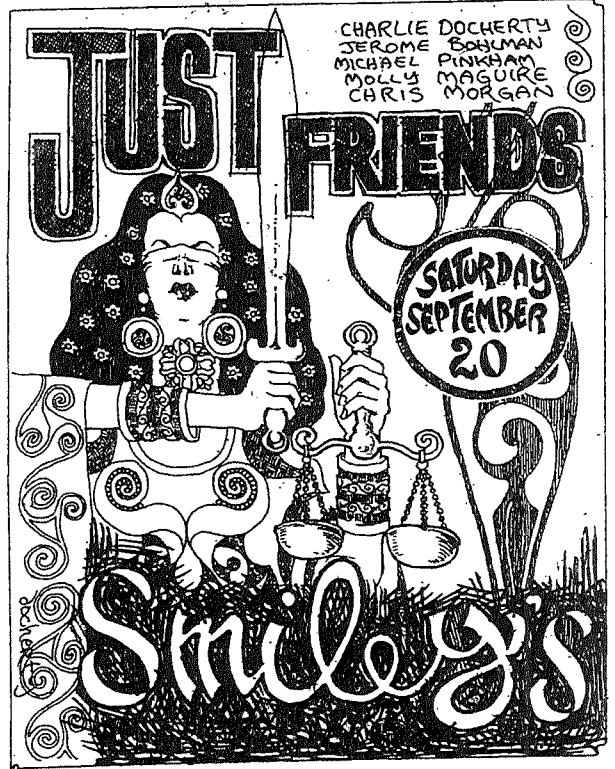
MOLÉ TASTING DINNER

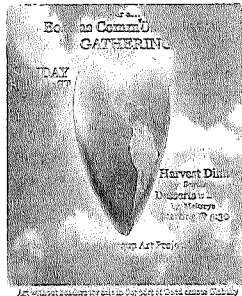

This fall, singers of all kinds will be coming together on Sunday nights at the Bolinas Community Center for a new chapter of Common Voice Choir.

Musical duo Tim Weed and Debbie Daly started Common Voice in 2013 in Point Reyes. Many know Tim as the banjo virtuoso of West Marin. As a longtime professional singer, songwriter and multi-instrumentalist, Tim accompanies the choir and he also writes and arranges original choral music. Tim and Debbie have been singing together for years, and they started the choir because they wanted to share the joy they feel from group singing.

The choir sings folk songs, chants, harmony songs and world music. Tim and Debbie are quick to explain that it's not a formal choir, and there are no auditions. "We welcome all voices," said Debbie, "and it's a comfortable space for people with different levels of experience."

"Even people who consider themselves to be tone deaf often find that they can easily sing in tune when surrounded by others," said Tim. "Everyone is a singer." And for those who are seasoned singers, he said, there are opportunities to lead harmony parts and to sing solo parts while backed up by the choir.

The choir grew fast in its first year, with over 50 members now singing in Point Reyes. Last spring, they started a new Stinson/Bolinas group at the Stinson Community Center, and that group will now meet in Bolinas. They hope to alternate between Bolinas and Stinson each fall and spring.

Common Voice has received a grant from the Stinson-Bolinas Community Fund for the upcoming 8-week session. With the grant, the choir is able to offer 50% scholarships to residents of Bolinas and Stinson who can't afford the full dues.

The choir gets together throughout the year for pop-up performances, potlucks and community service singing. They'll be performing on November 6 with Bread and Roses for the Point Reyes Community Lunch, and on November 23 for their fall season finale at the Bolinas Community Center.

New members are encouraged to join. Fall rehearsals begin Sunday September 28 at the Bolinas Community Center, 7:00-8:30pm, continuing until November 16. Dues are \$180 for the 8-week session if paid by September 25; \$200 after.

Congratulations to project director, Christine Cunha; school director, Susan Tacherra; S.B. Preschool Board; and all those who worked so diligently to bring this to fruition. It will be a well-equipped classroom, and it is good to once again have two fine preschool programs for our District families and our youngest learners. This portable building has been obtained as a three year lease by the Preschool on rented District property.

There are many local organic vegetables being harvested now, so be sure to enjoy the bounty of our excellent local growers, as we appreciate the good fortune of living in this beautiful place, with this lovely pre-fall weather. JP

The White Caps

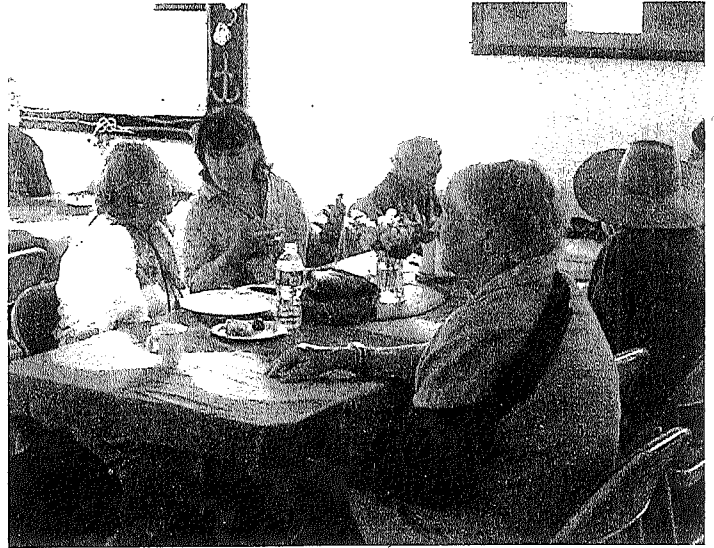

About forty years ago, a congregate feeding program for seniors in Bolinas was closed down. A number of the participants decided that they didn't want to give up the social benefits of the program and started a potluck style lunch monthly meeting. The playful name they gave their group, Whitecaps, was indicative of the prevailing spirit of the group. Many of the early members were foundations of the community, adding luster to its importance.

One of the earliest and most enduring and enthusiastic members was Ed Letter. Ed was the founder of the Bolinas Rod and Boat Club and owned an old house on the Bolinas Lagoon. From its beginning, the meetings were held in the Boat Club's facility and, thanks to the generosity of the present management the Whitecaps, myself included, still meet at their beautiful location.

Originally, the membership was entirely from Bolinas but in the early 1990s Nancy Sullivan, onetime teacher and principal at the Bolinas School, became a member and helped to promote the club in her home town, Stinson Beach. We have some members from farther afield and welcome all who want to join us. Our meetings are typically attended by 25-35 seniors. Visitors are always surprised by the liveliness of the crowd, finding it hard to talk over the happy chatter and laughter. Occasionally we have a brief presentation after the lunch on topics of interest.

The Whitecaps is a non-organization, a happy testimonial to the rewards of benign anarchy. The



original group drew up a set of by-laws which were lost years ago. We are supposed to elect a group of directors each January but forget to do so half the time. The annual dues are twelve dollars, unchanged in forty years. The directors meet a week before the lunch and decide on what will be the club-supplied main course and what the décor will be. We always have brightly colored table-cloths and flowers on the table. Three meetings are centered on a theme each year: March (St. Patrick's Day), November and December. Occasionally, we have another theme such as Mardi Gras and Baseball.
