To the Bolinas Community:

As many of you know, the BCPUD received a grant from CalFIRE to fund the removal of hazardous vegetation from the eucalyptus grove on the BCPUD's property above the Resource Recovery Center. As part of the project, a herd of goats will be in the project site beginning July 9th to graze out poison oak and other ground-level underbrush prior to work crews arriving in August. The herd of goats will be on site for the next 14 days and a shepherd will be on site (with a trailer) as well, 24/7 during that timeframe. Please note that the temporary fencing surrounding the work area is electrified. Please feel free to say hello to the goats, but do not feed them and please, do not touch the fence!

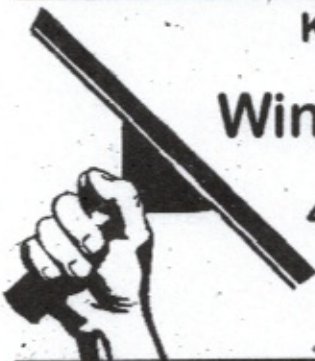

Minutes from the May 28th, 2018, Bolinas Fire Protection District Board Meeting

Pres. Kimball called the regular meeting of the Bolinas Fire Protection District to order at 7:10PM (late start due to technical difficulties with recorder). Vice Pres. Chiera, Dir. Gade and Dir. Martinelli (7:30) were present. Dir. Shaw was absent. Also present: Chief Brown, Administrative Assistant Cadance Lynam, and Captain Krakauer.

MSC Gade/Chiera (unan.) to approve the agenda.

CHIEF'S REPORT

MERA

Chief Brown attended the April 25th regular meeting. Agencies were given the opportunity to order replacement radios early; Bolinas placed an order for two portables. The promotion for the Low - Income Senior Homeowner Exemption continues. Staff is working on preparations for the upcoming CEQA process and schedule. The deployment timing of the system relies heavily on this process.

Prevention

We held our second Community Wildfire Planning meeting on **Sunday, May 6th, 2018** **1:00 - 2:30PM**. Approximately 25 members of the public attended. Speakers included BC Martinelli, MCFD, Lt. Jim Hickey, MCSO, Supervisor Dennis Rodoni, Disaster Council Coordinator Nolan Godfrey, FF Clint St. Martin and Chief Brown. We are hoping the residents who attended will help share the information provided. Unfortunately, it was thought of after the fact to record the meeting and make it available on our website. We intend on doing this at the next opportunity, likely next spring.

Grants

The grant application submitted to the CPUC by Inyo Networks, Inc for funding of the Bolinas Gigabit Network was approved.

Training

In the past month training has focused on Rescue Operations and Ropes, Forcible Entry, hose

evolutions and EMT policy updates. Thank you to Assistant Chief Marcotte and Capt. Krakauer for organizing and providing the training.

Volunteers

The Annual Mothers Day Pancake Breakfast held on May 13th from 8:00 am to 11:00 am was another large success. Thank you to everyone who volunteered their time to the event including all of the volunteer firefighters, Disaster Council folks and our Directors Shaw and Chiera. We served 310 people and raised approximately \$2,000 for the Volunteer Firefighter Association and the Bolinas Disaster Council.

Apparatus

The 219 Replacement Group continues to work to narrow down costs for the replacement of U219. The cost to replace the unit has been included in the FY 18 - 19 draft budget and is a not-to-exceed amount of \$50,000. Once the order is placed for the unit, it is expected to take approximately two months to complete the work. E265 went to Diego in San Rafael for its annual safety inspection. The engine is in good shape though they noted it would need new front tires soon. The money to replace the tires has been proposed in the FY18 - 19 Draft Budget.

Disaster Council

Media Leones, a long time resident in Bolinas, has volunteered to be the Area Coordinator for Area 9, Horseshoe Hill Rd. Disaster Council Coordinator Nolan Godfrey and Chief Brown met with her on the 17th to review her job description. They will be searching for Neighborhood Liaisons in the area to assist her in an emergency. We are very grateful Media is willing to help out. DCC Godfrey spent a great deal of time prior to our Community Wildfire Planning meeting editing and printing our new Disaster Plan Worksheet. Work is being done to find the best way to provide this to all community members, possibly a bulk mailing as well as making them available at various spots around town. Todd Lando, FireSafe Marin, who originally designed the Living With Fire in Bolinas brochure in 2015, is working with Chief Brown to update the document. To update, print and mail approximately 1,500 copies will cost around \$8,000. These funds are already budgeted and available in this year's prevention budget. We expect to mail the brochure out by the end of June.

The small brochure detailing our Disaster Council Area Coordinators and the Disaster Council Area Map has been fully updated. We will also make this document available to residents and visitors at various spots around town.

Dir. Gade mentioned it would be a good idea to have an evacuation drill to get people involved rather than just reading the information. After more discussion it was agreed Chief Brown and DCC Godfrey would work on planning an evacuation drill. Dir. Gade offered her help as well.

On May 8th, Dir. Kimball, Dir. Shaw, and Chief Brown met with Steven Siegel from the Bolinas

Health Center to discuss disaster preparedness. Issues discussed included stocking emergency supplies for clinic use during a surge of patients, possibly in a small shed in the back yard, the clinics existing Emergency Operating Plan and finalizing the agreement between the Fire District and the Clinic which outlines each organizations roles and the use of the premises during an emergency.

General Operations/Administration

Chief Brown continues to participate in the TOT2 Advisory Committee. She attended the last meetings on May 4th and May 18th.

Our auditing firm, Doran and Associates, provided us with an engagement letter. The proposed cost for the upcoming audit is \$9,575, an increase over the last year of approximately \$300.

Chief Brown attended a County Code Enforcement Hearing regarding 175 Poplar on May 9th. She was asked to speak about her findings during an inspection held in June 2017. The property is violating various Marin County and State and local fire codes by having unpermitted structures, habitation and debris on an undeveloped site.

GENERAL BUSINESS

Action Item #1- Request From AT&T to Modify Communications Tower – Remove and Replace Nine Existing Panel Antenna's, Remove and Replace Six Existing Remote Radio Units, Installation of Nine New Remote Radio Units.

Referring to the memo provided, Chief Brown reviewed the request received from AT&T in April to modify their communications tower. The request was too late for discussion at the April meeting and at that time, an EME Exposure report detailing the emissions from the proposed equipment was not provided. Chief Brown spoke at length with the AT&T representative about the lease amendment put in place in 2011 requiring AT&T to operate their site within 10% of the established baseline RF levels. On May 21st, an emissions report was provided to the District indicating, through computer simulation, the proposed modifications would raise the Max RF Exposure Level to 18.4% of the FCC allowable limit. Dir. Kimball expressed his desire for the District to work with AT&T in a manner that allows both AT&T and the District to understand the amendment and to operate within its parameters as we have an obligation to the community to honor the amendment. The Board was in agreement.

MSC- Chiera/Martinelli (unan.) to table the request from AT&T to modify their communications tower and to have Chief Brown and Dir. Kimball continue to work with AT&T

Action Item #2 – Approval of Draft Budget FYE 2018-2019

The Personnel and Finance and Budget Committees have been meeting to discuss and draft the proposed Budget FYE 6-30-19. Chief Brown reviewed the proposed draft budget, noting any recommendations that pose significant changes from the prior fiscal year. Specifically, there will be an increase in rental income due to the anticipated 5-year rental increase from AT&T, a recommended 3% Cost of Living increase for employees, an increase in the Firefighter and Training line items due to the changing of staffing and training of the new Chief, a one-time increase for new tires for

E265, an increase in the funds reserved for building maintenance, and a one-time line item to purchase a new U219 which the District has been reserving funds for, for the past 15 years.

MSC- Chiera/Gade (unan.) to approve the proposed Draft Budget for FY18/19 without changes.

Action Item #3 – Request from Marin County Supervisor Dennis Rodoni for Letter of Support for Proposed Increase to the Transient Occupancy Tax.

MSC-Chiera/Martinelli (unan.) to send a letter of support for Sup. Rodoni's proposed ballot to raise the Transient Occupancy Tax in the West Marin area from 10% to 15%.

Action Item #4 – Request from Chief Brown for Funds in the Amount of \$1,700 to Purchase Camper Shell for U231.

As the process for replacing U219 moves forward, it has been determined that U219 will be out of service for approximately 2 months while the change over takes place. During that time, U231 will take U219's place. A great deal of equipment will be carried on U231 which is an open pick-up bed. As a means to secure all of the equipment, the Operations Working Group has determined that a camper shell on U231 would best serve that purpose. After a great deal of research, the group is requesting funds in the amount of \$1,700 to purchase a new camper shell for U231.

COMMITTEE REPORTS

Updates from Finance and Budget, Personnel, Building and Grounds and Operational Working Group.

Finance Committee –The Finance Committee has been working on the proposed Draft Budget for FY18/19.

Personnel Committee – The Personnel Committee has been meeting to discuss personnel issues as they relate to the budget.

Buildings and Grounds – No recent meetings. There have been several equipment failures at the station recently including a heating and ventilation unit and the station compressor.

Operations Working Group – Continue to work on the replacement of U219. The replacement cost is recommended to be included in the FY 18/19 Budget.

GOOD OF THE ORDER

All of the Directors expressed their appreciation for everyone that helped with the Mother's Day Breakfast. President Kimball also expressed his appreciation for Claire Molesworth coming to the meeting and taking an interest in becoming a Board member.

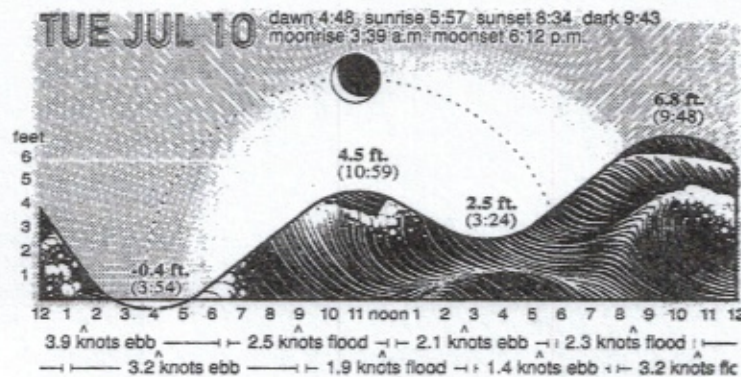
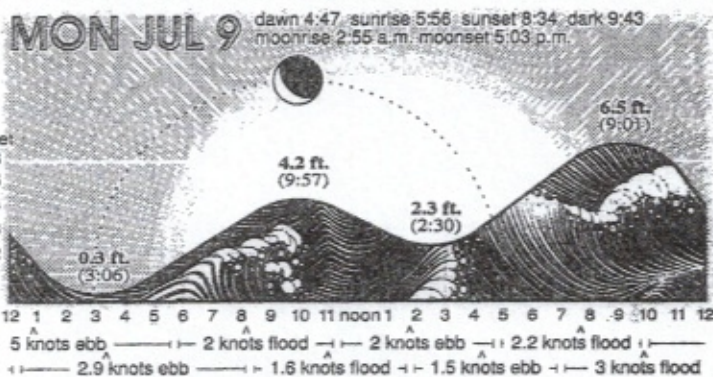

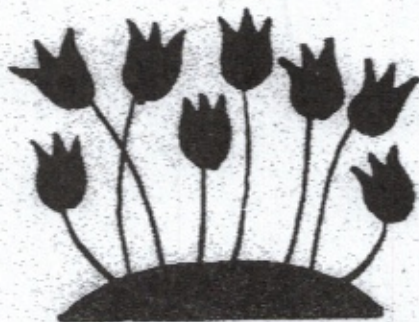
