WHAT HAPPENED

7-16-18 Monday Morning Recap
Week in Review from Jennie Pfeiffer

WHAT HAPPENED, was a week that had some great news, along with at least some improved news for children of the world. The improved news, is that family reunification has started at our southern border entry points. Looks like all of the outrage over children being taken from their parents and placed in kennel cages has forced a change in Trump's policy regarding immigrant families seeking asylum. This administration must now comply with the court order requiring all children be returned to their families. The bad news is that there was no adequate chronicling of children and parents, so getting them back together is proving difficult, in some cases impossible. This is truly outrageous and the response has been an outcry reverberating around the world. It is the most egregious of so many examples of lack of compassion exhibited by this bogus POTUS, and the outpouring of hundreds of thousands of demonstrators this week in London and Scotland while Trump was abroad, was truly remarkable. This bigoted, homophobic power monger must be held accountable for crimes against children and their families! Continue to protest!

The truly great news for children is that the last of the young soccer players, trapped with their coach in that flooded cave in Thailand, were rescued safely -- such a very happy outcome, literally, as the final child and the coach were guided out to medical care. What an ordeal with a miraculous conclusion.

On the larger soccer stage, it was a week that brought to a close this year's World Cup Futbol Championship games, with France victorious over Croatia, in a game that was more exciting than it's 4 to 2 score might suggest. In my opinion, France had the more elegant play while Croatia was the scrappier, harder working team, with some bad luck calls against them. But that said, all the players were stellar, in it 100% for the 90 minutes start to finish. That is all the more impressive to me as I worked to catch my breath after a jog down the pitch and back in our Sunday game yesterday, after having watched the world's best play the past several weeks. After our game yesterday, several of us recapped the various games with a light, delightful supper at *THE SIREN* at the lifeguard tower on Stinson Beach, watching the last of the sunny afternoon beachgoers. I recommend it - good food, affordable prices, lovely view.

Also, good food for an affordable cost, was the Spaghetti Bingo Dinner at the Community Center Saturday night. It was a fundraiser for the Bolinas Children's Center preschool, and the tiny hosts did an excellent job of showing us how to have an exuberant good time. It was an especially welcome dining out for us as our refrigerator went out again and meal prep is no picnic, or actually is more of a picnic than we want to keep enjoying. Here's what I have found out about fridge repair: Dave Brash in Inverness does appliance repair, 415-669-7499, but not refrigerators, but he did recommend Dillon Sheppard of Forest Knolls, 415-497-7241, who will be coming this afternoon. I will report on how that goes.

Though the school is on summer break, the Staff Housing Committee continues to work on finding affordable residences for the hard-working community members that provide for our District children. We are putting out the word for leases or purchase arrangements available. A quick answer to Michael Rafferty's good suggestion for use of the cabin at Stinson Campus is that it is much tinier than he might remember when he was younger and the cabin might have seemed larger, which frequently happens. Staff members' families blossom. More space and privacy is

Thoughts on the BCLT

The quantity of writing in *The Bolinas Hearsay News* on behalf of the Land Trust as well as the widespread opposition to their policies is amazing.

I know of no Land Trust up and down the Coast that has become so community-divisive as the BCLT. This divisiveness seems to have started when the organization became headed by a developer.

As I look at the listing of Board members I see few names of people who were here in the late 60's and 1970's when the Bolinas Community Plan and Bolinas Gridded Mesa Plan were debated and adopted. Both of these plans spend a significant amount of wording on limiting growth and using second units for lower cost housing, rather than new home construction. I urge every Board member to familiarize themselves with both of these plans. That should be a prerequisite for Board membership. Links follow:

Brighton Parking Issue Summary

Problems

- Many formerly housed residents must live in their vehicles because the Bolinas property they rented has been upscaled, sold, or converted to an AirBnB.
- Significant increase in new arrivals to town camping on Brighton Avenue for weekends or months in RVs or trailers.
- Reports of noise, trash, theft, drug-dealing, verbal abuse, and space taken by some campers.
- Prohibiting overnight parking on Brighton would further squeeze resident parking while moving campers to Wharf Road and obstructing fire access there.

Solutions

- Sheriff's Department has committed to increasing enforcement of existing parking regulations, and urges us to promptly report illegal activities so they can respond.
- Enact new parking regulations if favored by the community in an advisory poll consisting of two possibilities that are the result of extensive discussions between BCPUD, Supervisor Rodoni, and County Staff*. These would prohibit overnight parking downtown except for:

A. "... vehicles displaying a resident parking permit"

Pros: consensus preference of BCPUD Board; limits overnight parking to verified residents & guests; accommodates nonresident patrons of public venues until 2 am.

Cons: administrative burden of permit control and patrols, legal difficulty of banning camping by visitors but not by displaced residents; many years (if ever) to resolve above cons and to get Coastal Commission approval.

or B. "... automobiles, motorcycles and pickups, between the hours of 11:00 p.m. and 5:00 a.m."

Pros: can be enacted quickly using County's "enabling" ordinance 3662; eliminates RVs and trailers from downtown; easy to enforce, so more likely to be enforced regularly.

Cons: does not remove visitors camping in smaller vehicles; further marginalizes town's displaced residents.

Because of time constraints, this summary has not been reviewed by the other BCPUD Board members and is my own view of the situation.

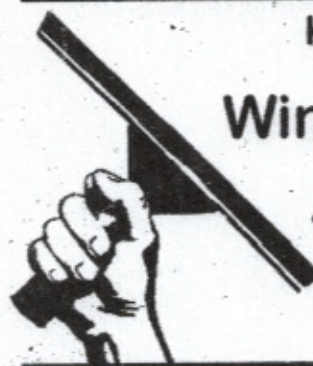

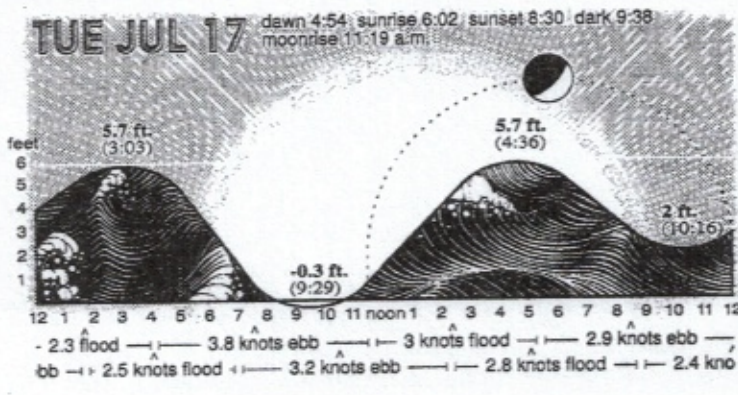
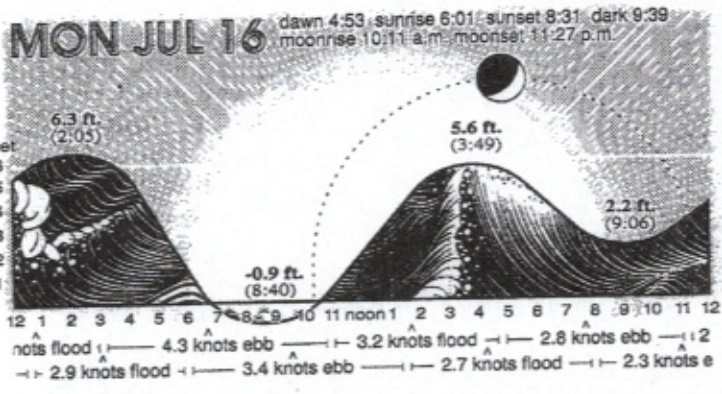
