WEEKLY WRAP & RECAP 6/24/13

Just returned from a full moon summer solstice camp out on the Eel River, the 17th (or so) annual soccer family and extended family (and anyone who wants to join in) trip to Trout Creek Campground. It was a relaxing, mellow, exhilarating, refreshing, convivial, funny, family time with 35 friends (really missed Dave and Evan Gleason), ranging in age from one to seventy one, and five dogs with varying degrees of manners. Four of the young adults, now 19-21, were kids in diapers when we started. There were three sets of grandparents/grandkids in the group, which means many of us were, of course, much more vigorous in the early Eel river days. The combined kindergarten and transitional kindergarten will move back to the smaller classroom, and preschool will remain where it presently is. I regret deeply that this came to us at this last meeting of the year, causing major shuffling of personnel and materials during the summer months. "Jugville / The Musical"

In its early days, Bolinas (then called Jugville) seems to have been known mainly for logging, drinking and shipwrecks. According to Jack Mason's Last Stage for Bolinas, "Oliver Allen cut six million feet of lumber at his Dogtown mill, or 20,000 feet a day. Logs were hauled to the mills by oxcart, and lumber carted to schooners at the head of the lagoon. By 1852 the lagoon had so silted in through indiscriminate logging that lumber had to be lightered to wharves in deeper water. . . . Saloons were as numerous as sawmills. Dogtown had one, so did Bolinas Point, where David Robinson and Calvin Woodbury in 1852 converted a ship's poop into a bar, ten by ten feet, with a deal table for poker. In 1853 the Point had a hotel-bar and another name: Jugville. . . . [On] June 14, 1874 the ancient English-built steamer Prince Alfred, southbound from Victoria, ran on Duxbury Reef, then slid off. Aboard, in addition to passengers, were elk and bear skins, coal, a \$10,000 organ and a Wells Fargo Shipment of \$24,000 in gold."

Even though we still have Smileys Schooner Saloon (established in 1851) and the lagoon still seems to be silting in, things have changed a bit since then (no "Jugville" on Google Maps, we don't do logging anymore, no more ships on Duxbury Reef). And so, with those "early days" now long gone, one might well ask "What WAS life like in Bolinas in the mid-1800s?"

If you want to find out, come see (and hear!) "Jugville: The Musical." Written and directed by Molly Maguire, and based on the true story of the wreck of the Prince Alfred, this homegrown musical comedy has a cast of 40, including 23 local children (all of whom have speaking parts and sing), 4 professional actors (including our own great Howard Dillon as Robert "Honest Bob" Cottingham), and music by Bill Quist and The Yellow Fever Band .

Lower Your Electric Bill

. . . by a huge amount by running energy-sucking appliances when the rates are low. Look on your bill to see if you are on the "Time-Of-Use" (TOU) metering schedule. If you can't figure it out or want to get on it, call the number on the bill. With TOU during Summer season (May-October), the rate is only 5¢/kWh in off-peak hours but a whopping 37¢ (over 7 times higher!) in peak hours, which are 1 pm to 7 pm weekdays only. You may find it only a minor inconvenience to dodge these small blocks of time to do laundry or ironing, run your space heaters or dishwasher, fill the tub if your water is electrically heated, filter your hot tub (reprogram it), or charge your Prius. You'll be amazed at how much money you'll save, while at the same time reducing the need for more nasty power plants by lowering demand in peak hours.

**PLEASE MAKE EVERY EFFORT TO
REDUCE YOUR WATER CONSUMPTION

After several years of historically low water consumption in the district, we are beginning to see water use rising to alarming levels. During the most recent quarter, consumption rose to the highest level in six years. As we enter the summer season, it is critically important that all customers use their best efforts to reduce their water use immediately.

Please, reduce or eliminate your outdoor watering as soon as possible. Please turn off automatic irrigation systems and hand water only, preferably late in the day or early evening to reduce water loss due to evaporation. Make every effort to use your household appliances such as laundry machines and dishwashers only when you have full loads. Limit the length of showers to a few minutes. Check your toilets and faucets to make sure you do not have any leaks.

Thank you in advance for your conservation efforts. After an unusually dry winter, this water-scarce community will need to do its best to conserve water now to avoid mandatory rationing later in the year. Please call 868-1224 with any questions. Thank you!
