President's Report: The meeting began with a chorus of the Bolinas Community Center song. The President announced that "The 80's were the real death of the sixties." Minutes from previous meeting approved.

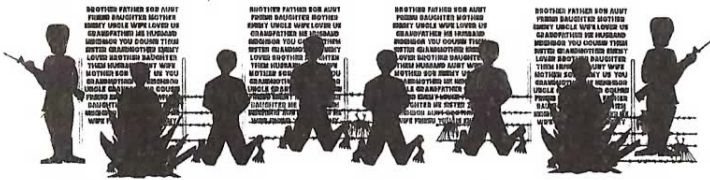

**YISRAEL K. FELTSOTT'S
TRAVELING PORTABLE ART INSTALLATION
ASKS US TO RECONCILE WITH OUR ENEMIES**



BOLINAS, CA—MY ENEMY, (myenemy.org) the vision and prayer of Bay Area artist, Yisrael K. Feldsott, is an interactive portable art installation that will travel cross-country from California to New York on its first leg of the journey. Over the course of two months, the traveling show, erected in many places, will make its first stop at Saint Gregory Episcopal Church in San Francisco on September 29.

The installation consists of a group of life-sized silhouetted figures, which are condemned, kneeling, and waiting for execution. Alongside them stand figures of monks aflame, referencing the protests on the streets of Saigon and Tibet. Accompanying the figures is a text-based background, (English, Spanish, Arabic, and Lakota) bearing words in many languages that reference the fact that we are all someone's neighbor, lover, brother, sister, father, friend, etc... The words spotlight the core of our common experience.

Feldsott's paintings and sculptures, a career that spans almost 5 decades, reflects work that is bold, unflinching, and sometimes confrontational and controversial. (www.feldsott.com). **MY ENEMY** is another challenging work of art that Feldsott hopes will support people in bridging the divide between themselves and their enemies. **MY ENEMY** is Feldsott's call to move through the world with more compassion, empathy, and kindness, even in places of conflict.

The installation will stop at distinctive locations including the Nez Perce Reservation near Moscow, Idaho, The Rocky Mountain Peace and Justice Center in Boulder, Colorado, the site of the Wounded Knee Massacre in Pine Ridge, South Dakota, and Equality House in Topeka, Kansas. Feldsott chose these locations because at these sites the label of enemy has led to the objectification and ultimately the justification of violence towards others. *Tibet House in NYC.*
**Saint Gregory's Church on Sept 29 in SF.*

Relational aesthetics come into play because Feldsott is asking viewers to add to the core installation by conjuring up their own enemies and prayers, while creating their unique offering to the installation. At each stop, participants will be given blank wooden birds, along with painting materials. As viewers add their painted birds to the core installation, their physical embodiment and hope will add a visceral depth to the core of the piece. According to Feldsott's vision, the show will gather the stories of people across the United States and represent their voices. Accumulating and traveling with these painted birds is an important part of the project: the interactive art suggests a reckoning place where a dialogue based in empathy might begin. *If the person across from me is as human as I am, how can I hate him/her so much?* As it expands, the traveling show gives priority to exploring and visualizing the harm done to people across the United States. For Feldsott, this active participation creates an atmosphere where healing can take place.

A documentary film crew will be accompanying the installation, in order to capture the experience of the artists and participants as they collaborate to create a forum for dialogue, questions, and insights—and hopefully a new dedication to dissolving the violence with which we view each other. The film crew will track the project's growth and impact with video and blogs on the **MY ENEMY** website. Upon conclusion of the 10,000-mile trip, the filmmakers will create a feature-length documentary film to honor the diverse group participating in the project.

As **MY ENEMY** travels over the next two weeks, more sites will be added to the website so everyone can follow along. Feldsott will arrive in New York City on October 14 in time for the opening, October 17, of an exhibition of his work: *Cries, Chants, Shouts and Whispers: Songs of the Forgotten*, curated by Peter Selz, at Studio Vendome.

Well we had our practice rain that we usually get toward the end of September and then forget that we get them and are taken by surprise and say "how can it be raining this time of year?!" It's our shakedown drill to remind us that the rains are coming, how ready are we? Usually, not so ready. Where are those blue tarps stashed anyway, and how did all this stuff end up out in the yard? Saturday was the day when we were pretty much asking for it - with three weddings in Bolinas, some drainage and road work going on, a few house improvement projects, and of course, the thing that always brings on the rain, several roof repairs. The sun was out by mid afternoon and the weddings went on as scheduled, all beautiful and moving, and a reaffirmation of the hopefulness of life.

Lots of community dining this weekend, breaking bread together in the Community Center, Friday with the Friday Youth night, and then Saturday night to congratulate Jeff and Vanessa. Then a bright and beautiful day Sunday to send the sixth graders off on their week's class trip to the Sierra with Don Jolley.

Tomorrow will be a look at the sewer pond land, to see what the plans are for use there, and then an updating of the policy for contracts for use of that Community owned open space.

Also this week, speaking of open space, the Mesa Park Board will be stuffing envelopes to send out letters to voters with a full detailing of their request for a renewal of the parcel tax that is so vital to the upkeep of Mesa park. That park gets so much use by our families, that we need to see that it's maintained so it remains safe for our kids. Birthday parties are held there, Little League and multiage hard and soft ball are played there regularly, the skate park is almost always in use, the swings are seeing wear in the playground, the basketball court requires maintenance, the fields need regular mowing, and the trash must be collected for pickup. The grant for grading and seeding the soccer field is to be in place in time for the winter rains, then come spring, mowing in earnest will be necessary so games can resume there again, so the school field doesn't get so much adult use. All these things are ongoing and require a maintenance budget in place. When you get your letter from this hardworking group of volunteer Board members, most newly on board with fresh energy, please read it and get yourself prepared to vote. Last election cycle, this parcel tax renewal lost by only two votes, which means it had a big majority in favor, but not the 2/3 required. The year before that, it won by the same close margin, which goes to show how important every vote is. It's easier to get one third of voters to oppose something, if the two thirds in favor don't get themselves out to the polls to pass it. This money is for Mesa Park upkeep only, nothing to do with Downtown Park, or the pool, both of which have separate budgets. Please read the letter you receive, and give some support to the hard working volunteers who keep that park safe for our children.

Now that the rain has left everything so fresh and clean, we have a few weeks of secret fall-summer to get ready for the rains for real. How lucky we are. jp

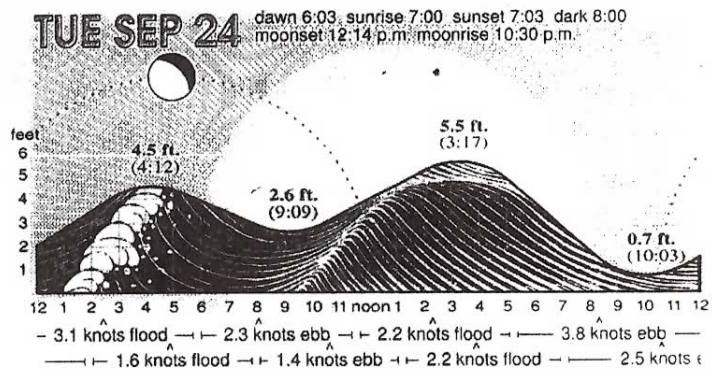
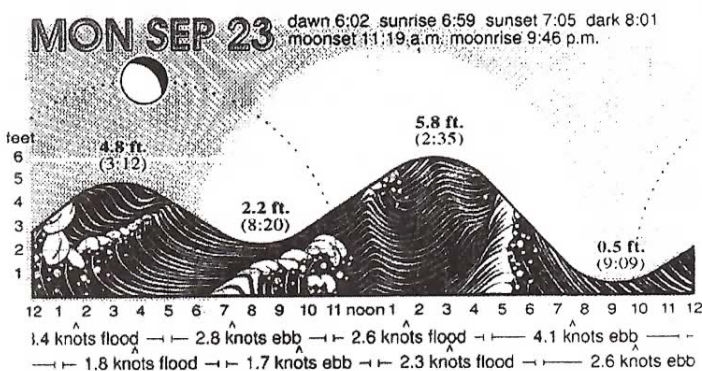

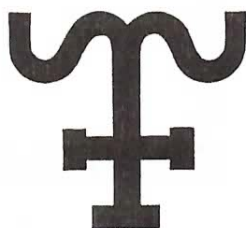
