A New Contraceptive and HarvestPlus

The U.S. Food and Drug Administration has approved a new contraceptive for women developed by the Population Council. Annovera; (segesterone acetate and ethinyl estradiol vaginal system) is a combined hormonal contraceptive for women of reproductive age and is the first vaginal ring contraceptive that can be used for an entire year. It is a reusable donut-shaped (ring), non-biodegradable, flexible vaginal system that is placed in the vagina for three weeks followed by one week out of the vagina, at which time women may experience a period (a withdrawal bleed). This schedule is repeated every four weeks for one year (thirteen 28-day menstrual cycles). It is not felt during sex. It does not prevent sexually transmitted diseases. Annovera is washed and stored in a compact case for the seven days not in use. It does not require refrigeration prior to dispensing and can withstand storage temperatures up to 30°C (86°F). This new contraceptive is considered suitable for women who do not always remember to take the pill regularly, or who used the previously available contraceptive ring that had to be replaced every month. Women in developing countries may find this method convenient, as they are often unable to find other contraceptives on a regular basis. The Population Council plans to make it available in Latin America, Asia and Africa as well as in the US. It will be released in 2019.

The efficacy and safety of Annovera were studied in three, open label clinical trials with healthy women ranging from 18 to 40 years of age. Based on the results, about two to four women out of 100 women may get pregnant during the first year they use Annovera.

All hormonal contraception carries serious risks. Annovera carries a boxed warning relating to cigarette smoking and serious cardiovascular events. Women over 35 who smoke should not use Annovera. Cigarette smoking increases the risk of serious cardiovascular events from combination hormonal contraceptive use.

HarvestPlus is an international organization that uses 'biofortification' to make plants more nutritious. Its work is in Asia, Africa and Latin America. It uses conventional plant breeding rather than genetic modification, and focuses on three crucial micronutrients that are most limited in the diets of the poor—vitamin A, zinc, and iron, breeding these into key staple crops. Harvest Plus screens thousands of different types of crop seeds stored in seed banks that have naturally higher amounts of iron, zinc, and vitamin A. They use these more nutritious seeds to breed new crop varieties with higher micronutrient content that are also high yielding and have other traits farmers want. Together with farmers, they test these new varieties in the target region. The national government then officially releases the best-performing varieties of micronutrient-rich crops for farming communities to grow, eat, and sell in local markets.

Iron deficiency during childhood and adolescence impairs mental development and learning capacity. In adults, it reduces the ability to do physical labor. Severe anemia increases the risk of women dying in childbirth. Five hundred million women aged 15 to 49, at the peak of their productive years, are anemic due to iron deficiency. This condition reduces their productivity, decreases their economic potential, and affects their reproductive health outcomes.

Zinc is involved in more body functions than any other mineral. Its role includes acting as a necessary component of more than 200 enzyme systems, normal growth and development, the maintenance of body tissues, sexual function, vision, and the immune system. Zinc is essential for survival, and zinc deficiency has serious consequences for health, particularly during childhood when zinc requirements are increased. In addition, zinc deficiency also causes stunting. Randomized controlled trials showed that zinc supplementation can reduce the severity of morbidity from a number of common childhood infections, including diarrhea,

pneumonia, and possibly malaria, by one-third.

Vitamin A is essential for good vision and cell differentiation. Deficiency results in growth retardation, damage to mucous membrane tracts, reproductive disorders, eye damage—and ultimately blindness. Children with vitamin A deficiency are often deficient in multiple micronutrients and are likely to be anemic, have impaired growth, and be at increased risk of severe morbidity from common childhood infections such as diarrheal diseases and measles. Pregnant women with vitamin A deficiency may be at increased risk of mortality.

Today, biofortified crops, including vitamin A orange sweet potato, iron beans, iron pearl millet, vitamin A yellow cassava, vitamin A orange maize, zinc rice, and zinc wheat, have been grown in more than 40 countries in Asia, Africa and Latin America. Crop improvement continues to develop varieties with higher levels of vitamins and minerals that are adapted to a wide range of agro-ecological conditions, and ensuring that the best germplasm for climate-adaptive and consumer-preferred traits continues to be used in breeding biofortified crops.

The take home message from this column is: despite the suffering in our world due to climate change and political chaos, efforts to improve situations of poverty are underway. As far as iron, zinc and Vitamin A are concerned – do not start to take these micronutrients as supplements, get them from your healthy diet and possibly a multi vitamin pill – not more! Talk to your health-care provider.

Prolific Berkeley poet Tom Clark fatally struck by car during walk

Berkeley poet Tom Clark drew some of his inspiration from long nighttime walks through his beloved town.

"Time's winged chariot," he once wrote, "is double parked near the eternity frontier."

On Friday night, Clark, 77, was walking in Berkeley near the Alameda and Marin Avenue when he was struck by a hatchback sedan. He died four hours later at Highland Hospital in Oakland.

Police said Clark had been crossing the Alameda westbound near Marin Avenue when he was struck by a southbound motorist. He was conscious and talking when he was taken to a local hospital with head and arm injuries, "but his condition worsened and he passed away," said Officer Byron White of the Berkeley police.

"The driver is cooperating, and early indications are that alcohol or drugs were not involved," White added.

Clark was a prolific writer, the author of poetry books, novels, plays, theater reviews and sports journalism. He wrote biographies of baseball players and poems about the national pastime, which he became passionate about as a young boy when he attended Chicago White Sox games with his father.

A baseball fan, he said, "suddenly emerges through a tunnel into the radiantly illuminated emerald green space." The game opened a "secret door to numerous worlds religion promised but never delivered."

A native of Chicago and a 1963 graduate of the University of Michigan, Clark was a slender man who favored wool caps and poring over baseball box scores in the newspaper.

In a 2006 poem titled "Baseball and Classicism," Clark explained why:

*Every day I peruse the
box scores for hours/
Sometimes I wonder why I
do it/ Since I am not going
to take a test on it/
And no one is going to
give me money/ The pleasure's
something like that
of codes/ Of deciphering
an ancient alphabet say/
So as brightly to picturize
Eurydice/ In the Elysian
Fields on her perfect day/
The day she went 5 for 5
against Vic Raschi.*



Clark was a contributor to Poetry magazine, a former instructor at New College of California and a dedicated blogger. He posted his final blog entry a few hours before he died.

"It's such a tragedy," said Brandon Loberg, a director at the Beat Museum in North Beach. "He was one of the last of a group of elder statesmen of letters in California. That generation is pretty much passing into the sunset. Now we're without his unique voice."

Loberg said Clark's biography of Beat writer Jack Kerouac is the "most accurate, informative and concise" among many.

Clark attended the University of Cambridge, and according to a tribute by the Poetry Foundation of Chicago, gave frequent poetry readings and hitchhiked around England with fellow poet Allen Ginsberg. He was also a former poetry editor of Paris Review.

A former student of Clark's at New College, San Francisco poet Charlie Getter, said Clark was "just an inspired, incredible teacher. Pansnickety, particular and prickly. He knew more about everything than anybody."

Clark, said Getter, gave his lectures from sheets of decades-old notes that he tacked to a door, then reviewed his students' notebooks full of poems, marking passages that he liked and others that needed work.

"He wasn't milquetoast," Getter said. "He let you know what he thought of things. But it was never personal."

His colleagues praised Clark's gift and his intellect.

In Poetry News, Amy Gerstler said Clark had an "amazing ability to blend humor and cosmic concerns." In Book World, Chad Walsh said Clark had the "ability to look at the ordinary world and see it for the first time, with the freshness of a Zen Buddhist painting a landscape or composing a haiku."

Reviewing a Clark collection of poems in The Chronicle, Joel Lewis said Clark was "one of American poetry's most consistent and constant chroniclers of our long sleepwalk into parts unknown."

And former U.S. poet laureate Billy Collins praised Clark's "many

decades' worth of goofy, melancholic, cosmic, playful and wiggly poems. ... I can never get enough of this wise guy leaning on the literary jukebox, this charmer who refuses to part with his lovesick teenage heart."

On the Berkeley website, poet Neeli Cherkovski shared a poem he wrote in Clark's memory: "... he's been taken to the river, left on the sand, allowed to flow over rock and willow branches — nothing but words, words alone ..."

His survivors and plans for services were not immediately known.

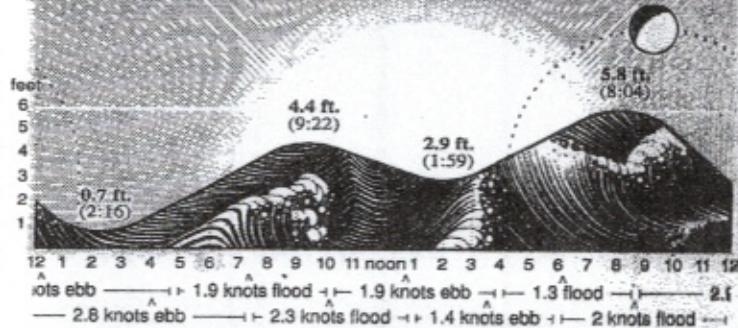

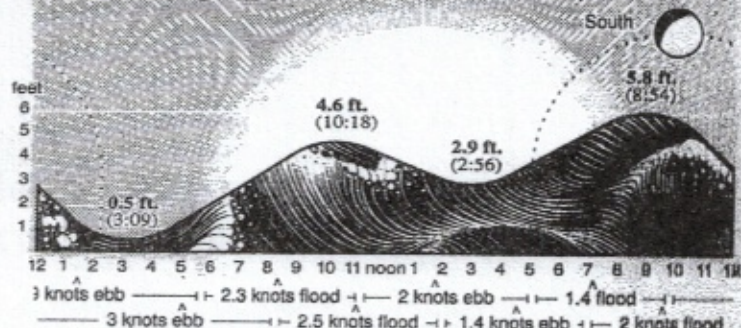
