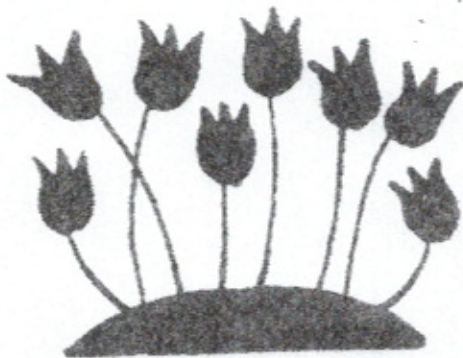

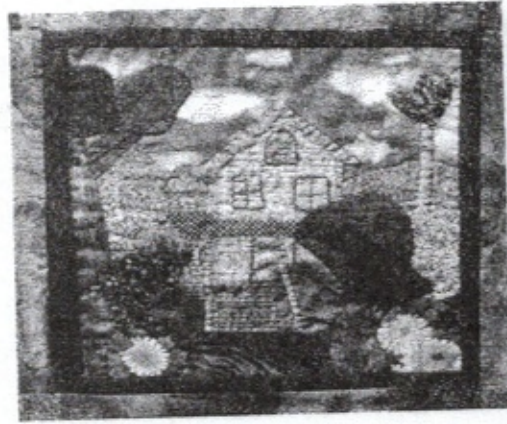

Nature Notebook By Loretta Farley

A double delight awaits on July 27, with a full moon and the planet Mars in opposition—a fiery dot visible in the southeast about 15 minutes after the 8:27 p.m. sunset.

In the warmer waters of Tomales Bay, moon jellies are washing up on beaches. The clear bodies have a pattern of four white half moons in the center. As surface dwellers, they are more susceptible to temperature changes, and seasonal die-offs occur after spells of hot weather.

California bay trees are producing nuts that are now yellow-green. The nuts will ripen by early September and become eggplant purple. Peeling off the outer layer reveals a thin-shelled, edible nut. News from the park includes the closure of the lighthouse and stairs, tentatively scheduled for July 23, while the 1,032 cut pieces of glass making up the Fresnel lens will be carefully disassembled, cleaned and thus restored to their 19th-century Parisian glory. The visitor center will remain open.

This is the second camp trip for some of us this year, the first one was on the Solstice, but was in the middle of the World Cup so the draw was small, only a few of us longtime stalwarts enjoyed a quiet retreat, in between trips to the closest pub to catch a game or two. This weekend was quite the opposite, with long-timers now joined by our children and their children, and delightful chaos reigned. There were two proposals, one more in line with the County's version, one geared more to the needs of our community. There has been a second suggestion that we use the caretaker cabin at the Stinson Campus site, which of course could happen were we to have singles in need, but we do not. As with all Bolinas struggling working families, the greatest need is for housing that can accommodate parents with children. The Stinson cabin is very tiny and has been reconfigured for teaching use with the kitchen removed, smart boards and equipment installed, and the door opening onto the expanded preschool playground. It could be returned to residence, but we have other needs at this time. Think families. Thanks for the input and lets keep those ideas coming. ✓

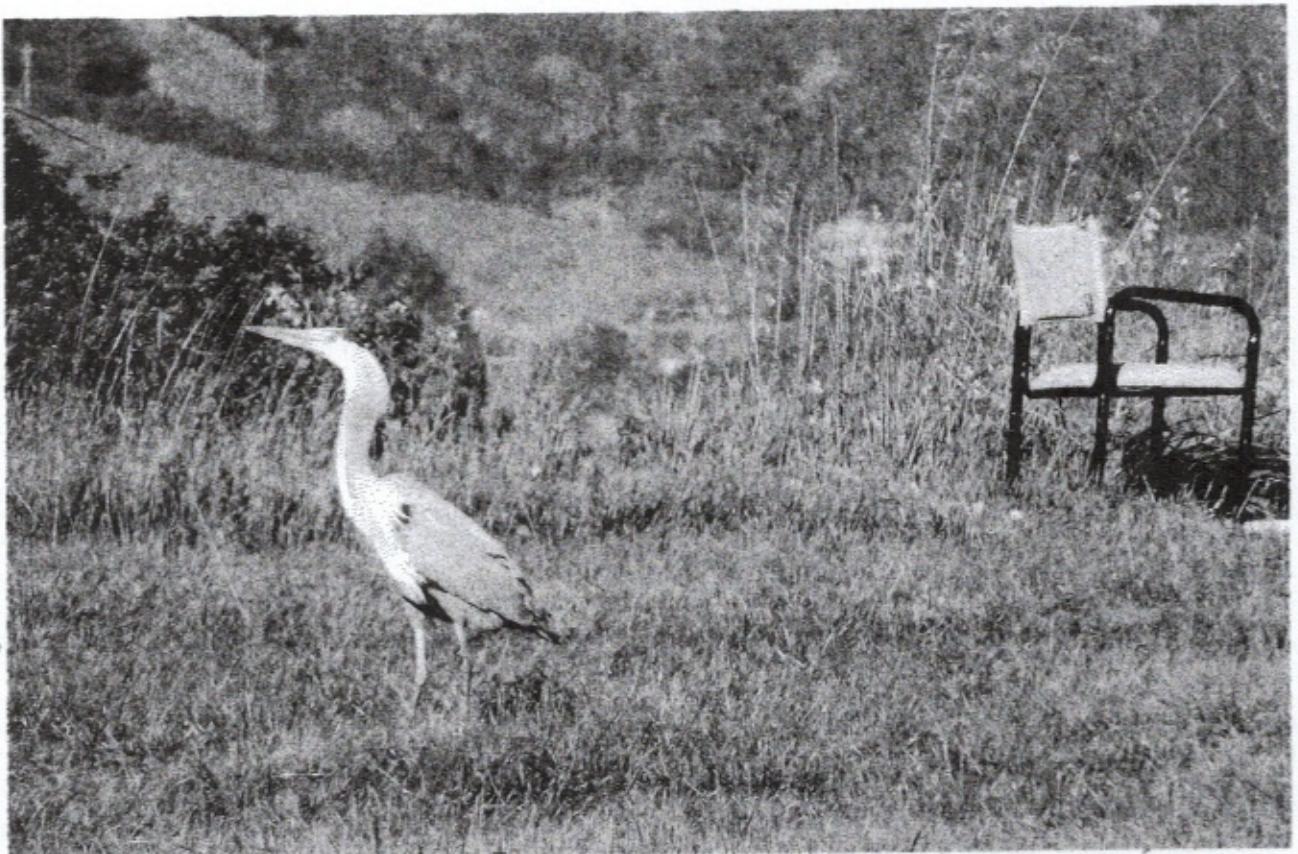

Supervisors prepare to put TOT on ballot

The Board of Supervisors on Tuesday decided unanimously to press ahead with the transient occupancy tax increase for West Marin, preliminarily approving an ordinance that puts the issue on the November ballot.

The original proposal, brought by District Four Supervisor Dennis Rodoni in January, outlined a 50 percent increase in the tax that short-term renters pay to the county, from the current 10 percent to 15 percent.

The revised proposal would charge 14 percent, following updated economic projections that maintain that the revised rate will still generate up to \$1.3 million per year.

The board's final reading of the ordinance is scheduled for July 31—the last step before the matter comes down to a vote in November by the residents of West Marin.

The funds generated by the tax increase would be

split equally between affordable housing and emergency services to benefit the coastal areas of the county exclusively. Because the monies are earmarked for specific purposes, the measure requires a two-thirds majority to pass.

When Supervisor Rodoni introduced the proposal, he said the most urgent concerns expressed by his constituents were the availability of affordable housing and the diminishing resources provided to emergency services, both a testament to the "hollowing out" of coastal communities.

For the first time since unveiling the proposal, on Tuesday Supervisor Rodoni had real numbers to back up his assertion that businesses will not be severely impacted by the tax increase.

A report released by the Marin Economic Forum this month stated that the hike is "unlikely to reduce hotel demand significantly." Yet it also acknowledged some impacts to hoteliers and made a few recommendations to monitor impacts.

Per those suggestions, Supervisor Rodoni has committed to forming a working group of hoteliers to discuss les-

sons, concerns and gains from the tax increase and, if there are problems, to raising funds to conduct marketing—which was something the report characterized as "critical" to keeping the county competitive and maintaining the same level of overnight visitors.

Yet the public speakers at Tuesday's hearing largely remained divided, with emergency personnel and local affordable housing advocates voicing strong support for the proposal and the owners of longstanding bed and breakfasts and hotels criticizing their supervisor for not protecting their businesses.

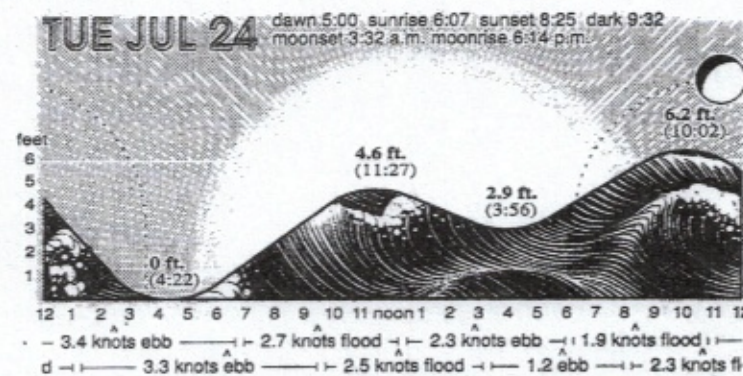
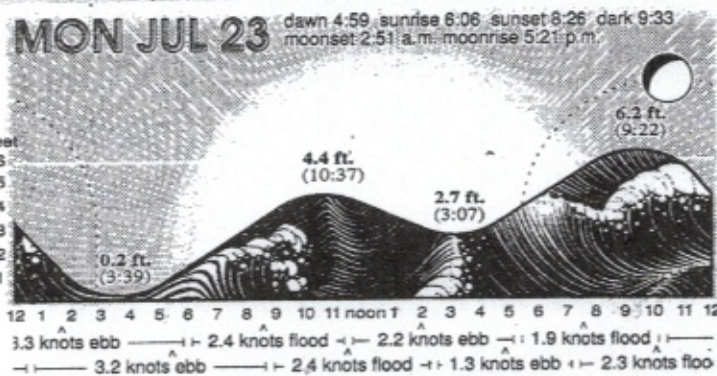
West Marin waste hauler launching audit prompted by reports of mixing

Is the truck that picks up your garbage combining trash and recyclables? The San Francisco company Recology, which in December launched a new Sonoma-Marin branch and began servicing much of West Marin, has just embarked on a two-month auditing process to analyze inefficiencies that may be encouraging drivers to toss the contents of different bins into a single compartment. Numerous residents have reported this practice, which the previous company that served West Marin, Redwood Empire Disposal, also was criticized for. The general manager of Recology's Sonoma-Marin branch, Fred Stemmler, said he encourages residents to call the customer service hotline if they witness combining—a practice Recology does not condone. So why does it happen? Only smaller trucks can navigate the more difficult terrain of many local roads, and those vehicles are outfitted with just one compartment, requiring drivers to make two trips. "We think that sometimes, if there are too many stops on a single route, drivers can't complete the day," Mr. Stemmler said. "Auditors will ride along with drivers over the course of the next few months, analyzing how to make the trips more efficient and the work more equitable." Mr. Stemmler said his office had already put in a request for five more trucks, either new ones or transfers from other locations, for the Marin-Sonoma service area. For the residences that are the most difficult to reach, some possible alternative measures following the audits may include requiring people to take their own garbage to the nearest more accessible locations—such as a nearby intersection—or Recology modifying the truck equipment it uses. This would be required for less than 1 percent of customers, Mr. Stemmler estimated. Per Recology's contract with the county, any changes to existing routes, collection days or times requires prior written approval by the county as well as two-week notice to customers.
