight I saw a rat running over the ground looking for the space to make its own holes and tunnels. But most likely they are more active at night!

You might notice a hole in the ground on your property. Maybe you think it is a mole or shrew and you put out mole poison even though the moles eat many underground insects.

But more likely they are rat holes, not cluttered up with caving earth like mole holes but clean round holes

Now there is a campaign going on to make Bolinas proudly free of rodenticides!

Then the rats don't die underground...

No!!!

Electrocuted or caught in rat traps, whatever earth surface method you choose ...:

Those rats die on the rodenticide-free surface of the earth.

And that spells trouble for some unfortunate person who has the job of getting rid of their dead and decomposing rodenticide-free bodies... BECAUSE

> BECAUSE RATS CARRY THEIR OWN SPECIAL RAT FLEAS (and fleas carry bacteria. viruses, parasites...worms)

Surprise! What? You didn't know that rats carry rat fleas? Just like there are dog fleas, cat fleas, etc fleas.

The fleas on those rats live in the rat's fur. They bite the poor, itching rat, transferring to the rat's blood the bacteria, viruses, parasites, that live in and on the fleas.

We have no control over where those fleas will hop as they leave the rodenticide free dead rat. Who will they bite next? Where will the flea's eggs drop?

Of course, those fleas cannot live long on your body; they prefer rat blood, not human blood. But just one bite, transferring to the human blood stream all the bacteria, viruses, parasites, that the rat flea carries. is all it takes to make you sick!

Maybe you forget what happened to the people in Europe during the 1200 - 1300 centuries when rat fleas carried in their blood the Bubonic Plague, some times called the Black Death! Those rats came from lands farther east where that plague is still endemic! But their fleas wiped out a third of the people of Europe!

Entire towns wiped off the face of the earth! Of course, those people did not know why they were dying. Nor that their heroic efforts to save themselves and their families had absolutely no effect. But they left their dead and decomposing bodies to fertilize the European earth....

(Please forgive the digression as an illustration of what happened in Europe, and what can happen anytime, anywhere as rats and their fleas mutate!

So here in Rodenticide -free Bolinas we are left with hopping rat fleas whose bite carries bacteria, viruses, parasites, worms, fungus, who knows what.

We have no control over those hopping fleas, and they are long distance hoppers!

They hop onto anything and anyone, especially anyone who moves to dispose of the dead and decomposing rat bodies!

That person, and anyone else within hopping distance of a bite from a rat flea, might become seriously ill:

Fever, aches and pains in their joints, diarrhea, a raging headache, worse!

Of course, we carry here, today, no immunity from the specific bacteria, etc the rat flea

Healthy bodies may eventually recover, but until they do they live with the debilitating, sickening effects of the rat flea bite!

Your doctor, if you go to one, might give you a prescription for an antibiotic...
Whether it is the antibiotic or your own system, or both, still it might still be two weeks or more until you feel yourself well again...

Meanwhile, you may be too sick to work, to go to school, to visit people important to you or you to them.

It might be more than two weeks until you can do your best work again...!

Even get yourself fired from your job because you were too sick to do the work as well as it should be done.

Or to complete your best school work, get a D instead of an A or B...
Or even contribute to an auto accident because you were too sick to be alert!

I hope you have thought about the possible results of a rodenticide-free Bolinas! You may say "This is all suposition", but the truth is that fleas carry bacteria, viruses, parasites that can be transferred to people, as we know what happened when the Bubonic Plague ravaged the people of Europe!






