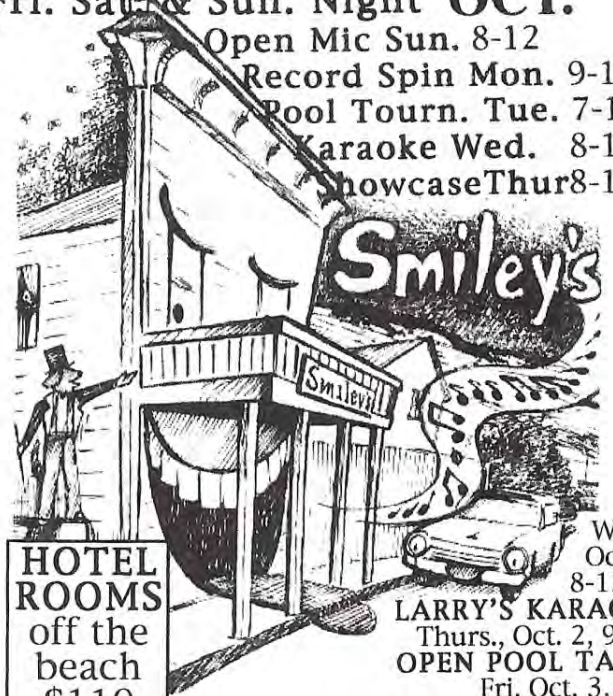

Minutes from the July 28, 2014 Bolinas Fire Protection District Board Meeting

Pres. Buchanan called the regular meeting of the Bolinas Fire Protection District to order at 7:30PM. Vice Pres. Smith, Dir. Chiera, Dir. Bass and Dir. Kimball were present. Also present: Chief Brown, Secretary Brown and Angie Calpestri.

MSC, Bass/Chiera (unan) to approve the agenda.

CHIEF'S REPORT

NERA

Chief Brown attended the Board of Supervisors meeting on July 22nd. The MERA member agencies were requesting the support of the Board of Supervisors to place a measure on the November ballot to fund the next Generation II system. Several MERA representatives made presentations to the Board regarding the need for the new system, its history and the details of the funding mechanism. After the presentations, public comments were heard. About five people stepped up to oppose the tax measure, stating that they were representing Citizens for Pension Reform and would not support another tax until meaningful pension reform was made. Ultimately, after comments were heard, they voted unanimously to place the measure on the ballot. Two of the Supervisors expressed concern about public acceptance. Sup. Kinsey stated he knows it will be challenging, but is confident that it will succeed.

\$200,000 has been spent on the public informational campaign due to the feed back from two survey's showing that the majority of the public had no idea who or what MERA is. Chief Brown stated that she has information for personnel and the Board on the proper way for our District to address the ballot measure in public. Essentially, anyone that is on duty or being paid in any way by the District can only speak factually about the measure.

Any work to promote voting for or against the measure must take place on personal time and equipment. MERA's General Council has provided all member agencies with an opinion regarding Ballot Measure Activities. Chief Brown will forward the document to all Board members and volunteer firefighters.

Vice Pres. Smith asked if every jurisdiction in Marin County uses the system. Chief Brown answered that all do including the transit system, the humane society, and the Sheriff's Office.

Chief Brown explained that the cost of the proposed tax will be \$29 per parcel with a low income senior exemption. She stated that if the parcel tax does not pass in the November election, the cost burden will fall to the District. The District would have to use reserve funds saved for new vehicles which is not sustainable. Most likely, the District would have to go to the public with a local tax for the new system. Pres. Buchanan suggested forming a Citizen's Group to campaign for the ballot measure in order to educate local residents. Chief Brown offered again to provide legal guidelines for how to talk about the measure with the public.

Chief Brown added that all of the radios were reprogrammed last week with added channels. The equipment was in good standing, just required new batteries.

Grants
Chief Brown and Todd Lando have been working on the Bolinas Wildfire Hazard brochure which is currently being printed. Residents and property owners will receive a copy in the next week or two. Extra brochures will be placed in the Post Office for display. Chief Brown thanked Dir. Bass for editing the brochure before printing. Todd and Chief Brown will meet on July 29th to discuss a hazard fuel reduction plan for the Yucca Road neighborhood. The work will be paid for by the California Fire Safe Council Grant with the required matching portion being paid for with Prevention Services monies that have already been budgeted for the District. They hope to continue to receive more grant monies for hazard fuel reduction.

Training
Attendance to trainings has been light due to Volunteers working for other departments but Thursday night trainings continue. Recently, an introductory Engineer/Operator class was held as a refresher for current Volunteers while new trainees did the bulk of the hands-on portion. A public CPR class was held at the station on July 9th. Five students successfully completed the class taught by Capt. Smith.

Volunteers
There are two potential new Volunteers who have contacted Chief Brown. She has invited them to begin Thursday night trainings. Dir. Kimball asked how many Volunteers are current at the District. Chief Brown answered that there are now 21, 23 is the maximum amount for best functionality.

Apparatus
No update.

Disaster Council
Beth Carusillo has updated our Medical, Mental Health and CERT team rosters. A letter has been drafted to all team members reacquainting them with the Disaster Council and the steps they would follow in the event of a disaster, emphasizing their own preparedness first. The Disaster Council is looking for four or five people to attend a Shelter Manager class. Shelter Managers would open a shelter in a disaster should it become necessary. In order for reimbursement to take place for the costs associated with a shelter, the managers must be Red Cross certified.

Beth and Chief Brown have been purchasing additional supplies to be used by CERT members as well as Area Coordinators and Neighborhood Liaisons. Thanks to the generous donations from Susie Tompkins and Home Depot, all of our Disaster Council members will have supplies to use in an emergency including headlamps, spare batteries, scissors, gloves, and knee pads. Collapsible water containers and various other pieces of equipment have been purchased to be used in the event a shelter needs to be deployed for visitors in town who are unable to return home right away.

Building and Grounds
No update.

General Operations/Administration
Sec. Brown and Bookkeeper Gann have been preparing for the audit which is scheduled for early September. A new GASB 67 and 68 requirement regarding pension actuarial has been added to the annual audit in the next fiscal year of 14/15. There will be no immediate charge to the District, but there may be in future years.

The Marin County Fire Chief's meeting was hosted by the District this month on July 17. Fourteen Chiefs from around the County came to the station for a two hour meeting followed by lunch provided by the Lunch Box in Stinson Beach.

Surfers' Overlook Repair/Terrace Avenue
Chief Brown reported that she met with Don Smith, Ralph Camiccia and Kim Bender on July 5th to discuss the feasibility of fund raising for the repair. Kim Bender stressed that in order to raise funds from the community, the repair must be addressed as a safety issue, not historical preservation of Terrace Avenue. Chief Brown confirmed that the District's interest in the repair is absolutely about safety. Mesa Road and Terrace Avenue are the only access/egress routes onto and off of the Gridded Mesa where the majority of Bolinas's residents reside. If Terrace is impassable then Mesa Road becomes the only access/egress route. If Mesa road becomes impassable, which is fairly common during storms, there will be no way for residents to leave the Mesa and no way for the fire department to respond to calls for service downtown or out Olema-Bolinas Road. The option of placing electrical lines underground along the lower stretch of Mesa Road has been discussed. A "broad brush strokes" cost estimate from PG&E some years ago for undergrounding the lines was around 1 million dollars. Trees and limbs that fall during storms blocking Mesa Road could be removed much quicker. The road has been closed for long periods of time in the past due to the long response by PG&E during storms. Due to serious safety concerns, the fire department can not work on or around downed wires until PG&E can confirm they are not energized. The Board discussed the possibility of a new road being developed. This option is potentially cost prohibitive in addition to the topography not allowing for road to be installed.

Dir. Bass reported that there has been discussion regarding the repair at the Rod and Boat club meetings. She said that Roger Kovach, a nearby neighbor to Surfer's Overlook has created a website that outlines the project. Cindy McCullagh and Mark Buell have expressed interest in possibly fund raising.

Dir. Kimball added that the Working Group met after the meeting with Kim Bender. He stressed that in order for the project to move ahead, the community must finance the repair. The community deserves to hear all of the options possible in order to make educated choices. Pres. Buchanan asked if the inkind repair of the top of Surfer's Overlook would be considered the first step. Dir. Kimball answered that would be considered Phase I of the repair costing less than a half a million and possibly buying ten to twenty years in order to raise the funds for Phase II. Phase II of the repair is located at the bottom of the bluff where the face of the cliff will be tied into competent material or "bedrock" below ground level. The Board reiterated the importance of maintaining two access and egress points within Bolinas especially in the event of a massive evacuation.

Personnel
Chief Brown reported that she has moved ahead with filling the Seasonal Firefighter position. FF Tacherra has begun working on Tuesdays and Wednesdays in addition to his regular Mondays. She also hired Brian Petersen for the Friday, Saturday and Sunday position. He has five years experience as a Reserve Firefighter with Corte Madera and Southern Marin and was strongly recommended by Capt. Matt Phillips. He will begin work on August 1st.

Angie Calpestri was hired from five candidates to replace Sec. Molly Brown. She has begun training this week.

Pres. Buchanan asked what "Palo" referred to on the Fire Calls and Emergencies Report. Chief Brown answered that it means the Palomarin Trail. She described a recent call that involved a hiker between the trail head and Bass Lake. She explained that the District and the Park Service respond together to calls in this area. Depending on the location of the patient, the Park Service has an All Terrain Vehicle they will respond from Five Brooks.

GENERAL BUSINESS

Action Item #1: Approve Crown Castle request for signature on Letter of Authorization for permit application to modify Verizon wireless equipment. Chief Brown began by reporting that the District has received the third incorrect SiteSafe EMF report regarding the proposed modification to equipment at the station. The request entails replacing seven of the nine panel antennas with upgraded ones. Ian Johnson has been assisting Chief Brown by reviewing the reports and looking for accuracy regarding the existing equipment on the tower. She reported that overall, the EMF emissions from the possible upgrade will raise the EMF levels by 3%. She recommended approving the request as the EMF levels anticipated with the modification are still well below the allowable limits set by the FCC.

Pres. Buchanan asked if there is an established "cap" or limit on emissions from the Verizon tower is in place. Chief Brown said there is no such understanding with Verizon. She went on to clarify that Verizon must submit the request first to the County and then the County submits it to the District.

Dir. Kimball emphasized that the Board has an obligation to the community to fully understand the reason for the modification. He requested that Chief Brown ask Verizon for an explanation in writing of the proposed modification. After continued discussion regarding the request, the Board concurred to continue the action item on the next August meeting agenda. In the meantime, they asked Chief Brown to request a letter of explanation describing the repair and an accurate compliance report. The Board will await notification from the County first before signing a request from Verizon.

Action Item #2: Proposed final budget for FY14/15.

Chief Brown explained that there has been one budget item added to the preliminary budget. She was advised by Bookkeeper Kaaren Gann to add an expense amount of \$2,000 called "Parcel Tax Shortfall" to the budget. During the past fiscal year of 13/14, the Parcel tax income was approximately \$2,000 less than the Parcel Tax payments for bonds and fees. Sec. Brown will inquire with Kaaren as to determine the discrepancy between the income and expense within the Parcel Tax account.

MSC, Chiera/Smith (unan) to accept proposed final budget for FY14/15.

CONSENT CALENDAR

MSC, Bass/Smith (unan) to approve the Consent Calendar including the Minutes from the June 25, 2014 regular meeting and the warrant lists from June 18 - July 22, 2014. There were no financial reports for June as the County has not yet supplied the reconciliation reports for June.

Pres. Buchanan added that he will be out of town from July 31 - August 18.

PUBLIC EXPRESSION

None.

GOOD OF THE ORDER

Dir. Kimball appreciated Angie Calpestri for being willing to join the Department. He was pleased that someone from our community was hired for the position. She returned the appreciation for being given the opportunity to work for the District.

Sec. Brown expressed her appreciation and gratitude for all the many skills she has learned and the positive experiences she has had at the District since first hired in 2002. She appreciated working within the community of the Fire District, working with Chief Brown and thanked the Board for their support.

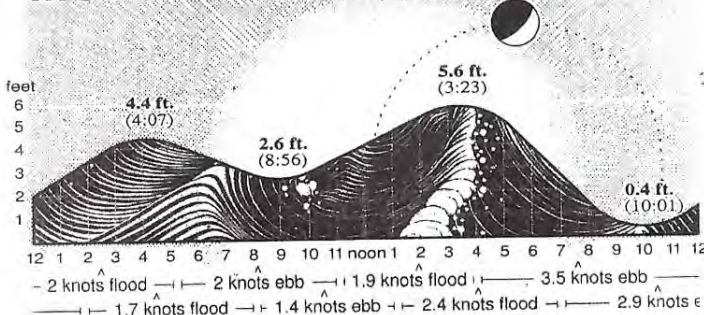

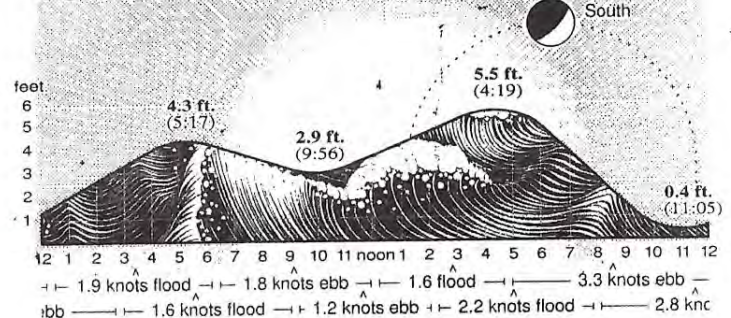

Celtic tree month of Muin ends*

St. Michael is chief of the angels in the Christian tradition, a warrior as well as a master of heaven. Equivalent figures celebrated on the same day are the Celtic Gwynn ap Nudd, lord of the underworld and the faerie kingdom, whose sacred mountain is Glastonbury Tor, and the Norse Heimdall (right), orderer of society, watcher of the gods,



and captain of the 432,000 Einherjar, the chosen warriors who defend Valhalla. September 29 is a weather marker: "Harvest comes as long before Michaelmas as dog roses bloom before Midsummer."

Curious ritual biscuits in the form of a man riding a goose, known as Taffy on a Goose, were sold on this day in Norwich, Norfolk, England, until the outbreak of World War II in 1939.
