**MONDAY MORNING WEEK IN REVIEW
6/1/15 Wrap and Recap from Jennie Pfeiffer**

This week, we left May-hem and here we are, the first day of June -- time for the mighty summer rumpus to begin!

It was a foggy week, ending with a lovely light unannounced rain this morning. The fog gave us a bit of a break from the onslaught of beach-goers, allowing a little space to notice things. Yesterday, on the way to play soccer on our beautiful new soccer field at Mesa Park, I noticed that there has been an amazing garden planted behind the firehouse. When did that happen? Clearly it was when I wasn't paying attention. It's gorgeous, filled with blooming plants -- quite the metamorphosis from the utility yard that was there at one time. It's worth a look. Thanks to the visionaries who transformed that lovely spot -- good work!

Later in the afternoon, after soccer, down at the Downtown Park, I noticed how many people, all ages, are using that delightful product of another visionary, Alethea Patton. There was a game of croquet; some whiffle ball batting practice going on with a small pitching machine, perfect for the eight and under; and a variety of folks enjoying the delicious take out sausages and slaw being served up by a pop-up Barbary Coast Bistro that John Sabbatini had going next to Smiley's.

Around about 5:00 yesterday afternoon, townspeople started gathering at the Bolinas Community Center for a Town Meeting, hosted by Bo-CAN (Community Action Network) in conjunction with the Bolinas Community Land Trust. The Town Hall meeting model, based on the Vermont annual Town Hall Meetings that allow citizens to bring up areas of concern and offer suggestions, is a great concept. The main agenda item was worker/family housing, and there was a packed house. In looking around, I noticed how many community members are new to me. I've been here a long time and thought I knew most residents, but I guess I'm not getting out as much as I used to, because there were so many faces new to me -- lots of children and babies, also lots of young adults I once knew as students when I taught in the wood shop at Bolinas-Stinson School, now grown and taking charge with this excellent Bo-CAN group. Arienne Dar, president of the Bolinas Community Land Trust Board, gave an in depth report on what the Land Trust has been working on to try to help mitigate the housing shortage. The BCLT has been working with the County to allow a variety of second unit proposals that could be built reasonably, without negatively impacting our Bolinas Water Moratorium. I don't have space here to cover all the excellent suggestions, so I'm hoping for a report to come out here in the Hearsay News. Good work all. Thanks to Evie Wilhelm for the spark that has ignited this energy flame of youthful enthusiasm, and to Evan Kahn who is putting together a team of workers available to help do yard/home maintenance for seniors and disabled residents. Excellent idea.

The Bo-BOP (Bring your Own Plate) chili dinner after, gave conversation time. My take away hopes are: that we can get all those people

Minutes from the April 27, 2015 Bolinas Fire Protection District Board Meeting

Pres. Kimball called the regular meeting of the Bolinas Fire Protection District to order at 7:30PM. Vice Pres. Bass, Dir. Shaw, Dir. Chiera and Dir. Gade were present. Also present: Chief Brown, Secretary Brown.

MSC Bass/Gade (unan) to approve the agenda.

CHIEF'S REPORT

MERA

Chief Brown reported that the regular meeting scheduled for April 22nd in Novato was cancelled due to a lack of agenda items. The next meeting is scheduled for May 13th. Sufficient applications have been received for the Citizens' Oversight Committee. Interviews are scheduled for this week. Recommendations will be made to the Executive Board on May 6th and made to the Governing Board on May 13th.

Prevention

None.

Inspections

Chief Brown said that she plans to conduct Fire & Life Safety commercial inspections for every business downtown beginning in the month of May as required by the State of California. She will reach the approximately fifty businesses downtown and inspect and advise regarding smoke detectors, exits, sprinkler systems, extension cords, etc. She noted that three prong extension cords are much safer than two prong ones.

Training

Asst. Chief Marcotte continues to provide excellent trainings for the Volunteers covering topics including SCBA's, supply lines, and ladders. Wildland fire training will begin in May.

Volunteers

FF William Krakauer, FF Cole Rippe and FF Nick Ferrari will be mostly unavailable this summer as they all hold seasonal positions with either the County of Marin or the National Park Service. Chief Brown plans to hire temporary seasonal firefighters for the District as she did last summer season. She stated that fire season has been declared in other areas of California but Bolinas's fire season tends to be later in the years, usually starting around July and lasting through October. The seasonal position will be filled during that time allowing the District to staff 2 firefighters every day of the season.

Disaster Council

Chief Brown reported that Beth Carusillo continues to contact every Area Coordinator to discuss how best to ensure that each of the Neighborhood Liaisons have what they need to do their job. She is also offering to help the Area Coordinators find additional Neighborhood Liaisons if they have fewer than three in their area. Beth will start working three hours a week at the fire station to better utilize her time and resources.

Contacting downtown businesses for after-hours contact info and floor plans has been very successful. Almost every business has responded. This information is critical for emergency response during closed business hours.

Beth and Chief Brown plan to meet with the Coastal Health Alliance on April 28th to discuss the agreement between the CHA and the BFPD regarding use of the Clinic during a disaster. During the planning stages of the new firehouse and Clinic, it was always part of the understanding that the clinic would be utilized as a field hospital during a disaster. They are working to solidify this agreement with a Memorandum of Understanding between the two entities. The Point Reyes Disaster Council is working on a similar agreement with the CHA and managed to set up a meeting to discuss the issue. Chief Brown and Beth plan to attend to speak for the Bolinas Disaster Council.

General Operations/Administration

Chief Brown reported that the Personnel and Finance Committees are meeting in preparation of the FY 2015/2016 budget. The schedule is to have the proposed draft budget before the Board for approval at the May 25th meeting and adoption of the final budget at the June 22nd meeting. Chief Brown thanked all of the Board members who have been working on the two Committees. Pres. Kimball thanked Chief Brown for her great work so far with the new budget.

Chief Brown met with representatives from the Insurance Services Office on April 7th. The ISO is responsible for assigning fire classifications to every fire jurisdiction in California. The last inspection of the District happened in

1998. Since that time, both the staffing and the apparatus have improved at the District. Billy Pierce from the BCPUD attended a portion of the meeting to answer questions regarding the water district. The classifications range from 1-10 with 1 being the very best and 10 the worst. Since 1998, the rating within the water district is 4 and the rating outside of the water district is 9. Results from the current survey have not been received yet.

Surfers' Overlook Repair/Terrace Avenue
Chief Brown reported the Save Surfer's Overlook Committee, consisting of Asst. Chief Camiccia, Rudi Ferris, Remick Hart, Ken Masterton and Dick Bass, with Jennifer Blackman and Chief Brown assisting, meets every week. A large community meeting is planned for May 9th at the fire station to update everyone about the risks of not repairing the overlook, fundraising efforts and deadlines. She summarized that if \$500,000 can be raised by July 1st, the County has agreed to place the project of repairing the road level retaining walls on their fall schedule for completion. So far, \$200,000 has been pledged. Dir. Gade reiterated her concern that if Mesa Road became blocked, which happens almost annually due to falling limbs during storms, there would be no access from the fire department to the school, Horseshoe Hill or the downtown area. There would be no access to the Mesa for an ambulance and no evacuation route from the Mesa. Dir. Chiera mentioned the solution of adding another road parallel to Terrace Avenue. Chief Brown reiterated that all of the property that has been considered is privately owned. She said that the environmental impact reports and permits necessary would be incredibly time consuming and expensive. Also, the topography of the area for road construction would be very difficult for road construction. It is not an impossible task but an expensive and time consuming one that may need to be undertaken. Dir. Shaw thanked Chief Brown and the committee for all the hard work that has been done so far.

GENERAL BUSINESS

Action Item #1: Consider proposal from AT&T to modify existing cell site lease.

Chief Brown was contacted by Lisa Rambo, Lease Consultant with Md7 to discuss the lease the District holds with AT&T. The current lease terms are: \$4,513/month rent which will increase to \$4,701 in October, escalation clause of 30% every 5 years, and expiration date of October 2022. The most current proposal from Md7 entailed a \$3,200 rent beginning in September of 2015, 15% escalation clause every 5 years and an extension of the lease through 2045. Chief Brown added that Lisa mentioned Micro Cells as a potential "threat" to the District's revenue stream. The deployment of many Micro Cells could potentially decrease the demand for cell

towers resulting in their removal from District property. Ian Johnson entered the Board room at this point in the meeting and advised the Board that, in his opinion, they are not a great threat to cell tower usage. There are two different kinds of Micro Cells that can be used. The first is strictly for homeowners and connected to their home phone numbers. Their radius is small and cannot reach wide areas. The Micro Cells that can be deployed on utility poles to cover wider areas can be used but leave large areas uncovered such as the beaches and fishing vessels out at sea. They also require the use of fiber optic lines which are not present in Bolinas. In Ian's opinion, due to the topography and the rural location, Micro Cells cannot be considered an option to replace the cell towers. Chief Brown made a recommendation not to accept the proposal from AT&T via Md7.

MSC, Gade/Chiera (unan) to decline proposal from AT&T to modify existing cell site lease.

Chief Brown will write a letter to Md7 and confirm that the District will not negotiate the lease until closer to the expiration date near 2020.

She thanked Ian Johnson for his advice and for all the ways that he continues to contribute to the District. All of the Board members concurred.

CONSENT CALENDAR

MSC, Bass/Shaw (unan) to approve the Minutes from the March 23, 2015 regular meeting, the warrant lists from March 18-April 21, 2015, and the financial reports for February 2015 including the account balances.

Dir. Gade inquired about the budget report and about the financial report balance. The Board reviewed the budget report and concluded that it needs to be revisited by Kaaren Gann, the consultant bookkeeper for the District.

Sec. Brown suggested that she meet with the Finance Committee after she visits the District to make her 3rd quarter review of finances.

GOOD OF THE ORDER

Chief Brown attended the Bolinas Community Action Network (CAN) meeting organized by Evie Wilhelm at the Community Center. She remarked that she was very impressed with the younger generation of Bolinas stepping up to learn about predominant issues and recent changes regarding housing, parking, community plans, etc. Dir. Chiera also attended the meeting and found their concerns very encouraging.

ADJOURNMENT

MSC, Gade/Bass (unan) to adjourn the meeting at 8:25 PM.

Russell (Russ) Victor Faure-Brac

February 22, 1944 - May 20, 2015

Russell Victor Faure-Brac ascended his final summit on May 20, 2015. He passed at home, in peace, surrounded by loving family.

He is survived by the light of his life, beloved wife Anne Sands; the pride of his childhood, dear brother Michel Faure-Brac; and the joys of his heart, sons Joshua & Gabriel Faure-Brac.

A rare combination of positivity and practicality, Russ approached life as a High-Sierra climb, whose peak was the journey itself. His confident, hopeful, and easy-going nature, combined with his passion for environmental stewardship & working for a world without war, remain an inspiration to his many friends and cohorts in West Marin.

Born to Victor & Mollie Faure-Brac, he grew up with brothers Leslie and Michel, playing in fields that later became the Hillsdale Shopping Center in San Mateo, CA. Valedictorian of Hillsdale High Class of '61, Russ was also named MVP of the JV Basketball Team. He fondly remembered his teen years: playing mud football with Les, backpacking the Shasta-Trinity forest with friends, and strumming ukulele for the musical group The Uncalled4+1.

After receiving a Masters in Engineering Economics from Stanford University, he worked for SRI as a weapons systems analyst, applying statistical models to death tolls from the Vietnam War. In 1968, when he saw the disparate valuing of U.S. lives (\$50k) vs Vietnamese lives (\$0), he underwent a crisis of conscience and resigned in protest.

The film But, What Do We Do? documented Russ' decision to leave the defense industry, to pursue the teachings of Gandhi & MLK at Joan Baez' Institute for the Study of Nonviolence, and to participate in the Peace Games, an immersive event that explored nonviolent approaches to a hypothetical Soviet invasion of Northern California.

After spending two years as a VISTA volunteer in rural Missouri, Russ joined friend Hugh Cregg (later known as Huey Lewis) at Neil Smith's Whole Systems in Mill Valley, CA. With a truckload of color-coded burlap sacks, they began one of the nation's first curbside recycling programs.

During this time, Russ & first wife Patt Dombroski, brought two sons into the world, Josh & Gabe. Throughout his life, Russ enjoyed many excursions with the boys: climbing, kayaking, hiking & fishing in the Sierra-Nevada mountains and the Gulf of California.

Outdoor adventure - mountaineering in particular - was key to Russ' peace of mind. Having topped most of California's 14,000' peaks, his favorite by far (and spiritual outdoor home) was Mt Shasta, summiting 12 times in 21 attempts. His international expeditions included Jade Dragon Peak (China, 1986), Chanadorje (China, 1989), Aconcagua (Argentina, 1998), and Mt Pisco (Peru, 2005).

Russ also scaled his way up the ladder at EIP, an environmental planning firm in San Francisco, CA. As President & CEO, he shepherded the company through enormous growth until he retired, conflicted about his role in corporate life, at the age of 52.

In 1979, Russ met the love of his life, Anne Sands. Sitting alone in an empty conference room, he was surprised and delighted to be asked by a beautiful woman if the seat next to him was taken. From that moment on, it was.

Married in 1982, Anne and Russ shared a deep love for one another and a mutual awe for the beauty and tranquility of West Marin. First living in Mill Valley and soon settling at Woodville Ranch in Dogtown, CA, the two maintained a vibrant and doting relationship for 36 years. Though each ardently pursued their own interests - Russ with his mountaineering, Anne with her equestrian endurance rides - the two were happiest at home, sitting with one another at the breakfast table, watching their garden and horses and through the window.

Anne and Russ lived boldly together; finding courage to pursue their dreams in one another's loving arms and understanding smiles. Even when separated by thousands of miles, it was always their calls at the end of the day that brought meaning to their adventures.

Russ' greatest loss was the death of his brother and best friend, Les, in 1992. The two shared a zeal for motorcycles and a zest for laughing at life. Russ was deeply hurt by his passing and found solace in fishing trips with his youngest brother, Mike.

He also found comfort in the serene, bucolic life of West Marin: clearing trails, weeding the garden, walking the sands of Limantour Beach, eating fresh Drakes' Bay oysters and catching the sunset from the cliffs of Bolinas.

A passionate advocate for nonviolence, Russ dedicated his last decade to the cause of world peace. He vigorously researched his ideas and in 2012 published the book Transition to Peace, A Defense Engineer's Alternative to War.

Valued for his calm and pragmatic nature, Russ was a favorite among many peace groups, including MettaCenter for Nonviolence, Praxis Peace Institute, Transition West Marin & World Beyond War. A board member of KWMR, he loved hosting the Transition to Peace radio show. He also spent 10 years combing Limantour Beach as a PRNS Beachwatch Volunteer.

In 2012, Russ completed his "Peace Tour," a solo motorcycle ride across the country and back, during which he stopped for speaking engagements and to share meals with far-flung friends.

But just as his peace work was taking off, he was forced to begin the work of making peace with life. In May of 2014, Russ was diagnosed with Myelofibrosis - a very rare bone marrow cancer - complications from which led to his passing. Anne was his constant and nurturing caregiver, tending to his needs, tempering his wants and holding him firmly grounded in the love they created together.

Altruism aside, the lasting power of Russ' life is in the love he shared with Anne, the land he tended to in Dogtown, and the glint in the eyes of his boys, who today - along with the entire Bolinas community - mourn the loss of a beautiful, compassionate man.

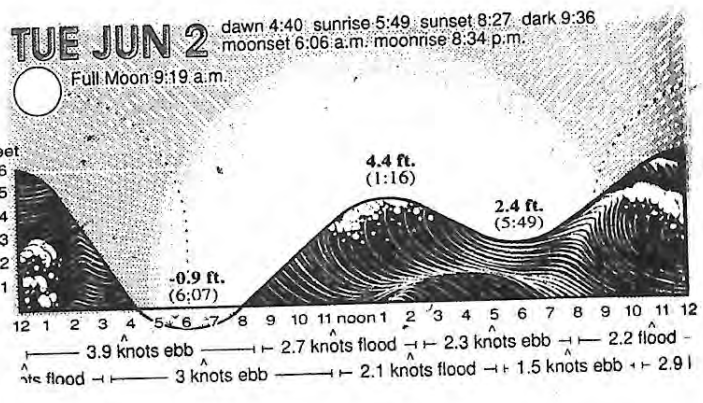
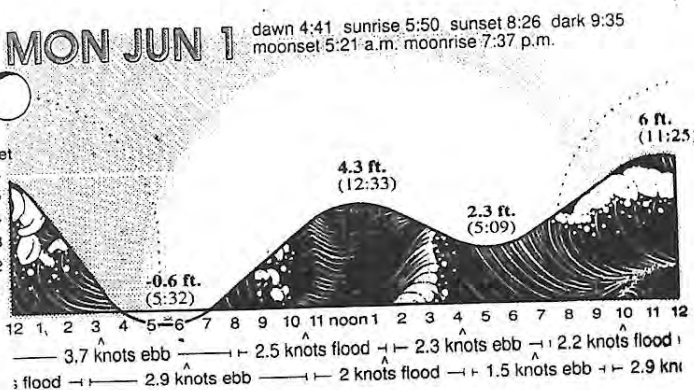

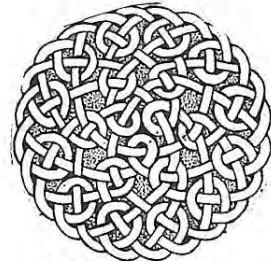
