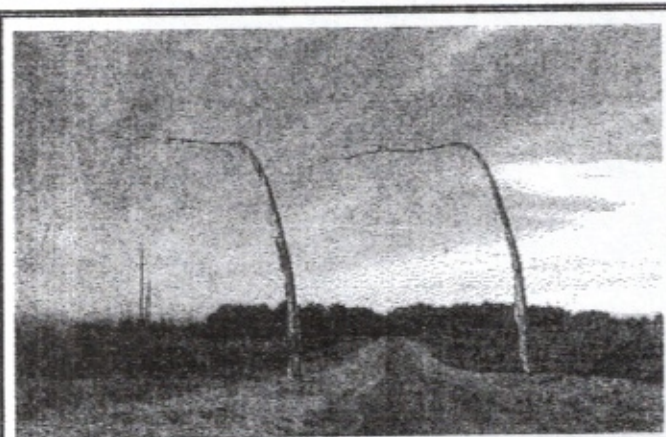

**The Exercise Paradox – Are We Designed to Sit on the Couch?**

We all know that exercise is good for the body and brain, and yet we are becoming less active as work has become more sedentary. If getting out for a walk, or taking a trip to the gym seems difficult, researchers at the University of British Columbia say that the problem is real, and it's happening inside your brain. Research findings, published recently in the journal *Neuropsychologia*, say that we may be designed to prefer lying on the couch. Matthieu Boisgontier, lead author of the paper, wrote "Conserving energy has been essential for human's survival, as it allowed us to be more efficient in searching for food and shelter, competing for sexual partners, and avoiding predators. The failure of public policies to counteract the pandemic of physical inactivity may be due to brain processes that have been developed and reinforced across evolution."

In their study, the researchers had young adults sit in front of a computer. They flashed sequential images of stick figures that depicted either physical activity such as running, biking and swimming, or inactivity, such as sitting or lying down. Subjects were told to move their markers as quickly as possible toward the pictures of physical activity and away from the pictures of inactivity. Subsequently, the order was reversed. Electrodes were recording their brain activity. While participants were faster at moving towards the active pictures and away from the lazy pictures, brain results showed that this required their brains to work harder. Avoidance of physical inactivity comes as a cost – namely increased involvement of brain resources. Boisgontier said "These results show that our brain is innately attracted to sedentary behaviors." Researchers asked whether people's brains can be retrained, adding that knowing what is happening is an important first step.

I found this paper to be astounding. What are its take-home messages? I think it's important to know that the lure of the chair, the hammock and the bed is innate and powerful. If we want to stay strong and feel well, we have to find ways to balance resting and moving. We are all aware that physical activity, including walking, is beneficial for the brain, bones, muscles, heart and most body organs. It helps with weight control and diabetes prevention. Therefore, we have to plan to get movement into our lives. Do more work in your garden, or home. Join a class, or a team. Take Pilates, dance classes, Qigong or Tai Chi. Form a group with friends to walk, talk and visit the gym. If you are a solitary person, you can find good exercise classes of all kinds on line. Set an alarm to get you up from the chair hourly during the day. We humans are endlessly inventive. Knowledge is powerful. Let's go for it! "I'm in love with a place. This place where I live."

—StuArt

Last night I attended Act 1 of *Home Sweet Bobo*, an operatic love letter to Bolinas presented by the incomparable StuArt Chapman, in joyful sing-along collaboration with cast, crew, and audience.

They call it an opera, but I also want to call it "participatory community musical theater"! The play tells the story of the oil spill in the 1970's and the hippies who came to help clean it up—and never left. (Sound familiar, Hearsay readers?) I was struck by StuArt's introduction to the evening: "Sometimes I wonder, did I write these songs?" He paused for a moment. "I think I collect them." He's collected these songs, reflections of this place, for 40 years. Your favorite small-town troubadour has written so well about *Home Sweet Bobo*; check out the Wednesday, September 19th issue of the Hearsay for StuArt's heartfelt artist statement and invitation.

The set was brilliant: Smiley's and John's Store were uncanny in miniature. That big wide part of Wharf does feel to me like town's "main stage" sometimes. The skinny replica of the Freebox, the paisley pink dumpster (alive!), the roving plywood hippy bus... it was all spot-on. My favorite part about the costuming was that it was difficult to tell if anyone was wearing costumes at all.

Beginning the evening with rousing rounds of "Happy Birthday" set the tone. I said to my partner, "If you didn't know the Bolinas Birthday song before you came, you definitely know it now."

"Border Patrol" was so brilliantly meta and tongue-in-cheek—the cast sang "...*nothing ever happens in this town...*" and I thought "yeah right!" as looked around at the lively crowd downtown on a Sunday evening, a sweet time in all of West Marin when the weekly "tourist invasion" has subsided.

"*You're the little town / where we're free to be / whatever we want to be...*" The soft and sweet "Bolinās, Bolinās" was especially moving, particularly as I heard voices from all around me harmonizing on parts they knew by heart.

**Heart.** That was the theme of the evening for me. My heart felt so full, having the opportunity to be present in such a powerful outpouring of community energy. I could almost see the huge hearts of the cast, beaming from their chests, hearts that made the time to be together and learn songs, build sets, and prepare such a generous offering. And I could feel the other full hearts in the audience around me, everyone engaged, people laughing and singing and clapping, Otis standing on a chair asking questions, Sooz shaking a shaker...

I think it's so important to tell, and re-tell our own histories. I think it's important to tell stories

about the places we love, and even more important to tell them with and to each other. Celebratory storytelling where everyone is involved. Narrative has tremendous power in the shaping of a place, and last night I witnessed that power in action.

When we talk about the "spirit of a place," we are talking about the unique parts that we collectively cherish: the things about *this* place that make it unlike any other place. The specificities of geography. The invisible layers of culture. The phrase "spirit of a place" comes from the Roman idea of *genius loci*, which was the protective spirit of a place, often envisioned as a supernatural being or guardian animal. I really felt the spirit of this place last night, and think these songs have some supernatural, protective qualities to them.

StuArt, you're one of my favorite artists. Thank you for this birthday presence!

**MARIN ALERT NEEDS SPANISH!**

I was really thrilled to see the turnout of folks on the Gridded Mesa on Saturday. Upon getting phone alerts on their landlines and cell phones at 9:30 am, neighbors got into their cars and "evacuated" to our Fire Station. It was a fabulous drill in which several hundred folks participated.

Serving as local disaster coordinators, Pam Fabry and I were stationed at the BCPUD parking lot with our portable two-way radio to the firehouse. Fire trucks were whizzing by blurring their sirens as they combed neighborhood streets.

As we were standing there, a Latino resident parked and got out of his car. His face showed me that he was totally perplexed about all this activity. Knowing that I spoke Spanish, he asked me what was happening. Later, when I was at the fire station, the very few Latino residents who were present told me they had gotten a phone alert, but felt it should have been available in Spanish.

Many of our non-English speaking residents own cell phones, yet are not part of the "Marin Alert" system. Granted people need to register with the county to get this service, but the system needs to give folks the option of getting alert messages either in English or in Spanish when they register their cell phone numbers. Marin Alert should announce their messages in both languages.

Los camiones de bomberos zumbaban haciendo sonar sus sirenas mientras recorrían las calles del vecindario.

Mientras estábamos allí, un residente latino estacionó y bajó de su auto. Su rostro me mostró que estaba totalmente perplejo acerca de toda esta actividad. Sabiendo que yo hablaba español, me preguntó qué estaba pasando. Más tarde, cuando estaba en la estación de bomberos, los pocos residentes latinos que estaban presentes me dijeron que habían recibido una alerta por teléfono, pero sintieron que debería haber estado disponible en español.

Muchos de nuestros residentes que no hablan inglés poseen teléfonos celulares, pero no son parte del sistema "Marin Alert". Concedido que la gente necesita registrarse en el condado para obtener este servicio, pero el sistema debe brindarle a la gente la opción de recibir mensajes de alerta en inglés o en español cuando registran sus números de teléfono celular. 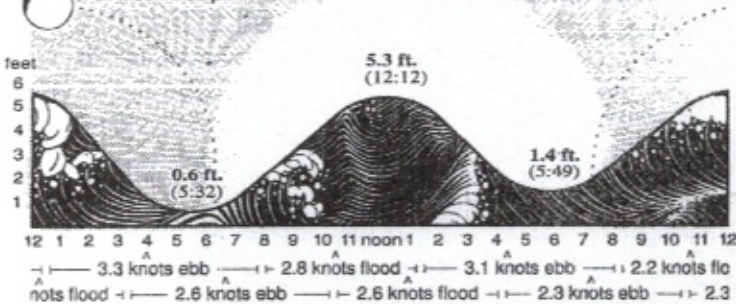

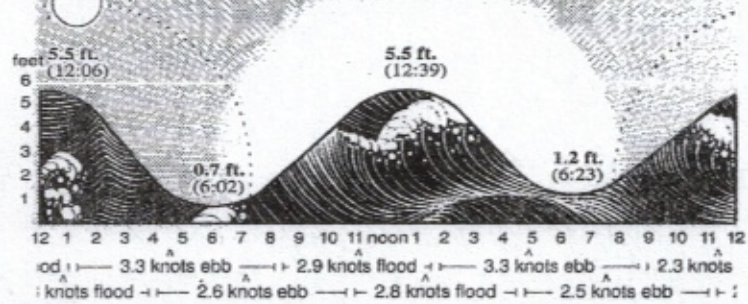

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## WHAT HAPPENED

9-24-18 Monday Morning Recap  
Week-in-Review from Jennie Pfeiffer Riley

It was a full week of meetings and music along with a disaster drill, rounded out by a convergence of Science and Art.

The short form of meeting recap is that on Monday there were three school meetings: Staff Housing Committee, because houses are being sold out from under us for unbelievable prices (it seems our whole neighborhood is up for sale with two open houses yesterday drawing many lookers, few buyers, lots of incredulous faces) and staff members being priced out of the market; Kindergarten Readiness meeting discussing how to best work with the under 4 Bolinas Preschool program, how and where to incorporate Transitional Kindergarten, and how to determine the readiness of our Kinders upon completion of our excellent pre-k program; and then a Facilities Needs meeting discussing, of course, the needs of our school facilities, and an announcement that after many a setback, our pre K playground is now complete. That is good news.

Wednesday was the monthly BCPUD meeting all about water and ways to use, but not abuse the privilege of our water supply. Leaks need to be repaired quickly and those who are renting space to visitors need to be sure they understand our water restrictions here. Report was that we are not being as conscientious with water use as last year. Water use is up while supply is not. Also, fences built in public right-of-ways complicate or prohibit access to reading water meters, causing staff headaches. They request you release the incarceration of your water meter.

A different sort of meeting took place at the Firehouse on Saturday with many Mesa residents showing up for the Disaster Preparedness exercise which was very successful and got us all thinking about how prepared, or not, we are. Thanks to Chief Anita and assistant chief Steve Marcotte for setting this up and providing coffee, tea and treats. While we were taking our evacuation route down Mesa Road, we were passed by many vintage autos headed the other direction. I wondered what sort of Disaster they were fleeing and how long they had been on the road.

In the Art News, the Museum had an opening of three excellent exhibits showing the art/science connection. I highly recommend a visit to see the Cosmic Wonders: The Moon, the Stars, and the Space in Between. I loved Don (Bolinas School 7<sup>th</sup>&8<sup>th</sup> grade science teacher) Jolley's hand-constructed Astrolabe and explanation of same; Marty Knapp's photos of the night sky; and the Joel Coen stereo-photography, a delightful peek-a-boo Haiku.

In the Bolinas Gallery, there are large beautiful works by Judy Molyneux, with her bold strokes of color, spread on in thick application like frosting on a bright cake; and at the Farmstand, Isis Hockenos & Sarah Wiener have a show called MUD SMOKE FLOWER MILK. Check out this art!
