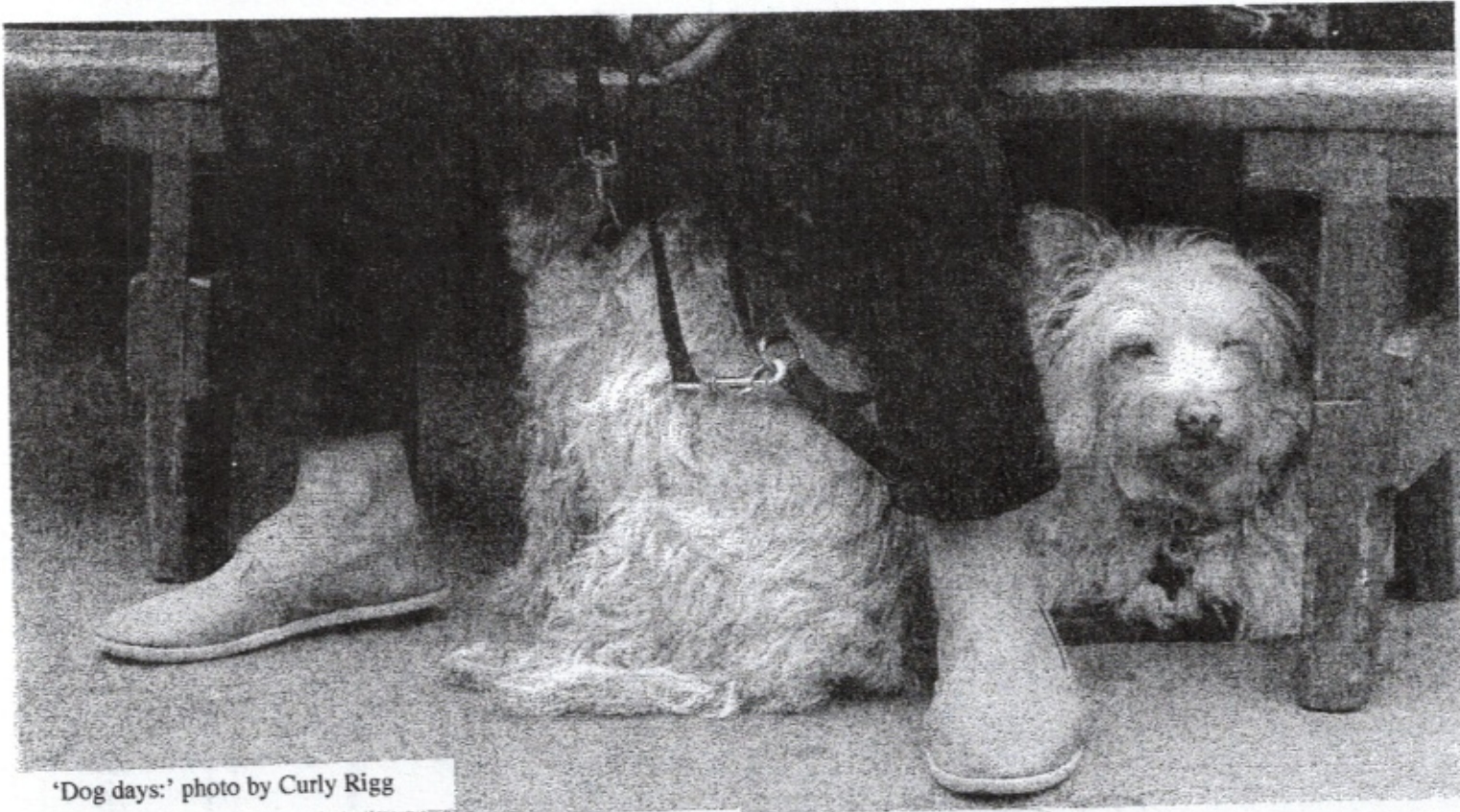

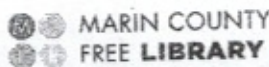

**THE BOLINAS-FAIRFAX ROAD:
139 YEARS OF HISTORY**



Historian & Author Brian Crawford shares the fascinating history of the Bolinas-Fairfax Road, built in 1878 to provide Marin with a crucial transportation link across the county. Intimately tied to the history of Marin County and its water wars, the road was rerouted many times as dams and reservoirs were built. It was also the scene of runaway stagecoaches, landslides, fires, earthquakes, encounters with wildlife and one bizarre holdup. Comment: Septic systems & Cliff Erosion

At the recent community meeting on affordable housing, a long-time resident in the audience said that back in the day (late '60s?), she had talked to a soils scientist who had told her that septic systems on the mesa were causing the cliffs to erode. This is not true. Although septic systems from houses on Ocean Parkway may exacerbate cliff erosion, the cliffs are eroding due to the loose Monterey Shale, rainfall, and storm surf*. The cliffs are eroding from Jack's Creek up to Double Point — about 4 miles along the coast — a lot more than they are in Bolinas, and there are no houses there. There were major slides out there last year after the late rainfall. As well, there have been big slides out on the Holter property (just northwest of Poplar) where there are no homes.

All of our bluff landslides happen in winter during heavy rain periods. There might be septic system water that trickles into the ground water but not enough to cause a landslide. The bluff landslides are a combination of the ocean waves taking the toe of the cliff away along with major ground water moving through our linear aquifers.

This is the type thinking that caused the BPUD board of the '60s to propose building a sewer with ocean outfall for the mesa, which would have been an ecological, functional, and financial disaster. This was one of the main causes for the recall election in November, 1971.

Onsite wastewater treatment is often attacked by people who don't understand the way it works, and this is magnified by bureaucrats and engineers seeking maximum profit from "upgraded" systems. I wrote an article on this in *The Mother Earth News* in 2008: <https://shltr.net/septicmother>

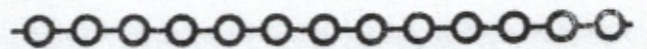
Failing systems ARE a problem when they contaminate drinking water, but that is not the case in Bolinas. Our water comes via gravity from Arroyo Hondo Canyon in pipes, not from groundwater.

The second thing this person said was that the sulfur smells on the beach come from failing septic systems. The sulfur comes from underground and has nothing to do with septic systems. Witness the sulfur water at the Steep Ravine hot springs — no houses anywhere nearby. There is a sulfur smell out on the reef (north of Jack's Creek) — no houses there.

**At Bolinas, soft sands and silts of the cliffs in the Merced Formation are sheltered from the prevailing northwest winds but face the southerly storms of winter. Here erosion has also been dramatic...." From Geologic Trips, San Francisco and the Bay Area by Ted Konigsmark*

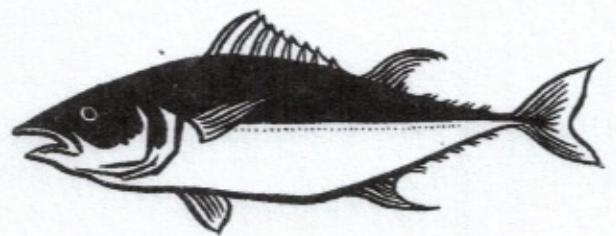

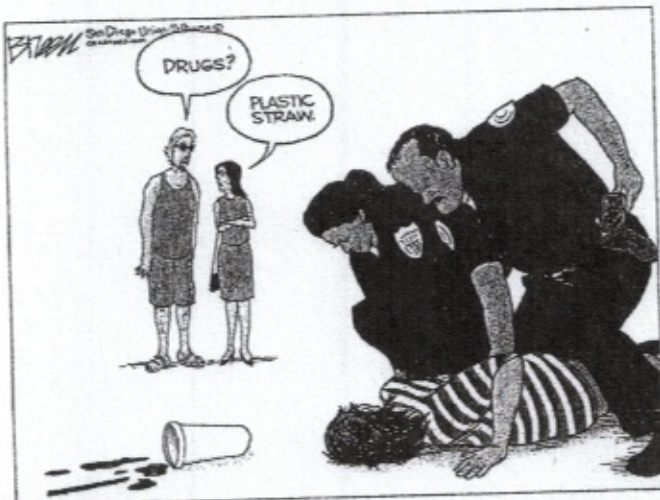

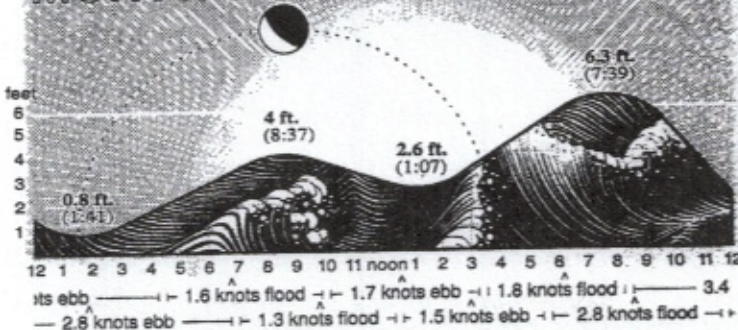
