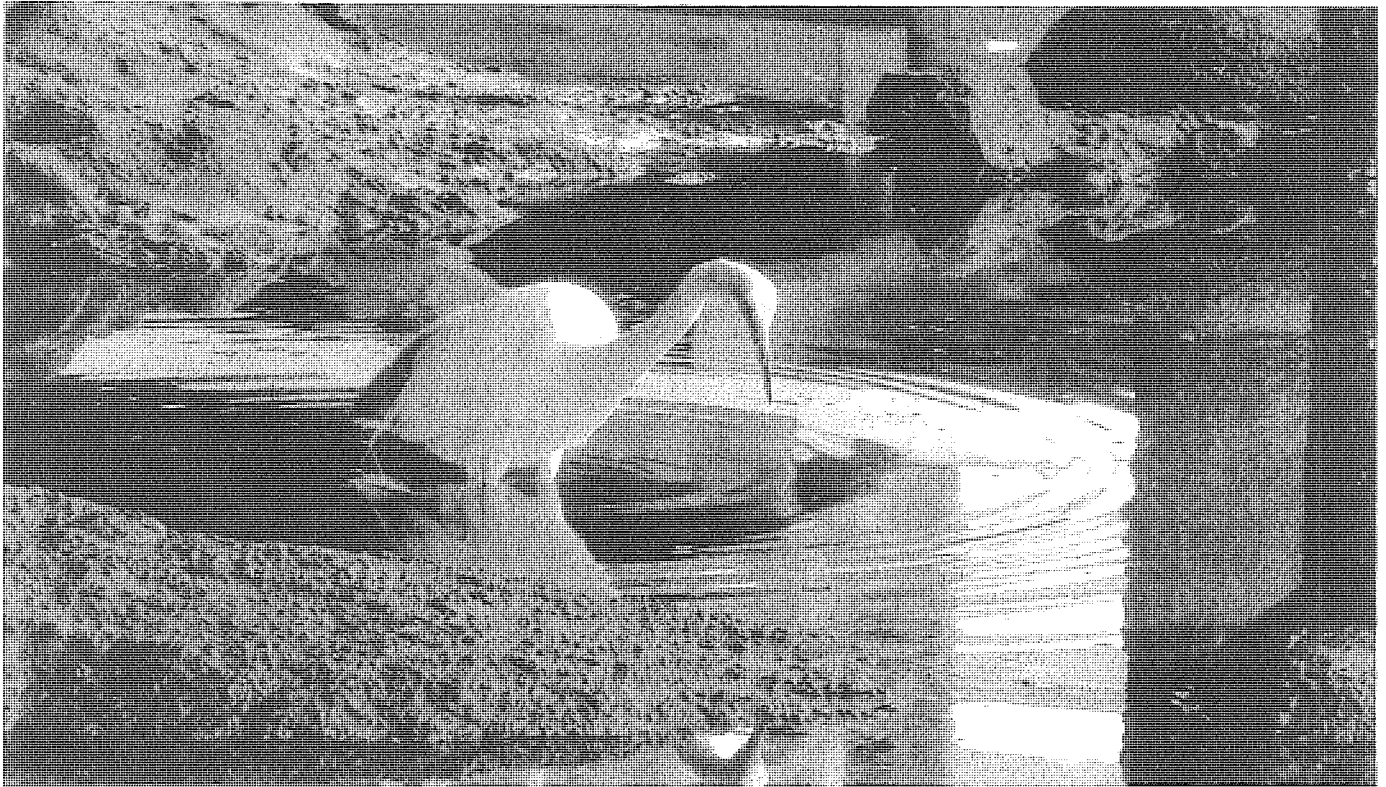

Today I went to the soccer field on Mesa Park for a tradition that has been a part of Bolinas for decades, Sunday Soccer. When I arrived with my son as I have countless times over the years I found a group of city hipsters with crowns, flags, cones, a stereo and the intention of having an organized Ultimate Frisbee practice on our community's field. We told them there was a traditional game that was going to be starting soon and there were other fields they could use on the baseball outfields or at the school but they insisted on sharing our little town's field. The fact that this game had happened every Sunday for longer than most of them had been alive did not phase their insistence that the field should be shared. They coned off half of the field and started running drills as my son and I waited for our Bolinas compatriots to come and defend our tradition. It happened to fall on the weekend of the soccer clubs annual camping trip so numbers were thin, but slowly club members began arriving and we were able to send the neon-clad invaders on their way. In our town where locals are constantly being pushed out of the places we feel at home, this was a significant event to me and I am happy to say we were able to take one small step in repelling the takeover of our town.

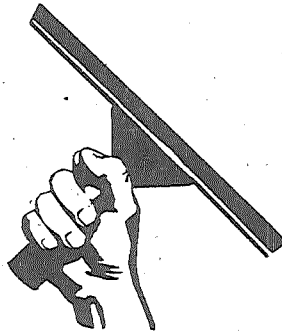

Minutes from the May 25, 2015 Bolinas Fire Protection District Board Meeting

Pres. Kimball called the regular meeting of the Bolinas Fire Protection District to order at 7:30PM. Vice Pres. Bass, Dir. Shaw, Dir. Chiera and Dir. Gade were present. Also present: Chief Brown, Secretary Brown.

MSC Bass/Chiera (unan) to approve the agenda.

CHIEF'S REPORT

MERA

Chief Brown attended the May 13th regular meeting. The agenda was full and included reports on the Next Generation Oversight Committee, the Citizen's Oversight Committee, multiple agreements for services for the new fiscal year between MERA and the County of Marin and Public Hearings on the proposed operating and capital budgets for FY15/16. Chief Brown commented that it is the intention that the next generation system will provide coverage for the "dead" spots in the County where there is no currently little or no reception.

Prevention

Chief Brown reported that a wildland fire occurred at approximately 3:00 am on May 10th, Mothers' Day, near Jack's Creek. The Bolinas firefighters were the first on scene and assumed command but the fire was on federal park land. Approximately 3.5 acres burned but it could have been more if conditions were windier and/or drier. The Volunteers hosted the annual Pancake Breakfast later that morning. Chief Brown announced that she plans to host a community meeting regarding the serious fire danger that we live with and how to best address the threat. She hopes to have a guest speaker, possibly Battalion Chief Chris Martinelli from Marin County Fire, and to offer food and drinks. She would like to schedule it in the end of June.

She also said that she has been receiving many calls from undeveloped property owners regarding the green cards sent out by Marin County Fire Department. She has been advising property owners how best to implement the State requirements. In light of the recent fire and the continued accumulation vegetation in town, Chief Brown reported that she has proposed doubling the prevention budget for FY15/16 in order to provide more services for residents. She hopes to work on opening up roads and providing Chipper Days which allows property owners to have their brush chipped at a very reduced cost if not free.

Training

Wildland training started on May 21st, with MCFD Battalion Chief Chris Martinelli presenting information on safety and fire behavior. Wildland training will continue throughout the summer.

Chief Brown taught a CPR class for a NPS crew 11 on May 21st at the station. Eleven students attended.

Volunteers

The Annual Mother's Day Pancake Breakfast, as mentioned previously, was a success. 345 meals were served. The District fed several engine crews who had responded to the fire at Jack's Creek.

Disaster Council

Chief Brown and Beth Carusillo have finalized the flyer which will be mailed to all residents regarding information about the Bolinas Disaster Council. Chief Brown said that an Area 8 Coordinator has been identified but that two other Area Coordinators are still needed, including one for the downtown area. She said that Beth's new hours working at the firehouse on Mondays for three hours have been well utilized and very productive. Beth and Chief Brown attended a meeting at the Coastal Health Alliance offices on April 28th to discuss the use of the clinic as a field hospital in the event of a disaster. Critical information was exchanged and Chief Brown is now aware of additional equipment needed for a field hospital such as a temporary tent structure and cots for potential overflow or non critical patients. Brown is waiting to hear from the CHA Executive Director as to whether or not their insurance will allow an emergency medical team to utilize the Clinic. Chief Brown spoke of the original understanding between the Fire District and the CHA when the buildings were being built. It was always intended that the clinic would be used in an emergency which is the main reason the district agreed to give the clinic space on the property.

Chief Brown taught the medical portion of a CERT class held on May 16th at the

Nicasio equipment yard. One Bolinas resident was in attendance.

Chief Brown was unable to attend the West Marin Disaster Council meeting held on May 21st. Beth was able to attend and will update Chief Brown.

Building and Grounds

Chief Brown reported that she received a surprise visit from a Cal OSHA Safety Inspector. He came to inspect the pressure vessels only, which include the air compressor and the propane tank. A small leak was found on the propane tank regulator and the stickers were too faded. McPhail responded quickly and fixed both problems.

Recently, the Clinic suffered the same heating unit failure that the firehouse did. The unit will need to be replaced but will cost the clinic more as it is positioned above a drop ceiling which will need to be dismantled in order to remove and replace the unit. The warranty on the unit was only for one year from the date of purchase which has long since expired.

General Operations/Administration

Chief Brown thanked the Personnel and Finance Committees for all their excellent work in preparation of the FY 2015/2016 budget.

Surfers' Overlook Repair/Terrace Avenue

Chief Brown reported the Save Surfer's Overlook Committee met with the community on May 9th at the fire station to update everyone about the risks of not repairing the overlook, fundraising efforts and deadlines. She summarized that if \$500,000 can be raised by July 1st, the County has agreed to place the project of repairing the road level retaining walls on their fall schedule for completion. Due to a very generous pledge of matching funds, the goal of \$500,000 was reached very shortly after the meeting. A total of over 140 people have donated to the project. An agreement between the Committee and the Bolinas Community Center must be finalized before any checks can be deposited for the project. The BCC is acting as a fiscal sponsor for the project and is only charging 3% for their service. The next step will be for the Terrace Ave Working Group to reconvene and plan a meeting with the County to discuss next steps.

COMMITTEE REPORTS

Personnel Committee

Dir. Chiera reported from recent meetings held by the Personnel Committee in preparation for the 2015/2016 fiscal year. He announced that there are several proposals regarding personnel including a 4% Cost of Living raise for all employees, an additional 2% merit raise for the District Secretary as well as 2 more additional vacation days bringing her paid vacation to a total of 6 days or 3 weeks. Dir. Chiera mentioned possible retirement benefits with Calipers for Sec. Brown. In order for her to qualify, she would have to

work at least 20/hours/week or 1,000 hours/year. The Board will continue to consider this option.

It is proposed to raise the range of pay on the firefighter's position depending on experience. The top step is proposed to be \$20/hour. The Fire Chief salary was also discussed. The Committee would like to make her salary commiserate with her duties. Dir. Chiera has done research surveying other districts and what they pay their chiefs. Dir. Bass stated she felt it is very important to have all of the information collected regarding pay comparisons kept and made available if future inquiries arise.

At this point in the meeting, Dir. Chiera requested an "Executive Closed Session" for Board members only without Chief Brown or Sec. Brown present.

Twenty minutes later, the Closed Session concluded. There were neither decisions nor announcements made.

GENERAL BUSINESS

Action Item #1: Review/approve preliminary budget for FY15/16

Chief Brown reviewed the preliminary budget compared with the prior years budget. She went through individual accounts and explained all adjustments and changes made. Recently, the Finance Committee met with Bookkeeper Kaaren Gann and changes were made to the chart of accounts to better reflect actual operating expenses. Vice Pres. Bass approved of the new arrangement of accounts. Pres. Kimball presented two cash flow projection charts dated from 2016 - 2035 titled, "Bolinas Fire Protection District - Engine Replacement Cash Flow". The charts illustrate the projected cash flow into the future of engine replacement costs with and without rental income from cell towers, whose leases expire in 2022. The cash flow in the chart without rental income from cell towers after 2022 leads to a negative balance in the Vehicle Replacement Account sooner than in the chart with the continued income from rentals of the cell towers, as would be expected.

Chief Brown warned against increasing expenses in the budget significantly without taking into consideration the potential loss of income from rentals of cell towers in 2022 when the leases expire. Other methods of raising income for the District were discussed including fundraising and raising the Fire District basic tax which has not been increased since 1990. Pres. Kimball asked Chief Brown to meet with the Finance Committee soon to fine tune the budget to maximize cash flows into the Vehicle Replacement Fund. Vice Pres. Bass thanked Pres. Kimball for all of his hard work to create the BFPD Engine Replacement Cash Flow charts. Dir. Chiera encouraged the Board to think about long term sustainability for a changing population in Bolinas and to consider the needs for housing, education and an aging population. Dir. Shaw reminded the Board that seven years have passed since the last major fundraising

efforts were made to pay for the new firehouse and clinic. She remarked that there have been many new additions to the community who might be unaware of past efforts made for supporting quality emergency response.

The Board thanked Pres. Kimball again and Chief Brown for their efforts to create the preliminary budget.

MSC, Gade/Chiera (unan) to approve the preliminary budget for FY15/16. Sec. Brown will notice the public for a preliminary budget review before the adoption of the final budget at the regular June meeting.

Discussion: AT&T commercial lease renewal

Chief Brown reviewed that Mb7, a representative of AT&T, contacted her to begin negotiations on their commercial lease with the District which expires in 2022. At the last Board meeting in April, the Board rejected the request. Lisa Rambo, a representative of Mb7, wrote back and offered to continue the conversation regarding their proposal and wanted to know how the Board would like to move forward on the issue. After some discussion, the Board concurred to continue the conversation without formally renegotiating the lease. Pres. Kimball is interested in learning how the industry will change with the development of micro cells and fiber-optics. Dir. Chiera warned against mistakenly entering any kind of formal negotiations with Mb7. Chief Brown will contact Lisa Rambo and continue the conversation.

CONSENT CALENDAR

MSC, Bass/Shaw (unan) to approve the Minutes from the April 27, 2015 regular meeting, the warrant lists from April 22 – May 18, 2015, and the financial reports for March 2015 including the account balances.

GOOD OF THE ORDER

Dir. Chiera commended Chief Brown for a fantastic job facilitating the Surfers' Overlook Community Meeting. He also thanked Capt. Pete Smith for cooking the bacon at the Mothers' Day Pancake Breakfast so soon after a major wildland fire.

Chief Brown thanked Dir. Chiera, Pam Fabry and Meg Simonds for always showing up at 6am at the station to cut fruit before the Pancake Breakfast year after year.

Sec. Brown thanked the Board and especially the Personnel Committee for their support.

ADJOURNMENT

MSC, Gade/Shaw (unan) to adjourn the meeting at 9:55 PM.

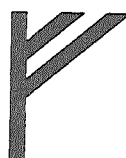
Runic New Year's Eve

This is an important day in the runic year cycle, marking
the beginning of the first rune, Feoh, sacred to Frey and
Freyja, the lord and lady worshiped in modern Wicca. It is
the half-month of wealth and success. As St. Peter's Day it
is a day of foundations. It also commemorates the Egyp-
tian astrologer and high priest of Thoth, Petosiris of
Hermopolis (c. 300 B.C.E.), whose
tomb became a place of pil-
grimage after his death and
