


THREE GREAT THINGS ABOUT THIS PLACE...

All we ask is 1.5 to 2.5 hours of your time.



President's Report: Tabled

Meeting chaired by Kate and Randi. April minutes and May agenda approved

Old business: Update on status of meeting with BCLT & BCC with neighbor. No date set yet. Chips will be delivered and spread before Memorial Day. Update on researching parcel tax, Kate has not heard back from Rodini's office. Mark spoke with the county and believes another entity needs to sponsor the BCC for a parcel tax. Randi will follow up with county.

Manager's Report: Labor day committee meeting set for June 11 5:30 in the BCC office. Review of Art, Garden & Food Festival financials. The food and auction exceeded years past, bar and baked goods did less. Attendance was down, shuttle not used and was a deficit due to paying for van, gas and parking attendants. Shut it down half way through the day. Lack of attendance attributed to weather and other events in west Marin. The current rewriting of the old BCC information pamphlet was discussed, this will be available at all events, and can be used by the event managers to educate event attendees on the goals and purposes of the BCC. It will also be included in next fundraising letter. Decision was made to not have a membership table at the Memorial Day BBQ. Will continue to have at Winter Faire, Labor Day and Art, Garden & Food Festival. General discussion about upcoming Memorial Day event.

Treasurer's Report: (Presented by Alex Bleeker in Susan's absence) BCC operating at a deficit. Due to the fact bookkeeper's reports did not have most current Art, Garden & Food Festival numbers it was concluded the deficit was \$2,000 less than reports reflected. Also discussed the fact that BCC

historically tends to run at a budget deficit until after the Labor Day fundraiser. This is a budget deficit only, the BCC has funds.

Director's Report: Discussion of the 3 owned properties by the BCC and what to do with them. They generate no income and the BCC pays property taxes. Randi will contact county and get more information and also need to access value. Randi will also research how to modify bylaws in order to facilitate sale of property which currently needs the approval of majority of membership. Prior to current staff employment a mailing was generated to achieve a majority vote to sell properties but was not monitored and was unsuccessful. Director worked with Annie Densmore to create and submit a grant request proposal as the fiscal sponsor to the WMF for Annie's musical project. The annual \$3,000 grant from the county for Village and Beach cleanup was denied for the first time in 8 years but the supervisor is attempting to grant a larger amount to the BCC in the next fiscal year for outstanding projects and general fund support.

Do Not Open or Crush Tablets or Capsules Without Checking with Your Doctor or Pharmacist!

Information in this column comes from Public Citizen's newsletter: Worst Pills, Best Pills News. Some patients find it difficult or impossible to swallow large tablets or capsules. This is especially true of the elderly, people with Parkinson's disease or dementia, and young children. To cope with this problem, patients may crush or chew tablets, or open capsules and sprinkle the resulting powder or fragments onto food or into liquids. A review article from Prescrire International in 2014 warned that for many medicines this may have very serious results. Drug companies combine their medicines so that they will be released at a specific rate and in specific locations in the digestive tract, such as the stomach or small intestines. Crushing, opening or chewing the medication can result in overdosing, underdosing or direct toxic injury to the lining of the mouth, stomach, or intestines. Drugs that have a low margin of safety for overdosing include digoxin (Lanoxin) and blood thinners. Serious injuries including death can occur with tampering with these drugs. A drug such as Prilosec, frequently given for gastroesophageal reflux (so called heartburn) and/or ulcers can be made ineffective by crushing or chewing the tablet, allowing the stomach acid to inactivate the Prilosec and rendering the drug ineffective. Prilosec and related drugs are available over the counter. The label advises consumers to swallow the medicine whole. Many people ignore these warnings. Do not be one of them! You should never crush a tablet, open a capsule or chew one without checking first with the prescribing health care provider or the dispensing pharmacist. There may be a smaller tablet or capsule of the same drug, or another drug that you can swallow, or that can be safely crushed or opened before ingesting. 




