The wry curl of his smile and his mustache.


His modest suit, well cared for and adorned.

MESA PARK BOARD MEETING May 13, 2013 7:00 PM Bolinas Firehouse

Call to Order: 7 PM

Members present: Bryan Lee, Charles Whitefield, Patricia Hickey, Jane Mickelson, Dylan Squires absent.

Others: Angela Vernon, Nate Siedman, Don Smith, Vic Amoroso, Suki Ferrari, Roger Peacock, Jenny Pfeiffer, Bruce Bowser.

Community Expression:

Don Smith speaking for BCPUD: request to store asphalt grindings on MP lot this summer: County is grinding & repaving Wharf Rd. this summer. They're also going to pave OB road along Gospel Flats and parts of Horseshoe Hill. Leveling (spot grinding) will generate about 500 yards of asphalt, useful to fix local roads: packs tight, lasts long. Before they go out to bid, Public Works wants to know where it can be stored. Cal EPA says it has to pass Environmental screening levels in a leaching test. BPUD is sending samples to lab at Berkeley. If they pass we'd like to take the grindings.
Assuming they do, we ask for permission to store them in the parking lot & BCPUD will give them away to fix local roads. [Charles] When will they start grinding? [Don] No exact date yet but projecting August. [Charles] As long as we get through the 4th of July before it arrives. We made sure last time that it had to be for roads in Bolinas. [Don] How did you monitor it? Last time much went out of district & onto private roads. [Bryan] As long as the BPUD takes responsibility for passing it out, that they oversee it. [Charles] When current project on Terrace is done we'll have a much better, parking lot. They're going to fix it up and improve the surface. Maybe we can put the grindings where the dirt is now. [Don] I"I let you know if it passes the test. Patricia moves to authorize use of the parking lot; Bryan 2nd. Aye 4:0

Land Trust event in DT park: Jane moves to allow Land Trust to use DT park for their fund raiser on May 25th; Bryan 2nd. All aye.

Nate Siedman: Anthony Stewart would like to use the DT park on June 29th from 1 - 5 PM for a nonamplified, no-food event, a reunion for former and current Bolinas residents. Would clean up after. Jane: I'll put it on the agenda for June meeting for a vote.

Bruce Bowser, Pool comm. member: presented some drawings of the site plan. I took the dimensions that had been discussed by the committee earlier. Needs to be covered; needs to take full advantage of solar sighting. We have found a pool designer. Have set up a meeting with Steve Kinsey this week to present the proposed project and see if he has ideas for possible funding. [Patricia] Now that there's Measure A funding, we need help from the county. This is about the pool but also about parks and safety. We're getting a lot of tourist use here, and have lost our funding; I'd like you to bring this aspect up with Steve as well. [Bruce] Will do. [Angela] Will there be a vote on whether or not the town wants the pool? [Don] The survey was widely responded to, and no tax money is being involved. [Bryan] I don't think you need to vote on it. It will be open to everyone and those who want it will support it. [Don] discussed

alternative ways of cleaning the water. [Patricia] It's taken 20 years to get a playable soccer field here, and we really need a second field. Whatever we can do to make this a community space for healthful activities, but we need to include it in an overall plan for the park. There will be a grants program from Measure A. We should find out who is on the granting commission.

Downtown Park:

Vote to adopt the full county ordinances for both the Downtown Park and the park adjacent to the Firehouse/Clinic: [Patricia] I move to adopt the full county ordinances for the DT park; they're the same as the ones for the tennis courts. [Roger] We need to have these in place to keep the park safe. [Patricia] We cannot be selective. It's all or nothing. [Charles] Right now we don't have any recourse. [Bryan] 2nd. All aye. [Roger] I've brought a model of the tugboat for the children's play area. It complies to ADA, about 14' long, 7' wide, will have a wheel and whistles. The design comm. is going ahead. The museum is going to have a float in the 4th parade in the form of the Owl (the old ferry) and use the play boat on the float. This will help raise awareness for funding for the play boat. There's a lot of enthusiasm for it. Installation is planned for right

after the 4th of July. We're also preparing to move on with the pavilion, to build the community cob oven, and will be holding a cob workshop while that's going on to help with the cost. The waterproofing's installed, but we need to put on the metal roof. The sidewalk part of the permit requirement is done.

Maintenance Report: [Suki] Estimate for \$2701 for the repair of the Toro mower. Want to know how to pay for

it. [Charles] We're supposed to send it in for naintenance every year and haven't been doing that. [Suki] The broken steering column is the biggest expense. It's not a cheap piece of equipment. [Charles] We voted to pay for the repairs at the special meeting last Thursday. We need to begin to stick to an annual check-up/repair. Give them a check for the repairs. [Patricia] I move to go up to \$3000 without having to vote again, if the costs go over the estimate, Bryan 2nd, all aye. [Suki] The garbage thing: the Family Fun day will generate garbage that needs to be brought up here. [Charles] The firehouse reported that the bathrooms get over-used and sometimes abused during the times when there are events at the park. They're being used every Sunday during soccer and any special events, even though there is a porta-potti available.

Irrigation Report: [Bryan] We've got the budget finalized. I'm going to meet Thursday at Civic Center, to get a planner assigned for the process, getting the permitting process started. We could possibly get water up here this fall, but spring at the latest. As soon as Jennifer tells us the grant's approved, we will order the

Treasurer's Report: [Patricia] \$6000 from the DT park account for the boat for the play area in DT Park. Angela's invoice for cleaning up the park: cleaning, reseeding, aerating, replanting things that needed it, topsoils, mulch. MP expenditures for Suki's work; United Site Services; PG&E. Can we get back renting out the parking lot for big town events when it's used? [Charles] If they want to pay the shuttle drivers, the gas, etc. anything over that we will split with the Lions. It's not a big money maker. We have to do all that to get the permit to close the streets downtown. [Patricia] Bryan &

Christine met with Roy Given at the county. I had Jack Siedman write a summary to inform him how we became an elected board and what we are as an entity and a taxing authority. He's hopeful he can find the strategy to get in compliance with that. There's a municipal review that they might be able to do in lieu of an audit, but the DT park funding may put us over the limit on that.

[Jane] We need to vote to place MP parcel tax measure on the Nov. ballot. Patricia moved; Bryan 2nd, all aye.





Go to Health: Artichokes, Asparagus and Avocados

I'm writing more this week from the wonderful book Eating on the Wild Side by Jo Robinson. I strongly suggest getting it from the library or buying a copy at the bookstore.

Although I'm not writing about lentils this week - I loved what she said about them, a most nutritious legume that cooks relatively quickly. Combined with a whole grain, lentils will give you a complete protein without the saturated fats that can be a problem for some people. Look up a recipe for Armenian Lentil Soup in her book or on the Internet - be sure to find a version that includes dried apricots and eggplant. I haven't tried it yet, but it sounds delicious and unusual.

Artichokes: This vegetable comes from the cardoon, a plant native to North Africa: it was cultivated during the Middles Ages as food and medicine. (We have a cardoon in our garden - it is beautiful in bloom, but it's not easy to prepare and eat the stems.) It is high in silymarin, a compound isolated from the milk thistle and used in alternative medicine for liver disease. An intravenous form of silymarin has been used Europe in the treatment of mushroom poisoning. According to the Mayo Clinic, milk thistle has been popular in Europe and the U.S. for various types of liver disease, but well designed human trials are lacking. Artichokes - a relative of cardoon - are a food source of silymarin and other plant nutrients. Robinson says they have the highest anti-oxidant capacity of all fruits and vegetables. They are also a source

of inulin, a fibrous substance that nourishes good gut bacteria. Buy the freshest artichokes you can find, and use them right away. Steam them stem side down for 50-60 minutes for maximum nutrient retention. Artichoke hearts in glass jars are also a very healthy choice.

Asparagus is another vegetable high in anti-oxidants. People have been gathering wild asparagus since ancient times; the wild plant is somewhat bitter, but still popular in Italy today. Like artichokes, asparagus is high in inulin, a substance that encourages the growth good gut bacteria. Buy purple asparagus if you can find it, otherwise the green kinds. White asparagus is not as good for you, as it has never seen the sun and developed chlorophyll. Keep asparagus cold, and eat it the day you get it. Steam it for 4-5 minutes, and eat it with a dressing made of equal parts of orange juice, vinegar and olive oil. Here in California the asparagus season may be over, but remember it for next year.

Avocados are native to Central America where they originated on tall trees, were half the size of an egg, and have been cultivated for 8000 years! They are an excellent source of anti-oxidants, Vitamin E, B vitamins, potassium and magnesium. The black Hass avocado is ripe when it is soft at the top but has only a little give in the middle. You can ripen them at home in a paper bag at room temperature. Adding a banana to the bag will hasten ripening. If you don't eat the whole avocado, keep the stone in and squirt it with lemon juice, then cover it to keep out the air. Here's Robinson's other way to store half-eaten avocados. Slice or chop about half an onion and put the pieces in the bottom of a small container (preferably glass).

Place the avocado half, with the pit, skin side down on the onion pieces, cover with a lid and refrigerate. Even though the cut side of the avocado is not touching the onion, the gases from the onion will prevent browning.
