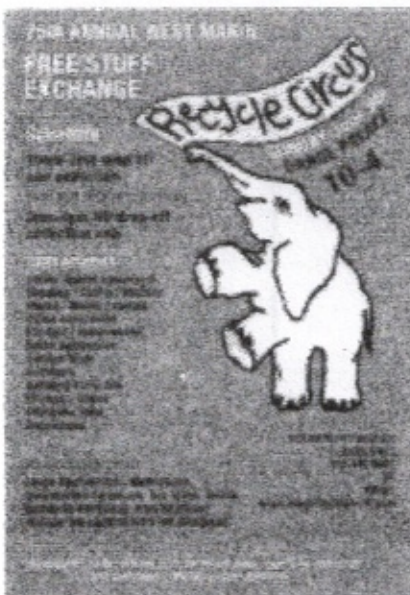

Jenniepfeiffer's Monday Morning Recap

Moving into the third week of May-hem, the calendar continues to fill, and the "to do" list lengthens. It was a week of mourning and meetings, bringing community members out to express support and condolences to Joan Hamerman Robbins and her family for the loss of her spouse, and our long time community member Bill Robbins, who died Tuesday after a long, difficult struggle with Parkinson's Disease. It's always a heart wrench to say goodbye to a friend and neighbor. The weekend's three day Shiva for Bill brought many memories, and photos showing early days of travel and young family life, giving us an opportunity to find out more about this intelligent and compassionate man who lived life so fully and will be surely missed.

Having May start on a Wednesday meant the Bolinas-Stinson District School Board of Trustees 2nd Tuesday of the month meeting, and the Bolinas Utility District 3rd Wednesday of the month meeting, bumped into each other this week, bringing out folks with opinions on a variety of topics, as they moved in and out and around raindrops, of late spring/early summer rains pelting the area starting Wednesday, continuing through Sunday's early morning lightening and thunder storm. Evidently, there are more rains to come this week.

The School Board meeting was a bit of a marathon, with a Board "retreat" (I put that in quotes because it's not what one might think - no hot tubbing or massages, just lots of talking and small amounts of listening.) Tuesday noon, running into the afternoon/evening/night regular monthly meeting with lots of conversation about deficit spending, new teacher hires, staff requests for parity with administration in raises and belt tightening, and all those issues that make community meetings so lively and enjoyable. Our staff does the important work of educating our children and keeping the school environment safe and beautiful for them, and I admire them greatly for their diligence. They deserve to get a living wage to be able to afford a place to live where they work. I wish that were possible. The District is working on that issue, and Arianne Dar, general manager of the Bolinas Land Trust, was at the meeting to make a proposal to the Board about working with the Land Trust on a school staff housing project in Bolinas. I certainly hope that can move forward. As usually happens, we ran out of meeting before we ran out of items to discuss, so there will be a special Board meeting scheduled soon, so watch for a posting on that.

Arianne Dar was also at Wednesday's Bolinas Community Public Utility District meeting, (busy woman these days), responding to community questions and concerns regarding upcoming building projects around Bolinas. This and other topics lengthened the Public Comments part of the Agenda, and it was two hours into the meeting before the listed agenda items started. Maybe it was the full moon in Scorpio, which we have only been able to glimpse in odd moments as clouds parted for a bit, but another stellar idea from Michael Rafferty, originator of so many of Bolinas' institutions, was presented and you might be interested in watching for it. He is hoping to once again live-stream BCPUD meetings, as in the days of WRFB (Radio Free Bolinas). He's fleshing it out and will be posting it in the Hearsay News Paper and on the Hearsay website. More reasons why we love Bo so!

On the art scene: congratulations to Chris Whitefield for his opening in San Francisco at the Jones Institute, Saturday night. Had plans to be there, but the sky opened up on the way to the car, and so decided not to be on the mountain road, or in the city looking for parking, dodging downpours. I hear it was a delightful success and I'm happy to see his work being shown more in the larger world. I plan to get in to see it soon.

Why is the Mediterranean Diet So Important?

The Harvard T.H. Chan School of Public Health and the Mayo Clinic are endorsing the Mediterranean Diet as a way to reduce the risk of heart disease, inflammation, blood sugar and body mass index.

The diet is a plant based eating plan consisting of a daily intake of whole grains, olive oil, fruits, vegetables, beans and other legumes, nuts, herbs and spices. The preferred animal protein is fish and other seafood at least twice weekly. Poultry, eggs and low-fat dairy can be eaten in small portions daily, or a few times per week. Olive oil replaces butter or margarine. Avocados, nuts and oily fish like salmon or sardines are other sources of healthy fat. Red meat is limited to a few times per month. Water is the main beverage. Plain coffee and tea are fine. Fruit juices contain too much sugar, and should be replaced by eating the whole fruit. Wine, especially red wine, can be consumed with meals. Women should drink no more than one 5 ounce glass per day, and men should stop at 2 glasses. People who do not drink alcohol do not need to begin. Eating and socializing with other people is encouraged. Daily physical activity is important.

The Mediterranean diet emphasizes whole grains, such as whole wheat, rye and barley. People wanting a gluten free diet can use brown rice, quinoa, buckwheat, millet, oats and corn.

Research has shown that the Mediterranean diet reduces the risk of cardiovascular disease and overall mortality. A study of 26,000 women over 12 years showed a 25% lower risk of developing heart disease and stroke among those whose eating plan was close to the Mediterranean diet. Favorable changes in inflammation, blood sugar, Type 2 diabetes and body mass index were also seen.

Fat intake is high in the Mediterranean diet, consisting of 39-42% of daily calories – note that the fats are healthy ones, such as olive oil, nuts, avocados and oily fish. This promotes satiety – feelings of fullness – so that the diet is easy to follow. The Ketogenic diet is also high in fat, but relatively low in plant food while emphasizing meat, eggs, and cheese. The lack of a wide variety of plant foods means a considerably smaller intake of protective antioxidants. This diet has been popular for weight loss without hunger. Compared to the Mediterranean diet it is less healthy for the individual and ultimately for the planet.

I recently had a visit with the new doctor, Steven Aussenberg, at the Coastal Health Alliance in Bolinas. I had stopped going to the local clinic a few years back due to long wait times, short visits and a general feeling of disconnect with the unfamiliar staff. My mother, Dale Johnson, was one of the original founders of the clinic, alongside Patty Bradford. She and some of the C.H.A. staff recently held a community conversation at the firehouse where people were honest and heartfelt about the problems they had and have with the clinic. C.H.A. followed up the meeting with an email to those who had shared their information. So I decided it was time to give it another try.

I was greeted with a friendly smile, and before I could finish filling out my paperwork I was called in to start my appointment. The nurses were friendly and thorough. The doctor came in quickly and my appointment went very well, and was followed up with a phone call from Dr. Aussenberg about a referral. I want to share this experience because so many like myself had given up on our beautiful little clinic. Please give it another try; we need health care in West Marin. They seem to be trying to make the changes we are asking for, so if you haven't yet, please speak up by writing to Quality@coastal-health.net. The Bolinas clinic is currently open Mondays, Wednesdays and Thursdays from 9 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. and from 1:30 to 5 p.m. Thank you, Mom and Patty, for starting the Bolinas family practice!

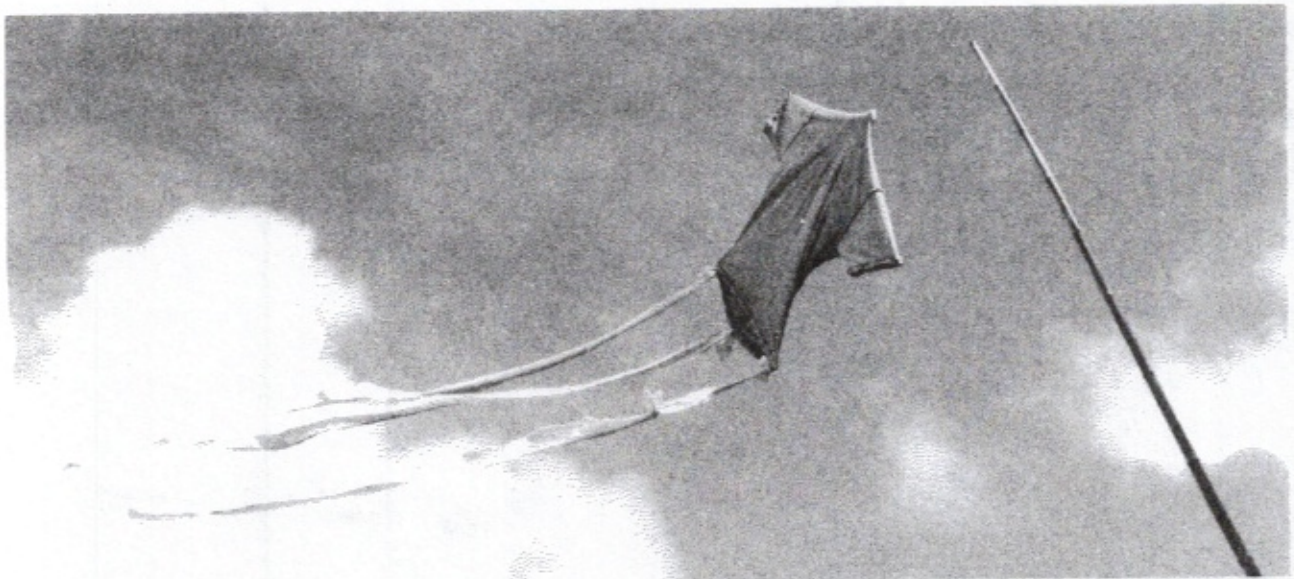

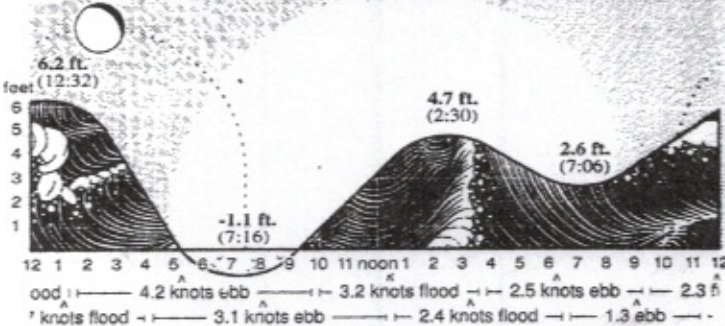

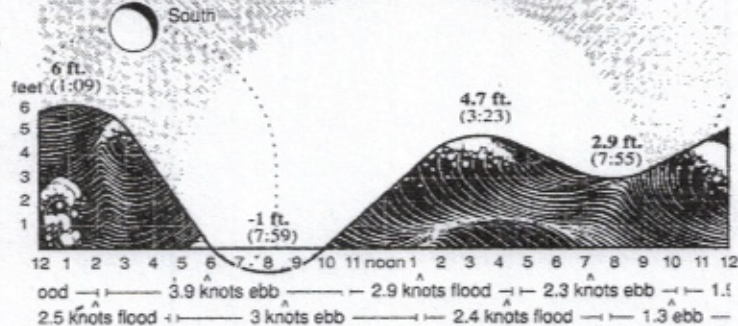
