



MONDAY MEETING REPORT 3/5/12

IT WAS A BUSY WEEK OF MEETINGS AND MARDI GRAS, starting Monday with two meetings, in addition to an early morning arrival of Susan and Hanford Woods fifth grandchild, a baby boy born to daughter Georgia and her husband Mark. That's hard to top. Congratulations to the family.

There was a meeting Monday morning of the greater Marin Transportation Consortium in San Rafael, which I was not able to get to, but I did make it to the 3:00pm gathering of our local West Marin TAG (Transportation Action Group), a coalition of communities out here with transportation needs not being met. The STAGE has been excellent in connecting Bolinas, Stinson, and Muir Beach with South County, but with the loss of the Bolinas to Olema to Pt. Reyes route, there is need for a south/north continuation, as well as service for communities up to Dillon Beach that have never been served. There is a van available to the group, but it needs seats and a driver. The more participation there is on this, the more the Transportation Authority will start listening the our needs out here in West Marin.

Monday night there was a Fire Board meeting. The topic of greatest concern for me was the Action Item dealing with approval of the Verizon request to add a microwave dish to the existing Crown Castle tower located by the Firehouse. There was discussion about the need for consistent monitoring of emissions, and a ceiling on what is acceptable. The item was continued until the next meeting, when there is adequate response from Verizon. I have great respect and appreciation for the due diligence the Fire Board has shown in all these matters of public health concern, and the work they do generally along with Chief Anita Tyrelle-Brown, to serve the safety and disaster response needs of our community.

Tuesday, before Brett Docherty's presentation of the unsettling, wake-up call film END:CIV (civilization) at the community center, (so glad to see our young people taking an active leadership role as activists), there was a meeting of the Uniquities collective, as we discussed the upcoming events for spring, including the startup of the 2nd Sunday Sales on Brighton Square, which will be held on the third Sunday this month, the 18th. We also sponsored a mask making workshop this past Saturday, giving an opportunity for revelers to construct masques to wear in the Mardi Gras parade, which happened at 5-ish from the Plaza, down Wharf to the Museum, then back to the Community Center, where an excellent dinner was served by Barbary Coast Bistro, with some fine dancing Tardy Mardi party music served up by BoBo Tempo. A great night.

Earlier in the day, Shehera's opening at Murch's Farm Stand gallery space, brought together a wall full of intricate canvases, each painted in a day - hard to believe.

Wednesday was a nation wide day of protest of Education cuts and a call to action to give higher priorty to our children's learning.

So another full week, with a little rain and a lot of beautiful weather, and more to come. jp

Go to Health: Volumetrics

Here's an interesting finding – as long as food is equally palatable, people tend to eat the same weight of food. The March issue of the Nutrition Action Health Letter features an interview with Dr. Barbara Rolls, at Penn State University, who has been studying this for years with the aim of helping people lose weight more easily. Her latest book - The Ultimate Volumetrics Diet - will be out in April; previous books include The Volumetrics Eating Plan. She has looked at ways to change the amount of water in foods, thereby adding weight and volume but no calories. This is done by adding vegetables to each recipe, and making sure the food is tasty. The result, found in careful studies, was that people reduced their calorie intake by about 25%. In a trial of 700 people, she found that when people ate a diet that was less calorie dense (more vegetables included) they were eating significantly more food about a pound more food a day yet they were eating fewer calories and losing more weight. In another study, people who successfully lost 10% of their maximum body weight and maintained the weight loss for at least five years were found to eat five servings of vegetables a day. Overweight participants ate three and a half servings. Besides adding more vegetables to recipes, calories are cut by reducing fat and sugar in sauces, using small amounts of olive oil instead of cream, switching to whole grain pasta or brown rice, and removing fat and skin from poultry or meat. Dr. Rolls advises adding vegetables to mixed dishes, soups and stews, and putting cooked vegetables in a blender for sauces. She suggests adding vegetables to breakfast, lunch and dinner for children and adults. She found that baked goods with added vegetables – such as extra carrots in a carrot cake - made the cake even more palatable, so people ate

more. However, at the end of the day they had consumed fewer calories.

Studies done on portion size were also important – Dr. Rolls found that while people tend to eat the same weight of food, when exposed to large portions they get thrown off very easily. Portion control is still important for all eaters, and it starts with visual awareness. Some people use a 10 inch rather than a 12 inch plate at home and automatically eat less. Some divide a restaurant entrée in half, and share the food or take half home for the next day. Some ask for a child's plate, which is easy if you are ordering a takeout. People interested in portion control avoid buffets and all-you-can-eat restaurants, or exercise great care therein.

Mindful eating is another important way to slow down and appreciate food. Become more aware of your hunger before eating and feelings of fullness as the meal goes on. It can take 15-20 minutes for the brain to register that you have had enough, so overeating is easy when you are rushed. Some people set a timer for 20 minutes and make sure they savor their food while making it last until the bell chimes. Eating while reading or watching television can lead to mindless stuffing for some people Become aware of gratitude for the food you have, for the animals who gave their eggs, milk or life, and for the people who harvested and prepared food for your table. Be aware of your personal triggers for mindless eating, such as anxiety, depression, alcohol, marijuana or certain chips and sweets.


